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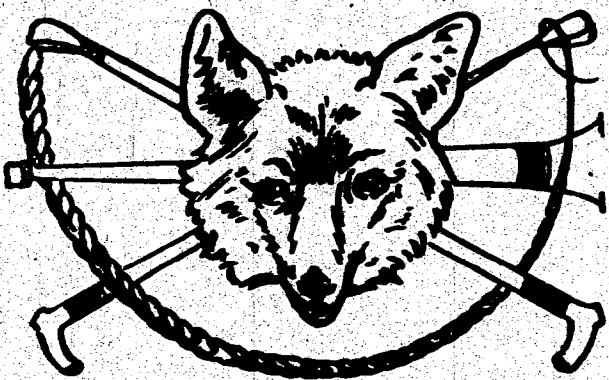

Dear Sir,
One of the principal arguments used by those who campaigned against Ireland's entry into the E.E.C. was that the special privileged position of farmers was not likely to last very long. This has been made quite clear by the announcement that agricultural prices for the coming year are likely to be raised by much more than 3%. A rise of 7 1/2% — designed only to prevent any further widening of the already large gap between agricultural and non-agricultural incomes — had been sought.

With present rates of inflation, a continuation of such small price increases over the next few years could mean that by the time Irish prices are brought into line with those in the rest of the E.E.C. in five years time, Irish farmers might be no better off than they are now. A policy of small increases seems inevitable, in view of the huge surpluses being generated by the current high prices. This applies particularly to dairy production, on which most of the Irish small farmers depend so much. Beef is the only line not experiencing any difficulty, but of course visible beef production is beyond the scope of most Irish farmers.

