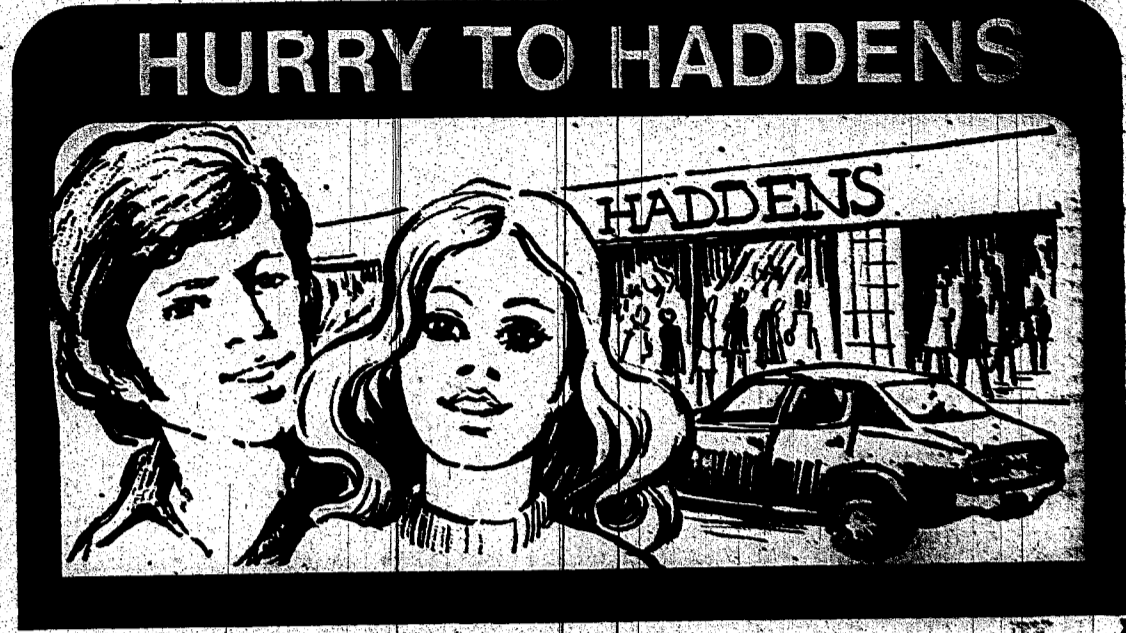

WATERFORD CO-OP. TAKES OVER SNOWCREAM

The Board of Directors of the Waterford Co-Operative Society Limited wishes to announce that terms have been agreed for the acquisition of the total shareholding of Snowcream Ltd., Waterford and Snowcream (Wexford) Ltd., suppliers of bottled and carton liquid milk and cream in the South Eastern region. It is intended to operate the business on the present basis under the name of Snowcream and existing arrangements with regard to supply and distribution will be continued. All employees in both companies are being retained. It is intended to expand the range of products and services offered by Snowcream in the areas currently being supplied.

The acquisition is a further important step in the rationalisation of the dairy industry in the South East which is now well advanced through the amalgamations completed by Waterford Co-Op. during 1972. The Society through these recent amalgamations serves farmers and consumers in the Counties Wick, Wexford, Kilkenny, Tipperary and Cork as well as Waterford. "Dairy Fresh" butter as well as many other quality dairy products are manufactured and distributed by Waterford Co-Op.

The Society which had a throughput of 55 million gallons of milk in 1972 is the controlling shareholder in Kilmacdonagh Creamery Ltd. cheese manufacturer of County Waterford. Snowcream has been trading in Waterford for 24 years and in Wexford for 18 and during this time has established a reputation for quality and service which the Society intends to maintain.

