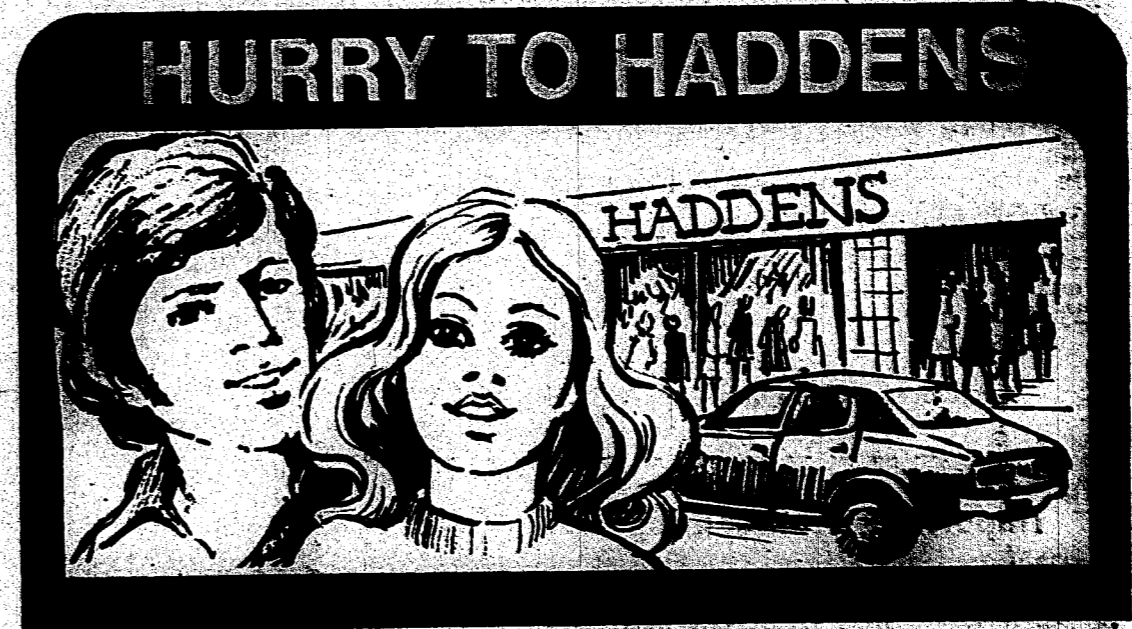

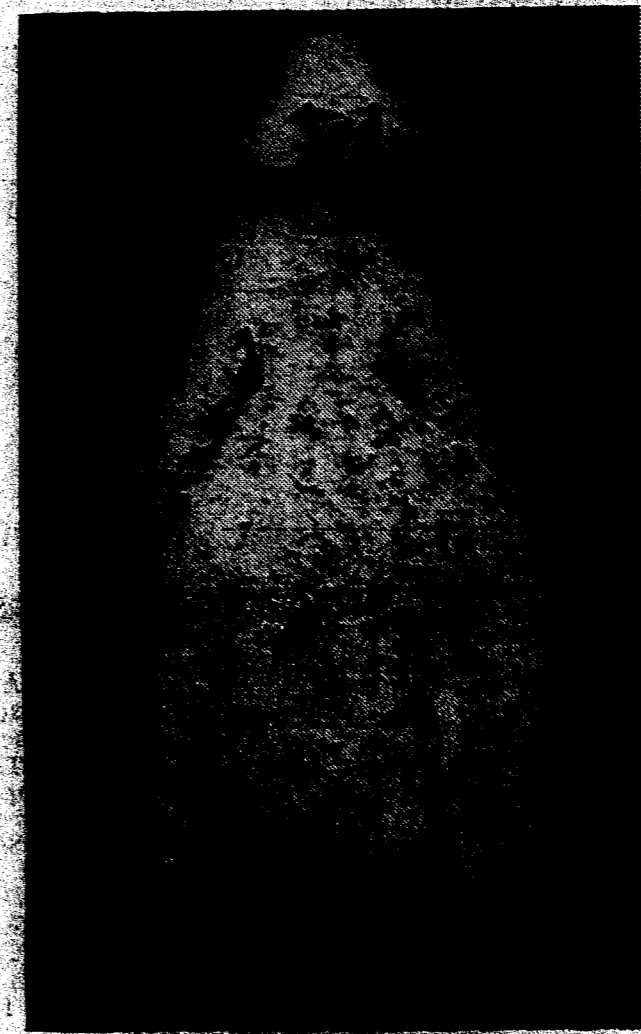

REDUCTION IN COUNTY RATE

At its shortest ever Estimates meeting
on Friday last, Waterford County Council
struck a rate of £5.84 in the Pound.
This is a reduction of 8.25p. over last
year's rate.

