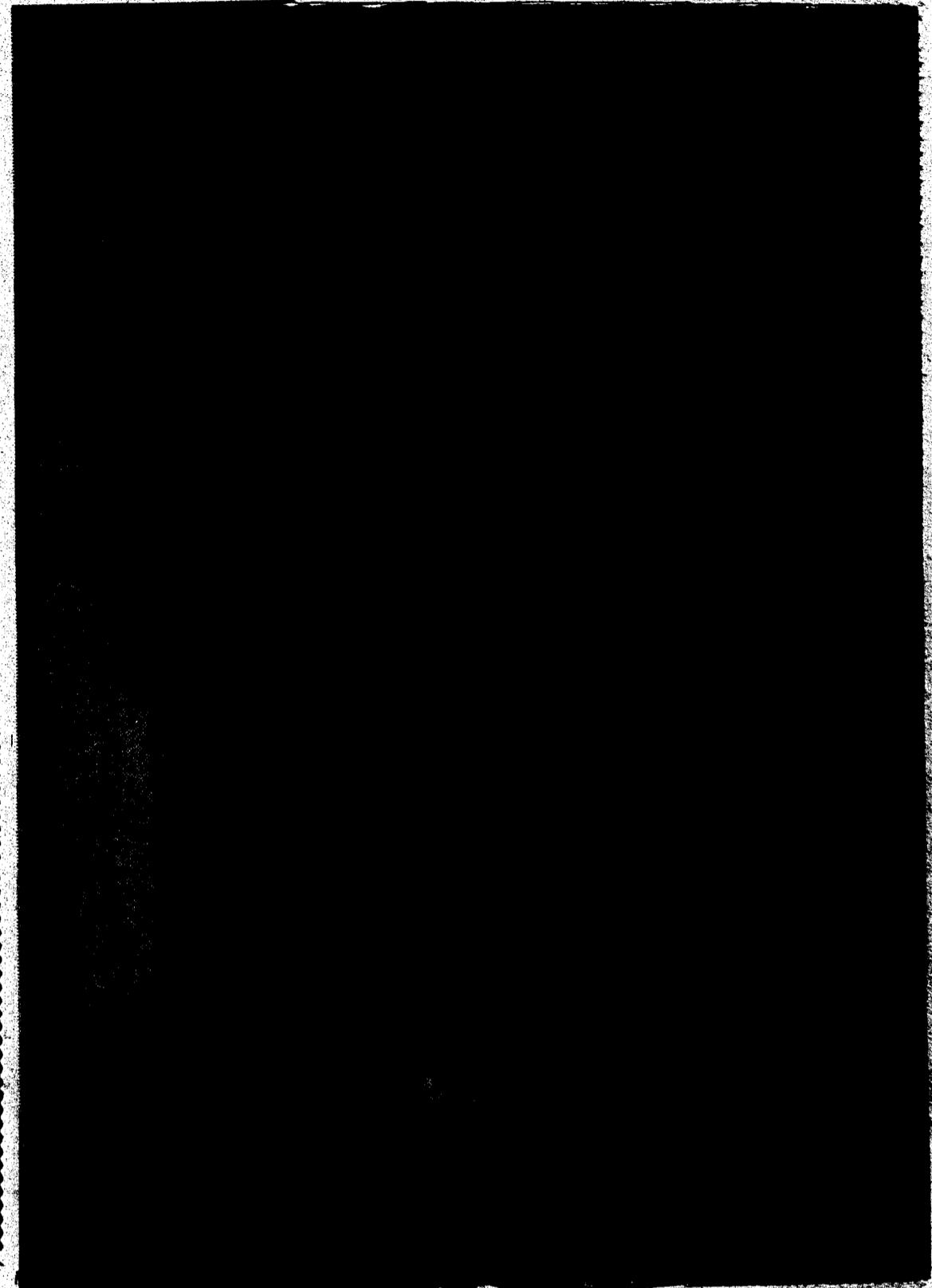

Health Board Estimate

The S.E. Health Board adopted an Estimate of £14,135,000 on the proposal of Colr. C. Curran seconded by Ald. T. Byrne. Also that the Department be requested to limit the demand on the rates to the same figure as last year. Mr. Curran said that they had examined the Estimates thoroughly and they were cut to the bone. Any further reductions would adversely affect their hospital services and the interests of the poor, old, handicapped and underprivileged, to whom they had a duty. There was grave concern at the present high level of local taxation.

With 400 metres to go John Treacy pulled out all the stops and on an uphill slope he suddenly closed the gap and went ahead of Phil English. For a moment it looked as if he would go on to win but his magnificent effort inspired Ger Deegan to greater height and suddenly he too passed the tiring Tipperary boy. Immediately this happened the two Waterford boys joined hands and decided to run the remaining few hundred metres together and so they came to the winning post at the same time. However, the judges decided that Ger Deegan just piped John Treacy and no one will begrudge the De la Salle boy the honour of being the holder of the gold medal, least of John Treacy who will have a few more chances of winning supreme honour whereas Ger Deegan will not be eligible next year. After all this excitement the next problem was the team race and here the Waterford story, is one of hard luck and a case of so near and yet so far. Dublin won the inter county contest with 64 points, followed by Cork with 67 points and next came Waterford with 71 points. So 7 points was the difference between glory and defeat but full marks to the Waterford boys for a great show. Ray Treacy of St. Nicholas A.C. came home in 6th position and no doubt the great display of his younger brother was the tonic he needed to run again, as we know he can and let us hope that his temporary loss of form is now past. Next came Tom Aspel of De La Salle A.C. in 13th position and again this was a display of great running by the long striding Waterford boy who has improved immensely this season. So Waterford had four runners

home and everything hinged on the next two and they were Michael Casey of Bally A.C. and Sean Meehan of Dungarvan who finished 24th and 25th respectively.