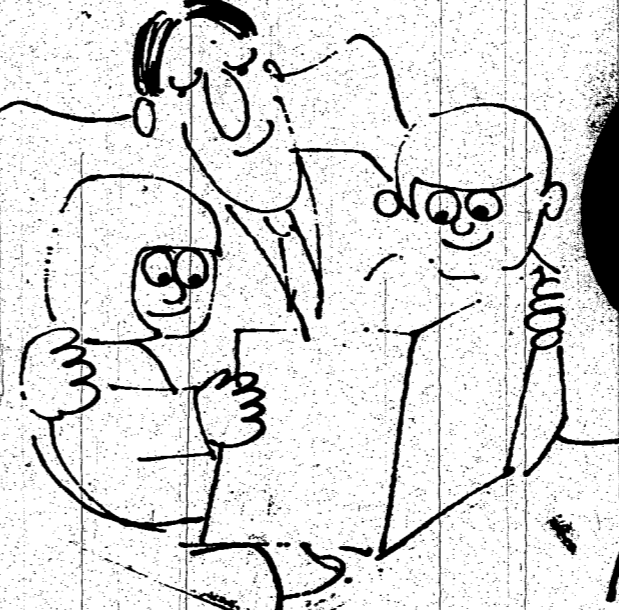

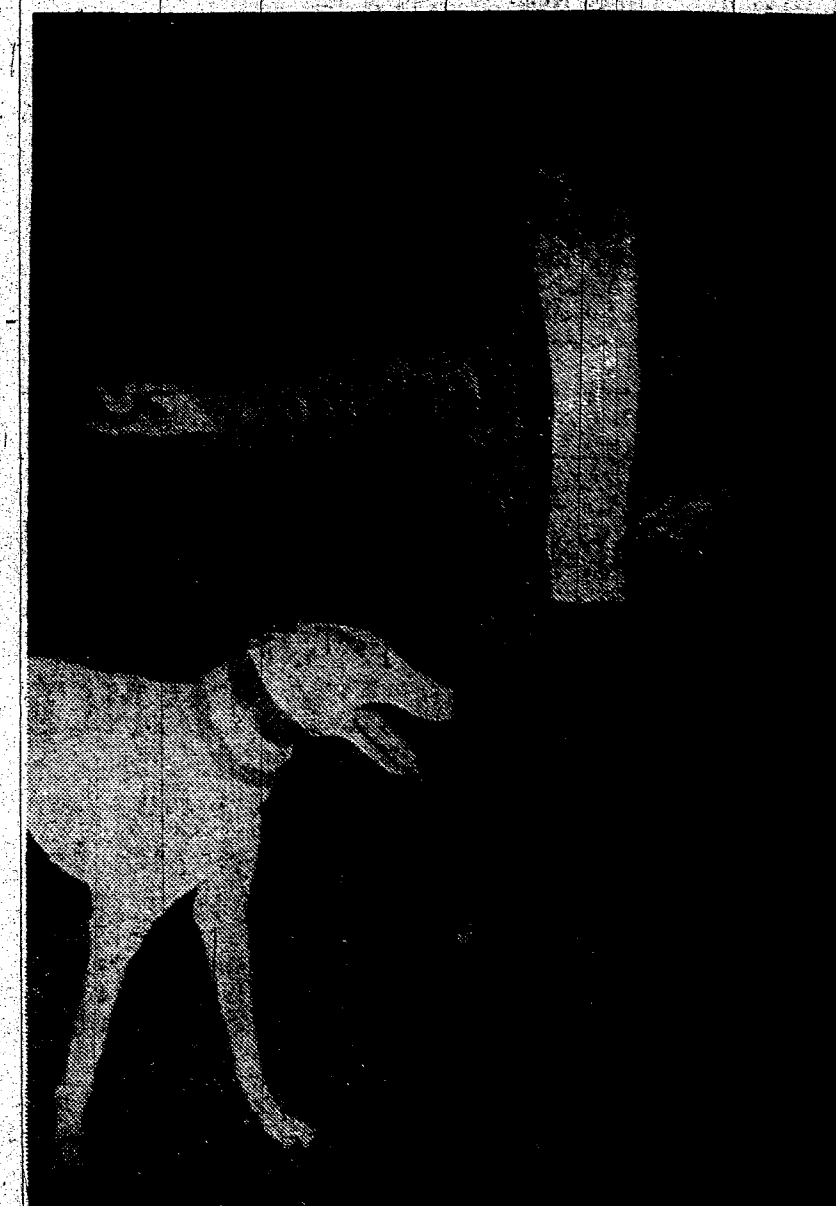

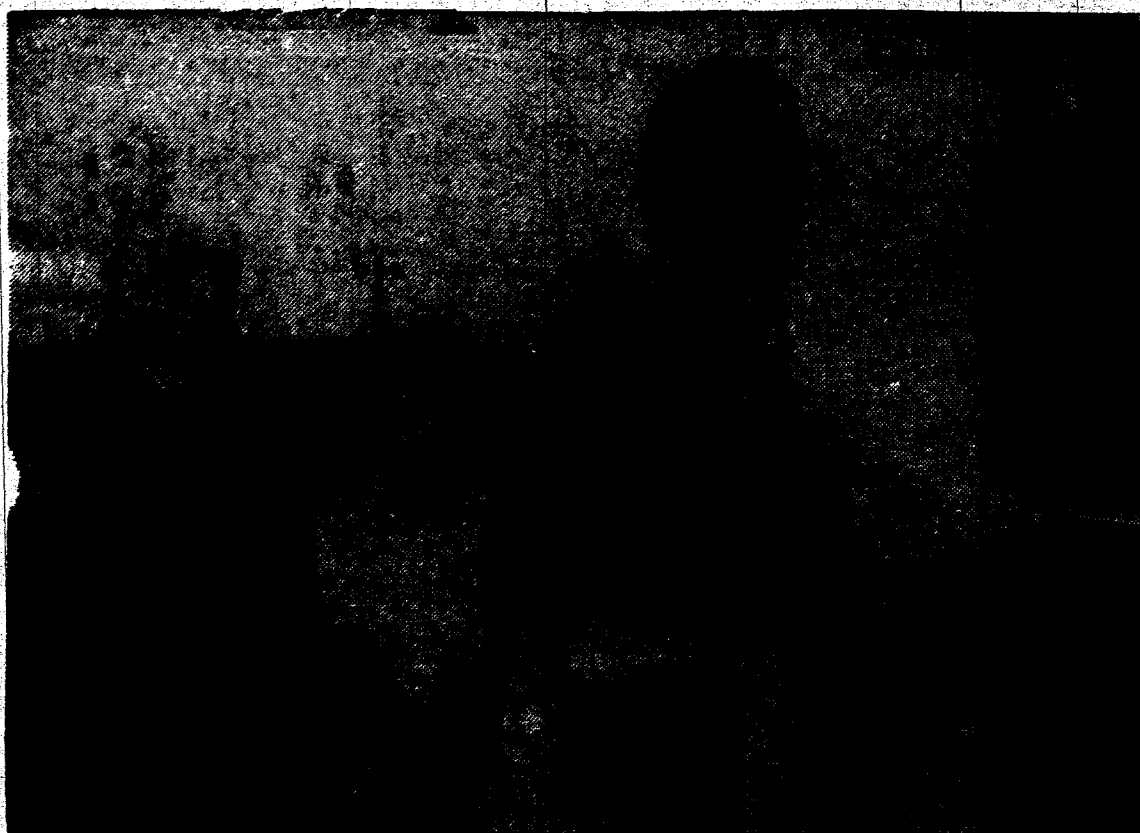

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

CONTOVERSARY OVER SALMON FISHING LICENCES
Mr. Austin Deasy, M.C.C., at Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council, expressed his grave concern regarding the fishermen along the Waterford coastline whose future's are in jeopardy due to the forthcoming reduction in salmon fishing licences.
Mr. Deasy said he realised licences had been abused in the past, but not by people who had to use the licences for their livelihood. If these licences are cut the County Council should appeal to their former colleague, Mr. J. Fahy, T.D. Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries endeavouring to avert the drastic reductions. It is unfair he said to see some people suffer because of the avarice of others.
Mr. M. J. Shalloo seconded Mr. Deasy's proposition.
Mr. Patrick Kenneally said it is an alarming situation as salmon licences for the river Blackwater are also to be reduced, thus threatening the livelihood of the fishermen.
Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman, said he saw the grave seriousness of the situation as 14 people have applied for a reported six licences being issued.
Mr. M. Harty said this is as a result of big vested businesses coming in and capitalising from the salmon fishing business.
Anyone who has had a licence for the past five years will automatically be entitled to a renewal.
It was unanimously agreed to appeal to Mr. Fahy, in an attempt to avert the proposed reduction of licences.

Romance and Tragedy of Steady Castle

(CONTINUED)

The widow was endowed with excellent qualities and her great kindness and merits were universally acknowledged. She gave her daughters a good education according to the fashion of the times and they grew up to womanhood remarkably handsome and attractive and had as may well be supposed, innumerable admirers, not less on account of their wealth.

Tradition relates that the eldest daughter, Margaret, was of a stately order of beauties and had inherited the pride of her mother in her youthful days. The youngest, Mary, is said to have been a mild and winsome lass, so kind, so gentle and so lovable that she was commonly called in Irish "Maire Milis Ni Philip na Siods Silken Philip's Sweet Mary".

