Pre-War Houses to be Re-wired

Mr. B. White, Acting Town Clerk at the last meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, stated that there are 220 Council houses in need of urgent and immediate re-wiring. Continuing, Mr. White stated the houses are pre-war which were wired during the early 1940s. Old age pensioners and widows were among the residents of the houses.

It is estimated that an average cost of re-wiring the houses would be in the region of £100 per house.

The County Manager having carefully considered the matter and having taken all aspects of the situation into consideration, recommended that a grant of 50% of the cost would be payable by the U.D.C. subject to the maximum grant of £50. In cases where the tenants are Old Age Pensioners or Widows or existing on Social Welfare Benefits, he proposed to increase the weekly rent by 5p per week for a period of five years, also where work had been carried out on A.O.P. or Widows' houses and a member of the tenants family succeeds to the tenancy within a period of 5 years, 50% of the cost will be repayable.

In a report Mr. White outlined that with the increasing popularity of various electrical appliances such as cookers, washing machines, fridges, television etc., tenants had the wiring installation extended to serve these. In many cases this resulted in the overlooking of the original wiring circuits and as a result caused the whole electrical installation to be dangerous and in the need of re-wiring as a matter of urgency.

The Council has decided to tackle the job immediately. However, the question of payment by less well-off tenants raised by Mr. P. Whelan, has not yet been finalised and Mr. Whelan is strongly opposed to rent increases in this sector and the County Manager is being asked to note this.

Committee Not Trying to Close Ring School

Discussing an allegation by Mr. T. A. Kyne T.D. at their April meeting, members of County Waterford Vocational Education Committee, agreed unanimously with Mr. Sean Ormonde, when he stated that if any action or lack of it on the part of the committee resulted in the closure of the All-Irish secondary school, Scoil San Níolas, in the Ring Gaeltacht, they could hang their heads in shame. Concluding Mr. Ormonde said that rather than threaten the existence of the school they should do everything in their power to ensure it continues to flourish.

The allegation of Deputy Kyne briefly is that children were being forced to attend the All-Irish School because of the non-availability of free transport to Dungarvan. Following this allegation genuine fears had been expressed concerning the future of the school, Mr. P. Kenneally M.C.C., Chairman, stated.

Senator Austin Deasy suggested the committee meet the management of the school to discuss the situation.

Mr. Sean Whelan stated the parents should also be met, as he considers them to be the prior concern.

Mr. Liam Comerford commenting on the situation, said he considers that they as a public body have no rights to intrude on the business of a private school, as the college is under local management and not in committee business. Concluding, he said, it would be terrible if they as a committee were responsible for the closure of an All-Irish school, which he regards as something they would never live down.

Mr. P. Kenneally Chairman, emphasised the fact that no member of the committee was anxious to have the school closed.

That the committee meet the management of the school to discuss the situation was agreed upon unanimously.

Ireland's largest indoor riding school, a £20,000 enterprise, the property of Jim and Nancy Willoughby, was officially opened and blessed at Ballyrafter, Lismore, on Saturday.

The riding school, which is ultra modern in lay-out and design, was officially opened by Mr. Thomas A. O'Gorman, head of regional and resource development with Board Fáilte while Very Rev. Daniel Canon McGrath, P.P., V.F., Lismore blessed it.

