Development of Environment of Junior Chamber of Dungarvan A.G.M. Waterford City

At the last monthly meeting of Waterford County Council, a programme was accepted for a joint development programme in collaboration with Waterford Corporation including provision of infrastructure services in the environs of the city. Mr. J. D. Hally, County Engineer, said that there is an urgent need for a comprehensive plan for the area in the County adjoining the City limits of Waterford in order to ensure the proper and rational development of this area.

Mr. Hally continued, discussions have been held with the City Manager and City Engineer and also with officials of the Department of Local Government on the matter and proposed the appointment of Consultants to undertake this work in association with the planning staffs of the City and County. The cost would be shared equally by City and County. The Council's approval Mr. Hally concluded, is recommended and it is estimated that the cost to the Council would be of the order of £3,500. Mr. Shahee proposed and Mr. Kynne seconded.

Lismore Toilet

Members of Waterford County Council are to meet Lismore Town Commissioners on Wednesday next, March 21st, to consult with them concerning a site for a public toilet in the town.

Aglish Sewerage Scheme

Mr. P. Kenneally at the last meeting of Waterford County Council raised the matter of Aglish Sewerage scheme, the cost of which is over £20,000 and which has not yet been completed. The scheme, idle for over twelve months, is to be investigated by the County Engineer on the spot and Mr. Kenneally will also be present.

Giving evidence Mrs. O'Connell stated she was blinded by an oncoming car which did not have its lights on and that due to this she did not see the car which she collided with.

