**WORK ON ABBEYSIDE PLAYSPACE
BEGINS**

During the week rumour had it that work on the new
playground for Abbeyside was in full swing. On delving
further into the matter our reporter interviewed the
assistant P.R.O. of Junior Chamber Dungarvan as the
Dungarvan Chapter are responsible for this wonderful
amenity.

The new place space will
be located at the end of the
soccer pitch near the Strand
in Abbeyside. The site was
donated by the Urban District
Council and when completed
will be handed back to them
for maintenance. This play-
space will cater for children
from 5 to 13 years. When
completed the equipment
which costs £1,500 will be in-
stalled. This equipment con-
sists of two sets of swings, a
slide, seesaw and rocking
boat. A high fence is being
built between the soccer pitch
and the play space and park
benches are being supplied
for the convenience of parents
and children. An amenity
grant has been approved by
the Urban Council and by the
Department of Local Govern-
ment. The Junior Chamber is
financing the remainder. When
completed it will accommodate
600 children who would other-
wise be deprived of an ameni-
ty, which is their right.

INCIDENT IN FREEDOM FIGHT.

A little known episode in the fight for freedom occurred at Pilltown Cross a short time after the famous ambush there. A section of the I.R.A., consisting of Lieut. Paddy Reilly and Volunteers Bill Foley, Jack Barron, Paddy Broderick, Bill Murphy, Thomas Joyce, and Michael McCarthy, had been instructed to open fire on Youghal Military Barracks from the Black Bog on the Co. Waterford side of the harbour. All were armed with Lee Enfield rifles. Vols Joyce and Murphy were posted as sentinels by the roadside at Pilltown Cross, while their fire comrades went to take up their fire positions at Black Bog. It was 01.00 hours I.A.M. Suddenly the small I.R.A. unit heard rifle fire from the direction of the Ferryport. Apparently acting on a tip off a party of British military had crossed over the bog by boat and landed at the Ferryport. A few local people who were on the seashore, ran away and the soldiers opened fire on them. At the same time Marines from Ardmore were advancing on foot towards Pilltown Cross, where Vols Joyce and Murphy were at their posts, listening and watching suddenly Vol. Murphy found himself 'covered' from the rear by a marine. Observing his comrades plight Vol. Joyce, rushed forward and knocked out the Marine. Both Volunteers then escaped under cover of darkness and amid a hail of bullets from the advancing marines, who had spotted them too late. At 80 years of age, Vol. Joyce is alive and active. Two years later Lieut. Reilly a brave and dedicated soldier was executed in Waterford by the Free State Forces.

FREE TRAVEL FOR OVER 70's

If you are over 70 and not in receipt of a pension from the Department of Social Welfare or a British Retirement Pension, you will be entitled from 1st of August next to travel free on the road and rail services of Coras Iompair Eireann, the County Donegal Railways (Joint Committee), the Londonderry and Lough Swilly Railway Company, the Galway-Aran Islands Ferry Service operated by C.I.E. and the services of certain private bus operators. Your spouse, if under 70 years, will also be entitled to travel free when accompanying you. Before any journey is undertaken, however, you must be in possession of a special travel card to be issued by the Department of Social Welfare.

HOW TO OBTAIN A TRAVEL CARD
Application forms for free travel cards are available at all Post Offices. You should complete the application in accordance with the instructions thereon and forward it, together with your birth or baptismal certificate, in the special envelope provided, to the Department of Social Welfare.

PENSIONERS NEED NOT APPLY
If you are in receipt of an Old Age or Blind Pension or being 70 years of age or over, a Widows' Contributory Pension, Invalidity or Retirement Pension or a Retirement Pension from Great Britain or Northern Ireland you are already entitled to free travel on production of your pension book and you should not now apply for a travel card. Arrangements for the issue of travel cards to pensioners will be announced at a later date.

LIMITATIONS ON FREE TRAVEL
Your attention is drawn to the following restrictions on the availability of the free travel facility which is subject in general to the by-laws, regulations and conditions of, or applicable to, the transport organisations concerned.

Free Travel will NOT be available:
(1) on services not shown in the official rail and bus time tables;
(2) on radio, excursion or special trains;
(3) on motor coach tours or special bus services;
(4) on city bus services, Monday to Friday inclusive, from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. and from 4.30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. in Dublin, Cork and Limerick;
(5) on long distance bus services leaving Dublin, Cork and Limerick between 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Fridays within a twenty mile radius of those cities;
(6) on long distance bus and rail services from noon on Friday to midnight on Sunday of the August Bank Holiday weekend and from 23rd to 27th December, inclusive;