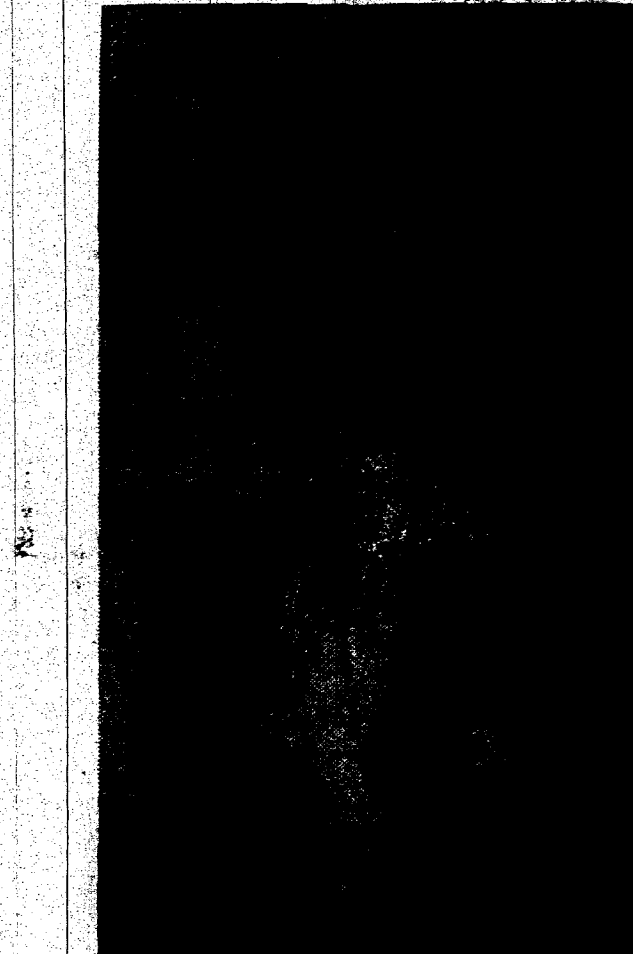
In performing the official opening, Mr. O'Gorman said that since 1965 Bord Fáilte had expended a total of £125,000 as part of its programme to develop horseriding as a significant element in tourism.

A presentation of an engraved silver medallion and a cheque for £100 was made to Mr. Tomas Clancy, Island, Stradbally by Mr. T. N. Tanner chairman Bord na gCapal after the official opening, in acknowledgment of his role as breeder of the renowned "Ambassador", the nine year old horse which won a gold medal for Italy at the Munich Olympics and the winner of the International Irish Show Jumping Award for 1972.

The new riding school can accommodate almost 500 people. Its actual riding area is 197 feet by 76 feet and many international events will be staged there in the future.

The discussion on accommodation was initiated by Mr. Liam Comerford who said it was disgraceful that teachers when they had free classes in Dungarvan had to walk the corridors of the school as no teachers' rooms have been provided. Neither has the school a drawing room nor a proper meeting room to hold the monthly meetings in. He considered it a matter of urgency that they apply to the Department of Education to have permanent offices provided so that all existing rooms be used as classrooms.

This was agreed to unanimously.

Farmers Shocked

In a circular letter sent for the Department of Local Government to local authorities on Monday last, Mr. Ryan, spelled out some of the details of his budget. In this he referred to a revised scale of road tax on commercial goods vehicles, which will increase the annual road tax on all commercial vehicles of under eight tons.

Land Rovers that were used for multi-purpose duties, by farmers, are hit by the annual road tax increase. They will now soar from £2.50 to £5.00.

Of the staggering increase which will hit the farmers, the Local Government Department has told authorities it is clear that vehicles other than conventional tractors — and these are such as jeeps, Land Rovers and cut-down trucks — should not qualify for the special concession of £2.50 annual road tax. They will jump instead to £5.00.

While it was not confirmed, the farmers may also be hit on diesel fuel which they got at the special 8p. per gallon rate — and are now likely to be compelled to pay the full normal rate of about

32p per gallon.

A mini van whose annual road tax was £15 up to now will go to £25 a year while other rates for commercial vehicles will be: Under one ton, from £24 to £37 a year; under two tons, £46 to £61; under three tons, £70 to £93; under four tons, £102 to £125; under five tons, £142 to £165; under six tons, £205 to £225; under seven tons, £235 to £305; and under eight tons, £335 (no change).

The annual rate of road tax for vehicles of nine tons goes down, however, from £505 to £465 a year. There was another small measure of good news. For vehicles of more than nine tons, it was normally £50 for each quarter ton over that unladen weight — but this figure is reduced now to £20 for each quarter ton.

About 6,000 farmers in the 26 Counties are expected to be caught in the Minister's net as a result of using specially converted Land Rovers for multi-purpose farming duties. But their wide abuse led the Minister to order a "clamp-down" through the revised rates now disclosed.

