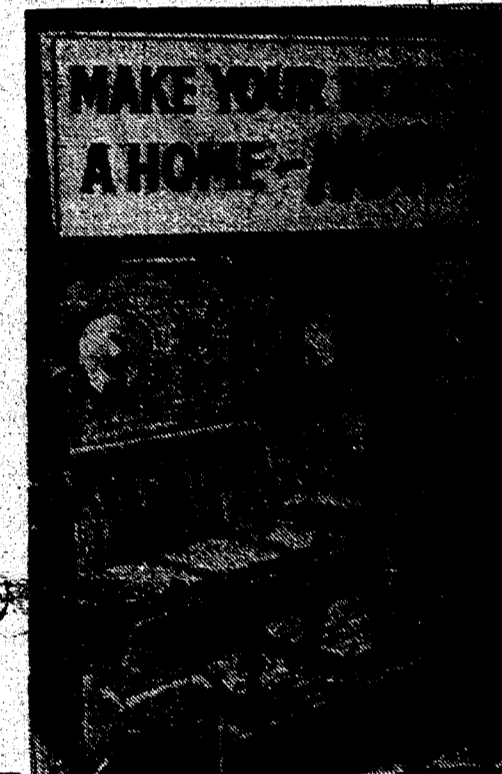

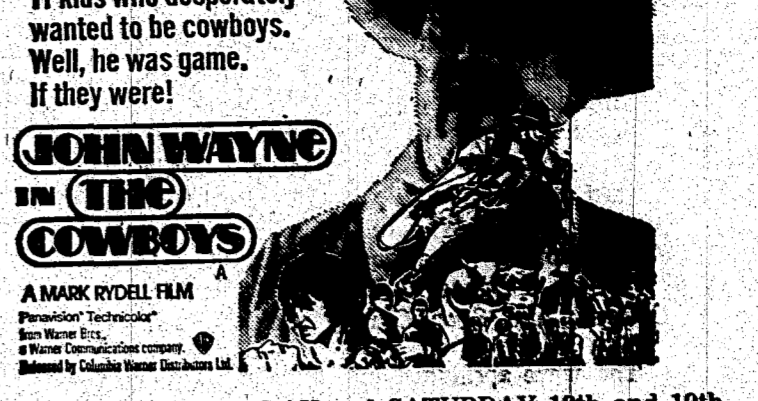

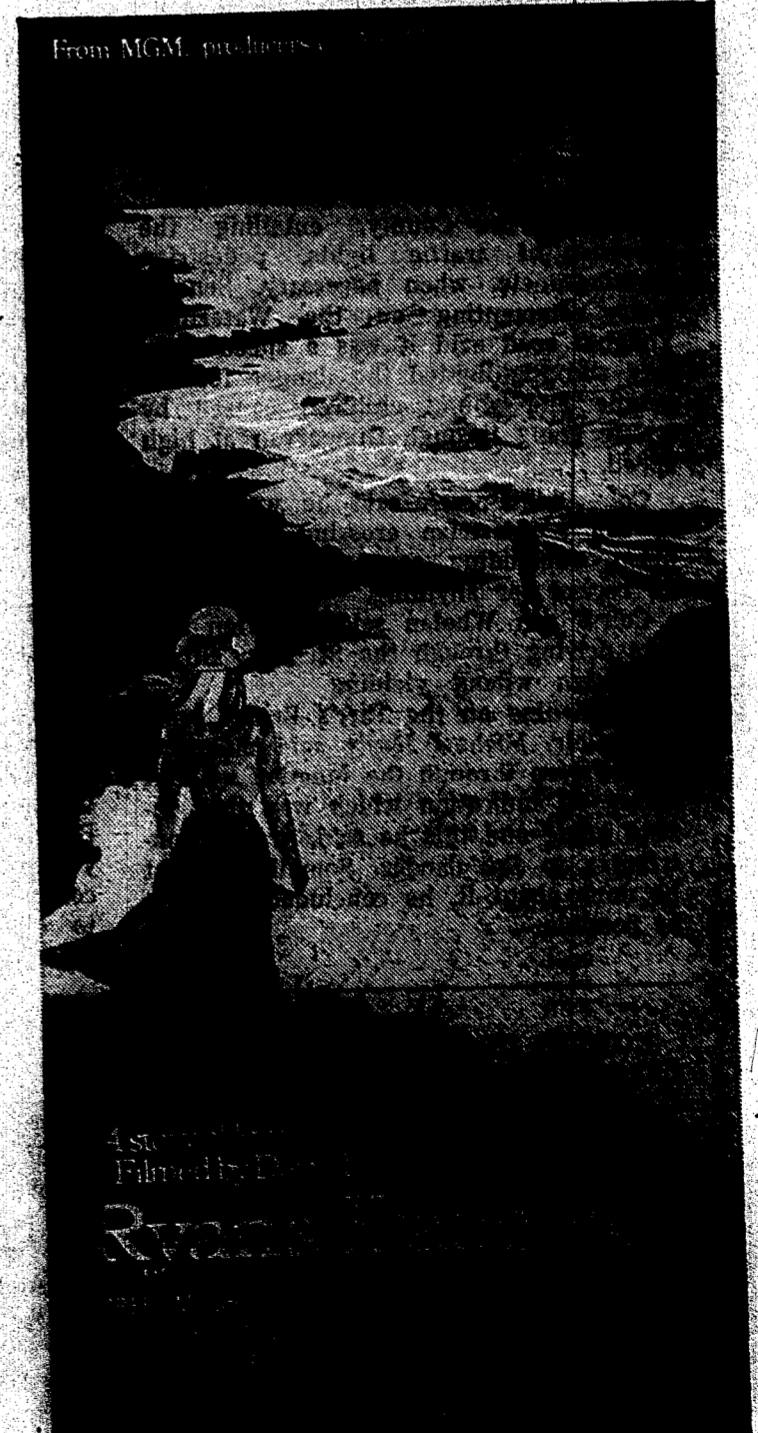

Fined £30 on charge of careless driving

Arising out of an accident on October 28th last, at Cork Road, Waterford, involving the death of an 18 year-old boy, Anthony Deegan, Mr. Patrick Kavanagh, 57 Central Avenue, Lisduggan was fined £30 at Tuesday's sitting of Dungarvan Circuit Court when convicted on a charge of careless driving.

Giving evidence Mr. Kavanagh stated, on the evening in question he was driving a friends car, which he admitted to have been in very poor condition. He saw the pedestrian coming towards him on his correct side of the road and he felt certain there was enough space between the car and side of road to allow pedestrian to pass. On passing him he heard a thud and ran back. He could not explain how the boy could have been struck by the car, he stated. Kavanagh did not admit to anyone, who had gathered round the scene of the accident,

that he had been involved and when the victim had been removed to hospital, he went home and told his wife what had occurred. At 3.30 a.m. the following morning, he was approached by the Gardai at his home, to whom he later made a statement concerning his involvement in the accident.

Dr. K. Cuddihy, Chief Pathologist, Arkeen Hospital, Waterford, submitted that the boy's death occurred out of injuries consistent to a road traffic accident.
