Official Opening of New Augustinian College

The official opening of the Augustinian Order's new ultra modern college complex at Duckpool, Aonyside, takes place on Wednesday next, May 2nd.

The new college was built at a cost of £750,000 and replaces the old Friary which had become increasingly inadequate in recent years to cope with the ever increasing number of students and the expanding demands of the educational curriculum. This is one of the most imposing educational complexes in the country. The college has a total enrolment of almost 400 pupils—boarders and day boys.

Secretary of the Department of Educa-

tion, Mr. Sean McGearailt, will perform the opening ceremony while His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Russell will perform the Blessing.

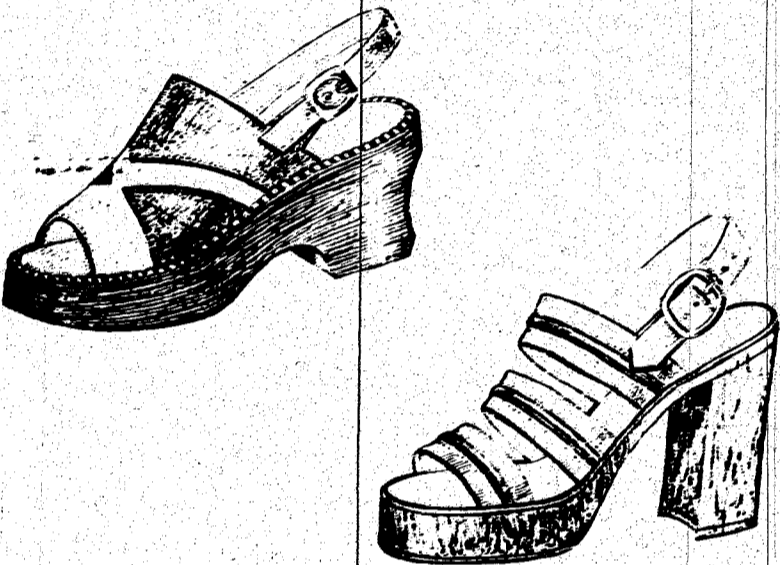

An informal chat with Brendan Caudwell.

In furtherance of their policy to broaden the scope of their activities, the Dungarvan Dramatic Club have invited the noted character actor, Brendan (Benmie) Caudwell to guest at an informal chat at Lawlors Hotel on Saturday 5th May, at 8.30 p.m. A member of the R.T.E. Repertory for some eighteen years, Brendan has played up to 1,500 character parts on radio and has made innumerable appearances on stage. Many will recall his all too infrequent, though inimitable, vignettes on television from time to time. A brilliant raconteur, Brendan is also well-known as an adjudicator at drama festivals. Tops of the Town etc. He has recently returned from Toronto where, with Siobhan McKenna and Niall Toibin, he received rave notices for his playing in a season of O'Casey.

Brendan, to whom the phrase "one-man show" is anathema, has insisted on the informality of the occasion and invites questions from those present so that the atmosphere of a "conversazione" will prevail.

As this is the first of many such "evenings" with leading theatrical personalities which the Dramatic Club propose to sponsor in the future, we feel sure that many producers and actors of the amateur stage will profit by, and enjoy "Things Theatrical." PROPOSED PILOT SCHEME FOR THE DEISE

An open forum on the Irish language will be held in Lawlors Hotel, Dun Garbhain, on 17th May at 8.30 sharp. A number of copies of a paper entitled "Treoir-plean na nDeise" (Deise Pilot Scheme) have already been circulated so as to provide a definite basis for discussion. The discussion will be in English but anyone who wishes to speak in Irish or bilingually may do so. A competent representative panel will discuss the following points from the paper—

(1) The right of every Irishman and woman to acquire their national heritage and position to pass it on to the next generation.

(2) Bilingualism in theory and practice. The necessity for some to acquire a knowledge of a continental language.

(3) Systematic planning under the local authorities for a cultural revival. The Pilot plan would involve all sections of the local community.

(4) A three-way approach to the revival problem. Co-operation between the school, home and churches at local level, with planned programmes on Television and Radio throughout the year to reinforce the local effort.

