### Direct Labour Discussed

At the last monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council, a report was presented at the request of the members that consideration be given to construction of houses at Ringnasillogue by means of direct labour.

Mr. M. O'Connor, Town Clerk, said that local authorities rarely construct houses by direct labour because competitive tenders are available from several construction firms who are highly gared and experienced in house building operations.

A local authority contemplating direct labour, Mr. O'Connor continued, would need to equip itself with sufficient plant and machinery, including scaffolding, to be readily available and ensure continuity and smooth work flow. This would involve heavy capital involvement. There would be a danger also that having acquired plant and machinery its full utilisation on a small scheme

might not be possible and therefore uneconomic.

The supply of a suitable work force for a direct labour scheme could also prove difficult, he said, and give rise to frustrating delays if not available when required. At present there are only four tradesmen on the live register in Dungarvan. While local tradesmen may be working in other areas, it is not certain that the level of wages available on a direct labour scheme by a local authority would be attractive enough to encourage them to leave their existing employment.

He concluded there would be inevitable delays at first in organising and gaining sufficient momentum to have a smooth and efficient production of houses. In the long term, the cost of the scheme could be higher than if carried out under a system of competitive tendering. Also, the possibility of doing the scheme efficiently by

direct labour in an urban area such as Dungarvan is remote.

Colr. Wade however, was not in agreement with the report of the Town Clerk. He said he was not worried about the extra cost if this would be the case. It is only justice to the ratepayers that some work be provided for the general labourers. He continued that he had talked to masons, bricklayers and carpenters who would be willing to start work at once. Also he said there would be enough plant in the Co. Council machinery yard to carry them through. If not quotations could be got from plant hire firms.

The County Manager said it may not be possible to get sanction for the use of direct labour in the scheme as no direct sum of money could be fixed.

It was then proposed to get figures from a Council where direct labour had been used in such a scheme.

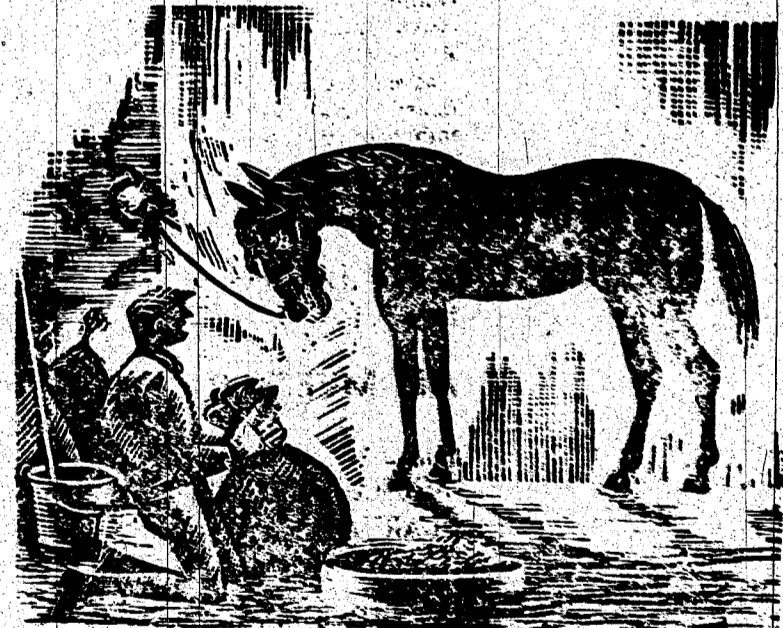
## G.A.A. Western Final

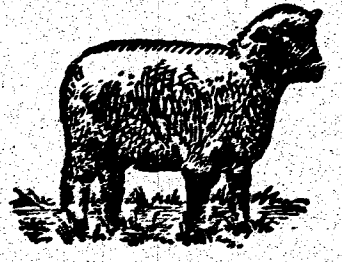

**Serious Treat to Irish vegetable trade brought to light**

Mr. Michael Hartly, M.C.C. at the last monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture expressed consternation at an article he had read in the "Sunday Times".

Briefly, the article states that the farmers of Brittany are assaulting the British and Irish vegetable trades on their entry into the Common Market.

Two years have been spent by the Bretons planning this move. They own a half-share in BAI (Bretagne-Angleterre-Irlande) a shipping line formed specially to carry their produce to the British and Irish markets. BAI represents a £4m. investment in the British and Irish markets by Brittany's farmers.

Freshly-picked vegetables can be on the British and Irish markets within 24 hours of their leaving Brittany.

Mr. Hartly was amazed at this competition to our own vegetable trade and asked what Irish vegetable growers are being advised to do to cope with it. As the article was mainly concerned with cauliflower, Mr. Hartly would like to know if Irish growers should be advised on this type of vegetable. The matter is being looked into at the moment by the officials of the Co. Committee of Agriculture.