 The car, a 1962 Black Ford Anglia, had two rear bald tyres, neither indicators nor horn were in working order, defective silencer and faulty steering, among other defects.

The defendant, 34, and father of four, pleaded not guilty to a charge of dangerous driving and was convicted on a reduced charge.
 Justice Fawcitt presided.

ARMS TRIAL

AT the Special Criminal Court, in Dublin on Monday, the trial opened of the six men in connection with the "Claudia" Arms Affair, on the night of March 28th, off Helvick Head.

Those charged were: Joseph Cahill; Denis McInerney (38) printer, Ennis; Gerard Walsh, plumbing contractor, Dungarvan; Donal Whelan (42), headmaster Kilmacthomas Vocational School; Gerald Murphy, engineer, Waterford County Council; and Sean Garvey, Cahirciveen.

The were arraigned on 10 main charges six additional charges, alleging I.R.A. membership, were made against Cahill, McInerney and Garvey.

The Charges — The 10 main charges include conspiracy between January 1 and March 29 last to import unlawfully assorted arms and ammunition, including 100 anti-tank mines; grenades, 250 rifles, 246 bayonets, 243 pistols, detonators, fuses and material for booby traps; having arms and ammunition in their possession with intent to endanger life, or to enable others to endanger life, having them for an unlawful object; having them under their control with intent to endanger life; and to enable others to endanger life and having them under suspicious circumstances.

