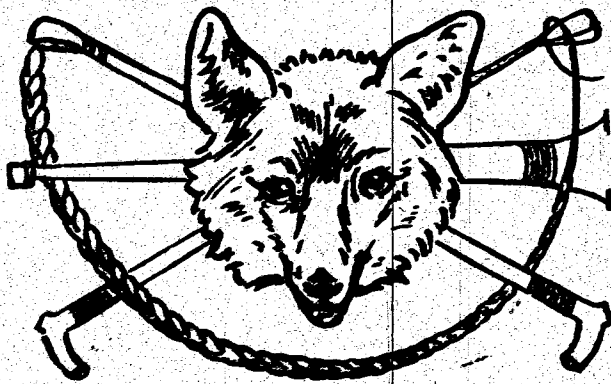

### Farm Credit Symposium

John C. O'Meara, Agricultural Advisor, Bank of Ireland said that the objectives of the Meeting on Farm Credit to be held on Thursday, 8th March, at Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan, are —

(1) To help farmers develop a further attitude to credit.  
(2) To provide information to assist farmers adopt a businesslike approach to presenting an application for credit. He stated that the vast majority of farmers do not try to make a good case when they are applying for a loan.

Farmers must be aware that with our entry to the EEC, opportunities exist which can be grasped through higher stocking, which in most cases mean, that extra borrowing will be essential. It is in their own interests that they should be able to present a good case, so that, their request for extra facilities are granted.

Business firms employ their own accountants in many cases and one of their functions is to help prepare the company's case when applying for loans farmers must compete with the business, for the available money and if they are to compete successfully, they must adopt a more businesslike approach to the management of their farms.

If we take a look at how many are keeping worthwhile farm accounts, we find the number is very small indeed, yet the information these accounts provide is essential if you are to be in a position to answer with confidence the questions which any lender will ask.

It is worth noting that in Germany, in order to qualify for the EEC development grant, a farmer has to present two years accounts.

At this meeting we will also discuss how to keep accounts and suggest an office system which will help to make account keeping easier.

I suggest that if you are a farmer, it will be worth your while attending the meeting on Credit on Thursday, 8th March at Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan.