(5) The nature of incentive required to encourage a fruitful study of Irish in the school and in adult education and the introduction of Irish into the social and business life of the community.

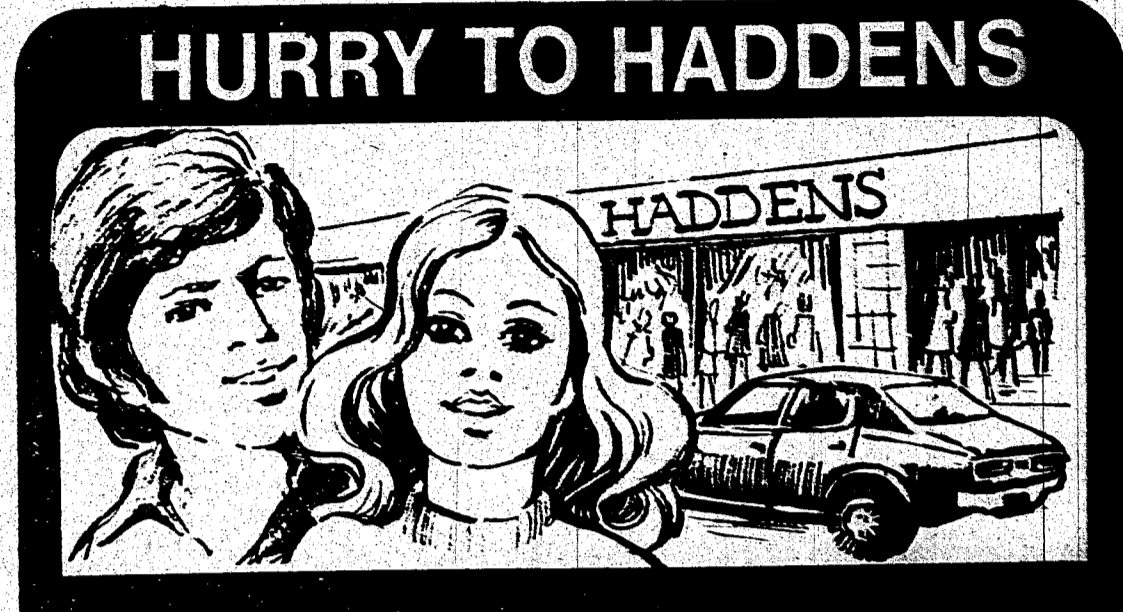
(6) The function of voluntary cultural organisations in the Treoir-plean.

(7) The functions of Na Teasachthoirí or Cultural Instructors. Their role in two-way communication.

(8) Youth and Gaelicisation through sports in the Treoir-Phlean.

(9) Irish culture a rural culture. Difficulties of applying it to large urban communities.

(10) A five year pilot scheme for a defined local area under local authority but partially financed by a department of the central Government.

There is a definite educational air about the Royal Dublin Society's forthcoming Spring Show (1st to 5th May). This is on a number of levels from agriculture the main point of the Show, to the Rural Urban Education Exhibit featuring small animals.

The repeat of last years jointly staged live/carcase beef class by the R.D.S. and C.B.F. will be welcomed by all in the beef industry. The C.B.F. Stand this year covers a larger area and has been resited in the East Hall. With entrances from the Main Hall and the general show yard it will be more accessible to visitors to the Show. C.B.F. are responsible for the administration of the class which was established last year. During the last two months animals have been selected at Marts throughout the Country. This has expanded the interest in the competition giving a local following for each of the animals selected. It has also opened up the competition to the small farmer. C.B.F. are also staging a selected lamb carcase class.

Also in the East Hall will be an exhibition of livestock by some of the cattle Breed Societies. The established breeds on show will be Hereford and Charolais. The other two breeds on show will be new to Ireland. They are Austrian Simmenthal, and South Devon from England. With the successful introduction of Charolais to Ireland not so many years ago, it will be interesting to see how much attention the exhibit attracts.