The three sisters were very fond of society, embracing every opportunity the neighbourhood afforded of enjoying it and they frequently visited Clonmel which being a military station, the balls and parties held there were enlivened by the presence of the officers.

The commotions of the 17th century were favourable to gangs of robbers and outlaws who infested the rural districts to which they were a plague and a terror, robbing and murdering by night and sheltering by day in bogs and mountain recesses. The part of Co. Waterford of which I write — the Parish of Modello, was frequented by a band of notorious robbers whose leader was a desperado called "Uathne" which means "Green," by which name I will call him. This man had long and greedily desired the plunder of Steady Castle but for a long time all his plans for effecting an entrance were defeated by the precautionary measures taken by the widow (Mrs. McGrath) who quite alive to the dangers of that time kept garrison with unrelaxing vigilance. The

gate was always locked and the keys in the lady's possession. The moate was always kept full and the drawbridge never lowered without strict precaution and nobody allowed in or out of the Castle after nightfall and when the matron had to absent herself on any business, a trusted relation was appointed temporarily. To attempt to swim the moate would be suicidal as one ran the risk of being drowned or shot by the sentry always on duty and again the height and narrowness of the castle precluded escalade but Green was not to be diverted from his purpose by obstacles. He knew that the pillage of the castle would amply repay him for time and risk and pains lavished to win his objective and he was determined to await his opportunity. At this period he had established his headquarters at a 'Lis' or fort (a circular fort or stronghold with underground chambers built all over Ireland in ancient times, as protection against wild animals as well as smouldering men) lying about a distance of four miles from Steady Castle. Experience had proved to Green that he had little chance of succeeding in his designs upon the lady's stronghold without the aid of domestic treachery. The servants generally were faithful, being old retainers of the family, though, however, amongst them a kitchen maid, whom he hoped, through the means of love and vanity to use for his designing ends two dangerous sentiments for a weak female head and a base female heart. This scullion was just the fit subject for the villain, being the person in the household and the farthest removed from meanness and least cultivated comprehending anything of loyalty or honour.

Green had amongst his band, a son, who acted as his lieutenant — a remarkably handsome young man, whom the outlaw tutored to throw himself in the way of the kitchen maid as she went and returned from Mass and to profess himself her lover. They met — the young Green

and the scullion on Sundays and church holidays and the endearing charms and presence of this pretended lover made such an impression on the wretched girl that she entered into all his plans and promised to watch for the first favourable opportunity for his stealing into the Castle and make it known to him by a pre-arranged signal.

In consequence of this agreement, Green the elder, moved his band of ruffians to within easy striking distance of the castle and established their night quarters about a mile from their objective at a huge rock called in Irish "Carrig-a-Hulla" i.e., "the rock of sleep," popularly termed "The Sleepy Rock", a name given to the place by the peasantry for the fact of Green taking his repose there, while his sentinels watched for the arranged signal from the Castle. The sleepy rock or rocks lie near the summit of a hill called "Eagle Hill" alongside the old road between Clonmel and Dungarvan, about a mile from Bears Cross on the main Dungarvan-Clonmel road.

About three miles from 'Rocks' is a kind of pass called "Duhbh Cloth" i.e., "the dark fence" which seems to have been a kind of fortified road between two woods. Amongst the wild crags of the Steep mound the outlaws made their midnight lair. At that period the entire district was then densely wooded and was a haven for wolf and wild cat, fox, badger and Eagle (hence "Eagle Hill").

The outlaws were clad in the Irish mantle — an apocloak for a thief with pistols and "skein" (dagger knife) and were villains banished from towns and houses of honest men and wandering in remote secluded haunts far from the dangers of the law here the brigands reposed at night while the wakeful sentries kept watch for the loved for signal from their ally in the Castle.

Fraher Field Closure - A Major Problem

The Western Board's annual Convention which will be held at the C.B.S. Hall on Sunday next, commencing at 2.15 p.m. clearly will be the focal point for all Gaels within the Division this weekend. This Convention is arousing more than usual interest as it is now certain that we will have contests for virtually all positions on the Board with the exception of the Secretaryship where Seamus O'Brien is honoured by being returned unopposed for another year. Surely this is a fitting tribute to a dedicated official. In all there are 13 motions down for discussion. All in all it should be one of the most interesting and lively Conventions of recent times.

Hereunder we give Motions, Nominations and Secretary's report

MOTIONS

1.—That a special effort be made to have all our championship completed by the end of November each year. (Cumann na Seamroga).