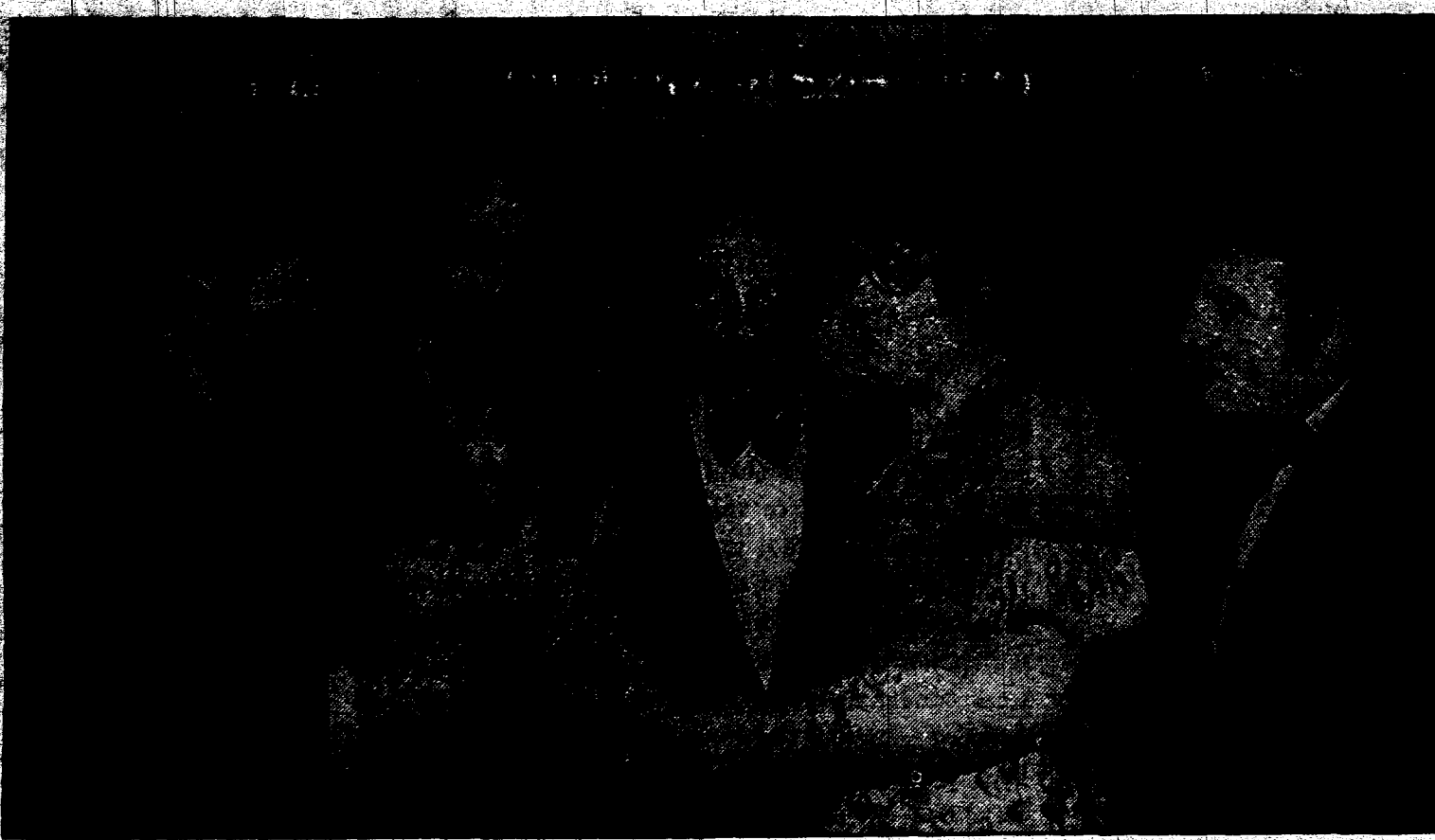

**When outbreak occurs**

The above points apply to an infected herd as well as to a clear herd. Pay particular attention here to spread of infection at calving time, also to disposal, clearing and discharges.  
If possible isolate all cows at time of calving.  
Be guided by your Vet's advice in relation to isolation, disinfection, vaccination and so forth. Do not assume that an animal which has been blood tested once or has passed a milk ring test is clear of the disease.  
The object of such a committee would be to promote, as it saw best, a voluntary campaign amongst farmers to eliminate contagious abortion and to give advice on other livestock problems.

**Committee to be formed**

At the end of the meeting a suggestion that representatives of the various interested bodies in the county should form themselves into a County Animal Health Advisory Committee, was adopted.  
The object of such a committee would be to promote, as it saw best, a voluntary campaign amongst farmers to eliminate contagious abortion and to give advice on other livestock problems.

**Advice for clear herds**

- (1) Do not buy in stock if at all possible i.e. be self contained.
- (2) If you have to buy, purchase only calves from 3 — 8 months of age.
- (3) Avoid unnecessary contact with young calves at sales. (This would also apply to recently calved cows.)
- (4) If you have to buy, vaccinate immediately (two injections) and isolate for 4 months if at all possible.
- (5) A bought-in infected animal may or may not abort, but will, over the next few years cause an abortion storm.
- (6) Remember that does, foxes etc. can spread infection from one farm to another.
- (7) The vaccination of maiden heifers and annual vaccination of all breeding stock will tend to keep infection to a minimum. If infection is introduced accidentally then losses will be very small.