The Estimates first circulated indicated
that a general rate of £6.88 in the Pound
would be required for the coming year
73/74, being an increase of 95.84p on
last year's general rate of £5.92p. The
Council's first Estimates meeting was
adjourned. This is the first time ever
a rate less than that of the previous
year was adopted by the Council.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor, Co. Manager, said,
if the new Government had not decided
to transfer a portion of the cost of
health services and housing subsidies,
which is at present borne by local rates,
from local to central taxation, their
estimated expenditure of £2,790,828
would have required a rate of £6.88 in
the pound for 1973/74, which meant an

increase of £95.84p on 72/73 rate.
However, following the Ministers an-
nouncement a reduction of £1.04 was
incurred on the proposed rate.

The new rate was adopted unanimously
on the proposition of Kieran O'Ryan
M.C.C., seconded by T. A. Kyne T.D.

Sanction received for purchase of 10½ acres

At the monthly meeting of County
Waterford Vocational Education Com-
mittee, Mr. D. Kelleher C.E.O., revealed
that sanction had been received from
the Department of Education to purchase
the 10½ acres adjoining Kilmatthomas
Vocational School, for the purpose of
carrying out developments.

Mr. P. Kenneally, Chairman, com-
plimented the members of the de-
putation on being so successful.

In the coming months we can look forward to the removal of Value added Tax from food and remove the iniquitous situation which prevails in respect of estate duty.