2.—That referees for all Western finals be drawn from the Eastern Referee's panel and that this convention instructs the incoming board to seek a reciprocal arrangement with the Eastern board. Cumann na Seamroga.

3.—That the making of fixtures (championship and League) i.e. the arranging of dates, venues, referees, etc. be the function of the incoming officer board, or of a special fixtures committee to be set up. That a comprehensive fixtures list be prepared, embracing all stages of all grades up to and including Western Finals. That a copy of this list be then furnished to all club secretaries and an acknowledgment received. Clubs will then be deemed to have been notified of their fixtures.

4.—That in future all objections be heard by open meetings of the Western Board. Relevant By-laws to be amended, if necessary. (Cumann Ath Mheadhonn).

5.—That the fixtures committee prepare a fixtures list, giving dates and venues for all fixtures for the entire championship (all grades), and that no postponements be granted thereafter, except those covered by general rule, (existing By-laws to be amended where necessary). Cumann Ceapach Cuinn.

6.—That the chairmanship of the board be held for three consecutive years only by any member. Having served his three years term of office he will be obliged to stand down for one year, after which he would again be eligible to contest the position. (Existing By-laws, if any to be amended if necessary). Cumann Dun na Mainistreach/Baile na Cuirte.

7.—(a) That the board under 14, minor and under 21 hurling and football championship be completed not later than the month of August each year.

(b) That the Intermediate and Junior championships in both codes, be completed not later than the month of October each year. (Cumann Dun na Mainistreach/Baile na Cuirte).

8.—That this board in expressing its complete dissatisfaction with the failure of the county board to acquire the Fraher Field, Dungarvan, requests its representatives to the county board and all other delegates from West Waterford who are on the county Board, to use their position to ensure an early purchase of the Fraher field. (Cumann An Coilligean).

9.—That all championship fixtures for minor, under 21, junior and intermediate football and hurling, be placed completely in the hands of a fixtures committee, to be appointed by the Board. (Cumann An Coilligean).

10.—That the fixtures committee draw up and publish a full programme of fixtures for Minor, under 21, Junior and Intermediate hurling and football championships in the month of February. The programme to be strictly adhered to. In the event of a draw, the replay to take place within 14 days of the drawn game. (Cumann na Coilligean).

11.—That Divisional Vice-Chairman and Treasurers, become automatic members of the County Board, as applies at present for the Chairman and Secretaries of Divisional Boards. Existing By-laws to be amended, if necessary. (Cumann Dungarban).

12.—That this Convention call on the British Army to withdraw forthwith from its occupation of Casement Park, Belfast. (Cumann Dungarban).

13.—That regular monthly meetings of the Board be held in 1973. The dates to be decided on at the first Board meeting following the Convention. (Cumann Dungarban).

Secretary's Report

Once again it is my privilege to submit for your consideration and adoption, a report of the activities of your Board for the year, just ended.

It is pleasing to report that the scale of activity reached in recent years was well maintained in 1972. This was to be expected when the seventy-two affiliated clubs entered a record total of one hundred and forty-six teams for the ten championships under the Board's jurisdiction.

A total of seven of these teams eventually withdrew, but the number which took part still constitutes a new record for the Board.

The following is the number of teams which took part in the different championships: L.H. 12; L.F. 8; J.H. 20; J.F. 24; U/21/H. 11; U/21/F. 16; M.V. 10; M.F. 14; Juv. H. 10; Juv. F. 14.

The closing of the Fraher field created a major problem for the Board, as on average, forty per cent of all games were played at this venue. The result being that all the games that would ordinarily have been played there had to be fixed for the other venues — thus creating a severe strain on clubs from the Dungarvan area and an overloading of championship fixtures to the other venues. The over all effect, apart from the inconvenience to clubs and to the Board, was that the championships ran a little later than usual and one of our competitions, Junior football, remains to be finished.

Members are aware that the County Board offer of £35,000, for the purchase of the Fraher field has not been accepted and that there is still a difference of £15,000 between the negotiation parties. In the circumstances, we cannot look too hopefully to the renewed use of the venue, unless the Board and the owners are reconciled at their forthcoming meeting. Needless to mention, it is the expressed wish of every Gael in the country, that 1973 will

see a satisfactory solution to this major problem.