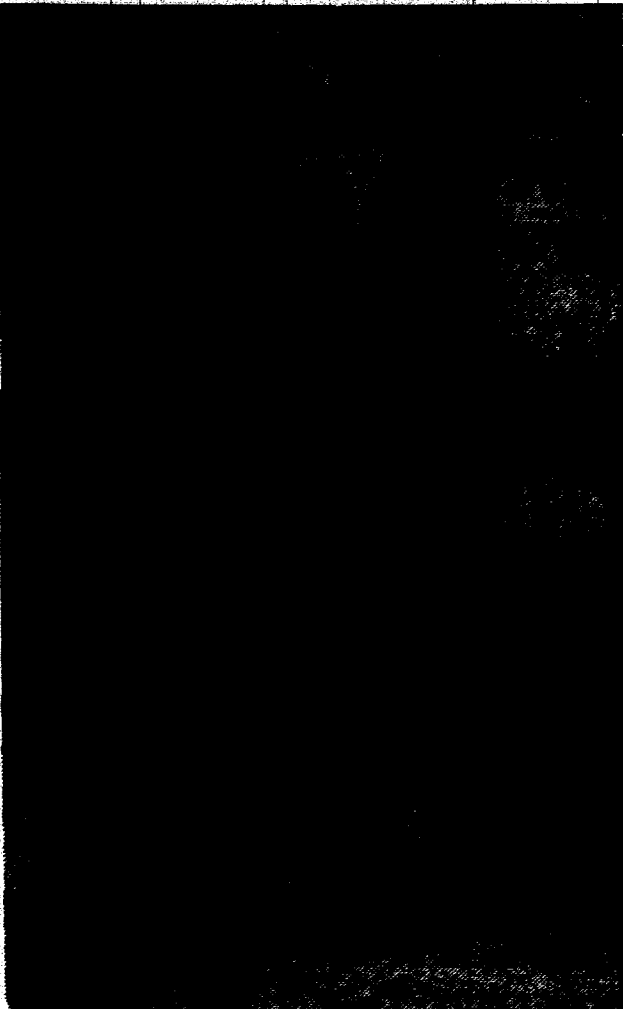

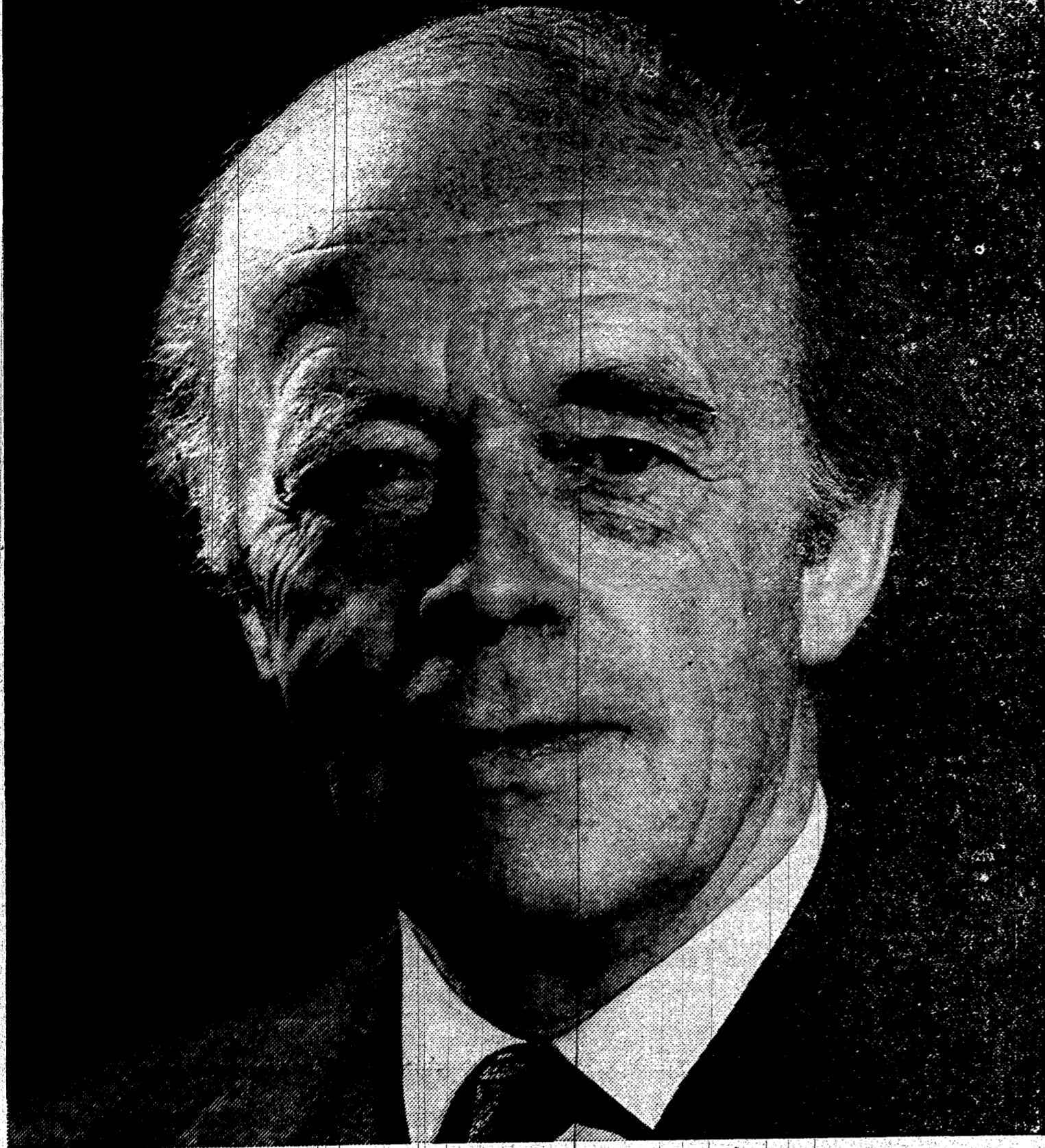

ARMS TRIAL ENDS

Five of the six accused in the Special Criminal Trial in Dublin, which ended after six days, were convicted on charges arising out of the attempted importation of arms and ammunition of Helvic Head on March 28th last.

For his part, Joe Cahill, named as the ringleader in the conspiracy, will serve three years penal servitude. He was also given a further 12 months imprisonment for being a member of the I.R.A. The sentences are to run concurrently.

He told the court "If I am guilty of any crime, it is that I did not succeed in getting the contents of the Claudia into the hands of the freedom fighters in this country."

He also accused Irish troops of "conspiring with our British enemies to deprive our freedom fighters of the weapons of war."

A sixth accused, Gerard Walsh (47), a plumbing contractor, of Dungarvan, was acquitted earlier in the day of all the charges against him.

As he left the dock, a free man, he shook hands with the remaining five accused.

The other accused were: Joe Cahill, Denis McInerney (38), a printer, of Ennis; Donald Whelan (42), headmaster, Kilmacthomas Vocational School; Gerard Murphy (33), of Dungarvan, an engineer with Waterford Co. Council; and Sean Garvey (28) carpenter of Cahirciveen. They were found guilty of

conspiracy to import arms and ammunition, with attempting to import arms and ammunition, and with having control over ammunition and explosive substances to enable other persons to endanger life.

In the cases against Whelan and Murphy, Mr. Justice Finlay indicated that the court would be suspending their sentences, providing that adequate bail was forthcoming and certain undertakings given.

