Traders complain of Parking Regulations

A deputation of traders from Main Street, Dungarvan, attended the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council on Monday night last concerning the Parking Regulations.

Mr. K. D'Arcy, spokesman for the group said that the present parking regulations are injurious to their business. If a strict member of the Force happened to be on duty a person could not even stop to collect messages as they would have a ticket on coming from the shop.

Mr. D'Arcy continued that he sees only one solution to this problem which he put forward at a previous meeting and that is one way traffic through Main Street and limited parking of not more than one hour on one side only.

Colr. P. Whelan agreed with this and said it would solve the problems at once.

Colr. T. Wade raised the question of the £18,000 Car Park and which to date is only being used by a minority. Unless the Council took a firm stand Colr. Wade continued, the park would be on the market for sale.

Colr. P. Whelan said if a one-hour parking limit were to be enforced in all central areas of the town, it would mean the new car park would have to be used.

A meeting with a view to discussing the matter will be held between the Gardaí and officials of the Council.

Sports complex planned for Dungarvan

At the last meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Deputy Tom Kyne, Chairman, said the first steps have been taken to provide a sports complex in Dungarvan.

A deputation of three from Dungarvan Soccer Club attended the meeting Mr. M. Lyons, spokesman, said they would have to give up their existing playing pitch next month. He asked what were the prospects of their acquiring an alternative pitch for the next season from the land purchased by the Council at Youghal Road.

Mr. Kyne revisited permission had been granted to the Vocational Education Committee by the Department to employ an architect to inspect the land and draw up plans for the project and then, depending on the cost of the project a decision would be taken on whether or not to proceed with it. At present the land is let on an 11 month lease but no difficulty is envisaged in getting immediate possession of an area suitable for a soccer pitch.

Members of the club are to meet the Town Engineer and mark out the most suitable portion of the land for the pitch.