Again I am pleased to report that 1972 was a very successful year as far as the playing of our championships were concerned. In all one hundred and forty games were played and as will be seen from our balance sheet, our games continue to enjoy increased support. In most of our games the high standard set in recent years was well maintained and as a result seven of our clubs were able to win county titles.

Our Balance Sheet once again shows the Board to be in a very strong financial position and with profits of nearly £400, again this year our assets have now reached the all-time high level of £1,800.

The gate receipts show a decrease as compared with 1971 record receipts, but this is explained by the fact that in 1972 we did not have the same number of very attractive draws that we had in the previous year. Also the fact that no games were played at Dungarvan, which hitherto had been our leading revenue earning venues, contributed to the decrease.

An analysis of the situation, therefore reveals that our games are being given increased support and there is every reason to expect that our financial position should continue to improve.

BOARD ACTIVITIES

A total of nineteen meetings of the Board were held during the season and with a few exceptions the attendance was satisfactory. Again, some clubs when beaten in the championships, seem to show no further interest in the running of the Board, by remaining absent from meetings. Clubs who are not represented at meetings very often find themselves at a disadvantage by failing to keep in touch with Board activities. The attendance of officer members of the Board was excellent and there was a very satisfactory attendance at all fixtures and objection committee meetings.

During the year, in accordance with County Board decision, a disciplinary committee was elected and in all, three meetings were held.

The following were elected members of this committee: Ciaran O Riain, Seamus O Tobin, Donnca Mac Craith, Sean O Liathain and Seamus O Brian.

During the year, the appointment of County Board representative, Sean O Fearsachain, to the position of County Registrar, left a vacancy on the Board which was filled by Tomas O Scannlain, Ath Mheadhonn.

In accordance with County By-Law, the Board at their March meeting appointed five hurling and five football members who were to act as local advisers to the official County Selectors, but nothing useful resulted from this exercise.

SCOR '72

The main social and cultural interest of clubs throughout the Division were again well catered for in the "Scor" competitions run by the County Board and the number of clubs which participated this season, showed a marked increase over the number the previous year. Scor '72 provided a much needed outlet for the talented members of clubs who availed of the opportunity to expose their hidden talents. To the clubs who succeeded in the County finals and particularly to Siabh gCua club who won All-Ireland honours in the traditional set-dancing competition, I extend the congratulations of the Board.

In an effort to cater for the cultural needs of our younger members, a "Scor na nOg" competition on a county basis was organised this year and this also met with tremendous success.

In the Scor '73 competitions which have commenced, more than sixty per cent of the clubs in the division have entered and this is also assured of support and success. As usual practically all clubs in the West have held their club functions and again this form of social activity among our units is proving popular. Many of our clubs have suggested, during the year, that trophies won during the season, should be available for presentation at such functions. This is a matter that should receive the attention of the incoming Board.

SCHOLARSHIPS

During the summer season six young members from the Division availed of the County Board Scholarship scheme and spent a month at Coláiste na Rinne. It is disappointing to find that only six applied to be interviewed for the course, which is open to all Minors and Juveniles within the Division. It is thought that many clubs fail to inform their younger members of their entitlement in this respect. A continuation of the apathy shown in recent years may lead to a discontinuance of the scheme.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

The number of motions before the convention which deal specifically with the running and scheduling of our championships, reveal the clubs concern about a situation that is getting worse each year. Again this year several of our championships were stretched over too long a period, with the unsatisfactory result to some clubs of having to wait for an unusually long period between their matches.

Some of the trouble in this regard, results from the Board's willingness to accommodate clubs who require the services of players, available only during the holiday period. Another contributing factor is the bye-law which allows a "free Sunday" for the All-Irelands. The net result is that the problem of finishing the championships is becoming worse in each succeeding year. It also makes it necessary for the Board to have attractive fixtures leading and to insist on fixtures being played in very bad weather conditions.

I have on many occasions recommended the setting up of a committee to make a searching investigation into all aspects of our activities. Now there is a more urgent need than ever before, for such a step.

Such a committee, as well as planning an overhaul and restructuring of our championships, could also consider how best our power and influence can be utilised to develop the Association within the Division. I believe that greater involvement by members of the Association within the Division, in the running of some of our Board activities would result in greater efficiency and it would allow the Board Officers more time to carry out the plans made annually at our Convention.

I am confident that the Convention will support the motions which ask for such a sub-committee.

