It must surely rank as the biggest single fixture ever held in the town. Over £10,000 in prize money will be distributed by the time the final event takes place.

Two merited greyhounds and their lucky owners will get £1,000 each and a trophy for winning the Derby and the Oaks. The £1,000 steeplechase at the horse race meeting on Thursday, February 8th, will carry also a prize of £1,000, of which the winning owner will receive £750. This race is so framed as to qualify the winning at the horse race meetings on 1. The Cup was presented to T. Sheehan, captain of Park House by Mr. Barry Ahern of Quigley Magnesite.

There are five £500 prizes to be distributed. The winners of the Derby and Oaks Consolation Stakes together with the runner up for the Derby and Oaks, will receive £500. There is also a £500 first prize for the Champion Stakes 1972/73.

An innovation this year is the Champion Stakes 1972/73 for eight all-aged greyhounds selected by the National Press Coursing Correspondents under the chairmanship of Mr. J. Murphy, Managing Editor "Sporting Press." This prestige event was made possible by the generous sponsorship of Mr. Jackie Nallon, Proprietor of Hotel Minella and Mr. Jack Mullen, of Newry, who each contributed £250. In addition, Mr. Mullen has presented a silver trophy for the winner.

The premier event at the International Open Stake confined to lady nominators merits a handsome trophy and a cheque for £250 to the winner. Apart from the eight Irish nominators they are also from England, Germany, Australia and the U.S.A.

At the Clonmel Greyhound Race Track each night the preliminary rounds and semi-finals of the usual assorted feature events will take place. The winners get handsome rewards and there is a ready market for the greyhound which performs well there. Many Cross-Channel and American owners and prospective buyers are present during all these events.

So great is the interest, Clonmel bulges at the seams and there is an overflow into the neighbouring towns. Visitors are advised to book accommodation early to avoid disappointment. All in all it looks as if the coursing and racing enthusiasts, both horse and greyhound, will have a week of festivities in Clonmel between February 4th and 8th 1973.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

The committee of Kilgobnet Scor and Hour's Entertainment wish to inform you whom it may concern that its artists are withdrawing from all those competitions indefinitely for reasons that are obvious to all those who patronise the above contests, and are remaining out until such time as they feel that a proper panel of competent adjudicators is set up. They also feel that the present system of running the competitions is crude in the extreme and is causing great dissatisfaction all over the country. The danger is that if something is not done about it in the near future a number of clubs may drop out altogether and nobody wishes to see this.

In our view these Social Activities are even more important than the games themselves. As far as we are aware there is no proper system of marking as yet, and to add to this drawback the powers that be are engaging local adjudicators, many of whom are of doubtful competency. We are not for a moment doubting the integrity and sincerity of these adjudicators, but we think that these attributes alone do not entitle them to adjudicate. We think that every adjudicator should have the ability to sit in judgement on top-class performers all over the country. This is not the case at present. We find people who never danced a set, adjudicating sets. We see people who never played a note of music adjudicating musicians of All-Ireland standard. Other artists are suffering a similar fate! Until such time as a proper system of marking and adjudication is devised it is very unfair to expect adjudicators to carry on, and it is even more unfair to expect artists to compete.

Why can't we have adjudicators from outside the county? Conradh na Gaeilge, and the combats can do so with great success. As is well known clubs put a lot of hard work and sweat, not to mention time and expense into the training and coaching of their artists, and on the right of the competitions it is not enough to be told that you have won by a narrow margin, or that you have just deserved to win, or perhaps the announcement — after twenty minutes' consultation — "round the conference table" — goes like this: "This was a nice affair, but we are of the opinion that so-and-so just got 'here'. Lord, how crude! This is not good enough in 1973.

What has become of the adjudicators' comment and summation we were so accustomed to in the past? What could be fairer and more entertaining than constructive criticism by a competent adjudicator, accompanied by the appropriate marks for each item. Yes what has become of the marks under the present system, or lack of system? Are some of able to handle the marks, or are we afraid of them? Or again have we something to hide?