McInerney and Garvey were each sentenced to two years' imprisonment and were each given an additional 12 months imprisonment for being members of the I.R.A.

The sentences in each case will run concurrently and date from Monday.

Imposing sentence, Mr. Justice Finlay, presiding said the offences were extremely serious. The quantity and nature not only of the arms but even more strikingly of the explosives, which were to have been imported, made the offences as serious as they could be. In the case of Murphy and Whelan, the court had regard to their previous good character and to their comparatively minor involvement in the conspiracy.

In the case of Cahill, McInerney and Garvey, it was clear that they were directly and primarily involved in this conspiracy and that Cahill was the ringleader.

Cahill (from the dock) — You do me an honour. Supt. Matthew English, Dungarvan, said that neither Murphy nor Whelan had been known to be associated with any subversive activity. Whelan was well known for his sporting and cultural pursuits. As an All-Ireland hurling medalist he enjoyed a hero worship in Dungarvan. But he never took advantage of that hero worship, nor attempted to impose his views on the children under his control.

Supt. Denis McGrath told the court that Cahill was a native of Belfast and had not been previously convicted within the jurisdiction. He was married with seven children and was a former carpenter.

McInerney he added, had two previous convictions for collecting money without a permit. Garvey had no previous convictions and was one of a family of nine. He was unmarried.

Murphy and Whelan who were given suspended sentences, were released on their own bail of £5,000 and one independent surety of £5,000.

The bailman accepted for Murphy was Dominic O'Brien, Blackrock, Dublin, and for Whelan, Robert Keane, O'Connell St., Dungarvan.