IOMAINT

As in the previous year, twelve teams played in the Intermediate hurling championships following some very mediocre displays in the first round. The championship reached a satisfactory standard in the succeeding

rounds. The games of note were the matches between Seamroga and Eire Og, Caislean Cuanach and Baile Ui Duibh and Baile Ui Duibh versus Ceapach Cuinn. In the final Ceapach Cuinn and Seamroga played a draw. The replay was the highlight of the championship year and after a thrilling game of top class hurling Na Seamroga emerged winners. A great display against Baile Ui Duirn in the County final brought Na Seamroga their first and well deserved County title.

PEEL

Seachranaithe an Gleanna withdrew to leave eight teams for this championship which was to a great extent dominated by Ard Mor. In the preliminary rounds, Baile Ui Duibh surprised by defeating tSean Phobal and Na hEimleagh and Lios Mhor, when beating Eire Og. In the final Ard Mor proved too good for Baile Ui Duibh, being going on to win a long deserved County title.

One of the unsatisfactory features of this championship was the fact that it took twenty weeks to complete with only eight teams participating.

BUN PEIL

A total of twenty-four teams entered for this championship and only one, Na Bricigh, withdrew. Because of our very unsatisfactory grading system, several of our Intermediate and Senior teams were able to enter a second side. In all sixteen of the teams in the competition were second teams of clubs and these were grouped in a separate section, with the semi-finalists proceeding to the championship proper. The teams which survived to the semi-final stage were Dungarban, Baile na Cuirte, Ard Mheadhonn and An tSraibhdhale.

In the championship proper, Na Seamroga, Siabh gCua Cill Gobnait and Tulach an Iarainn were most prominent and at the time of preparation of this report the entire championship has reached the stage where Tulach an Iarainn meet An tSraibhdhale and the winners will meet Siabh gCua in the Divisional final on the Sunday after the Convention.

Many of the clubs involved in the late stages of this championship also had teams involved in other championships and this was to some extent responsible for the late finish.

BUN IOMAINT

Twenty teams entered and even with the withdrawal of An Turin, it was still our biggest ever junior hurling championship. As was to be expected several teams again aided by our regrading system, fielded very weak sides and as a result the standard for the most part was mediocre in the second division of this championship.

In section 1 we had some splendid contests between Cill Gobnait and Baile na Míolach and Baile na Sagart versus Naomh Mhuire.

The best games of the competition were, Dungarban v. Baile na Sagart in the semi-final and Baile na Sagart v. Cill Gobnait in the Western final.

Baile na Sagart took the title for the second time and then went on to win a great county final against Cnoc Sionn. This was Baile na Sagart's first hurling title and the result gave the club some compensation for their defeat of two years ago.

FE 21 IOMAINT AGUS PEIL

With one or two exceptions the games in these championships were keenly contested and a number produced a far higher standard than many of the adult games. In hurling, we had close and exciting clashes between Lios Mhor and Ceapach Cuinn, Baile Ui Duibh and Tulach an Iarainn (twice) and Dungarban and Dun na Mainistreach. In the final, Tulach an Iarainn took the title from Ceapach Cuinn following a great game that remained in the balance up to the final whistle. In the county final Tulach an Iarainn took their first title in the grade when they came out on top in a game of top-class hurling against Cuanh Phaidh.

In football, fifteen teams took part and again the standard was excellent in the

majority of the contests. Baile na Cuirte, the county champions and Ath Mheadhonn reached the final of this championship and despite the atrocious weather conditions both teams played some fine football. Ath Mheadhonn proved best in this thriller and were justly rewarded for their perseverance, despite much adversity over the years in this grade.

They subsequently won the county title following a great performance against Port Mor in the county final.

MINOR AND JUVENILE

Ten teams fielded in the minor hurling championship in which we had some good and some poor games. We had to wait until the Divisional final to see the best contest and here the holders, Tulach an Iarainn and Dungarban produced some delightful hurling before Tulach an Iarainn emerged winners to retain their title.

In the county final our representatives made a brave effort in failing to beat Tra Mhor.

In minor football, fourteen teams took their chance in a competition that was for the most part dominated by Tulach an Iarainn and Dun na Mainistreach who met in Western final. This was another splendid final with the holders, Tulach an Iarainn retaining the title by a narrow margin. They were subsequently beaten in the county final by Tra Mhor.

Tulach an Iarainn's almost complete dominance in the underage championships was again very much in evidence in both juvenile competitions. They won both titles in defeating Dungarban in the hurling final and An Uidhir in football.

