## Mine-Sweepers Apprehend Arms-ship Off Helvick

A CYPRIAN registered Coaster, of Dutch ownership, "The Claudia" was last night intercepted 1 mile due East off Helvick Head. The coaster was first sighted 24 hours previously off the Wexford Coast. The haul included 250 rifles, 240 small arms and a quantity of anti-tank mines. Six men are being held; three in Dungarvan and three in Collins Barracks. Two locals and one reported from Co. Clare are being held in Dungarvan. The Navy, previously warned, set a trap, which made it impossible for the "Claudia" to escape. A large number of Gardai and Special Branch detectives were waiting inland. Among the crew of the "Claudia" were two Irishmen. The other four were reported to have been on board the launch. The "Claudia" and its crew of three Germans was escorted to Haulbowline, where it was unloaded and the arms and explosives brought to Collins Barracks. The "Claudia" was released after questioning and departed at 12.30 p.m. Destination unknown.

Any further information is being withheld by the Gardai and no names have so far been released.

Aglish Scheme should have been working long ago — Co. Engineer

Following discussions on the Aglish Sewerage Scheme at the last meetings of Waterford County Council, raised by Colr. P. Kenneally, he has received a letter from Mr. J. D. Halley, Co. Engineer.

Mr. Halley stated that the position of the scheme is that it has never in fact been formally handed over to the Co. Council from the contractor, from the consultants, although two of the lines which work by gravity are in fact in operation and the septic tank is also working.

The trouble has been that there is a substantial infiltration of water into one section of the pumping line and the Consultants have been asked to expedite clearing this up and getting the scheme into full operation, and they are at present engaged on so doing. It is expected and hoped that the scheme will be working before very long.

Mr. Halley agrees with Mr. Kenneally, that the scheme should have been working some time ago, but there is little point in our pumping unnecessarily, he outlined, this surface water which is getting in and which would be quite expensive in the amount of current it would use.

At the moment the contractors are coming back to get things re-organised out. Colr. Kenneally will be informed as soon as the scheme is fully in operation.

Colrs. Refuse to Strike Rate

At last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, the annual Estimates Meeting, the Councilors refused to strike a rate for 1973/74. Fianna Fail members had decided unanimously not to support the striking of the rate until the details of their contribution to the South Eastern Health Board for the coming year was made known.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor, the County Manager, said that the total expenditure on Revenue Account is estimated at £2,700,000. This would require a rate of £6.88 in the Pound being an increase of 95.84p on the current year's general rate of £5.82.

Mr. Kieran O'Ryan made the proposal that the striking of the rate be deferred until details of their contribution to the South Eastern Health Board be received, concluding it was of the utmost importance to the ratepayers of Co. Waterford. Mr. D. Ahearne seconded this proposition adding that it be approved unanimously.

The County Manager said if a rate was not struck there was a statutory period of 21 days within which to do so.

Deputy Kyrne said he didn't really think the deferring of the meeting would be of any avail.

Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman, said rates had already been struck by other Councils throughout the country going on last year's health contribution. However, he supported the proposal that the meeting be deferred.

Mr. M. Harty opposed the proposal. The Estimates Meeting will now be held on Friday, April 13th.