Opening the case, Mr. Thomas A. Doyle, S.C., prosecuting, said the charges arose out of activities earlier this year, particularly on the night of March 28. Some little time before that, three Irish Naval vessels, commanded by Lieut. Commander Brett, were patrolling the Waterford coast. Commander Brett was aboard Deirdre on March 27.

At about 18.30 hours the ship made radar contact with a small cargo vessel, subsequently identified as Claudia. Radar contact was maintained and the freighter shadowed. Next day freighter followed a rather irregular course and speed. From 18.00 hours on the 28th she remained stopped and adrift, about four miles south of Mine Head, just outside Irish territorial waters. Where she remained until after dark.

Soon after dark, radar contact was made with a smaller vessel, a launch, making straight for the freighter. Both vessels were kept under observation on radar. Soon they were both seen to merge. That was about 21.40 hours.

Claudia Boarded — Both Claudia and the

launch were followed to about one mile from Helvick Head by the Irish Naval Ships. Then the three Naval ships switched on search lights. Aboard her were the crew and three of the accused, Cahill, Garvey and Murphy. The freighter was taken to Haulbowline where these three were given into Garda custody and the arms and ammunition handed over to the Army. In the meantime the launch made a determined effort to get away, but was captured after shots were fired by members of the Naval Service.

Aboard were McInerney, Walsh and Whelan. They were arrested and charged. McInerney had £75 and foreign currency. Whelan's house was searched and in it was found a drawing, giving technical details of the Claudia.

Commander Brett said that Claudia had been boarded at 11.23 p.m. on March 25. To Mr. Goldberg he said that most vessels to-day would have radar. It was possible that Claudia was so equipped. He agreed that when signalled to do so, the Claudia stopped. That was at 10.50 p.m.

Cahill asked the Commander if the radar would pick up a submarine. He replied that, that would depend on whether the submarine was submerged or not.

It was at this stage that Cahill made the statement about conspiracy and the allegation that first contact with Claudia had been made by a British submarine.

On Tuesday, the second day of the trial, Belfast Republican Joe Cahill, claimed full responsibility for the arms, ammunition and explosives cargo aboard the Claudia. Adding that neither the crew nor the captain knew anything about it and nobody else was involved, Supt. Michael McGrath, of Cobh, told the Court on Tuesday. Cahill also told the Supt. that he was sorry the arms were being taken off him by Irishmen and it was a pity that he could not get to use them on the British.

A submission on Wednesday by Mr. Sheridan S.C., defending one of the men on the launch, that the launch which was arrested was not wrapping but returning to Helvick at the time and that the arrests were illegal, was overruled by Mr. Justice Finlay.

The hearing continues.