Tulach an Iarainn then went on to win the juvenile hurling county final in which they defeated Tra Mhor in a game that will be remembered as one of the highlights of the under-age competitions this season. They lost to the same opposition in the juvenile football county final.

Ten teams took part in hurling and there were fourteen in football.

BORD NA NOG

This committee set up to organise and administer the Under-14 hurling and football championships in the county has had another very busy and successful year and both their county championships met with tremendous success.

Both championships were run on a divisional basis and in this division the games were organised and played with great enthusiasm and spirit.

Dun na Mainistreach took both Western titles having defeated Lios Mhor in hurling and Ath Mheadhonn in football.

In the county hurling final the Western champions excelled in a thrilling game against the Eastern champions and Dun na Mainistreach took their first title in the grade.

Following the county championships, on the instigation of the Board Cathairleach, Micheal Mac Conaladh, a western board as a subsidiary of the county board was formed and at the first meeting of the committee a winter football league was arranged and this is in progress at the moment.

As well as the above competitions local juvenile leagues in both codes were successfully run in several areas throughout the division and thanks to wonderful and unselfish work of our many and devoted juvenile organisers throughout the division, I can report that the amount of juvenile activity throughout the West this year surpassed that of all previous seasons.

While such devoted men are willing to organise and foster hurling and football to such an extent among our youth, the survival of our games are guaranteed.

MOLTOIRIL

To our panel of loyal and dedicated referees who again played a major role in the running of our competitions this year, I offer the sincere thanks of the Board.

It is one of the unfortunate failings of this Association,

that we do not at any level fully appreciate the importance of the service and the extent of the role that these wonderful men play in the running of our games. It is not to the credit of any of us, whether players or officials, that the people who make the playing of our games possible, continue to be subjected to abuse, threats and insults on the field of play.

It is one of the wonders of the association that, despite the lack of respect shown and lack of co-operation given, they persevere and continue to serve us year after year.

I believe that one of the most urgent needs within the Association at the moment, is thorough examination of the business of all aspects of refereeing. The primary objective of such an exercise should be to find a means of compelling all our members to treat the referees with the dignity and respect that they deserve. I am sorry to have to report that within our division this year it was necessary to take action against players reported for indiscipline to referees and subordinate officials.

It is my sad duty on behalf of the Board to extend sympathy to all our members who suffered bereavements during the year.

In this connection, it is my sad duty to record the death of one of our best known friends in the person of the late Willie Grant, of Caislean Cuanach who rendered a lifetime of service to the Board.—Ar Dhais de go raibh a b-Ainm.

SYMPATHY

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Review of '72

This week we take a look at last year's senior hurling championship which resulted in Mount Sion regaining the title they last held in 1969. In the first round they defeated the 1971 county finalists, St. Mollerans. Next they accounted for arch-rivals, Ballygunner. In the semi-final they faced an up and coming Lismore fifteen at Cappoquin and if ever Mount Sion could be termed lucky, then this was it. Lismore came to the semi-final after scoring big victories over Dunhill and Tramore. Mount Sion opened the game with a flourish with two early goals yet they only flattered to deceive, as for 45 minutes of the hour they were well and truly outburled and outpaced by a determined Lismore squad.

Yet Lismore failed to translate their outfield superiority into the vital match winning scores and Mt. Sion came back to score two goals and a point in the final minutes to snatch victory. Mount Sion (43: Lismore (34). Billy Cunningham, Patsy Quinn, and Jimmy Geohagan, Billy O'Riordan, Dave Whelan, Liam Canning, Billy Landers, and especially centreback John Landers, were the stars on a Lismore team who must have a bright future.

The other Western challengers, Abbeyside, featured in two high-scoring thrillers with Butlerstown, in which Pat Enright's marksmanship was the feature and veteran John McGrath and newcomer John Burns also played some great hurling. In the quarter final, the Villagers, despite major injury problems turned in a spirited display against county champions, Portlaw. Down nine points at half-time, they stormed back and reduced the leeway to a single point entering the final quarter when the greater fitness of the champions swung the game in their favour. Dunhill then scored a shock victory over Portlaw in the second semi-final but in the county final despite the advantage of an extra player they failed to avail of their scoring opportunities and Mount Sion for whom Jim and Stephen Greene, Martin Geary and the recalled Frankie Walsh starred, came out on top to win 22nd title in all.

Certainly Dunhill and Lismore will be worth watching this year.