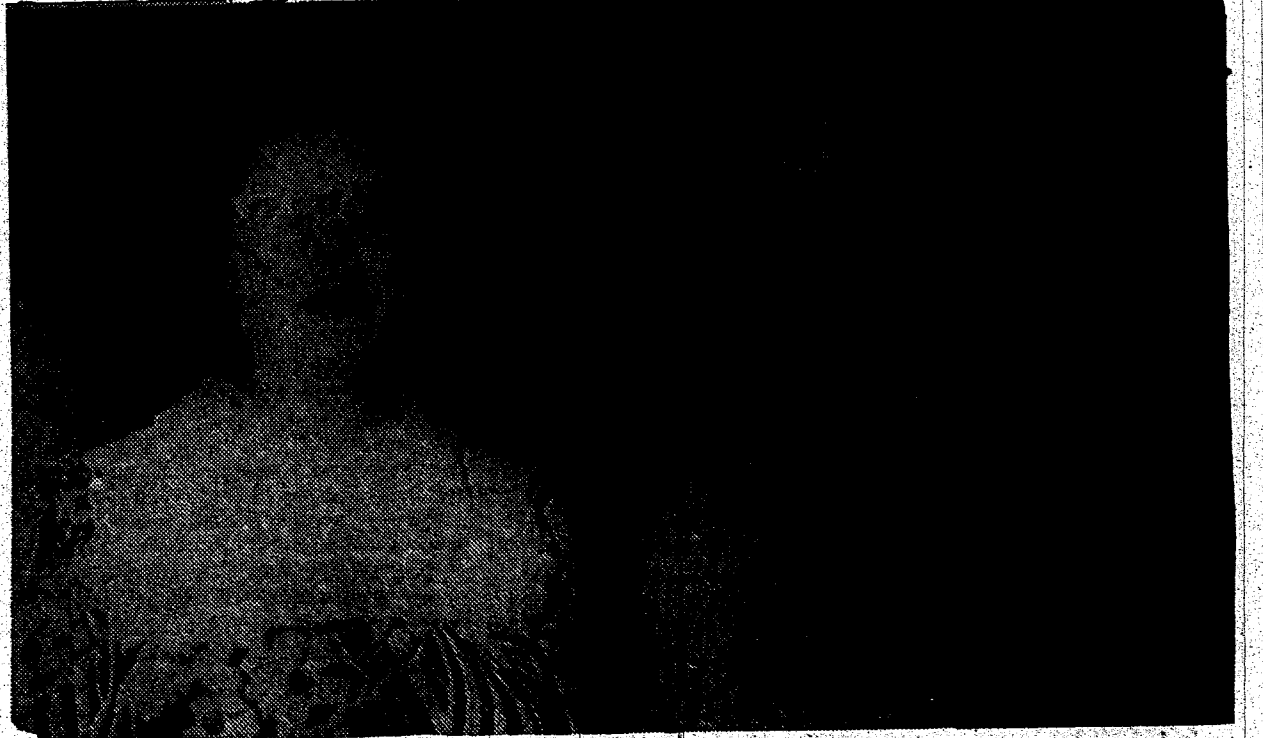