With proper organisation every G.A.A. club in the country could be involved. Not alone that, every competing club in the county should be represented on the committee dealing with the Scor and Hour's Entertainment. As matters stand many G.A.A. clubs have never entered the competitions, and most clubs, actually taking part in the contests are without representation.

In present circumstances our remaining in the competitions would serve no useful purpose. It could only promote bickering and jealousy, something we could all do without. At any rate all our artists refuse point blank to continue in either the Scor or Hour's Entertainment and do so in spite of great pressure by our highly respected chairman, Noel Fleming, to carry on. Romance and Tragedy of Steady Castle

(Continued from last week)

The broken stairs lead to a small illuminated stone room "the Ladies Bower" of the olden times and thence up to the turret top.

The interior of the castle is a mere shell and the ground covered with ruins and rubbish and overgrown with nettles and rank weeds but it is well evident that there were four stories with three floors supported on plain stone corbels and on the ground floor may be traced the kitchen with ample fire-place and an arched recess beside it. This apartment adjoins a machicolated flanking tower of the other rooms, nothing is left. The whole building is very plain, solidity and security seem to be the whole aim of the founder.

The entire castle, according to tradition, was surrounded by a moate, furnished by a drawbridge — of this no trace remains — the moat having been long since filled up to facilitate agricultural work around the spot. But it is time to pass from the description of Steady Castle to its history and that of its original possessors, the McGraths.

In very early times the ancient family of the McGraths held large estates in the west of County Waterford, the Augustinian Abbey of Abbeyside, near Dungarvan; amongst the ruins of which, under a low window at the east end is an ancient tomb inscribed "Donal McGrath, 1400". For the defence of the Abbey, the family built beside it a lofty square castle — some of which still remain. Local tradition affirms the McGraths also built Farnage Castle (of which not a trace remains) near also Castle Cloghagh (Crough-clooney) part of this castle, round in shape, can be seen near the roadside and Castle Reich, near Ballymacarthy — all near the boundary line of Waterford and Tipperary. At the close of the sixteenth century and the commencement of the seventeenth, the most remarkable member of the family was Philip na tSioda pronounced "na Teeda" meaning Silken Philip, polished and elegant, which he is said to have been to an eminent degree.

It is said that at this period one of the family estates, comprised seven townlands within a ring fence. Philip had two brothers of whom the one named John is said to have built the old (now in ruins) castle of Clonostoran near Dungarvan. The other brother, Pierce, is stated to have built the old Castle of Kilmahanah in the Barony of Glengahela.

The personal grace and accomplishments of Silken Philip found favour in the eyes of a noble and beautiful maiden — Mary Power or Poer, daughter of John De La Poer, then Baron of Curraghmore. She fell madly in love with him surmounting the opposition of her family and married him.

When Philip brought home his bride to the old castle at Farnage, where he then resided, love had not subdued all the pride of the high-born lady. She desired her husband's dwelling as soon as she saw it and positively refused to enter it, saying that her father's table would be a more fitting residence for a lady. She ordered dinner to be served on a rock hollow overlooking the Finia river and when the table was set over she returned to her father's safely home at Curraghmore and there determined to remain until her husband should have built for her such an abode

as she could esteem worthy of her presence and she further required that it should be erected on her own jointure lands of "Curragh na Steady" in order to secure for herself the use of the intended casue during her lifetime. Philip at first refused to build the desired residence but his wife insisted with such vehemence that a serious rift was imminent between them as the lady vowed never to be reconciled until she obtained her wish. The bridegroom seeing his domestic comfort at stake yielded and commenced the work. Their friends and relatives came forward to his assistance as well as numerous tenants of his family and their connections, not only gave voluntary labour but also brought such large contributions of every kind towards defraying the expenses of the building that when the Castle at Steady was completed, Philip McGrath found himself much richer than when he commenced. It is a circumstance worthy to be recorded of an Irish gentleman. A quantity of fine oak timber was used in the construction of the castle but not a vertige of it now remains, having all been carried away piece-meal by the peasantry, subsequent to its desolation and in one of the principal apartments was erected a handsome marble chimney-piece with the name of the founder and the date of the completion of the building — Philip McGrath, 1628. That memorial was extant for more than a century after the destruction of the castle but of which there is now no trace.