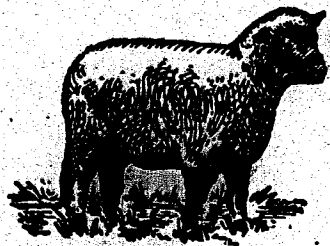

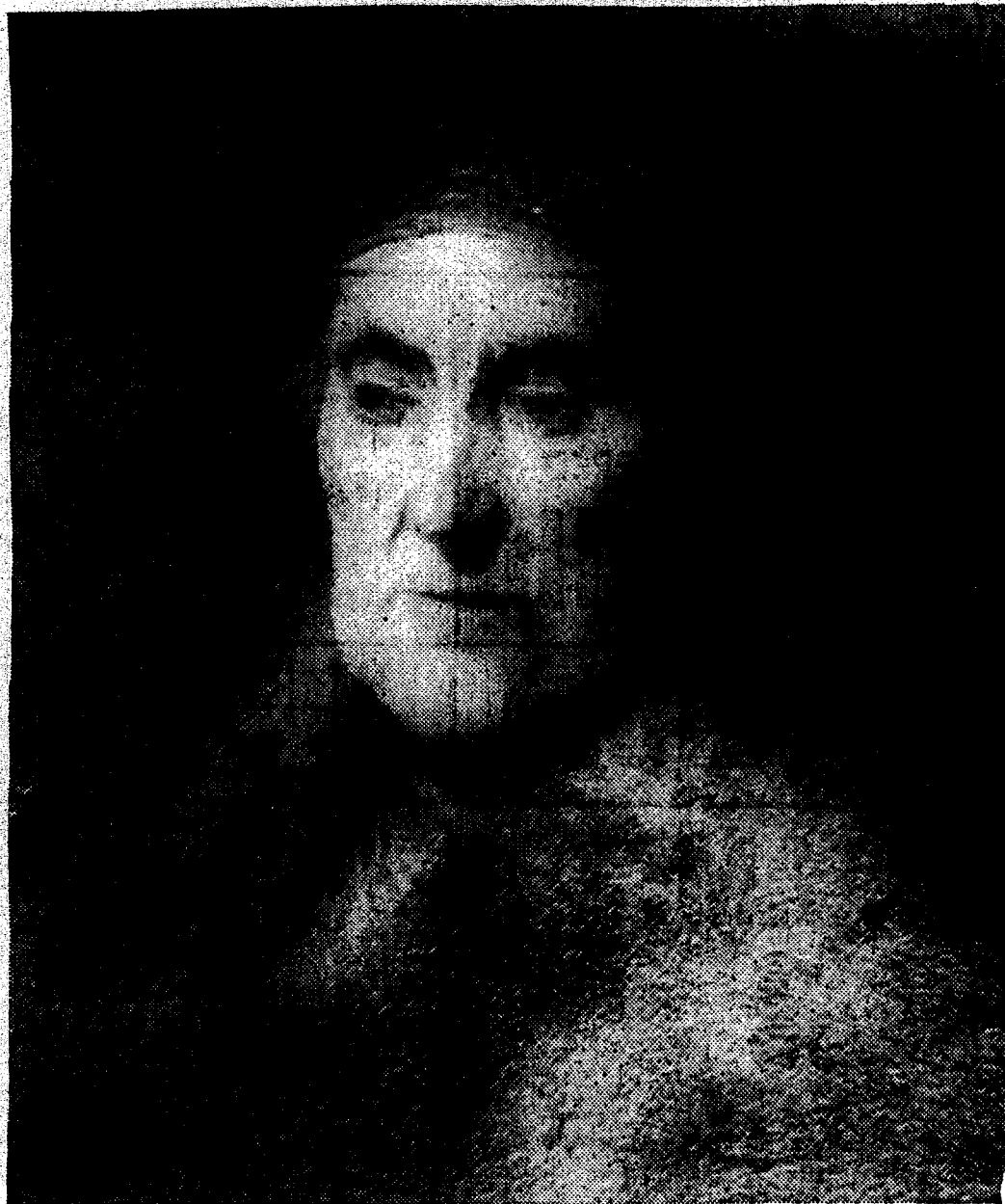

DROMANA

By Octogenarian JOHN O'REGAN



KATHERINE FITZGERALD, THE OLD COUNTESS OF DROMANA, who lived for over 140 years.