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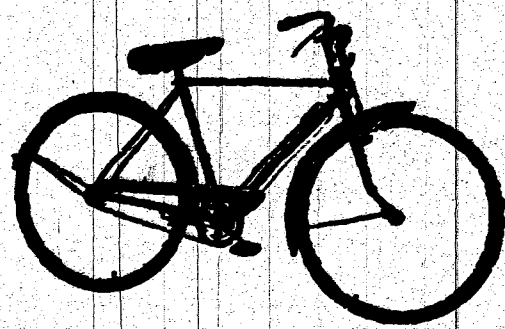
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B.L.E. ATHLETIC NOTES

HONOURS GALORE FOR JOHN FLYNN AND JOE BRICE

Without doubt the two most prominent young athletes in Waterford at present are John Flynn and Joe Brice, who are attached to Dungarvan A.C. and Friary A.C. respectively. Over the past two weeks they have hit the headlines in no uncertain fashion and we wish them and all the other athletes concerned the very best in the Munster Colleges Track and Field championships in Cork, on Saturday next.

The School Olympics due to be held in John's Park Waterford, on Saturday last, were postponed, due to bad weather.

However, two fixtures took place recently and the following is a brief report. On last Thursday night at De La Salle College, Waterford, Section I of the U-12, 14 and 16 boys and girls county championships for track and field took place. The night wasn't a very good one but the large programme of events was run off quickly although floodlights would have come in handy for the running of the relays! For Bally A.C. it was a night to remember as the club collected its first individual county championship of the track season and the honour fell to Biddy Whelan, who beat all her opponents in the shot putt under 16. This was just reward for a girl who was a familiar figure at all the cross country fixtures over the past few months and her perseverance was eventually rewarded. In addition she finished 3rd in the 200 metres and was the only athlete from the club to collect two medals. Other medal winners for Bally A.C. were Carol Wall, who, despite making all the running in the U-12 800 metres had eventually to be satisfied with 3rd place, being just pipped on the line for second place by Caroline Power of Tramore A.C. with Alison Corcoran of Tramore A.C. in first place; Michael Walsh ran his usual steady race to take 3rd place in the 1,500 metres behind John Treacy, who won from his old rival, Sean Meehan.

There was also much joy for St. Nicholas A.C. and they probably had the outstanding performer of the evening in Bernadette Pendergast, who ran a great race in the U-14 800 metres, which she won in very impressive style from Maura Clarke of Waterford Glass and Kay Moloney of St. Nicholas A.C. Young Pendergast should prove to be a big acquisition to the Ring club and much more should be heard of her in the future.

Elizabeth Treacy showed some of her old form with a good win in the 3,000 metres and at no stage was she unduly worried by the opposition. Finally Michael Brackett another new member of St. Nicholas A.C. had a fine win in the long jump and only for a disastrous start he would have figured among the medals in the 100 metres. It was not a great night for Dungarvan A.C., with Sean Meehan 2nd in the 1,500 metres; and John Flynn 2nd in the high jump being the only medal winners; Tommy Pendergast 3rd in the 400 metres; Hilary Barry 3rd in the 400 metres, U-16; and Joe Brice 2nd in the Discus after a great struggle with Kevin Tyrrell of John's Park. The only other medal winner from the West was Anthony Kelly of St. Joseph's A.C., who mistimed his effort in the U-14, 1,500 m. and was beaten by Billy Bird of Newtown.

At Rockwell, on Saturday last, Joe Brice of St. Augustine's College and John Flynn of Dungarvan C.B.S. gave outstanding displays and in the process collected four and three medals respectively. It was a memorable day for young Brice, who broke all records in the junior discus, much to the delight of his manager Fr. McCarthy and his house master Fr. Brennock. For the record Joe won the junior and intermediate discus, also the junior shot in which he broke the existing record as well as being second in the javeline.

John Flynn collected his share of the medals with a double in the 200 metres and high jump and a second in the 100 metres. In the senior high jump St. Augustine's College had the surprise packet of the meeting in Tom Feeney, who only took up the event during the week. In an enthralling struggle Tom put no less a person than Tom Aspel to the pin of his collar before the De La Salle boy won by one inch. No doubt, with the proper coaching, Tom Feeney could make his name as a high jumper. Liam Hennessy had to be content with being runner-up in both the high jump and pole vault and these performances were below his expected form. John Treacy of Cappoquin Secondary School, had an easy win in the intermediate 1,500 and after the first lap it was a case of how much he would win by and without exerting himself too much, he had plenty to spare over John Downey of Tipperary C.B.S. and Sean Meehan of Dungarvan C.B.S.