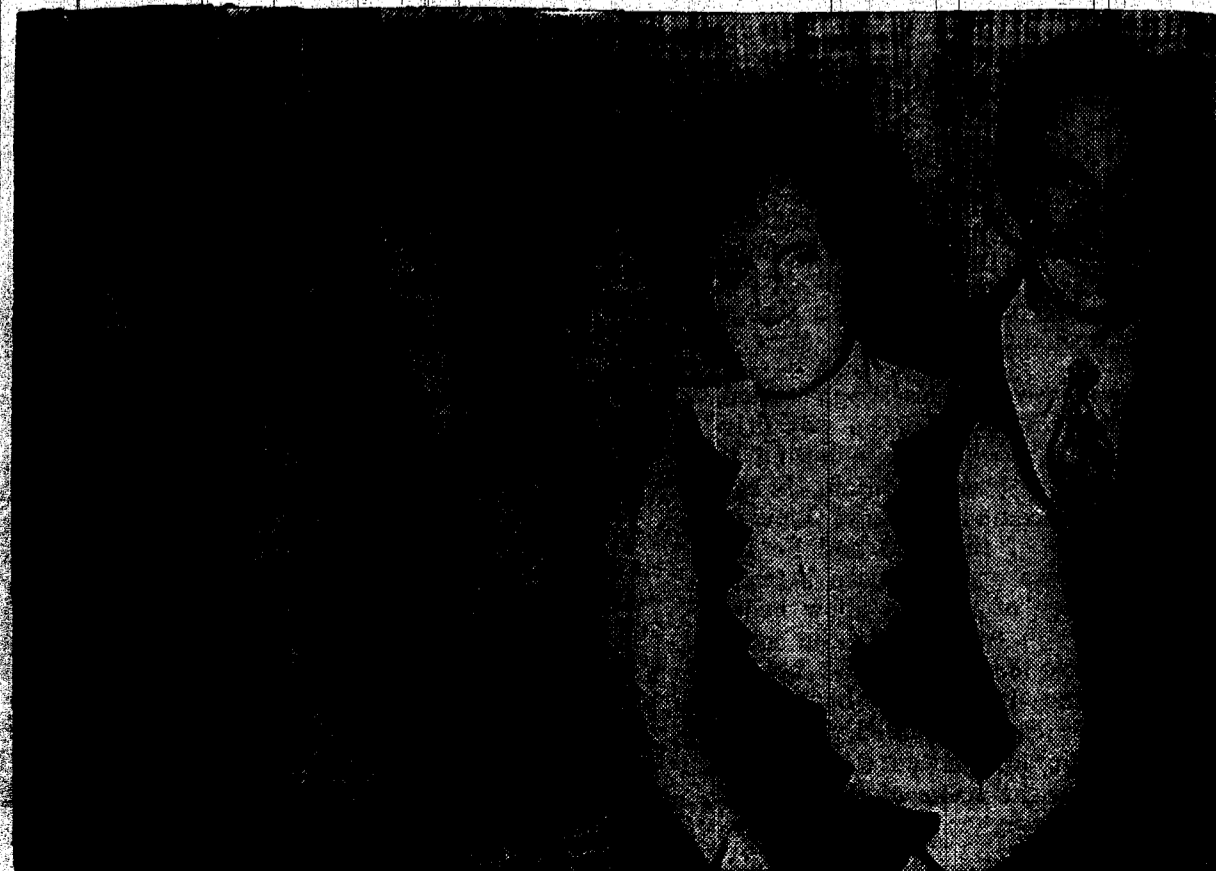

Major sewerage scheme for Tramore

Mr. J. D. Halley, B.E., B.Sc., County Engineer, at the Quarterly meeting of Waterford County Council introduced the preliminary report for the Tramore Sewerage Scheme. Introducing the scheme Mr. Halley said that when the last scheme was designed some ten years ago the population of Tramore was about 3,000 people and allowance was made in the design for an increase of more than 100% to a total resident population of approximately 6,200. This capacity is available but what has happened in the meantime is that a) the population of Tramore has begun to increase at a rate far in excess of anything that might reasonably have been anticipated in 1963 and b) development is taking place outside the area which could be catered for by the existing sewerage scheme, c) the day tripper population is increasing, d) while there is considerable capacity still in the centre of the town, the sewers at the extremities of the town are not in all cases big enough to take the flow which would come into them if a normal combined sewerage scheme was operated in the new developments. There are at present five main areas of development in Tramore and it was in the light of these developments and the trends which they indicate that the report was derived.

The overall cost of the scheme is estimated at £330,000 approximately in current money valued. This will have the effect of "ripening" a considerable area of land and will provide for an ultimate population of about 16,500 people as against a present population of about 4,000. This means that something of the order of an additional 3,000 houses will be involved and the Council should give serious consideration to the imposition. Mr. Halley continued, of a development levy under the Local Government (Planning and Development) Act, 1963, on each house to cover the cost that they will be incurring in making it possible for these houses to be built. A figure of £150 per house adjusted from time to time to take account of real money valued would appear to be reasonable, having regard to the administration and other problems involved in the operation of the scheme and also to the fact that it may be quite a long time before the full development takes place whereas the Council will have committed its capital well in advance of that.

Concluding, the County Engineer stated he considers the scheme as proposed a realistic approach to the problems of Tramore as far as sewerage is concerned and will provide for the development of the area for a considerable number of years.