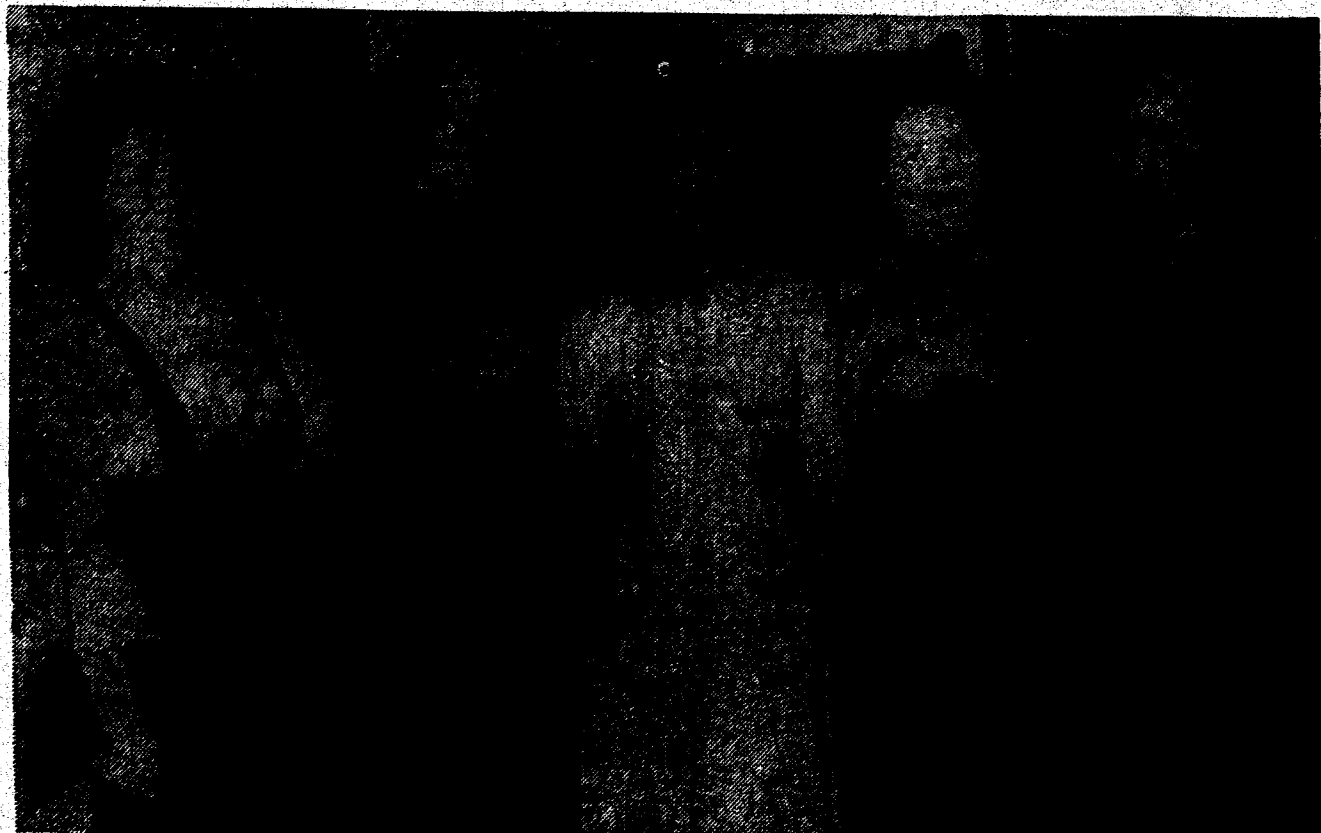

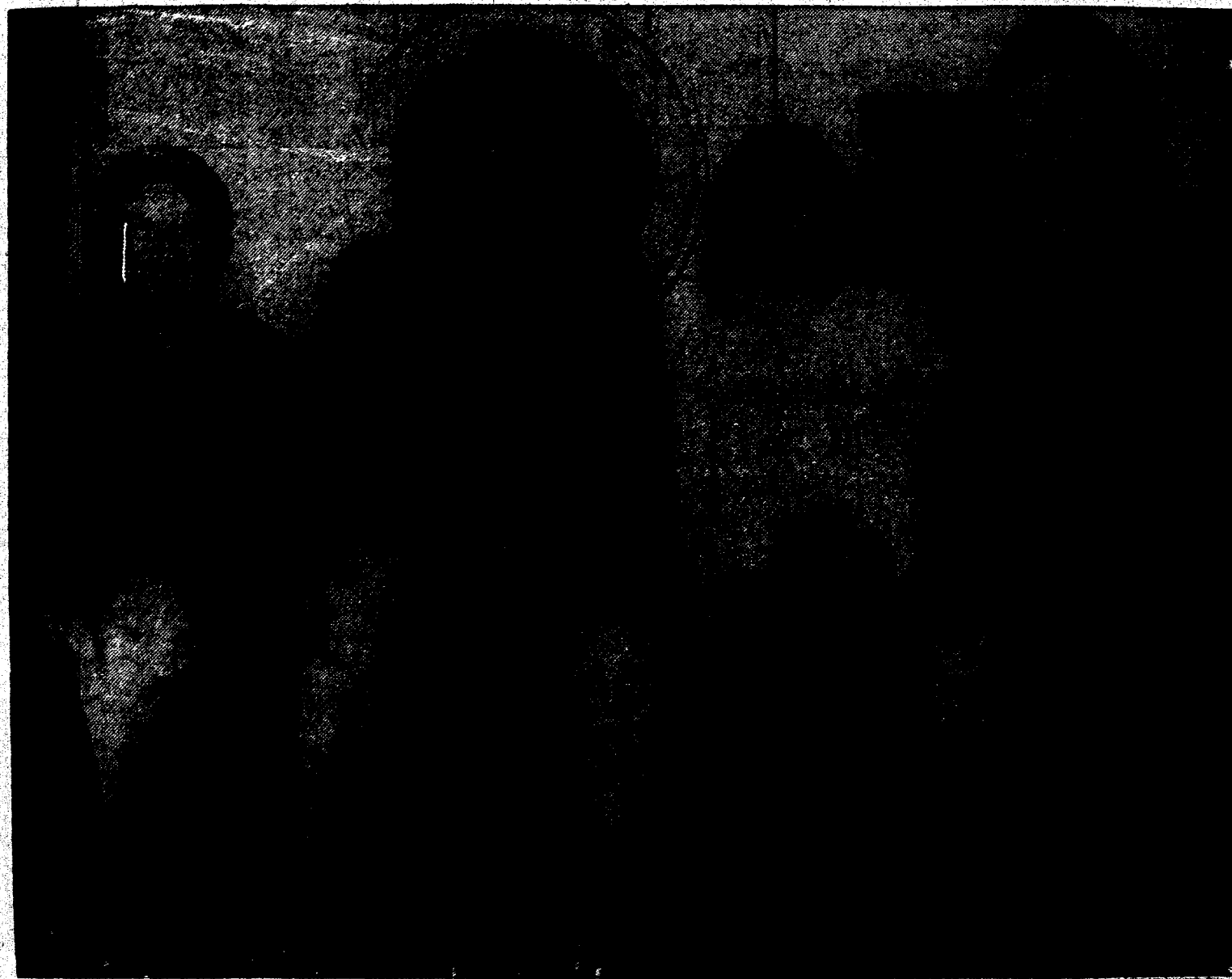

