F.F. Re-instate O'Ryan

Mr. Kieran O'Ryan, Knockalisheen, Ballymacarbray, who was officially expelled from the Fianna Fail organisation in County Waterford following a specially convened meeting of the Comhairle Dail Cheannair in Dungarvan on December 2nd last, is back again in the fold. The same body that "sacked" him five months ago have now welcomed him back with open arms, thus reuniting the party once again in the Constituency.

Mr. O'Ryan who had represented the Fianna Fail party on Waterford County Council and many of its subsidiary bodies for more than seventeen years, was expelled following a series of confrontations with official party policy. That decision, taken by a 10-4 vote of the Comhairle Dail Cheannair was known however, to have met with the strong disapproval of many of Colr O'Ryan's Co. Council colleagues at the time.

Ever since then Mr. O'Ryan has sat as an independent member of the County Council though his support for the F.F. party has never been adequately contested.

The first indications of a possible "re-ification" came at a meeting of the Kilmacthomas Comhairle Cheannair when the vast consensus of opinion was

that there was a place for him within the organisation. Then came the recent General Election when Mr. O'Ryan worked as assiduously as anyone officially within the organisation on behalf of party candidates.

That, it is felt, helped considerably the relationships between himself and the party "hierarchy" so it wasn't any great surprise when ultimately the Comhairle Dail Cheannair ratified the Kilmacthomas Comhairle Cheannair decision that he be taken back again as a party member.

Whatever misgivings there may have been — and there were undoubtedly quite a deal, about Mr. O'Ryan's many attacks on some aspects of Government policy in the past, the patching up of differences will no doubt be welcomed by the great mass of F.F. supporters throughout the county. His return too, as a member of the organisation restores the party's overall strength on the County Council and ensures the reelection of Mr. Charles Curran at Chairman at the annual meeting in July.

Mr. O'Ryan spoke on Monday of the decision to take him back as a member and said he was delighted to regain his status as an official Fianna Fail Coun-

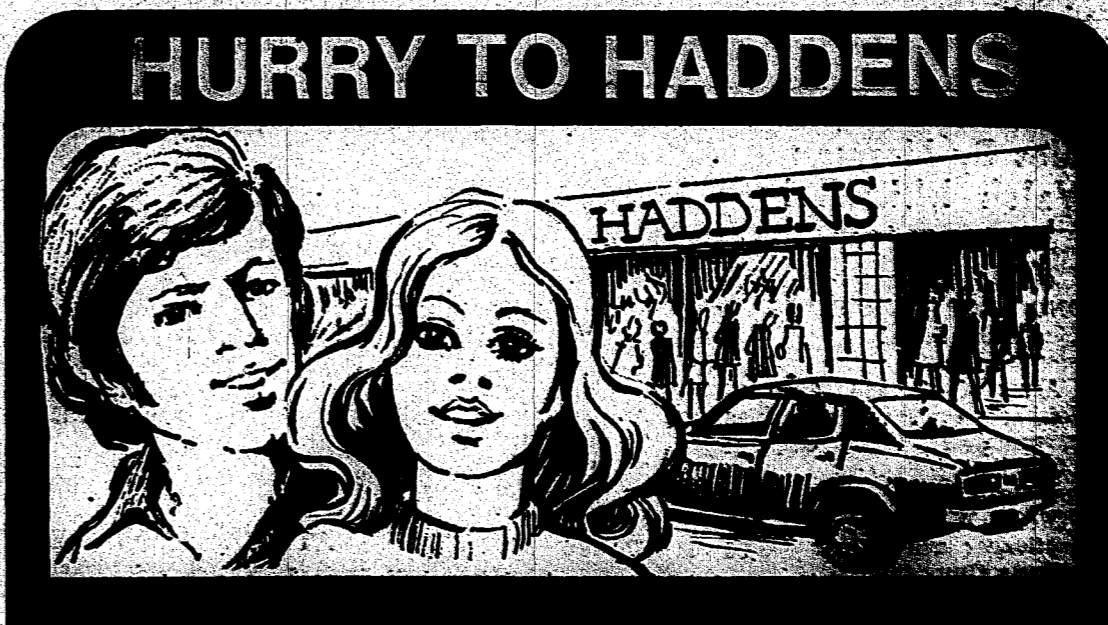
cillor, "All my life I have supported only the one party," he said "and will continue to do so as long as I live."

