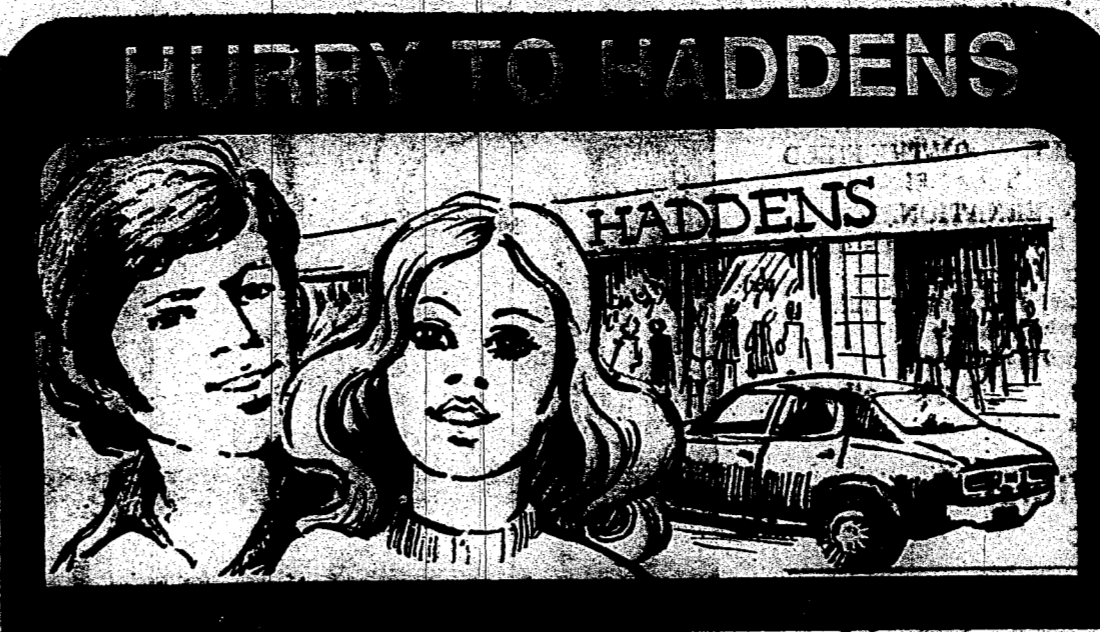

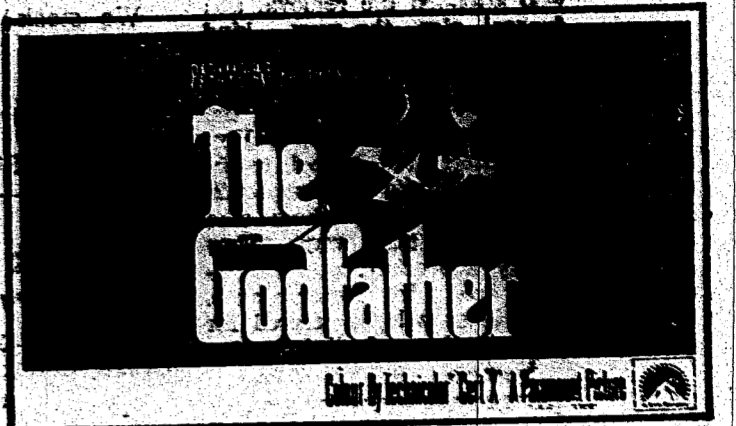
CAMOGIE

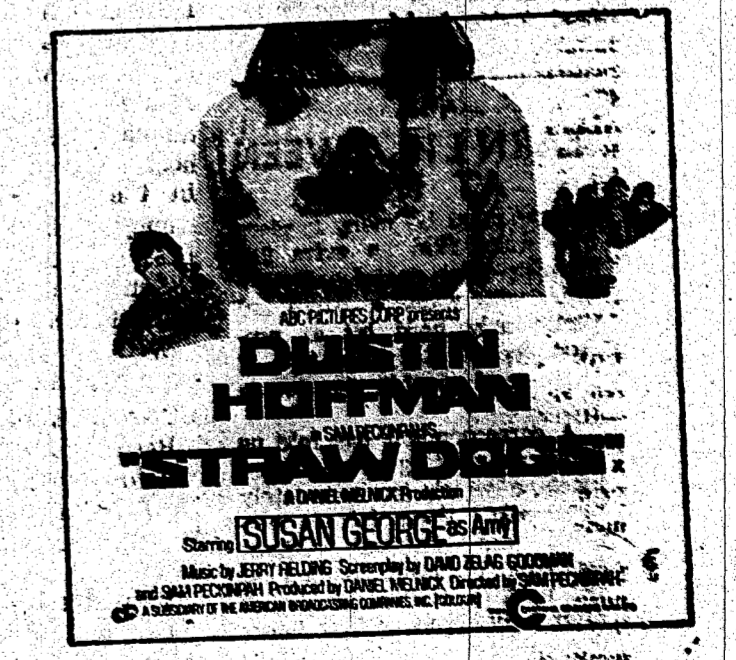

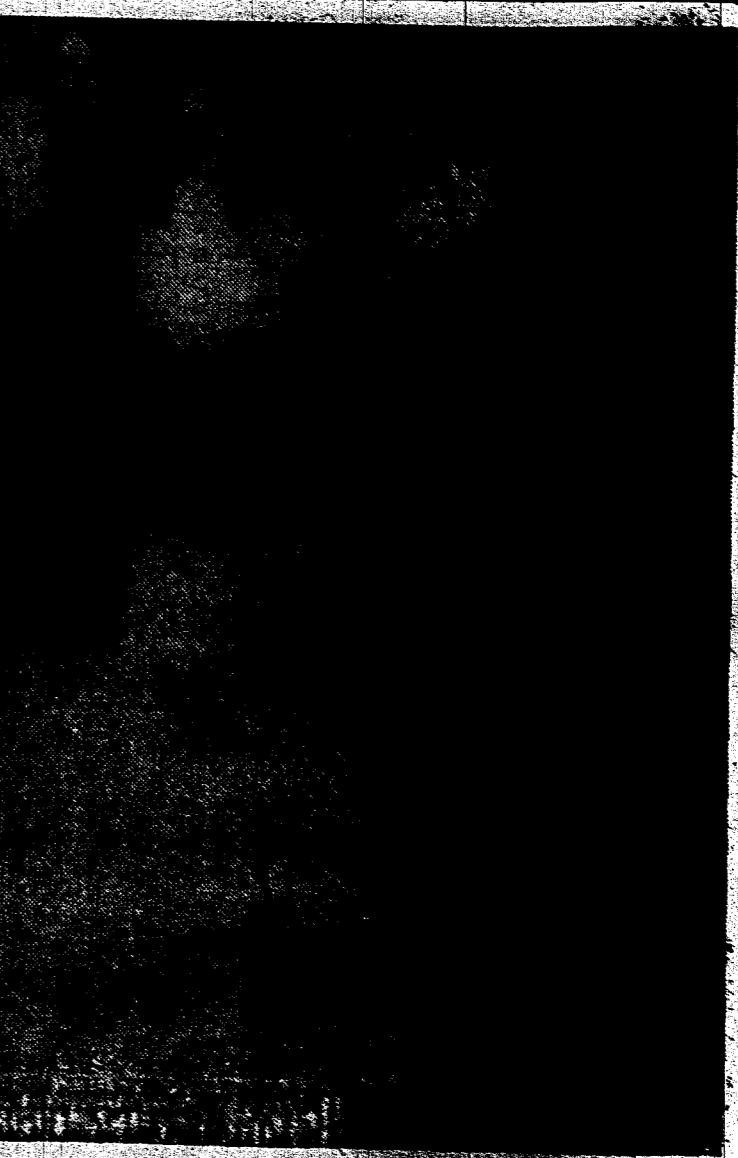

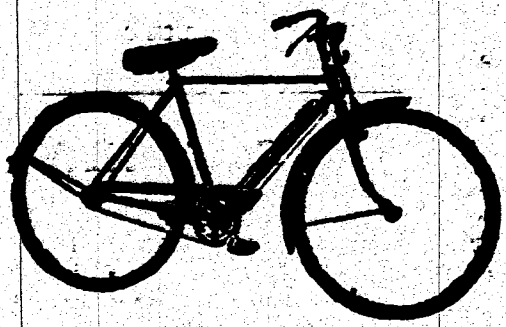

FOREST FIRE DISCUSSED

At the last meeting of Waterford Co. Council, Mr. Michael Harty M.C.C., raised a point which he considered to be of the utmost importance to the rate payers of Waterford. Commenting on last Friday night's destruction of forty acres of State forest plantation involving 60,000 trees in a forest fire at Windgap, Mr. Harty said if water had been adjacent to the plantation the destruction would not have been so devastating. As it was, Mr. Harty continued, due to the distance of the only suitable area of water from the fire, it took the firemen from one to three or four hours to get depth, to hold up to 5,000 gallons, be constructed adjacent to plantation depth, to hold up to 5,000 gallons were to be constructed adjacent to plantations and built up areas all over the country.

This he continued would considerably lessen the damage done by fires, as time would not be wasted in search of suitable water supplies. The Council, however, he concluded, should not carry the full cost of this and insurance companies and the Forestry Division should be approached.