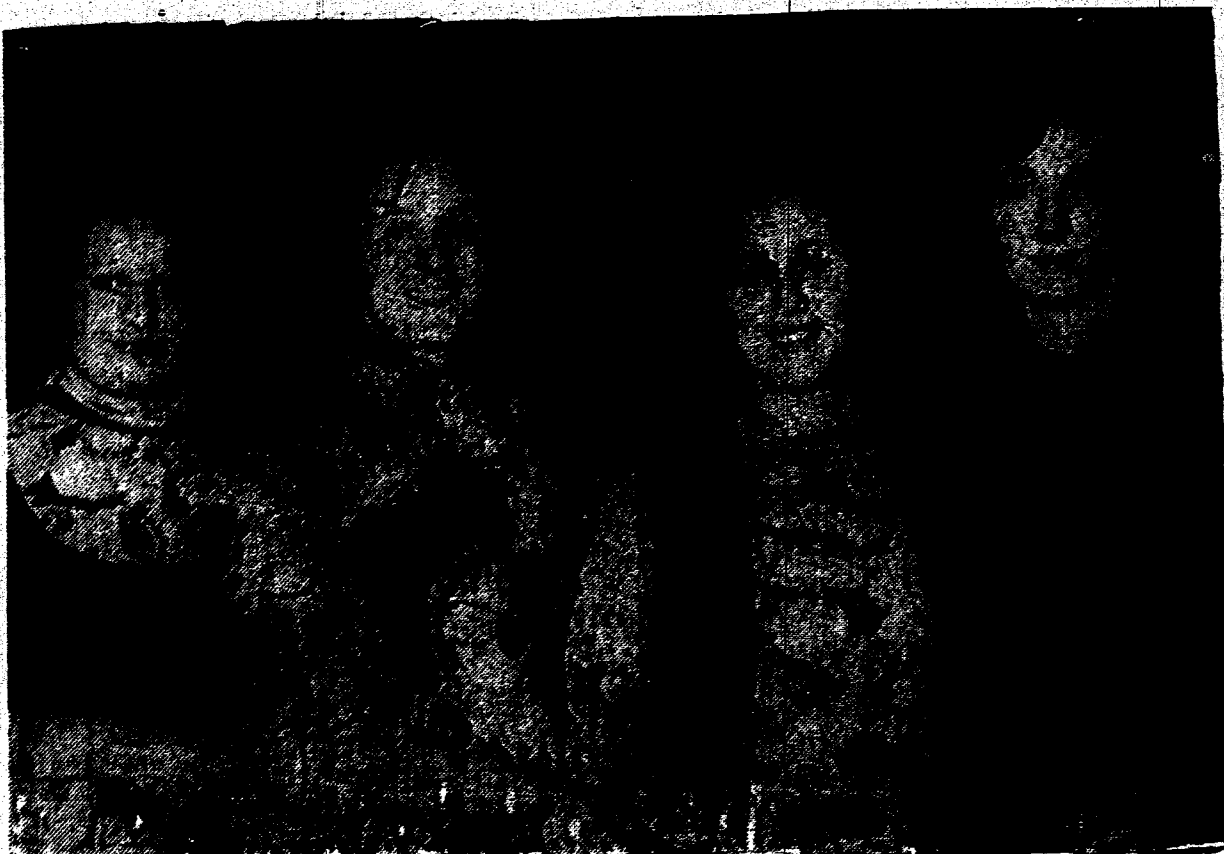

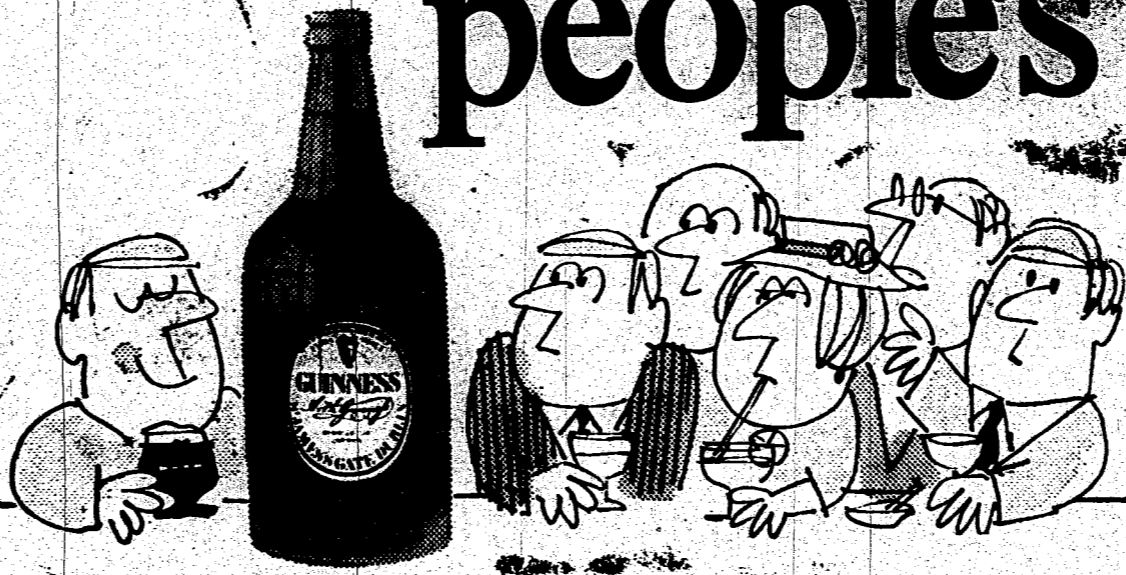

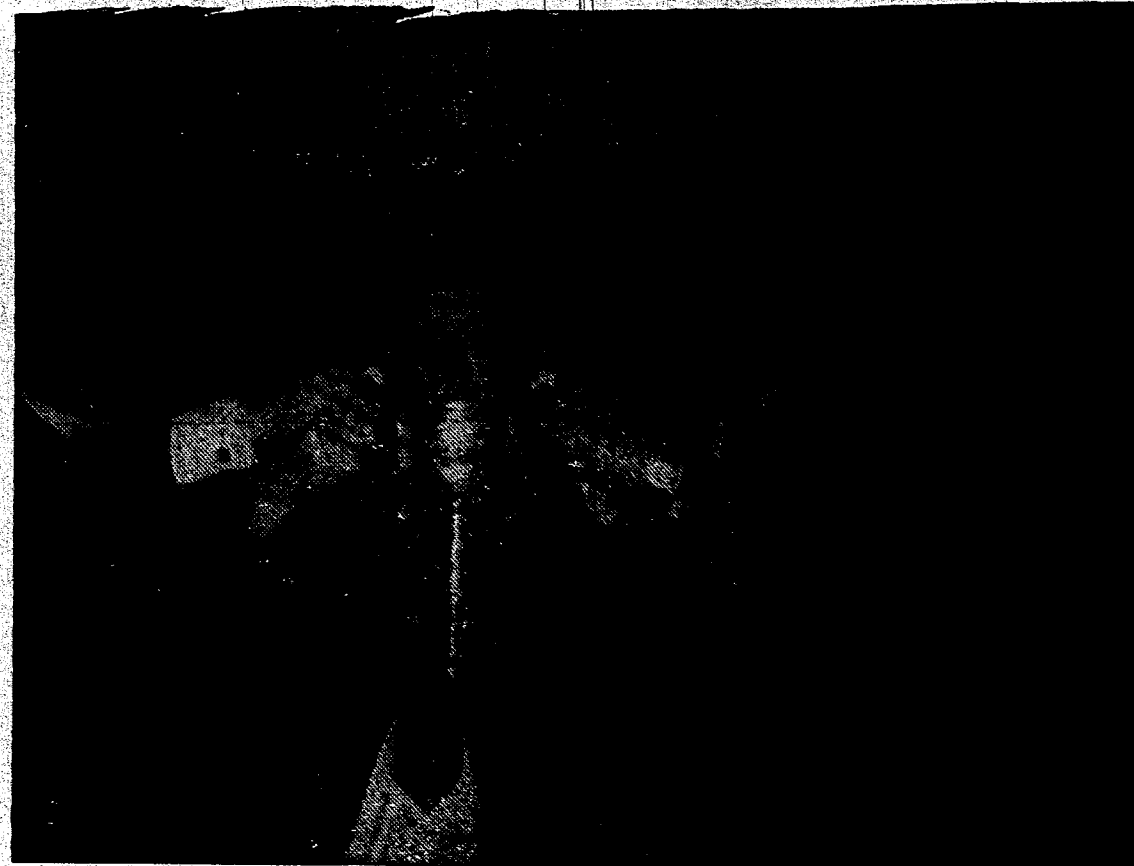