Friary take on Waterford seniors

St. Augustine's College have won the Waterford County minor and U-16 championships and finished joint leaders in the junior league with Victors club. They now have thrown the gauntlet to the senior men and defeated victors in the semi-final at Abbeyside, last Saturday. It was score for score right through a hectic game, but at the bell St. Augustines were two points ahead, 46 — 44. Next Saturday they take on St. Otterans in the final. St. Otterans had a narrow victory over St. Paul's (Garda) in the other semi-final. A victory for the school boys would make it a unique four in one year, with the same team practically in all, but U-16. The seniors have been through eighteen victories out of twenty games and victory on Saturday would crown a

year of determination led by captain Dan Hayes, whose fearless high fetching has saved many a game and towering Eddie Daly under the rebounds. They are infested with spirit by ace-scorer Henry Barry as he thunders up-court through the opponents zone to get his game-quota of twenty-five points on average. Francie Conway and Tim Hayes are always on hand to score from the generous supply of passes and often the full team of five finishes without a substitution. Still the subs. also have at times played full games and Jim O'Neill and Sean English are well able to hold their own. Neill Reilly is a promising regular for his place next season, as is the other reserve Noel Carroll, who himself was chief architect of the U-16 victory.

A group of Irish and German industrialists have already expressed strong support for the establishment of such an airstrip in Co. Waterford. Suitability of the proposed site at Coolfin has already been confirmed by a number of aviation experts and recently a fly-in afternoon was held there when several small aircraft landed and took off without difficulty. Ten planes have used the proposed site in recent months, Colr Michael Hennebry said, and all the pilots considered it to be ideally suited for an airstrip.

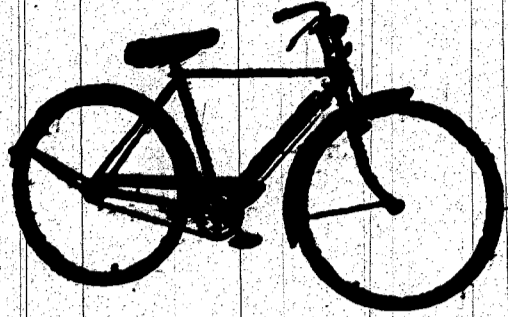

Justice warns defendant

"You can go straight when you come out," Justice Sean Mac D. Fawsitt, said, to Michael Whelan, aged 20, of 60 John's Park, Waterford, refusing an appeal against a sentence of twelve months arising out of the larceny of spirits and cigarettes to the value of £126, on February 23rd last from Besco's Supermarket, Waterford, at last week's sitting of Waterford Circuit Court in Dungarvan. Addressing the court Mr. Whelan stated that at the time he hadn't been able to get a job, was in bad company and was drinking heavily. He was asking for a suspended sentence as the Probation Officer had promised to get a job for him, concluding he was not in his full senses the time he committed the crime.

Justice Fawsitt stated the appellant had been very select in what he stole, refusing the appeal.

Draw knife on Garda Escort

When M. Anthony Duggan drew a knife on his escort at Tramore Court on 16th February last, he told Justice Fawsitt at last week's sitting of Waterford Circuit Court he had no intention whatsoever of using it. Addressing the court he said he had been in custody for some time and was rather depressed at the time of the incident. He was being visited by some friends and one of them gave him a bottle of cider, and when the Garda escort tried to take it from him he drew the knife.

Anthony Duggan of no. 64 abode

was appealing a sentence of 6 months imposed on him by Justice McKaye on that date, for assaulting Garda J. O'Shea in the execution of his duty. Anthony Duggan submitted that while he had threatened to use the knife he had not assaulted anyone which was the reason he was appealing the sentence. Justice Fawsitt stated as far as the law was concerned, the threat to use violence was enough.

Anthony Duggan, aged 19, years is the result of a broken home and mainly resides in a men's hostel or in containers on the docks.

Refusing the appeal Justice Fawsitt said the District Justice was correct in imposing the sentence as the appellant doesn't seem to be able to make up his mind to go straight.

Fined £20 at Circuit Court

A priest gave evidence at Dungarvan Circuit Court, on Thursday last, on behalf of a Waterford Glass factory worker, Sean Carew, 6 St. Killian's Place, Ferrybank, Waterford, aged 19, who was appealing a sentence, when he, with others unlawfully took a car on February 16th last. Garda D. P. Carroll giving evidence stated that on the date in question he was informed a car was stolen in Mooncoin and he waited at the bridge in Carrick-on-Suir, where having seen the car he gave chase in the patrol car. Having apprehended the occupants they returned to the station with him in the patrol car.

Fr. Moore stated he knew the appellant to be of good character and was

very obliging and sincere, adding that he was under the influence of alcohol at that time, but that he had since taken the pledge. The appellants father also spoke for him. Justice Fawsitt said the fact the boy's father spoke for him had a bearing on the case and he imposed a fine of £20, in lieu of the sentence.