Sheep get a bigger than ever showing this year with a centre being established in the Simmonscourt extension. Fleece classes are being introduced for the first time. Sponsored by the Wool Council, the main interest will be to see how the fleeces

are presented. The general theme of the sheep centre is educational and the Wool Council will be showing how to present and prepare fleeces.

There will also be sheep shearing demonstrations, a commentary on the fleeces, a parade of sheep with a commentary and on the Tuesday a Sheep Dog Trial.

The Show's lecture programme is focussed mainly on the cattle and dairy industry. These will all be held in the Member's Concert Hall and start on the Wednesday at 3.30, when the subject will be "Dairy Farming". The second on the Thursday, also at 3.30 p.m., is on "Beef Production" and on Friday the subject will be "Grazing Management."

In the former Tea Gardens, behind the Grand Stand in the jumping enclosure, a new exhibit will be located. This is the Rural/Urban Educational Exhibit. In the main this will feature Mothers and offspring. In some cases these will be as young as two weeks old. Among those on show will be a mare and foal, a Ewe with lambs, a goat with kid, a donkey and foal, cow and calf and a sow and bonhams. This will mainly be an educational exhibit as there will be information on the animals available.

Alongside will be an exhibition of camping equipment adding new variety and colour to this section of the show grounds.

Throughout the general trade and industries exhibition will be many education and informative stands. The Department of Agriculture will be dealing with many aspects of agricultural, while the exhibition in general will cover many cultural, commercial, domestic and industrial interests.

SPOTLIGHT ON EIRE OGE

THIS WEEK we turn our spotlight on the Eire Oge club which was re-formed in 1968 when they captured the County Juvenile Hurling title. In 1969 they reached the Divisional final of the Intermediate championship losing to the eventual county champions Lismore. In 1970 they qualified for the final of the county in the Junior Football championship, which they lost on replay to Butlerstown. IN 1971 their U-16 footballers reached the Western final of the championship.

When one looks closely at Eire Oge's record it can be seen that they have been very active and quite successful over the past five years. Older readers will remember with pleasure the outstanding Eire Oge Junior Hurling team of the early fifties and their great games with Abbey-side. Eire Oge captured the county title in 1951.

For the past three years Eire Oge have lost to Shamrocks in the Intermediate championship. Indeed the Knockanore team have proved to be a real misfortunate side for them. Now that Sham-

rocks are playing in the senior grade we may see Eire Oge mounting a senior challenge for the Divisional title. Carrolls All-Ireland Seven-A-Side championship

A RECORD NUMBER of Clubs representing 28 Irish counties and teams from Britain and America have entered the fourth annual Carrolls All-Ireland Seven-A-Side Championship which takes place this Saturday and Sunday the 28th and 29th April in Belfield, the grounds of the organising club, U.C.D.

This was announced at a reception which was held yesterday in the P. J. Carroll and company offices at the Grand Parade, Dublin 6 at which the draw for the first round of the competition to be played on Saturday was announced. Of the 35 teams included in the draw, 31 are Irish, two are from London, one is from the Air Corps and for the first time in the Championship the Michigan Gaels from Detroit will take part. John O'Keefe, who played with the Michigan Gaels Club while working in Detroit last summer, will line out with the American side.

When the competition was first played in 1970 twenty teams competed, in 1971 thirty teams participated and in 1972 thirty four teams took part. This year with thirty five teams competing it will be necessary for six teams to play in a preliminary round which will be played on Saturday at 12.30 p.m. and the first round proper will be played at 2.00 p.m. followed by the second and third rounds. The Semi-finals and final will be played on Sunday morning at 11.00 and 12.00 noon. This change in the programme is as a result of the proposed replay of the Derry v Kerry match which is scheduled for the 29th April. The Final and semi-finals will have a new setting this year in the newly laid out and enclosed pitch known as Belfield Park, the home of the U.C.D. Soccer Club who have kindly given the use of their ground for the occasion.

The prizes for the winners of this year's Carrolls All-Ireland Seven-A-Side consist of a set of nine replicas in bronze of the famous statue of Cuchulainn which adorns Dublin's General Post Office.