Fellow County Councillors and some of the most top ranking "brass" within the party in the county have also made no secret of their welcome for this closing of the ranks. One of them put it aptly when he said on Monday "there is a place for everyone in Fianna Fail who is prepared to support and work for the party."

Thus five months of political exile for one of the county's best known public representatives has ended. And for Fianna Fail—the organisation as a unit and the members and supporters individually, the healing of this once major split, could scarcely have come at a better time.

Tailpiece — Leo Dunne, Secretary of the Waterford Comhairle Cheannair in confirming that the decision to support Mr. O'Ryan's re-entry into the Party was unanimous, added that final ratification would, of course, have to come from the National Executive.

But we learn that his acceptance once again as a Party member will find the full approval of the National Executive.

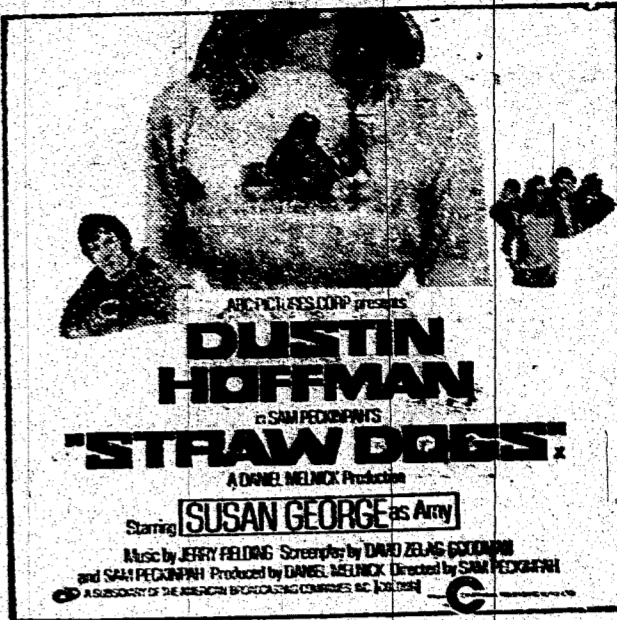

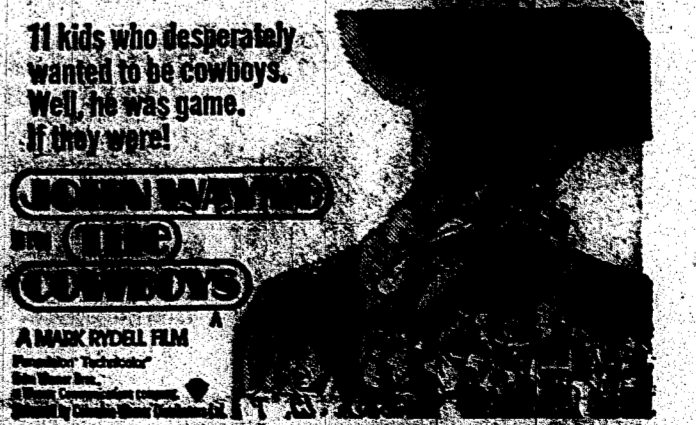

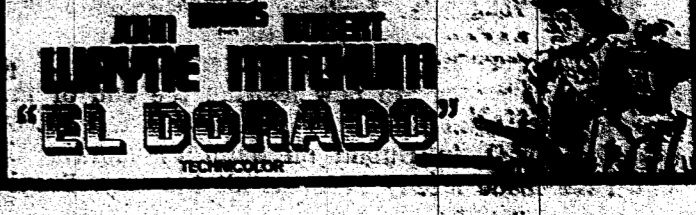

Widespread sympathy was expressed at the announcement of the death of Mrs. Mary Kiely, late of Ballinagulke, Ballinacult, who died on Friday evening, May 4th, at the District Hospital, Dungarvan, after a rather short illness, but of the allotted span. 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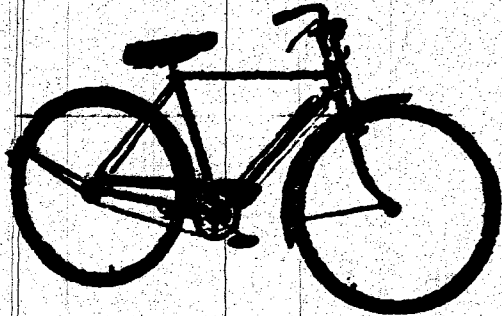