In reducing the danger of complete devastation this would also help reduce the burden of the taxpayers if malicious injury claims were made.

Mr. C. Curran M.C.C., complimented the firemen on their action the previous Friday night, adding that Waterford has one of the best brigades in the country. Mr. K. O'Ryan M.C.C., said, people seem to have no sense of responsibility any longer. Mr. M. Harty stated the forestry people are not doing their duty either to the people or their job.

Mr. N. Walsh M.C.C., said the public should be far more careful now that the state forests have been made available. It was the general opinion that the main cause of forest fires are cigarette ends.

The matter, raised by Colr. Harty at a previous meeting also was passed for survey and examination.

Forest Fire Destroys 60,000 Trees

On Friday night last, 40 acres of State Forest Plantation, involving 60,000 trees were destroyed in a forest fire at Windgap, Dungarvan.

Four fire brigades from Dungarvan, Youghal, Kilmachthomas and Cappoquin fought the blaze for five hours before getting it under control. At its peak the fire was 800 yards in length and the firemen had to use a hose stretching more than a mile. The fire was so intense that at one stage it was considered calling in army personnel from Fermoy and Clonmel.

The firemen prevented the fire from spreading to a nearby plantation which at one stage was threatened and they eventually succeeded in saving 30 acres of the Windgap plantation.

Late Miss Angela Lawlor

"Clodiagh Cottage," Abbeyside

Deep feelings of sincere regret was expressed at the announcement of the death of Miss Angela Lawlor, "Clodiagh Cottage," Abbeyside and formerly of Lawlors' Hotel, Dungarvan, who died during the early hours of Wednesday morning, April 25th at St. Mary's Hospital, Dungarvan. The deceased was the sole surviving member of a very popular family, who were attached to the Hotel and General Grocery and Bar trade of the town prior to their retirement.

The late Miss Angela Lawlor was a lady of many charming qualities, which greatly endeared her to legions of sincere friends.

In her youth, Miss Lawlor was a very keen golfer and won many trophies at local and provincial levels. She was one of the last members of the Dungarvan Golf Club, when it was first opened on the Cunnigar in the early 1920's. Her remains were received in St. Mary's Parish Church on Wednesday evening by Rev. F. Callanan C.C.