Rampage of crime ends in sentence of 12 months

An appeal against a sentence of 12 months by William Fraher, 30 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, was refused by Justice Sean Mac D. Fawsitt at last week's sitting of Waterford Circuit Court in Dungarvan.

Supt. M. English stated that between 24th October, 1972 and January 12th, 1973, William Fraher with a number of others went on a rampage of crime in the area, stealing property to the value of £190.70p of which £82.65p had been recovered. Even though William Fraher had been in the company of different people for each specific case it does not appear he is the ringleader, Supt. English said. On occasions he has tried to help the Garda with other matters the Supt. continued, concluding he was not the vicious type of criminal.

Addressing the court, Mr. Fraher said he would like to be out in August, for domestic reasons. Justice Fawsitt said he saw no reason why the sentence should be withdrawn stating if the proper application were to be made to the prison authorities he could be released on parole for that period.

DUNGARVAN SPORTS WASHED OUT

There was general disappointment on Athletic Club were left with no alternative last when officials of Dungarvan native but to postpone their open sports meeting at the local C.B.S. grounds. It was a pity that this should happen because although club officials contacted as many clubs as possible, a good number of athletes from Wexford, Tipperary and Cork did in fact come to Dungarvan only to find out that the sports

were off. The provisional date now for the sports is Monday, June 4th which will be a bank holiday.

At Newtown School, Waterford on Saturday last we had some good displays in the Waterford Colleges track and field championships and pride of place goes to Tom Aspel of De La Salle College, who caused a mild surprise, when he relegated his great friend Ger Deegan of Waterford Technical College to second place in the senior 1,500 metres. This display by Tom Aspel emphasises for anyone who hopes to do well on the importance of cross country running track during the summer. Other good displays were given by John Treacy of Cappoquin Secondary School, who won as he pleased in the intermediate 1,500 metres with Sean Meehan of Dungarvan C.B.S. taking 3rd place in the same race. Michael Casey of Dungarvan C.B.S. confirmed the fact that he has that elusive mixture of speed and stamina with an impressive display in the intermediate 800 metres while Anthony Kelly also of Dungarvan C.B.S. showed good form when winning the junior 1,500 metres. All these athletes will be striving for further honours on Saturday next at Rockwell College, when the East Munster Colleges Track and Field Championships take place.

At the Marryke, Cork, on Saturday last Linda Curran of St. Nicholas A.C. and Ursuline Convent, Waterford, confirmed her undoubted ability with two fine displays. In the senior 100 metres she had to give best to E. Spillane of Fermoy, but in the 200 metres she made no mistake and had a good win with a little bit of luck she should collect the gold medal in the Munster championships at the same venue on May 29th.

On Sunday next the Annual Schools Olympics take place at John's Park Waterford, at 2.30 p.m. and the following is the full programme: Girls U-11 - 100 and 200 metres; Girls U-13 - 100 and 200 metres; Boys U-12 - 100, 200 and 400 metres; Boys U-14 - 100, 200 and 400 metres; Boys U-16 - 200 and 800 metres; also long jump. The club with the greatest number of points will be awarded the Power Perpetual Trophy for one year.

The Community Games Committee for Waterford are very busy at the moment organising the various sports at local level to make way for the Mini Olympics to be held in Butlins on September 7th, 8th and 9th. In athletics the county finals will take place in Dungarvan on July 1st and in the meantime local committees are encouraged to hold their own sports, to choose their representatives for the big day. It will be a historic day for Faha on Sunday, May 27th, when Bally A.C. and St. Ann's Guild of Muintir na Tire combine forces to run off a large programme of athletic events. SPECIAL REPORT ON AGRICULTURAL PRICE NEGOTIATIONS

BY ALAN DUKES

THE E.E.C. Ministers for Agriculture took many hours of discussion and argument until they finally reached agreement on farm prices for 1973/74.

So states Alan Dukes, Director of the I.F.A.'s Brussels Office, in a special report for the provincial papers.

The process of decision-making was complicated as usual this year by the different interests of the various member states - with the added complication of three new members. A further difficulty, however, was added by the fact that the Commission wanted to use the price decisions partly as a means of overcoming the problems which monetary problems in the Community have caused in the area of Agricultural policy.