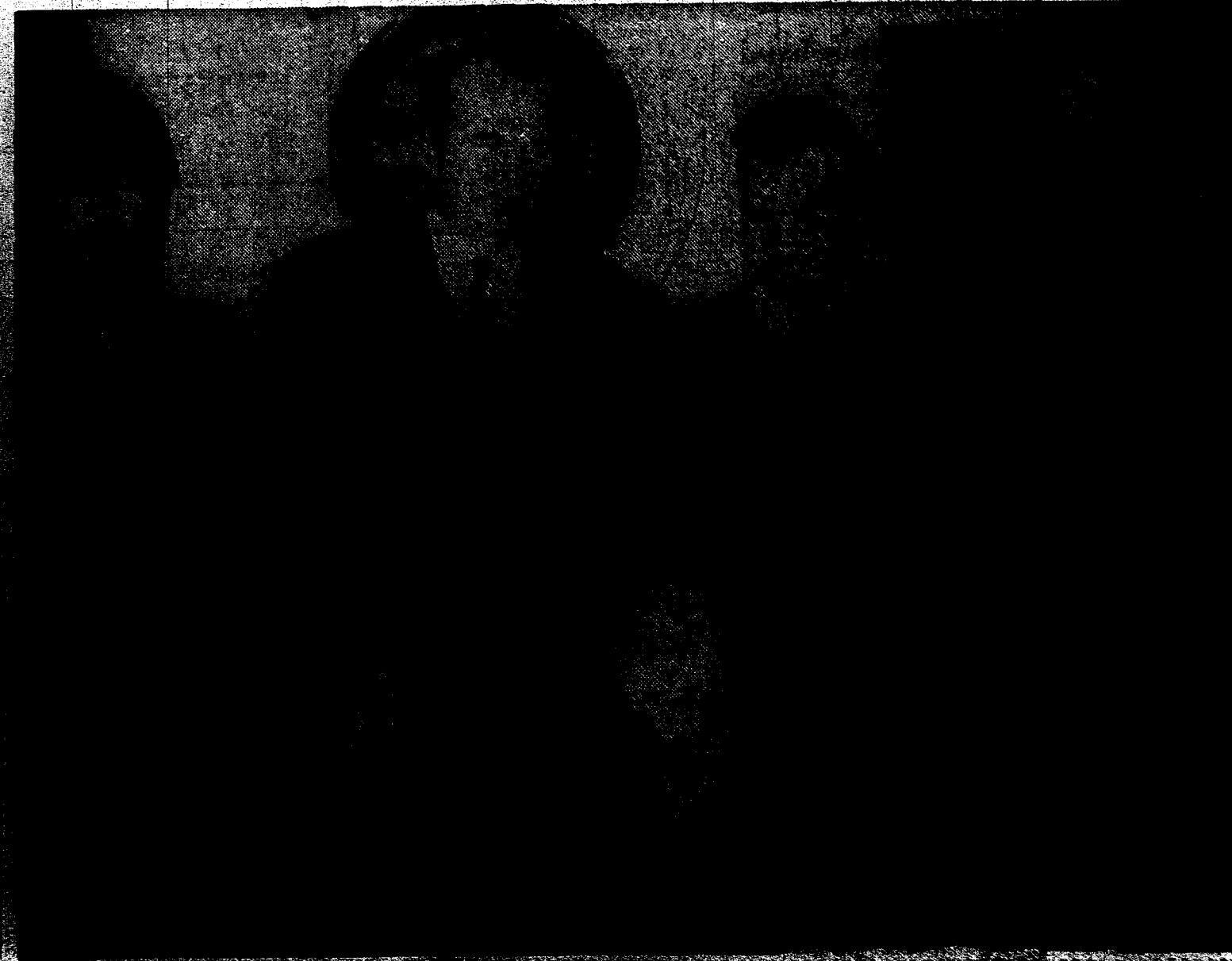
The names of the six men were released at 5.00 p.m.