Tradition says that the building of Steady Castle occupied seven years during which period Philip McGrath's wife presented him with four children, the three elder were daughters (name in the order of birth — Margaret, Catherine and Mary — the youngest child was a son, Donnell (Anglice Daniel). The Castle being at length finished and the lady's pride gratified, she came with her husband and children to take possession and the now happy couple looked forward to many happy years of enjoyment. Philip McGrath and his wife lived lovingly together, esteemed by their equals and respected by their inferiors and for a few short years' comfort and happiness seemed to have blessed their abode at Steady but scarcely had five years elapsed from the completion of the Castle when Philip McGrath was snatched away in the prime of his life from his new dwelling, his loving wife and his affectionate young family. On his death, his son Donal — a child — was removed by his guardians to Dublin to be educated but the widow with her daughters remained at Steady. She was a clever and notable woman and all things that devolved to her management, threw so well that Steady Castle, forlorn though it looked, was famed for its ample stores of rich plate and fine linen, handsome furniture and well-filled money chests.

Another sorrow, however, afflicted her not long after the loss of her husband. Her son, Donal (or Donal) died in his minority between 1633-41. The estate of Steady or at least the principal part seems then to have been vested in the next male heir, Pierce McGrath (brother or Philip) but the widow still continued at the Castle with her daughters who were possessed of very large fortunes.

G.A.A. Club Administration

Down the years much has been said and written on the above subject. At times I have been at variance with some views. Nevertheless, those views enables on to form some kind of view that keeps one on course. The wonderful thing about the G.A.A. is we agree to differ. Speaking for myself I have evidence that I have attended meetings of the Waterford and London County Boards. I found there was hard-hitting at times but when the meeting was over all was forgotten. We usually had a drink together. That is as it should be, true democracy.

Back to club administration, I have been associated with many clubs. Without boasting, I can claim to have seen the good and the bad. The club I like best is the struggling club. With little or no money one will find that only dedicated Gaels are associated with such clubs. The voluntary effort is ever present. That is what the G.A.A. is all about. All the great Irishmen associated with the struggle for freedom were imbued with such ideals. Money, I agree, is essential to run a club, but I have found such clubs don't always have the best players and win titles. In such circumstances, the voluntary effort is not so evident. It is a good thing to see clubs progressing but I have also noticed if clubs are well off financially, it might well attract the wrong type of person.

The club is the root of the great Association to which we belong. To have a progressive club you must have good officials — a secretary with diligence and prudence; a chairman who can listen and take action if required; a treasurer not in name but one who can study all aspects of his task. Experience has taught me small committees are more efficient than big ones who prove at times to be unwieldy. One of the most important posts in a club is county Board delegate. He must be well briefed on any subject which he raises, otherwise he can be made to look silly and embarrassed. The greatest danger that a progressive club can encounter is — a newcomer comes along to a club A.G.M. and is proposed for election against a tried and true official. It has happened that the outgoing official has been defeated by such a person. I have when such a thing happens the club suffers, not always. Members of the club should know some of the the background of a new candidate for a position of responsibility.

Clubs should only send men to county conventions who are conversant with the aims and ideals of the G.A.A. It is regrettable to see delegates at conventions who only come to vote. One might ask what my experience of running clubs is? My reply is that it is a long one.

Anyhow, whether you agree or disagree, it will give club officials an opportunity to discuss points raised. That again is true democracy in operation and what has really stimulated the Gaelic Athletic Association in fair weather and in