In a perverse kind of way, these difficulties underline both the partial nature of the unity so far achieved by the Community, and the success of the agricultural policy.

These difficulties arise from the fact that the Community has not yet achieved anything like the same degree of unity in monetary matters as in agricultural policy. Thus, when exchange rates get out of line, with previously-fixed rates against the "unit of account" exceptional measures are necessary in order to ensure the free movement of agricultural products between the member States.

If the Common Agricultural Policy were not quite so successful and agricultural products did not move so freely within the Community, member Governments would not perhaps be so particular about measures proposed to take account of the monetary problems.

DECISIONS: - The main decision in relation to the E.E.C. Common prices which are to interest us are set out in Table 1.

The increase in the target price for milk is to be brought about by a reduction of 5.4 per cent in the common intervention price of skim milk powder. However, in Germany and in the Benelux countries, the increase in the intervention price for skim milk is smaller than elsewhere, so that the increase in the target price for milk in those four countries is 4 per cent, rather than 5.5 per cent. This is a "monetary" adjustment.

A further "monetary" adjustment is to be made when, and if, all of the EEC currencies are in the "snake" i.e. when the pound sterling and the Italian Lira are brought in. This adjustment would give a further price increase of 1% in Ireland, the U.K. and Italy.

The Ministers also made some decisions on structural matters.

Firstly, they adopted a resolution binding them to agree, by October 1st next, a directive on agriculture in disadvantaged zones. This directive would provide for measures of special assistance to farmers in difficult farming areas, in order to take account of their special problems, and to help with farm development. The Commission had already drawn up a draft directive on this matter, so that the line of discussion on this problem are already laid out to some extent.

Next, a scheme of premia for the conversion of dairy herds to beef production was agreed. This provides for a grant of 15.75 pence per gallon to be paid to farmers who would undertake to give up milk production. The payment would be related to milk delivered to a creamery in the year previous to the undertaking and would be spread over four years. Thus a farmer who achieved an average yield of 600 gallons from each eligible cow would receive £94.50 per eligible cow, spread over four years, or £23.625 per cow per annum. The minimum size of herd is normally 11 cows. Member Governments may, however, decide to increase this to 15, or to bring it down to 5 in areas where over 50% of cows are in herds of 11 cows or less.

It is expected that it could take some two to three months to get this scheme into operation. It is likely, therefore, to be in operation by next Autumn.

Finally, the Council agreed on the "orientation premium" provided for in article 10 of Directives 159/72 on the modernisation of farms. This premium is designed to encourage beef and sheep production and is paid on an acreage basis, per acre of land used for a beef or sheep enterprise.

In order to qualify, a farmer must be operating a development plan in conformity with the provisions of the directive and at the end of the plan, sales of cattle and/or sheep must account for over 50 per cent of total farm sales.

The premium is payable in three instalments:-

1st year - £8.41 per acre, subject to a maximum of £2,080; 2nd year - £5.61 per acre, subject to a maximum of £386; 3rd year - £2.81 per acre, subject to a maximum of £693.

IRELAND

The price increases in respect of this country are greater than the common price increases in most cases, because of the fact that this year we take the first step in aligning our prices to full EEC levels. For skim milk powder and sugar beet, the "common" price increases apply in our case, since we are already at full EEC levels as far as these products are concerned.

To calculate Irish intervention prices etc. for 1973/74 we take the one-sixth of the difference between the Irish price and the common price in 1972/73, add it to the Irish 1972/73 price, and increase the result by the relevant percentage increase in the common price for 1973/74.

For example, if the Irish intervention price for a given product was 70 in 1972/73 and the common intervention price was 100, and this common price is increased by 5 per cent for 1973/74, the increase is 12.5 per cent.

The new Irish intervention etc. prices for 1973/74 are set out in Table 2.

In spite of the fact that the common intervention price for butter has been reduced by 5.4 per cent, the Irish intervention price has been increased by 3.31 per cent from £710.39 per ton, because our price was still below the common price level.

The "common" price level when adjusted for comparison with ours, would be £806 per ton, which leaves us still with £72 per ton to catch up during the next five years, or approximately £14 per year, assuming that the EEC common price does not change in the meantime.

At the time of writing, no firm details are available for the increase in the subsidy on liquid skim, or on skim milk used in the manufacture of animal feeds.