# Secretary General on Common Agricultural Policy for Sheep

Sheep meat is a commodity of major economic and social importance to Ireland and in particular to the Irish sheep farmers, yet it is a commodity for which a common Agricultural Policy has not yet been established.

This was stated by Mr. Sean Healy, Secretary General of the Irish Farmers' Association, when he spoke at the annual dinner of Kerry County Executive, I.F.A. in Tralee.

He said that consequently, this is a product for which the formulation of the EEC Policy, I.F.A. through its membership of CIDA and through the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries of the Commission and Council of Ministers level will be involved with her EEC partners from the very initial stages.

We in I.F.A. have advocated at EEC level a policy for sheep meat similar to that presently in operation for beef meat. Official Government policy advocated in Brussels to date has been on similar levels. Monsieur Chene, the French Minister for Agriculture, who outlined French thinking on an EEC regulation for the sheep sector recently, also agreed with this line of Commission forecasts.

The EEC Commission forecasts a deficit of 300,000 metric tons of mutton and lamb for the enlarged community in 1990 and a world deficit in that year of 600,000 metric tons. The failure of production to respond to this situation is cited as a fundamental reason justifying the drawing up of a sheep regulation. Furthermore, sheep production is regarded as vital to the maintenance of Agricultural activity in many regions and in particular in certain disadvantaged regions. In the light of this, an effort to regularise the sector is regarded as a priority, particularly since it is amply justified by the market prospects and

there is plenty of feed capacity to carry extra stock.

We consider the following three features as essential for the structure of a sheep regulation: (a) A common guide price; (b) Permanent intervention and (c) An external levy — that is a levy on imports into the Community from non-member countries.

Furthermore, we believe it necessary to increase the FIFC's common external tariff (import duty) on sheep meat, which is currently "bound" at 20% under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade. We recognise that the difference which exists between the Irish, the French and the British price systems poses a problem, particularly since the British Government seems to be disposed to keep prices down. But even so they say that a European solution must be found. It should be possible to agree on the content of a Regulation before next summer.

The importance of lamb production to Ireland cannot be over-emphasised. In 1972 the value of sheep output amounted to £19 million and Irish lamb exports returned more than £7 million.