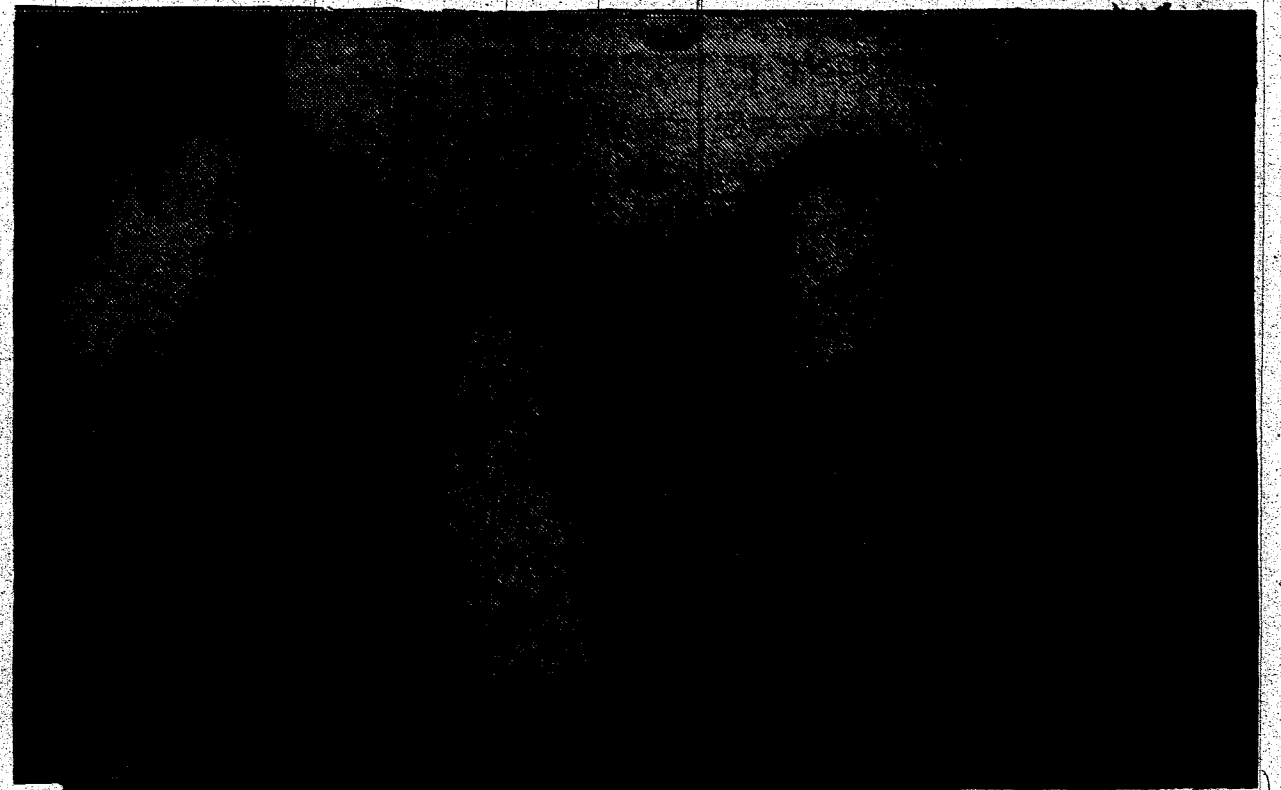

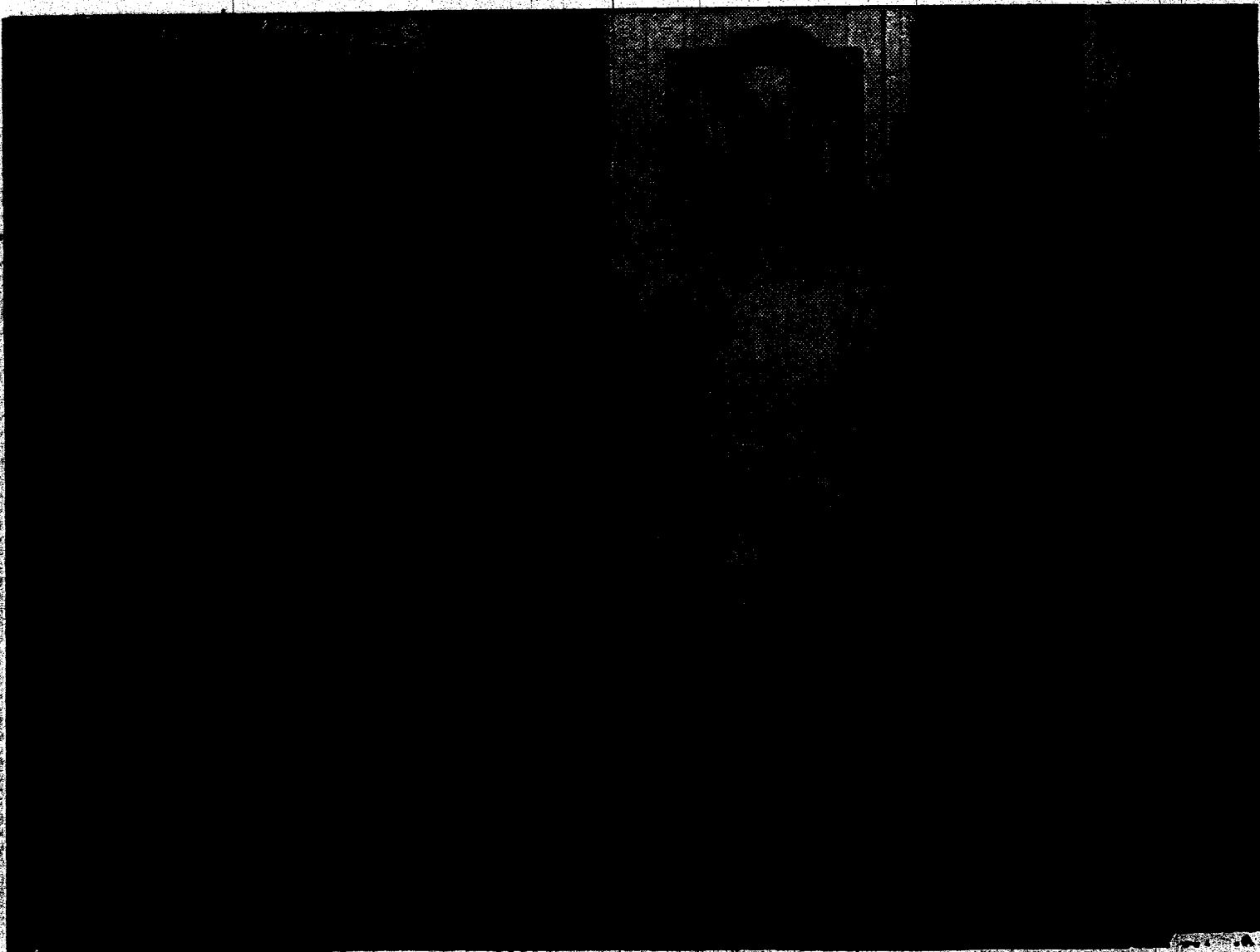