**Dungarvan Symposium on Brucellosis**

At a meeting last week in the County Committee of Agriculture Offices, Mr. E. Phelan, Chairman, Dungarvan Co-Op presided and stressed the need for farmers to take constructive steps towards reducing and eventually eliminating the scourge of Brucellosis.  
Mr. G. Frost, C.A.O. said that this disease hung over dairy farming like a dark cloud. Unless the problem was tackled now we would be in for a stock when compulsion comes.  
A Veterinary Practitioner gives the following information on the spread of the disease. He also gave some practical hints to dairymen on its control and elimination.  
**Prevention**  
Maiden heifers can only become infected when they reach sexual maturity e.g. at the age of 9 — 10 months. Two inoculations are necessary to confer immunity. The first injection should be given at the age of 12 months and second 6 — 12 weeks later. It takes 4 months from the date of the first injection before immunity is achieved.  
(This treatment is free of charge under the Department of Agriculture Brucellosis Eradication Scheme and is available to all stock-owners through their local Vet.)  
If these heifers have become infected before Vaccination as happens if they are mixed with cows in a yard during winter the vaccine will lose some of its value. Vaccinated heifers will not stand up to massive infection. (The precautions listed below to be taken at calving time are also necessary for the prevention of the disease.)  
Annual vaccination of all cows in the herd is vitally important to build up immunity.  
**Advice for clear herds**  
(1) Do not buy in stock if at all possible i.e. be self contained.  
(2) If you have to buy, purchase only calves from 3 — 8 months of age.  
(3) Avoid unnecessary contact with young calves at sales. (This would also apply to recently calved cows.)  
(4) If you have to buy, vaccinate immediately (two injections) and isolate for 4 months if at all possible.  
(5) A bought-in infected animal may or may not abort, but will, over the next few years cause an abortion storm.  
(6) Remember that does, foxes etc. can spread infection from one farm to another.  
(7) The vaccination of maiden heifers and annual vaccination of all breeding stock will tend to keep infection to a minimum. If infection is introduced accidentally then losses will be very small.

# Future of Grain Production

Peter A. Spillane - An Foras Taluntais PRODUCTION PATTERNS

John Bolger - Irish Grain & Agricultural Merchants' Association

THERE has been some confusion among growers and indeed among other sections of the community on the future of grain production in Ireland during the 1980's. This is evident from the significant reduction in the acreage under wheat in 1972 which was due more to lack of confidence in the market than to commercial reasons. Yields in 1971 were well up to average and harvesting was completed under ideal conditions, in record time. It was known, however, that after February 1973 the statutory obligation on millers to use 75% of native wheat would no longer exist and this undoubtedly influenced sowings. The rapid escalation in the price of beef and milk had also a considerable influence on planning.

Beef prices had almost reached their E.E.C. level before Ireland accepted the Community price structure on February 1st, 1973 and the transitional arrangement so laboriously hammered out by our negotiators have become largely irrelevant. The transitional arrangements were introduced to allow for a gradual harmonization of prices with the "Six" and thus avoid, as far as possible, distortion of trade patterns due to wide differences in price levels. What the negotiators hoped to avoid has now become a fact and it is obvious that the prices of other commodities will rapidly increase to restore the balance. This is in fact already happening and barley prices are currently £3 per ton above intervention level.

Seminars organised by the Agricultural Advisory Service Merchants' and Co-operatives have shown that farmers in traditional tillage areas will stay in grain if the margins are realistic. They are prepared to take the long term view but are critically short of information on the grain position in E.E.C. and find it difficult therefore to make a firm decision.

The object of this article is to provide this information, to examine the Common Agricultural Policy of the E.E.C. as it applies to cereals and to consider its impact on grain production and marketing in Ireland. The Common Agricultural Policy and its implementation have been severely criticised from time to time and it is considered in the U.K. that some modifications will be necessary as a result of the widening of the Community.

The Common Agricultural Policy, evolved after years of negotiation, is based on five principles:  
1. Common organisation of the market with common prices for the main products.  
2. Free trade between member countries.  
3. A single trading system with non-member countries.  
4. Joint financing of the costs of market support for farm produce and the subsidising of exports to non-member countries.  
5. Contribution by the Community to the cost of modernising agriculture.

### TARGET PRICE

Target or guide prices are determined annually by the Council on the basis of proposals made by the Commission, for a number of products including cereals, beef, sugar and milk. For these products maximum production is provided. (Target prices are set for wheat, barley, rye and maize.) These are wholesale prices for grain with a moisture content of 15-16% which the authorities would expect the market to achieve in the months after harvest. The basic target price is set for Duisberg in Federal Germany, the area of greatest deficiency in the E.E.C.