Michael Casey of Dungarvan C.B.S. got a bit of a fright in the intermediate 800 metres as John Redfern of Tipperary C.B.S. set off at a cracking pace and looked like holding on for a long time, but the boy from Faha used his vast experience and timed his effort to perfection to win well in the end. Anthony Kelly of Dungarvan C.B.S. had sweet revenge for his recent defeat by Billy Bird of Newtown School, when he kept in touch with the leaders all the way in the junior 1,500 metres and after a great struggle got the better of Frankie Howard of Rockwell with a very tired Billy Bird in third place.

A very welcome feature of the discussion was the note of sincerity and a recognition of the fact that a Gaelic revival is an enormous task, but not an impossible one if tackled properly. Senator Deasy, however, expressed the view that to restore Irish again as a spoken language was not feasible, it should be preserved as a cultural language.

After a very healthy discussion which lasted over three hours the consensus of the meeting was:

- (a) That some such plan as the proposed pilot scheme was necessary to forward Irish throughout the Deise and to co-ordinate efforts of all voluntary organisations that seek to forward any aspect of Irish culture.
- (b) That the proposed plan be explained in the public at further meetings in Oir Dheise and Iar Dheise. The voluntary organisations to be approached by members of Coiste na nDeise, Conradh na Gaeilge to solicit their aid and participation in the scheme.
- (c) That a further meeting be then held at Dungarvan to review progress to date and make provision to imitate at Dungarvan. Seamus O Maoldomhnaigh, Cathaoirleach, Coiste na nDeise acted as chairman and Padraic O Fionnusa Timithire, put the main points of the suggested teoirphlean before the panel for their observations.

LOCAL ATHLETE WINS CO. CHAMPIONSHIP

THE BUDGET

MR. RICHIE RYAN, T.D., Minister for Finance, introduced the first budget of the National Coalition Government, in the Dail on May 16th last. The budget did much that was expected of it in re-distributing income among the less well off sections of the community, but it had a much harsher sting in the form of increased taxation than anyone expected. It is estimated that 700,000 will benefit under the social welfare increases.

Old age pensioners (under 80) got an increase of £1.00 per week, while T.D.s got an increase of about £17.00 per week, bringing their salary to £3,400 p.a.

Taoiseach's salary will be increased by £2,000, bringing his salary to £10,000 and ministers salaries will rise from £6,000 to £7,800.

Cigarettes are to increase by 3p. a packet, a glass of spirits, 3p. extra, while beer goes up 1p. a pint.

Telephone calls and 1st and 2nd class post will cost 1p more, taking local calls to a minimum of 3p. Road Tax and licences will also be increased, licences by £2.00, from June 1st. VAT on food will be lifted in September. But, VAT on items such as clothes, shoes etc. will increase from 5.28% to 6.75%.

VAT on cars, motor cycles, T.V. sets, is increased from 30.26 per cent to 36.75 per cent.

When all is said and done, the new budget will cause a price explosion. Poorer people will be paying more for their footwear, clothing and fuel, because the Government is incapable of approaching any degree of social concern or practicality. Mr. G. Colley, former Minister for Finance said:

Taking everything into account the Minister is going through the pretence of giving with one hand and taking away with the other.

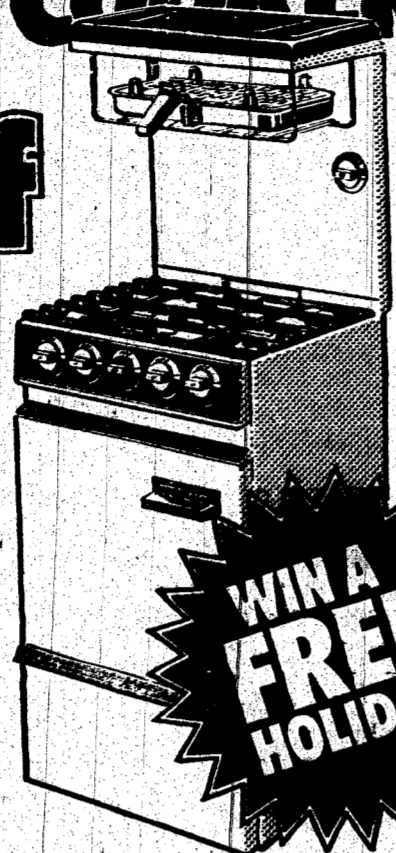

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FARMERS DISAPPOINTED THAT GOVERNMENT DID NOT REMOVE ESTATE DUTIES

Bitter disappointment was expressed at the failure of the Government to implement their pre-election commitment to abolish Estate Duties, by the Irish Farmers' Association in a statement.