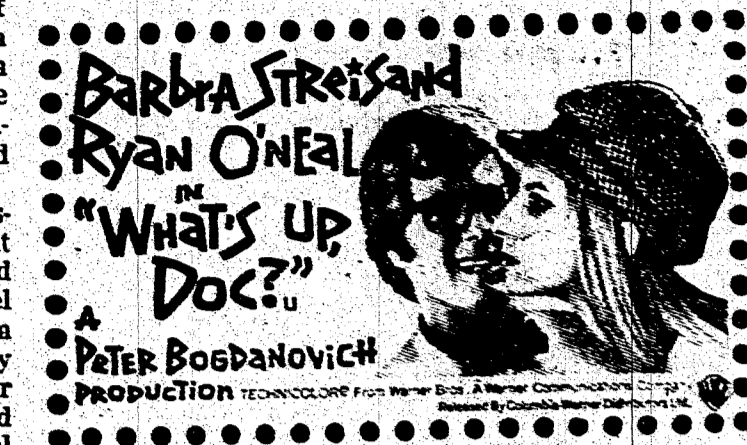

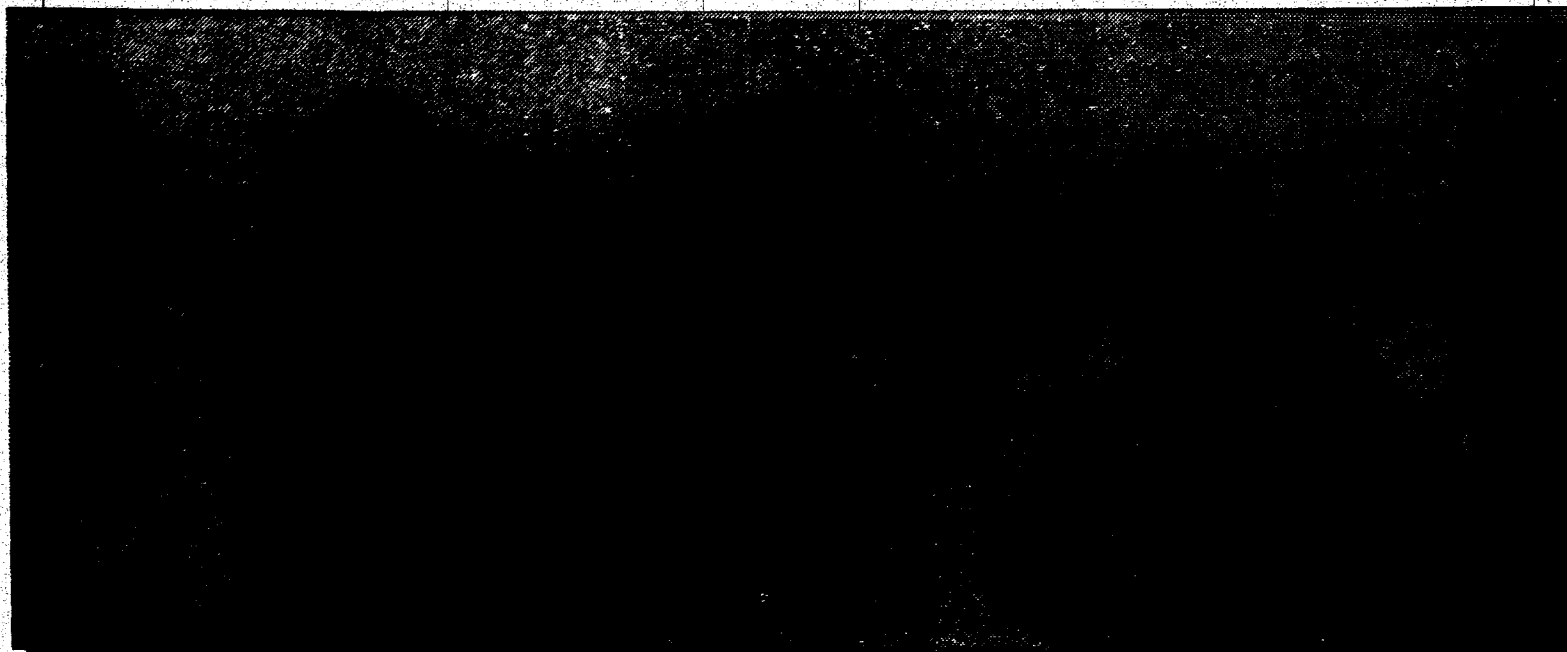

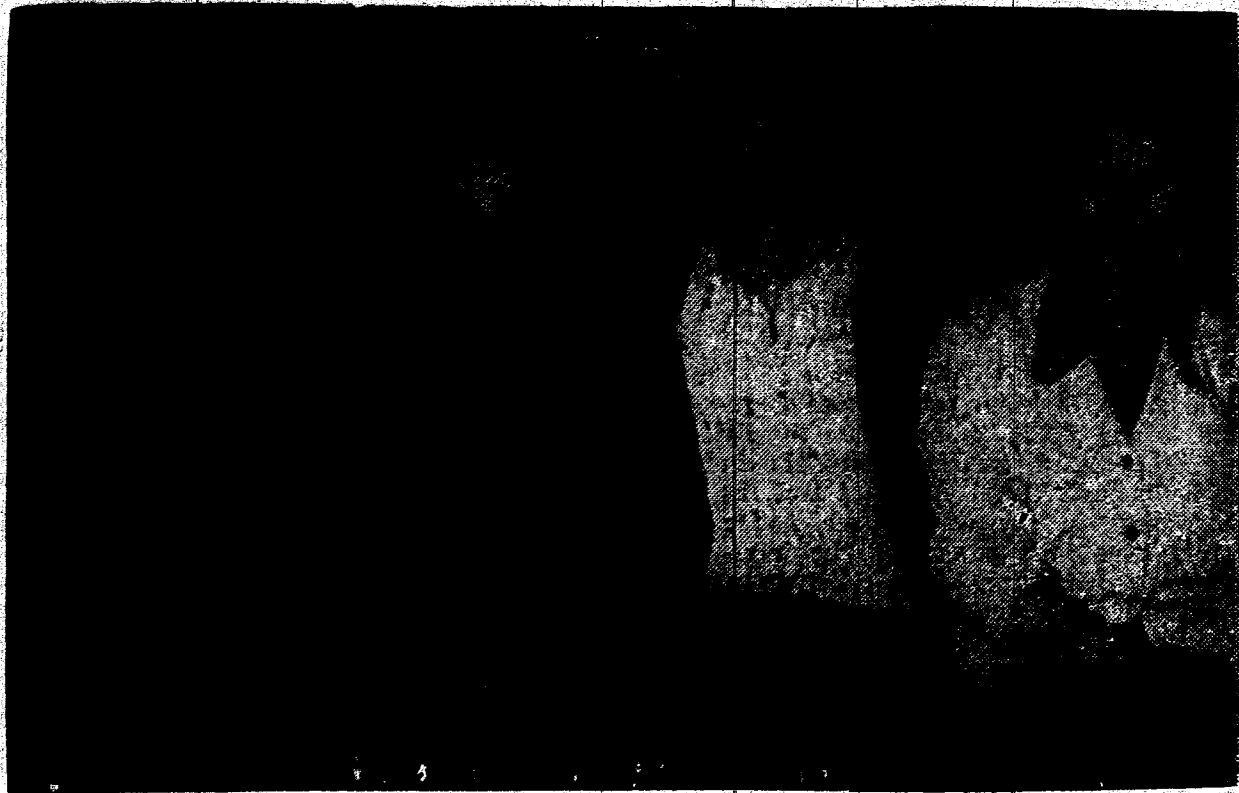

WATERFORD CONSTITUENCY-NET SALMON LICENCE UNDER REVIEW

The Chairman of the Constituency Council of the Labour Party, Mr. Frank King, received a report from Deputy T. A. Kyne stating that the following Dail Question has been tabled by him: 134 To ask the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries if he will examine the method by which the Board of Conservators selected fishermen for the granting of licences in view of the financial loss sustained by County Waterford salmon net fishermen who were refused licences to continue to net salmon this season; and if he will ensure that all genuine fishermen are granted licences.

Thomas A. Kyne. The answer to this question, which is of vital concern to a significant number of fishermen and their dependents in this constituency, was scheduled for the 28th March. It was not dealt with at the time of the adjournment of the Dail and will now be discussed when the Dail reconvenes.

In view of the grave urgency of the matter, however, Mr. Kyne immediately sought an interview with Mr. Michael Pat Murphy, Labour T.D. Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture, during which he impressed upon him the urgency of the situation and the need to deal with the matter with all possible expediency. A full list of the various net salmon fishermen in the Constituency who were refused a licence in 1973 was left with the Parliamentary Secretary, and each case is now under preview with a view to having a licence issued.