### THRESHOLD PRICE

The threshold or minimum import price is the lowest price at which imports are allowed into E.E.C. countries and applies uniformly at all external frontier points in the Community. The threshold is lower than the target price and usually reflects port charges and transport charges between the port and the area of greatest deficiency.

### INTERVENTION PRICE

National intervention agencies operate in all countries of the E.E.C. These are State controlled and may accept all home-grown (E.E.C.) cereals

Irish growers will be protected from imports from third countries after February and as efficient producers and handlers of grain we should be in a position to meet any challenge from Europe. Total grain production in Ireland is less than 1.5 million tonnes and our imports amount to 0.5 million tonnes. The value of imported cereals at the present world barley price of about 36 tonnes is £18 million and this will be increased to twenty-two million pounds with the introduction of the levy system in this month. The Irish Grassland and Annual Production Association estimate that the demand for grain, based on expansion targets for livestock production will increase by 600,000 tonnes over the next five years. If the increased demand for grain is met by increased imports our adverse trade balance could be increased by more than £20 million each year. There is, therefore, considerable room for expansion.

Yields of wheat and barley in Ireland are comparable with those in Denmark and the Netherlands and higher than in all other countries in the E.E.C. New varieties with a much higher yield potential will shortly be available to Irish growers and this will further improve our competitive position. Grain prices will remain attractive to the producer in the long term and the introduction of well-designed aeration systems at farm level, where high moisture grain can be stored for extended periods, can provide a low cost, high quality feed suitable for beef and pig production. Finally, the capital requirements for grain production are very much lower than for other farm enterprises which is a factor of prime importance.

### IMPORT LEVIES

Variable levies are applied to imports of all grain to ensure that target prices are undisturbed. This is the most important single element in the E.E.C. marketing system for grain. The amount of the levy is the difference between the threshold price and the lowest world price, allowing for quality differences and calculated on a c.i.f. basis at Rotterdam.

### EXPORT SUBSIDIES

As a counterpart to the levy, export subsidies are paid to enable the Community to compete on world markets. The amount of the subsidy is normally the difference between Community and world market price. The rate of subsidy is the same for all E.E.C. exporters but the actual amount granted may vary with destination to cover transport charges. Considerable use has been made of the export subsidy by France.

### DENATURING

E.E.C. regulations provide for the payment of subsidies for the denaturing of soft wheat to allow wheat of milling standard to be marketed for animal feed at feed grain price. The grain, which must meet the required quality standards at time of purchase, may be denatured by the intervention authority or by their agents who are paid for carrying out the process. The subsidy, which is determined annually before the beginning of the season, is based on the difference between wheat and barley price and the cost of denaturing. A special allowance may be given to encourage the use of wheat for feed. The payment of this subsidy effectively removes the milling surplus and therefore fulfils the same function as the Irish wheat levy. In contrast to the wheat levy, whereby the wheat grower pays the full cost of putting the milling surplus on the feed market, the denaturing premium is paid from Brussels.

Denatured wheat has become an increasingly important feature of the E.E.C. feed market in recent years and the quantity treated now amounts to 4 million tonnes. It will be particularly important in the U.K. where more than 2 million parts of wheat are used each year for feed. It should also be important in Ireland where wheat could receive a significant proportion of soft-wheat in round-bow feeding-stuffs when the levy ceases fully into operation during the year. It is possible through the denaturing premium for a grower to get milling price for his wheat crop and purchase it back at barley price for cattle feeding.

are the 120 or so major regulations which European grain merchants have to take account of in their day-to-day activities. Prof. J. E. M. Coppock, Director of Research at Spillers, speaking to millers on technical and legal aspects of the E.E.C. food regulations states, "The E.E.C. have not as yet set up a competent enforcement authority to ensure that their regulations are obeyed. Enforcement is therefore controlled by the individual countries in the E.E.C. One can foresee some countries still making national products despite regulations forbidding certain practices whereas others will not."

It is already clear that there will be considerable resistance in Britain to financing the disposal of accumulating butter surpluses with the almost certain prospect of facing a similar situation in a few years time.