Entrancing Co. Waterford

As one ponders on the Bride Valley and the area around it, they are left unrapured by the scene and looking across to the famed Blackwater, appropriately called the Irish Rhine. Lismore's stately castle stands out amidst this sylvan scene, known far and wide. St. Carthage has long been associated with this well known Co. Waterford town. On to Cappoquin which has been a famed cornerstone, adjacent is Mount Melleray known far and wide in christian dom.

Standing at Lauragh Cross one gets a perfect view of Ballinacoola and the area around it, what a setting for a painter. On to the famed Nire Valley and the lordly Knockmealdowns, which has down the years been a refuge for our freedom fighters. It was here that General Liam Lynch fell in action in the Civil War of 1923. The Skeheens is rich in history, I have listened with bated breath to older folk from the area relate the great rivalry between rival groups the Corrowats and Scheavats. Famed Knockmeal Creamery which continues to progress over the years, is an indication of the splendid progress made in the area.

Clashmore is an area rich in history, it has down the years produced great footballers and athletes, who have shed lustre on the county. Ardmore known far and wide as a holiday centre. St. Declan the patron Saint of the area has bestowed many blessings on Ardmore.

Over to Ring the bastion of the Waterford Gaeltacht, where one hears our native daily. Much credit is due to those who blazed the trail in difficult days to preserve the Gaelic tongue. Helvick at eventide stands resplendent in the glow of the evening sun. The Old Parish known as the home of traditional Irish music. Ballyduff Upper has given some great administrators to the county. It continues to uphold all the finest traditions of our race. On to the Pike at Ballymague where one finds that fine Monument to that great dog, Master McGrath, in song and story his deeds are still related around the firesides of the country. Over to Kilrush home of great Gaelic families the O'Donnells and O'Mahoneys. To Liscannel where one can observe the famed horsemen, the Kiely brothers, who by their excellent riding sportsmanship are rated highly at the many racing venues in Ireland. The sporting fraternity still talk of Paddy Kiely's great riding in the Grand National of 1972. On to famed Dungarvan town of the hopes and rovers. Dungarvan produced some great athletes in yesterday including the late Patsy Keohan, Denis Barry, Patsy Morrissey, Dan Fraher, Ronnie Fitzgerald and in latter years,

Junior Cummins. One would travel far and wide to find such magnificent interior workmanship than that at St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan. The Friary still retains all its grandeur. I recall its great choir of yester years, it was the best in the land. Dungarvan Quay saw in its time berthed there, ships from all parts of Europe. I recall the men loaded and unloaded them, men such as John Joe Young, Tom Duggan, Michael Pincers Duggan, Lord Duggan, The Murphys, Pat and Matt Organ, Mike Curran, Dan Hanrahan. Paddy 'Buckeen' Byrne, Johnny Byrne, Bob Mulcahy, Mike Power, Bill Murray, Declan Mulcahy, etc.

Grattan Square holds many memories for Dungarvan Folk. Many problems and plans were discussed at this historic spot nightly. One could observe the late Jim Gibbons and Mr. Hurley deep in conversation on matters affecting the Old Borough. Of course many of us have followed the fortunes of the local W.D.C., which on the whole has served the town well. I recall many who served on the Council, men like P. Byrne, Willie Stack, John Curran and that outstanding personality Mr. M. J. Casey. Michael Brennan, Mr. P. Foley and Ron Davy, Abbey-side, Tom Lannon and last but not least our old friend Tom Lee. What of to-day, the present Council have fully justified its existence led by Chairman, Tom Kyne. A great administrator in the 20s was the late Mr. Patrick Mulcahy, who was town clerk. He sacrificed his position as principal. He was interned at Ballykinlar, a great Irishman of whom Dungarvan could be proud. Many of the amenities now available in the town are in the main due to the local U.C.D.

