

What will this Election decide?

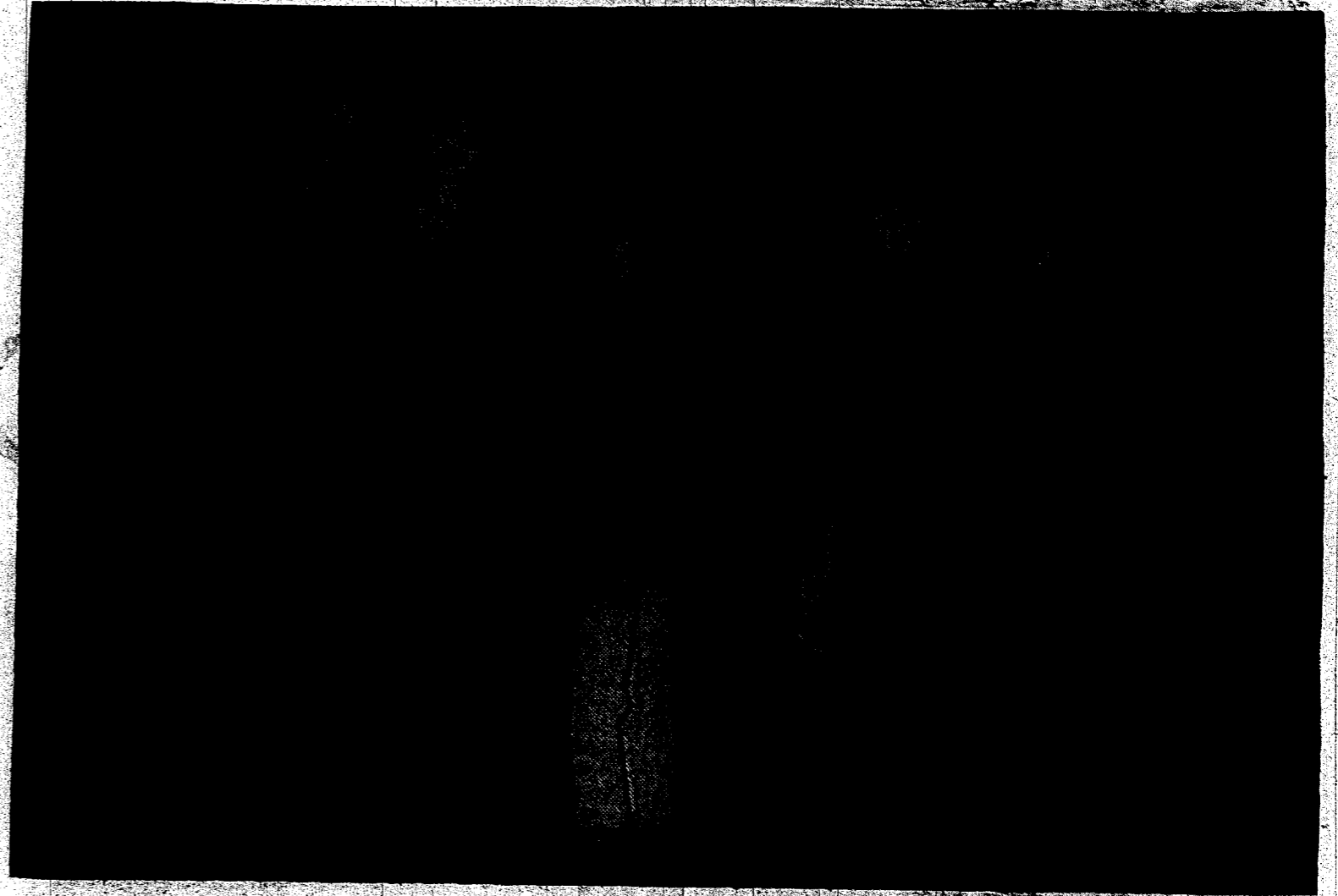

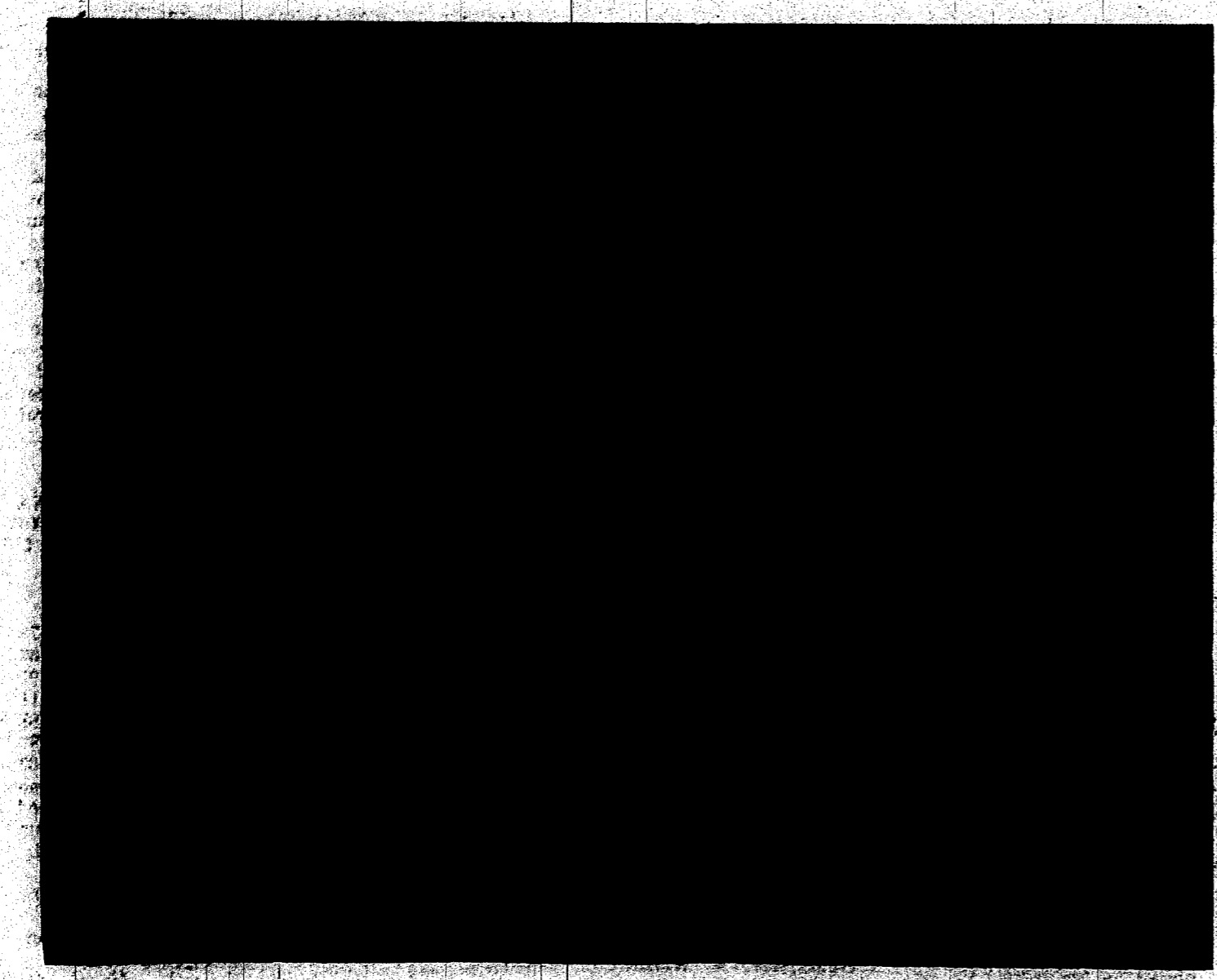

Romance and Tragedy of Steady Castle

Some time following the marriage of "the Sweet Mary" her sister Margaret married a local gentleman of rank and affluence and of sufficiently long standing to satisfy her pride of pedigree. She is respectfully remembered by her very charitable disposition as well as being a catholic and prized by her dependants is a magnificent silver chalice she caused to be made for the celebration of masses in her own home. Around the base of this chalice is engraved the following: "Margaretha Craigh de Power, Clashmore A.D. 1658."