The other two scoring athletes for Waterford were Tom O'Donoghue and Paddy Kelly of St. A.C. and here more was expected from them but still they did not let the side down and this is the important factor in team contests. There is no doubt that the absence through illness of John Treacy of St. Nicholas A.C. was a big loss to Waterford and his presence would definitely have meant that Waterford could have collected the silver medals. However, even his presence would not have improved the lot of St. Nicholas A.C. in the inter club contest but at the same time the club maintained its great record of being able to hold its own with the more established city clubs like Leevale in Cork and Limerick A.C. Full marks to young Mattie Curran who certainly had a tough bap-

The acquaintance between these officers and the young ladies soon ripened into mutual and warm attachment which promised to terminate happily in the union of the three couples for upon the suitors stating their intentions before the mother of the fair maidens, they were favourably received and encouraged for the hands of their lady loves. From this we may infer that those military men were themselves persons of consequence and respectability for though daughters might be won by the gay trappings and masculine beauty and accomplishments of suitors whose all-wealth was love (or like the song "All I have to offer you is me"). Parents, especially the parents of heiresses are seldom so romantically inclined. In the summer of that year, Margaret, the eldest of the family could not have been more than 19 years, Catherine 18 and Marie Mills — the sweet Mary — about 17 years. At length the expected visitors came in sight gallantly mounted in full military apparel. The guests from Clonmel appeared in their military dress, the heavy and encumbering portions being laid aside but the breast-plate gleamed beneath the heavy buff coats with its deep cuffs and collar and silver buttons, the broad scarf crossed the figure from shoulder to hip, the trusty belt held the heavy long sword, the gorget protected the throat and the iron fingered gauntlet, the hand and wrist and the high horseman's boot with spur on heel, and after each officer rode his servants with his master's oak, valise and small travelling rug.

The horses' hooves clattered on the rough road, the welcome guests swinging onwards soon reached the drawbridge that was lowered in an evil hour for them, and arrived from their panting steeds that were destined never to bear them again.

I leave to the imagination the joyous meeting, the courtesy of the stately matron as she did the honours of her drawing room, the pleased and flattered greeting of the pushing maidens and the glow of satisfaction in the bosoms of the lovers at their warm reception in the home of the beloved. For though good cheer and plenty had been ordered for the attendance of the visitors, still the Steady servants considered that was the property of the mistress and hospitality required they should do something from themselves on this auspicious occasion. On the arrival of the guests the vigilance of the widow had relaxed and she entrusted the keys to another hand. Perhaps she thought that the addition of six men trained to arms formed so strong a reinforcement to her own garrison that she need fear nothing during their stay.

Tradition states that Pierce McGrath (the inheritor of the entailed estates after the death of the minor, Donell) who was present at this fatal visit, was the person to whom the matron confided her keys and the Steady servants took advantage of the opportunity of positioning him to permit a short absence to treat their new acquaintances, confident that the kitchen maid would carefully attend to the drawbridge during their temporary absence. Pierce McGrath suffered himself to be too easily persuaded, so he unlocked the gates without the knowledge of the lady and then the servants cautiously lowered the drawbridge and under cover of the night stole out to the neighbouring public-house leaving behind them only the perfidious kitchen-maid who with affected good nature had volunteered to watch the still lowered drawbridge until they returned, but scarcely had they departed when she hurried up to the top of the flanking tower that adjoins the kitchen and there displayed a light in the manner arranged between her and young Green. The light was speedily described by the sentinel on the watch at 'Sleepy Rock' and Green, the elder immediately mustered his gang and favour by the night's darkness, set out silently for the betrayed castle.

At the Castle, the widow and her happy little party had concluded the social supper — the favourite meal of those times, but were still seated at table and having dispensed with the restraining presence of attendants, they were at the height of lighthearted gaiety when suddenly their merrymaking was interrupted by the sound of stealthy, yet heavy footsteps which caused them to turn their eyes towards the door. It opened suddenly! the ladies shrieked as the officers sprang to their feet — for the doorway and passage behind were crowded with ferocious-looking ruffians armed to the teeth and enough to make the bravest cower at the unexpected sight of such a savage-looking horde.

### EEC STANDARDS OF QUALITY GRADING PACKAGING AND LABELLING

#### THIS APPLIES TO

**FRUIT:** apples, apricots, cherries, grapes, lemons, mandarins, oranges, pears, peaches, plums, strawberries.

**VEGETABLES:** Asparagus, artichokes, beans, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, chicory, cauliflowers, celery, cucumbers, garlic, lettuce, endives, onions, peas (for shelling), spinach, tomatoes.