Over the Bridge to Abbeyside where one can stand and gaze out on the Bay. The Causeway with the seats available is the ideal place to sit and ponder, on the history of St. Augustine's Village. Abbeyside Castle no longer standing has storied connections with the area. Abbeyside Church stands out with all its pomp facing the sea. The cemetery adjoining it is the resting place of many Abbeyside people. Abbeyside was served by some great priests such as Rev. Fr. Byrne, Fr.

Galvin, Fr. Conway, Fr. Power, Fr. Crotty, Fr. Roche, Fr. Rea and the present clergy.

Abbeyside beach is the ideal place for contemplation. The view of the Western Bay from the beach is excellent and compares favourably with any in the land. The visitor returning to Dungarvan is sure of having a rest on the Poor Man's chair. Any subject one cares to mention has been discussed there, sport politics and personalities from G. B. Shaw to Yeats. With the passing of old timers it has lost some its glamour, but it is pleasing to know that the Poor Man's Chair still attracts the locals. One of the most interesting personalities I met there was the well-known Davy Foley, whose capacity for composing poetry is unsurpassed in the area. Another great character was the late Moss Higgins; it is good to see our old friend Paddy Power still at the Poor Man's chair. As a seaman Paddy has had a long experience. He sailed the seven seas. Racing men over the years have sat down there in an effort to pick out winners and beat the local bookmakers. The best tippers I knew there were Bill Murray and Paddy McGovern, the greatest judge of a horse I have known. Bill and Paddy gave a close study to all the racing meetings from Ascot to Tramore. They usually threw the form book to the wind. To this day I am kept posted on likely winners from the Poor Man's Chair. The latest tips from there were Red Rum for the Grand National, which won at 15 to 1. Most of the racing men I met at the Poor Man's Chair thought there should be a bookmakers office located at Abbeyside. It would save the trek to town and give more time to study and find the winners.

On to Kilgobinet, where one can view that fine Handball alley. The gaels in this area were always in the forefront of the handball revival. The Kellys, Devines and Bolands have kept the Gaelic flag proudly flying around this area. Whilst Kilmahon has produced great musicians including the late Tom Fahey.

Over to Ballinacourty standing serene in all its glory. The Lighthouse stands as a guide to the mariner from many lands. Stradbally and the cove are West Waterford's area that demand more attention from the Tourist Board. The Cove is rich in scenic beauty. Ballinroad, that homely Deise area. The home of great Gaels, such as the Landers, Carlions Powers, Kennedys and that veteran gael Jackie Bumster. As a tribute to this former Ballinroad footballer star of yesterday I quote the following lines:

You can travel all through Munster, But you'll not find as great a gael as Jackie Bumster.

Memories of Ballinroad with my old friend the late Jim Keohan, singing the cross of Ballinroad.

On to the Pike, where I retain pleasant memories of that genial lady, the late Bridgie Terry and Dick Tobin, mine host and no mean violinist. Wonderful people in every respect. They had the ever open door. I spent many enjoyable Sunday evenings there after playing a match at the Pike. I recall a well known former Dungarvan footballer singing the song I rarely hear now, its title was "I'm exiled by Columbia shore." He brought the house down. Yes, great days at Bridgie Terrys, memories, memories.

The Mahon flows gently by Leamybrien, Kilrossanty and the towering Comeraghs, the home of that great patriotic family the Keatings. I quote the following lines of my old friend, the late Michael Walsh of Ballingown:

"Nigh Leamybrien last June, I heard a robin singing high, upon a beechen bough, He sang of how Pat Keating fought and fell at Abbeyside."