Mr. Donal Cashman, Deputy President, in a statement, said that the proposed introduction of a White Paper Offers very little solace to the families now affected and those that are going to be affected before implementation of the contents of the White Paper or the alteration of the legislation in relation to the abolition of Estate Duties.

"The interim alterations in the present system are of little significance in alleviating the severe effects of this iniquitous system," he said.

Mr. Cashman said the Association were glad to note that the Minister for Finance

has recognised the special position of the sheep industry, particularly since no Common Agricultural Policy applies.

"We note with satisfaction that the I.F.A.'s proposals on Hogget Subsidies and Mountain Lamb Extension Subsidy have been implemented," he said.

He added that in view of the possibility of this country gaining additional funds from EEC sources for Regional Development Farm Modernisation Schemes and Disadvantaged Areas Support Schemes, the I.F.A. is disappointed that no provision has been made in the Budget so as to enable us to match the EEC funds which is essential under EEC rules.

On account of this it seems that the Government has not yet prepared plans for this country to benefit from these Schemes.

There must be no Slowing up of Development in Agriculture — Says President

A warning to the Government that any policies developed by them which will lead to a slowing up of a development in agriculture at this time will be met by stern opposition from farmers generally, was given by Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers' Association.

Mr. Maher, in a statement, said that for far too long farmers have been in a grossly underdeveloped state in the industry to allow the present opportunities to pass us by, because of either inactivity on the part of the Government in putting into effect progressive policies, or on the other hand taking a course of action which will retard us from reaping the full benefits of Common Market membership.

He said: "Farmers demonstrated during the last General Election, considerable perception to the policies being pursued by the last Government and accepted certain commitments made by the Coalition Group and voted accordingly.

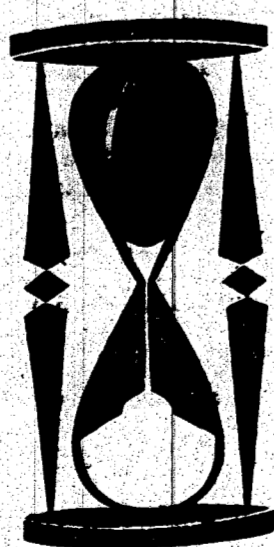
"It is clear at this stage that farmers in future, more and more use their vote to ensure that the political party aspiring towards power will get their support and retain it on the basis of their attitude towards agriculture generally.

"Different organisations outside of farming at the moment are, in my view, without due consideration for the possibilities for them and for the Community generally of a prosperous agriculture, endeavouring to prevent the farmer from making a long overdue investment in his industry for the benefit of all."

"I would have thought that at least these people who frequently talk about the importance of communication might at least have consulted the farmers, through their Organisation, about the whole question of taxation before they decided unilaterally to suggest that the burden should be increased on the backs of the farmers."

Mr. Maher added: "I would suggest to these people that we are ready and willing to discuss any matter of concern to the Community generally, farmers included; but we will not be dictated to by any of these Groups within the Community."

Tomato Growers may go to the European Court

The Compensatory amount of 1½ p. per lb. on Irish Tomato Exports decided by the EEC Agricultural Ministers in Brussels on Tuesday, May 15th, was neither a compensation nor an incentive to export, said Mr. Patrick J. Butterly, Chairman, Commercial Horticultural Section, Irish Farmers' Association in a statement.
He said the decision taken was completely against the spirit of the Accession Treaty and had not been arrived at through proper interpretation of the basis of calculations. The Commission has fixed the compensatory amount by reducing the Irish grower price to a theoretical outdoor price and arrived at a figure based on the difference between Irish and EEC outdoor tomato prices. This procedure is not correct as all Irish tomatoes are grown commercially under glass.
Mr. Butterly said the figure of 1½ p. per lb. was not arrived at legally and he has requested the Irish Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Clinton, to appeal this matter to the European Court at Luxembourg.