The fact that prices in Ireland are largely determined by the condition of our export markets where there is no guarantee of access and where prices are uncertain because of lamb importations from other sources to our main outlets, has resulted in a complete lack of confidence in the Irish sheep sector at different periods in the past and sheep numbers decreased from five million to four million head between 1965 and 1970 as a direct result.

This year numbers have tended to decrease slightly again. The sheep population over the 1972 year decreased by 28,000 from 2,862,000 to 2,834,000.

The French, Irish and English sheep farmers are

the major producers of lamb at the moment and sheep production in Europe is on a limited scale. In addition to these facts, lamb is a high priced article on the continent, and with the rising standards of living and increasing demand, there is a strong potential market. With that improvement, which can be financed, in part, from EEC funds through the proposed directive on agriculture on hill and certain difficult regions, our sheep farmers can produce much more sheep meat which will find a ready and well paid market in the enlarged EEC.

In Ireland at this juncture, the emphasis of Government policy should and must be placed on the need for Irish sheep farmers to retain ewe lambs for replacement stock. The number of hogget ewes presented for subsidy in 1972 was down by approximately 10% on the corresponding figures of last year.

Part market and price uncertainties contrasted with present prices may well tempt some producers to sell potential breeding stock for slaughter which will further reduce our already low sheep numbers at a time when sheep farmers should be increasing their stocks in view of full EEC membership where there is an estimated deficit of sheep meat of 360,000 metric tons at present.

Mr. Healy added that the Irish Farmers' Association has been and will continue to negotiate with CIDA with all the European Farmers' organisations on behalf of Irish sheep farmers in order to speed up an agreement for a common Sheep Policy so as to have such a policy implemented as quickly as possible in order to offer all Irish sheep producers a secure and expanding market at remunerative prices.

## Great deal of goodwill in the new Community for Western area

The need for working very closely together so that there would be no exploitation of the Irish agricultural interests from the outside was stressed by Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers' Association, when he spoke at the annual dinner of Sligo County Executive, I.F.A.

He said, "There must be no playing of one part of the industry against the other. The overbearing truth is that we are very small fry in terms of the European market place."

"While it may seem to some that they are making gains by being offered better prices or conditions, we must be extremely careful that these are not merely short term at the expense of the obvious long term rewards from a co-ordinated approach. One vital element in any marketing organisation is that it be adequately financed to carry out all the functions of administration, selling and promotion."

"I am convinced that producers recognise the necessity for this and are prepared to meet their full commitments. It should never be forgotten that it is the small farmer who needs good marketing structures and strong farmer organisation. The bigger man can always get by. The smaller one is the one most likely to be exploited."

"Despite what others say there is a great deal of good will in the new Euro-

pean Community for the problems of those in areas like the West of Ireland. Furthermore, vast sums of money are being provided for the development of these regions and for improving the standard of living in them."

"The I.F.A. is already involved in international committees set up to consider and advise upon the best use of such monies for the economic and social improvement of underdeveloped regions."

"In this context I should like to draw attention to two things in particular:— (a) Monies will not come from Brussels unless our own Government is prepared to make its contribution and if we want worthwhile improvements schemes to be implemented the contribution will have to be considerable and

(b) It must never be forgotten that the majority of farmers in Ireland are small farmers and if national schemes are to bring about worthwhile improvements they must be aimed principally at these men and their families."

Mr. Maher added that recent promises had been made by the Coalition Government during the Election, among which was a firm commitment on Death and Estate Duties, Bruce's Health charges etc. and he sincerely hoped that the Government would now honour those commitments.

## New price agreed for potatoes

Agreement has been reached between CSBT and the Beet and Vegetable Section of IFA regarding potato contracts for the Company's Tuzem plant for the coming season.

Under the terms of the agreement — (a) Contracts will be issued for the same quantity as contracted for the last season. (b) Contracts will be issued to growers whose performance in the eyes of the Association and Company was satisfactory last year. This will include growers in factory areas other than Tuzem. (c) The basic price of potatoes will be raised by £4 per ton over last season's price, which will leave a new basic price as follows:— Kerre Pink variety — £16 per ton; Record variety — £15.50 per ton and Cosula variety — £16.25 per ton. (d) Dry matter bonus, early delivery allowance and delivery compensation will remain unchanged. (e) Applications from interested growers should be sent immediately to the Manager, CSBT, Tuzem, Co. Galway.