The remaining sister Catherine was also married but it was not recorded to whom or where.

To the memory and sentiment it will no doubt appear quite a sprig of the legend that the young sisters should have ever married after the tragic fate of their first lovers, but it must be taken into consideration that they were very young when the tragedy took place and allowances must be made for the elasticity of their youthful minds and for the bewitching powers of time, besides there are often amiable, as well as valid reasons for second love and it is creditable to the good feeling of these young girls that their affections could be concentrated by the rare disinterestedness of those who sought them for their intrinsic worth alone after they had lost the usually more prized aids of fortune.

Steady Castle was left desolate from the time of its forfeiture and it naturally fell to ruin and decay by slow degrees. Occasionally some poor vagrant took up his unpermitted, yet unforbidden abode amongst the empty chambers.

The last dweller there was a county school master, or hedge school Master as they were known at that period around 170 years ago, when the castle was in a more habitable condition than it is today. He taught his neared scholars in the kitchen but chose for his own comfort and use, a room on the upper floor. He claimed to be a descendant of the McCraith family of the castle lineage, whose former greatness was his favourite theme. He is reputed to have written a book being a chronicle of that family and containing a great deal of local history and some curious information which tradition has now dropped from her loosened grasp. Some gentleman of the period who had seen the manuscript was anxious it should be published and the schoolmaster made several attempts to get it to get it printed in Clonmel, Dublin but soon beyond the reach of his humble sphere, but he was unsuccessful. That was not the age of literary enterprise, especially in Ireland. It is not known what became of the sermo, after the death of its author, but as the Irish peasant, in general have great respect for writings of this time, especially if relating to favours families or to the histories of their native counties and in all probability it is still extant, a prized possession of some family, if like



Councillor Deasy Condemns present Estate Duty Legislation

Mr. Michael Veale presided at a well attended meeting of the Garrynageragh (Ballinroad/The Pike branch) of Fine Gael last Friday night. Also A. Deasy, Fine Gael National Executive; and Cllr. P. Cusack were in attendance. Many items of local and national interest were discussed. In answer to questions Cllr. Deasy informed the meeting that the National Executive of the Party, which included Dr. Garret Fitzgerald, T.D.; and Mr. Tom O'Higgins, T.D., SC was prepared a memorandum on Estate Duties, aimed at greatly reducing the severity of the present legislation which had been introduced in the 1971 Budget.

FINANCIAL RUIN

This legislation had and was causing great mental suffering amongst property owners, stated Cllr. Deasy. Many people had not realised the significance of the new laws until they went to sign over their properties to sons or daughters and had got a great shock to learn that what they had worked hard for all their lives could largely if not totally be taken away overnight. It could be particularly severe in the case of a late marriage or where the head of the house died young. With the sharp rise in the value of land and house property the rate of the duties had become penal. In their present form they will bring financial ruin to many young people who are innocent victims. Voluntary organisations such as the IFA had done a tremendous service to the public in publicising the pitfalls of the Act and were to be congratulated. However, it should not be left to voluntary bodies to do this work. It was the duty of the Department of Finance to explain such legislation to the public and point out to them how best they could safeguard their interests. If it is accepted that death duties have to be paid, the present lower limit at which duty is imposed must be considerably raised and rates of rebate substantially increased.

The Act is of no benefit to the country as it stands said Mr. Deasy, as it merely puts people who inherit property deeply in debt and as a result unable to work land efficiently or develop their properties. It is not in the best interests of the nation as it stands and is causing great human suffering and misery.

Cllr. Cusack concurred fully with the comments made and promised his full support for the campaign to amend and modify the present Act.