#### DEALERS SHOULD NOTE THAT

When such produce is displayed for sale in its original packing the EEC marking requirements must be clearly shown on the package.

When it is displayed for sale unpacked or in small pre-packs a notice must be placed on the produce showing clearly the VARIETY, ORIGIN, and QUALITY CLASS.

# NEW CHAIRMAN FOR WESTERN BOARD

## Gaelic Jottings Review of '72

The Western Board at its annual Convention held at the C.B.S. Hall, Dungarvan, on Sunday last elected a new chairman in the person of John A. Murphy (Dungarvan) who defeated the outgoing Chairman, Kieran O'Ryan (Fourmilewater) who has held the post since 1970.

On the first count John A. Murphy received 61 votes; K. O'Ryan 53 votes and D. McGrath (Affane) 21 votes. On the second count, J. A. Murphy received 75 votes, three more than the quota, as against 69 votes for K. O'Ryan. Mr. Murphy who has been Secretary of the Dungarvan Club for the past few years served as one of the Divisional Boards three representatives for the past three years.

Shamrocks James Tobin retained the post of Vice-Chairman by defeating Jim Crowley by 91 votes to 51, while Secretary Seamus O'Brien and Registrar John Fraher were returned unopposed.

### NEW TREASURER

The outgoing Treasurer, Tom Walsh (Fourmilewater) who has held the post for the past 15 years did not seek re-election and many tributes were paid to the Ballymacman for his devoted service to the Board over the year. The Board's new treasurer is Paddy Fitzgerald (Colligan Rockies) who was elected on the second count as follows: P. Fitzgerald 85; T. Keane (Abbeyside) 34; and S. Power (Eire Oge) 25. In the first count, T. Hackett (Cappoquin) received 18 votes.

### THREE DELEGATES TO COUNTY BOARD

Michael O'Brien (Ardmore) topped the poll in the election of the delegates to the County Board when he received 67 first preference votes which must be a record. John Lyons (Tallow) and Jim Quirk just edged out Tom Scanton (Affane) (outgoing) and Tom Drummy (Eire Oge) for the other two posts.

On the proposition of Chairman Murphy, Convention agreed to the appointment of Kieran O'Ryan as an ex-officio member of the Board for 1973.

### MOTIONS PASSED

Affane were successful with their motion moved by Denis McGrath which asked that in future that objections be heard by open meetings of the Board.

The Convention agreed to take the Cappoquin and Abbeyside / Ballinacourty motions dealing with championship fixtures as representing the views of the various motions. Dealing with fixtures, these two motions which were moved by Tony Mansfield and John Fraher and adopted mean that a fixture committee will prepare a fixture list for the Board's entire championship programme and their target will be to have all the under age championships completed by the month of August and the adult championships completed by the month of October.

In future the Chairmanship of the Board can be held for three consecutive years only as is the position at present with the chairmanship of the County Board. This was moved by the Abbeyside Club. In future the Board will hold regular monthly meetings as a result of a Dungarvan motion.

Also passed was a motion calling on the British Army to withdraw forthwith from the occupation of Casement Park, Belfast. Several speakers felt that if motions were to be passed, that they should call for the withdrawal of the British Army from Ireland where they were being used to harass the minority population in the Six Counties and for the repeal of repressive legislation in the Republic.

Colligan's motion which was moved by Donal Connolly expressing dissatisfaction at the progress made by the County Board in its efforts to purchase the Fraher Field also received the approval of Convention.

### DUNGARVAN'S SUCCESSFUL A.G.M.

The Dungarvan G.A.A. Club couldn't possibly have hoped for a more encouraging start to 1973 than the annual meeting provided them with last Friday night. Weatherwise, it was a very bad night, yet the very large attendance reflected the massive goodwill and support that still exists for the oldest club in the county. In the unavoidable absence of the Chairman, Michael Curran, the meeting was presided over by Mickey Tobin and at the outset it was addressed by Mr. Michael Foley, T.T., one of the club's joint presidents. He appealed for greater involvement in club affairs in the coming year by former members and hoped that 1973 would see them win at least one county title.

The report of Secretary John A. Murphy reviewed in detail the activities of the past twelve months. The failure to win a title was a big disappointment, he said, yet with any luck they could have captured the junior and minor hurling and under-16 Western titles. With co-operation from every member he was confident the year ahead would be one to remember with pride in time to come.

### DEBIT BALANCE

One of their former football "greats" he should provide them with the spark of inspiration to make a real go of things in the coming year. He replaces M.L. Curran who wasn't anxious to retain the post but fittingly many tributes were paid to him for his invaluable work on the club's behalf over the past number of years.