In all probability, when Gerald came into the Decies property he took up his residence in the Castle of Dromana which stood then as it still stands, on a high rock overlooking the Blackwater, a safe and impregnable position in those turbulent times it is recorded that Gerald built the castle of Dromana but it is more likely that he built additions to the existing castle. Unfortunately we have no records concerning Gerald except that he married Margaret, a daughter of Mac Richard Burke and left a son John, who succeeded him and who seemed to have lived and died without encountering any of the disturbances and enmities that proved fatal to his brother Thomas, the Eighth Earl of Desmond. This Thomas, we are told was "much favoured by King Edward VI, in whose time he lived and flourished, having followed the fortune of the said King during those long and bloody wars which passed between the two princely houses of York and Lancaster. Now, Edward being mindful of the good services done for him by the Desmond in the Civil Wars for reward made him Lord Deputy of Ireland. Just before leaving for Ireland, Edward sent for the Earl and asked him "what fault worthy of reprehension the people found in his new begun Government." Desmond's answer was that "the greatest fault any man would lay to His Majesty was the unequal and too low match he made when he married Elizabeth Woodville." Desmond furthermore advised the King "to cast her off and to join and link himself to some greater and powerful princess. The King was not angry at the Earl's plain spokenness but sent him to Ireland "with many gifts and favours." Now it so happened that some years afterwards the King "upon some discontent grew angry with the Queen and said "had I followed my cousin Desmond's advice your pride had been abated long since. Afterwards when the King and Queen made up their quarrel she caused her husband to tell her exactly what Desmond had said and being "a spiteful woman sought and studied how to be revenged upon the Earl and to bring her plan to fruition she stole the King's privy seal and then directed a warrant or command formally sealed to the Earl of Worcester, who was then Lord Deputy of Ireland, commanding him upon sight thereof to put the Earl to death." Accordingly the unsuspecting Desmond was lured to Drogheda and "made shorter by a head to the great astonishment of the whole nobility of Ireland." This little tale is indeed a warning to anyone inclined to interfere in the family affairs of other people. The unfortunate Earl was succeeded by his two eldest sons and a grandson and then the succession fell to his third son, Thomas, who became the twelfth Earl. This Thomas is of special interest to us because he married his cousin,

Katherine Fitzgerald to that Gerald who became First Lord of the Decies and of Dromana. Katherine Fitzgerald is one of the most extraordinary figures in history because of her great age, for she lived to be 140 at the very least and some writers say, to 160 years. However, a dame so venerable is worthy of all consideration and must in consequence be given the next chapter entirely to herself.

KATHERINE FITZGERALD—THE OLD COUNTESS OF DESMOND

Katherine Fitzgerald was born as far as we can judge about the year 1464. In all probability she first saw the light in her father's castle of Dromana or Dromany as it was then called. According to tradition she spent some period of her girlhood at the Court of Edward IV in England. One writer in speaking of our heroine asks "Why was Katherine in England, then goes on to say "let us conjecture with retrospective clairvoyance that she came over, young, fair, to grace the Court as a medieval Maid of Honour (or like another fair Geraldine" her kinswoman who was educated with her cousins, Queen Mary and Elizabeth) she was brought up with the Royal Princesses who were her own age. The luxurious Edward IV gathered round him a court circle, he most beautiful in the world, so that the eyes of foreign ambassadors were positively dazzled by the superabundant lovely young ladies they saw at the State Ball in the Palace of Westminster. Judging from Katherine's picture, painted when she was 140 years, one can quite well imagine that she may have been very beautiful in her youth. Horace Walpole says in his vivacious way, in speaking of her picture — "shades of veteran beauties, she carries the historic proud countenance of the Geraldines of her day. Aristocratic, patrician and placid, though deeply traced with sorrow, eyes hazel, features regular and handsome, a complexion yet fresh and healthy. Cete Comtesse dans sa premiere jeunesse, fair vivacious now diminished to six score years" — must have been more lovely than the widowed Lady Anne, whose heavenly face provoked haunted sleep. One is inclined to agree with Walpole's estimate of Katherine's character. She lived in an age that fostered such qualities, an age in which the weak and wavering went to the wall because the law of the survival of the fittest held undisputed sway, an age that produced virile men of the calibre of Columbus and Raleigh and women of iron purpose and dominant intellect, like Elizabeth of England. If we are to believe the story of Katherine to be true, we may indeed regard her as the type of character liable to be produced by the eventual sixteenth century, which was a veritable battle field, whereon the darkness

of medieval tyranny strove to annihilate by violence and bloodshed the insistent and ever-growing demand for light and freedom. Granting that Katherine had enough personal charm to win her footing in the Court circle of the fastidious Edward, there was probably another reason that might account for her presence. Edward, as we have seen, entertained a great regard for Thomas, Eighth Earl of Desmond and was deeply displeased at his unauthorised execution. This Thomas was great uncle to Katherine and uncle to her father, so it is more than likely that, in order to atone for the chief-tain's untimely death, Edward may have gone out of his way to show honour and friendship to his near relatives. On the whole, it is quite probable that Katherine did, as tradition recounts, visit the English Court. But whether she did or whether she did not, she chose no gay English gallant to be her husband, but a kinsman of her own house and blood, her cousin, Sir Thomas, third son of the Earl who was beheaded at Drogheda, and himself, many years afterwards, successor to the family title, as Twelfth Earl of Desmond. The marriage probably took place about the year 1480 but the exact date is impossible to fix.