PIPED WATER SUPPLY

The councillors were thanked for their dogged efforts to secure a piped water supply for the Garranbane/Pike area a scheme which will commence shortly.

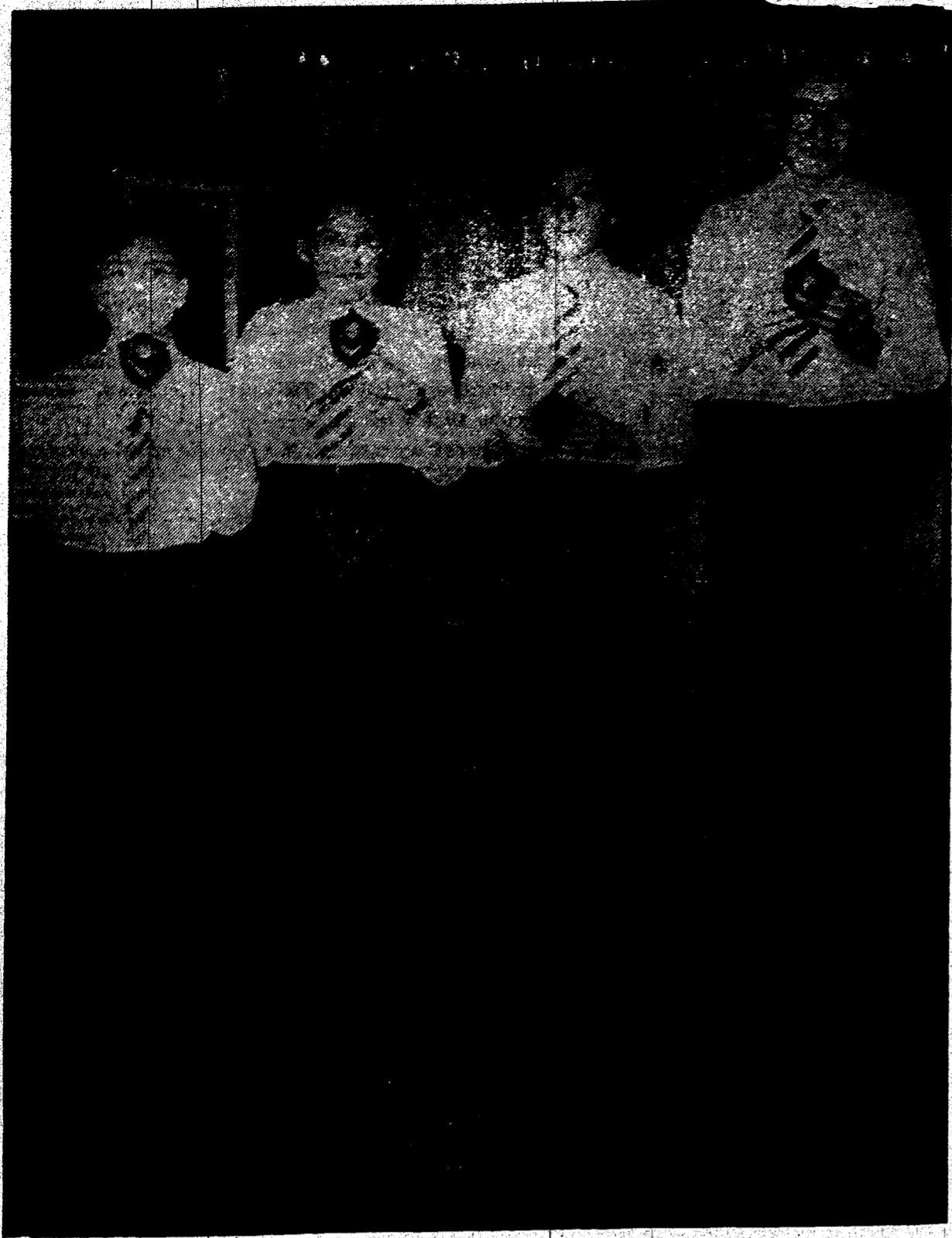

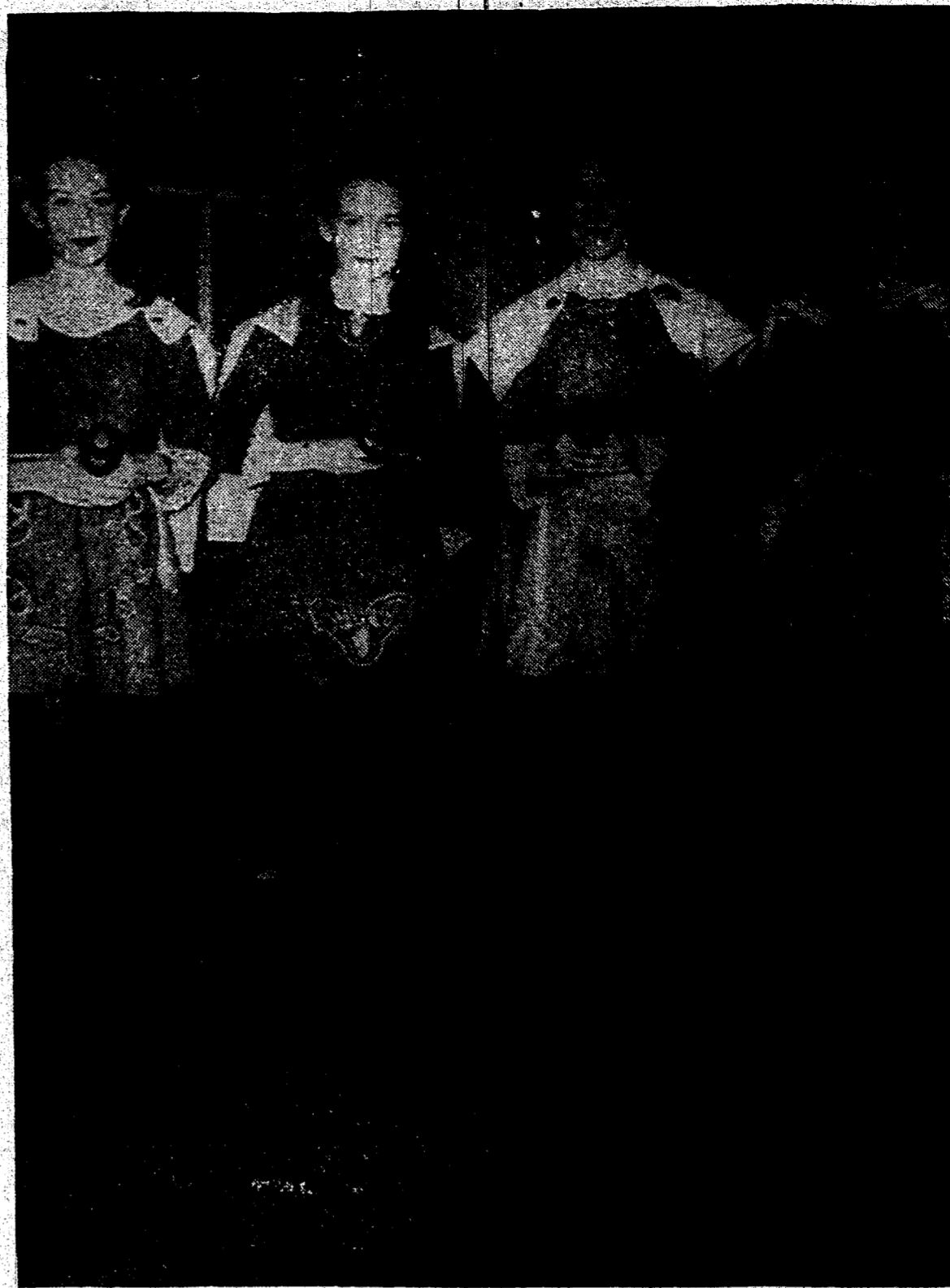