John Fitzgerald faced the foe and like a hero died. It is history now how Crotty the highway man roamed the famed Comeraghs. From my childhood, I have and still have a great gradh for the people from around the Comeraghs, whose great hospitality I have partaken of on many occasions in the past. Around the firesides of the Comeraghs stirring tales are told of the fame and glory of great Kilrossanty football teams of yesteryear. I often heard the older folk in the area tell of how they defeated a star Tipperary team. Bohercrowe. It was at Fraher Park, Dungarvan in December 1919. I saw a great Kilrossanty team defeat Ballymacaw. In the 1919 Waterford senior football team I retain memories of this star studded Kilrossanty team that day they played super football. I was simply enthralled by it all. The Kilrossanty team that day was as follows:

Matty Ryan, Pat Keating, P. Kirwan, J. Kirwan, T. Ryan, Pat Fitzgerald, P. Guiry, Paddy Lalor, J. Lalor, John Power, M. Walsh, M. Norris. My memory serves me right the late Paddy McGrath came on during the game, Paddy was the best winner I ever saw play in Waterford football. Small in stature, but big in heart. As I leave the kindly towering Comeraghs heading for Kilmacthomas, where I reflect on the fame and deeds on the

athletic arenas of Europe of the late Percy Kirwan. A few years back I spent a pleasant evening with Percy. As mine host I found him modest and unassuming. He travelled down memory lane, we talked of the champion Tom F. Kiely, who farmed at Fruithill some years back. I look forward to the day when the sporting bodies in the county have some memorial erected to this outstanding Waterford athlete. They came no better than this big hearted athlete who shed lustre on the Deise. Another great Kilmacthomas personality was my old friend George Kiely. As a writer he was second to none. Frank Drohan was the man who preserved Kilmac as a bastion of the Gael. He was Hon. Treasurer of the Waterford County Board G.A.A. for many years. The late Dan Fraher often told me of Frank's great work for the G.A.A. in the County. Kilmac still retains its fine communal spirit, it was ever thus.

On to Dunhill and Harneys Pub with the flowing bowl, where one can enjoy real Irish hospitality and hear a good song. I recall a visit there one evening some years back, I heard a fine tenor voice singing a song, it went as follows: "Goodbye to Dungarvan, we're off to Lismore,

And we'll leave the old spring carts, Outside the back door, Over to Fews, Fenor, Kill and Bonmahon, A countryside that compare with the best in the land.

Dunmore East possesses all that is required for scenic beauty.

Waterford city Urbs Intacta makes steady progress industrially and commercially. The City of Meagher of the Sword. Co. Waterford's roads must be the best in Ireland. They are a monument to the Late Co. Engineer John F. Power. Another splendid official was my old friend Gerry Ormonde of Lismore, who was Co. Surveyor. Gerry wore the Waterford Hurling colours with distinction in yesteryear. I am pleased to state he is still going strong.

The finest view of the Coastland is obtained from the sweep. Many counties have been given wide publicity in various Tourist Guides, but I share the view of many good judges that Waterford surpasses many counties with its fine scenery and fertile soil and is well on par with parts of much vaunted Kerry. The kindly Comeraghs, Without a frown, Smile gently down, On old Dungarvan town.

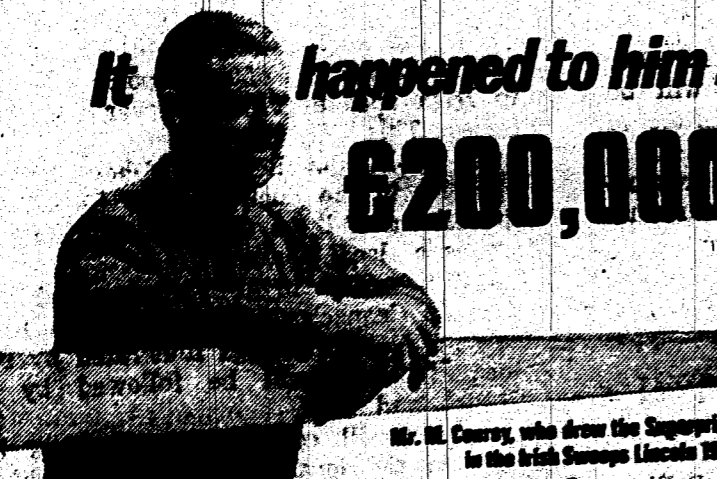