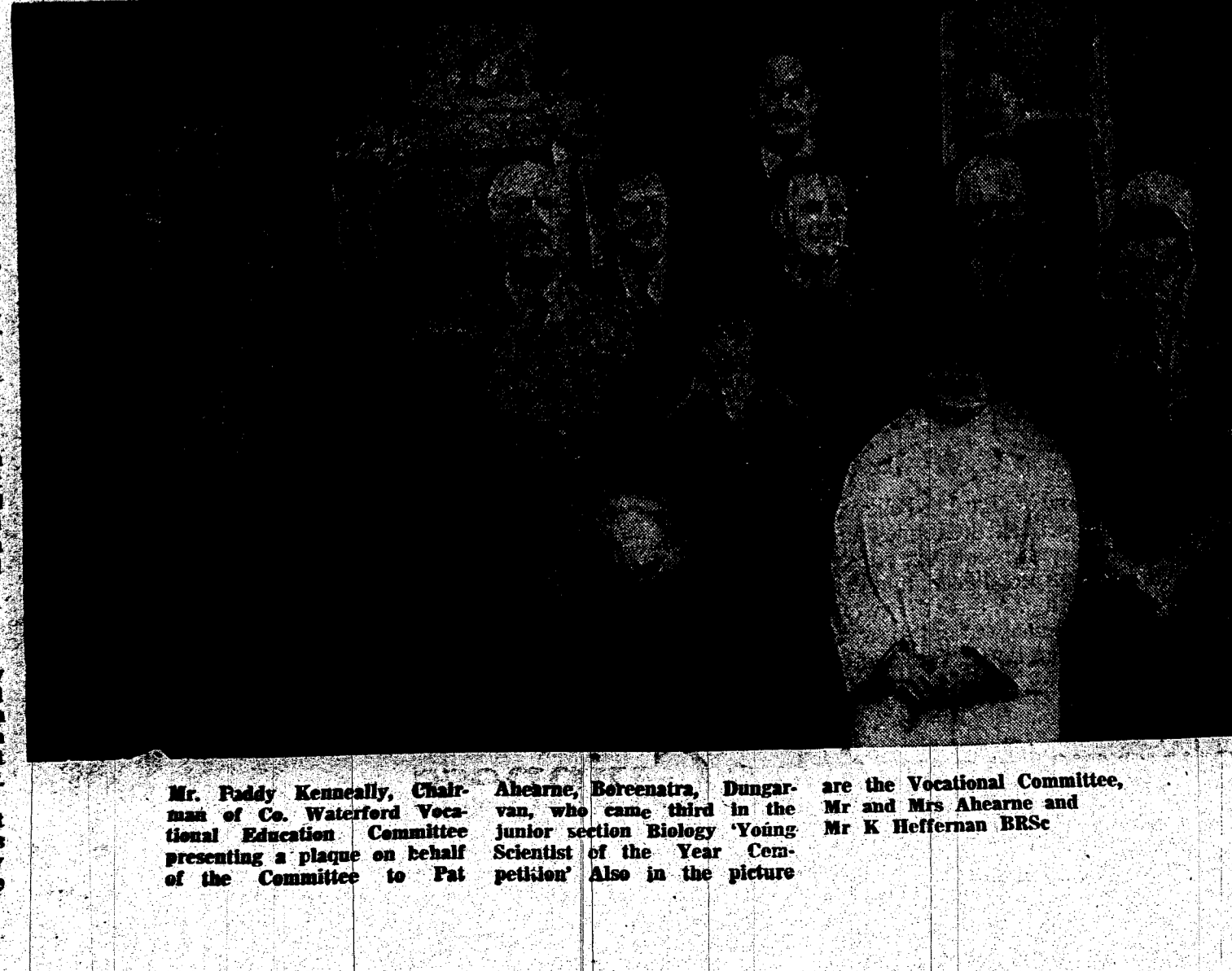