Conclusive and irrefutable evidence concerning Katherine's great age and the chief events in her life, is very scanty. Sir Walter Raleigh, in his "History of the World" says very distinctly "I myself knew the Countess of Desmond, of Inchiquin, in Munster, who lived in the year 1589 and many years since who was married in Edward VI's time and held all her jointure from then the Earl's of Desmond since then and that this is true, all the noblemen and gentlemen of Munster can witness." That he calls witnesses to support his word, shows that he scarcely expects that the very unique story will be believed. Sir Walter published the first edition of his history in 1614, only ten years after the conjectured date of Katherine's death, when it would have been easy to contradict his statement. We have proof that it was unchallenged because another and similar edition was published in 1617, the year before Raleigh was beheaded. We may be certain that as he wrote while a prisoner in the Tower under Royal displeasure, there were not lacking parasites of King James' Court who would have gone out of their way to prove an error in Raleigh's work. Yet they apparently held their peace. From the time of Katherine's marriage in 1589, when Raleigh tells us, she was living in the castle at Inchiquin, five miles from Youghal, we have no records of her life. We do know something concerning the career of Sir Thomas, her husband, and thus knowing, must conclude that his life was far from peaceful. For Sir Thomas was a very turbulent charac-

ter and like all his family, lived and died fighting.

He was known by the name of Thomas the Victorious and sometimes as Thomas "the Bald." He must have been a hardy old ruffian, for at the age of eighty it was reported to Henry VIII that "albeit his years required quietness and rest, yet entertaineth he as much trouble as ever did any of his nation."

One old chronicler says that Sir Thomas "was very fortunate and a great warrior, having been an actor in nine fought battles. He was General of the horsemen in that great battle which was fought out between the Earl of Kildare then Lord Deputy, and General of the whole Kingdom of Ireland and the great O'Brien of Thomond, which battle was valiantly and resolutely fought out by both parties and the victory stood doubtful. This Earl Thomas Meale (Irish for bald) had the honour to give several overthrows to two lords of Muscerry and the killing of the one of them being his father-in-law. Many other valiant feats and acts, worth ample relation, were by him manfully undertaken and performed both before and after he came to the earldom. One gathers from these and other sources that Sir Thomas was indeed stout of heart and valiant in the killing of his enemies, the beau ideal of a man in those times and in fact the only type that was honoured and approved of. Now, I fear he could be regarded as a ruthless savage. Nevertheless, he was a leader among men and a fitting mate for such a forceful personality as Katherine. It speaks not a little for her powers that she did keep a grip on her rough husband for more than forty years, for she never bore him a son and that in itself constituted sufficient cause for the breaking of the marriage tie in Ireland in the Sixteenth Century. As a matter of fact, Thomas had presumably "put away" one wife before he married Katherine. This is the only theory that coincides with Raleigh's statement that Katherine was married in Edward VI's time, for the first wife was known to be alive in 1505. This lady's name was Gills Ny Cornyk, a daughter of Cormac Oge Cartie, the Lord of Muscerry, which Lord we have just learned Thomas had had the "honour" to overthrow and kill whether the quarrel which proved fatal to the Lord of Muscerry arose because Thomas "put away" Gills, or whether, after her father's death, she herself insisted on a separation, is not known. We are sure that Gills was alive in 1505 because a document is still in existence showing that she lived land from Earl of Kildare in that year. The wording of the document runs thus "An Identur from Gerald FitzThomas, Earl of Kildare unto Gills Ny Cornyk wife of Sir Thomas of Desmond upon Corbyne in the Countie of Cork, for terme of five yerres paying yearly at Michlemas and Easter XXVI, VIII sterling and that the said Gills shall not waste the woods. Dated IX of June XXVIIII." This document could not have been correct as to the date of Katherine's marriage but on reflection it strikes one forcibly that if Gills had been living with Sir Thomas as his acknowledged and reigning wife, she would not have hired land on her own account and in her maiden name close to her husband's property. Neither would the Earl of Kildare have been willing to give a lease of lands to Gills if she had been living with her husband and in her maiden name for there would have been no security as he could have repudiated it at any time. It was of course, a different matter if, as we are assuming, she was leading an independent life apart from her husband. The Irish marriage laws appear, even as late as the days of Queen Elizabeth, to have been extremely lax. It was a perfectly easy matter, in the times of which we write, to annul a marriage, and it appears to have been regarded as quite an ordinary occurrence. One has only to study Irish History in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries to find instances after instance to prove that the marriage tie was a mere slip-knot holding the parties together no longer than inclination or interest induced a continuatio of the connection.