The European Economic Community is basically a political institution and political considerations will govern decisions made to deal with the developing situation within the Community and also in dealing with countries outside the E.E.C. Present priorities could show a dramatic change over the next five years as the enlarged community becomes more industrially oriented. It would be a grave mistake to put all our agricultural eggs in one basket; a broadly based agricultural economy makes sense. The efficient Danish agricultural industry is organised in depth and grain is a vital support plank in the production chain. The same approach must be valid for this country. The possibility of a rapid extension in the number of feed lots suggests that the integration of the beef - grain enterprise is a natural development.

The recent statement by the Irish Flour Millers Association which guarantees a minimum price of £2.20 above last year's level, provides a stable market for 200,000 tonnes of milling wheat. This has since been overtaken by the recent announcement that intervention price are now increased by 10% due to currency re-adjustment, indicating a harvest price 96/ per barrel plus the possible quality premium. This guaranteed market and the introduction of new high-yielding Spring varieties should be attractive even on a short-term basis. On a long term basis the advantages are obvious.

There is no doubt that grain production in E.E.C. is a viable enterprise and will remain so. The increasing world demand for grain will ensure that prices will remain firm and will follow the trend in livestock prices. Beef prices have almost reached their peak and when a stable situation is reached, the low capital input required for grain will ensure that relative profitability will compare favourably with other agricultural enterprises.

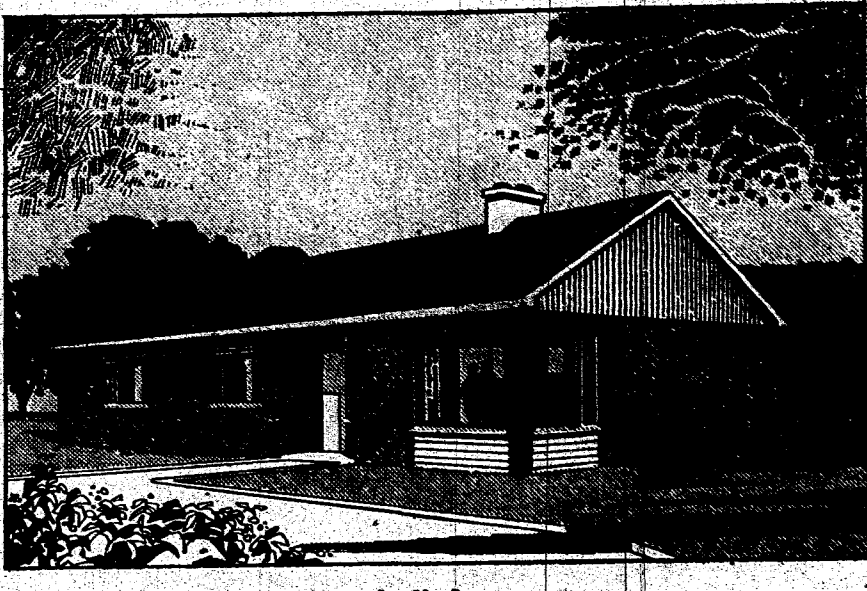

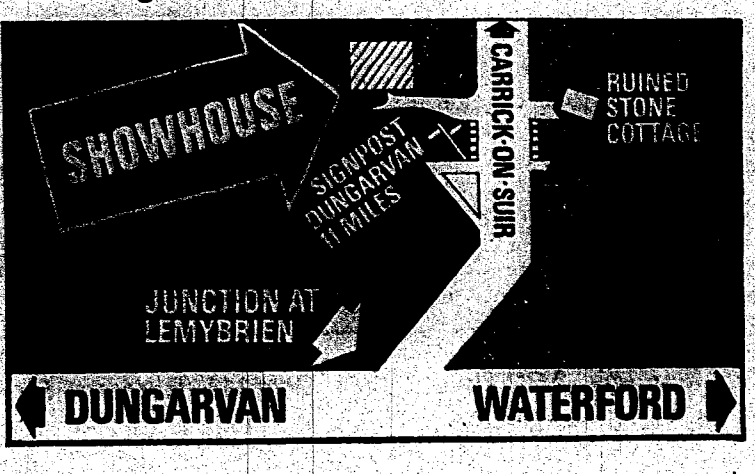
