MINISTER'S REPLY ON DEATH DUTIES

The Government Information Bureau, on behalf of the Minister for Finance, Mr. Richie Ryan, T.D., in reply to comments attributed to Mr. T. J. Maher, President I.F.A., in a Sunday newspaper, states:—

Mr. Maher's comments overlooked the many advantages which this year's budget conferred on farmers, giving death duty relief from death duties was given to over 25 per cent of the people previously liable. In the case of farmers previously liable, over 50 per cent obtained complete relief and all others got a reduction. This is no mean achievement for a Government only 9 weeks in office.

To have abolished all the death duties outright in this year's budget would have cost over £12m. This would have meant greatly increasing other taxes or withholding other benefits including local rates easement and social welfare improvements to over 700,000 families including a large

number of small farmers.

The White Paper on a wealth taxation system to replace death duties is at present in the course of preparation. It will be published in a few months and subject to the complete consultations requested and promised to interested parties, including the I.F.A., the necessary legislation will be ready within the year.

Were death duties to be simply abolished overnight, without making some other provision for a fair alternative system of taxing accumulated wealth, farmers would be the principal sufferers. Ireland would become a tax avoidance haven for millionaires from Britain and elsewhere who would rush in here and build up massive tax-free estates. In that event Irish farmers would find it next to impossible to buy land against the enormous prices wealthy foreign interests would be willing to pay for Irish land and other assets.

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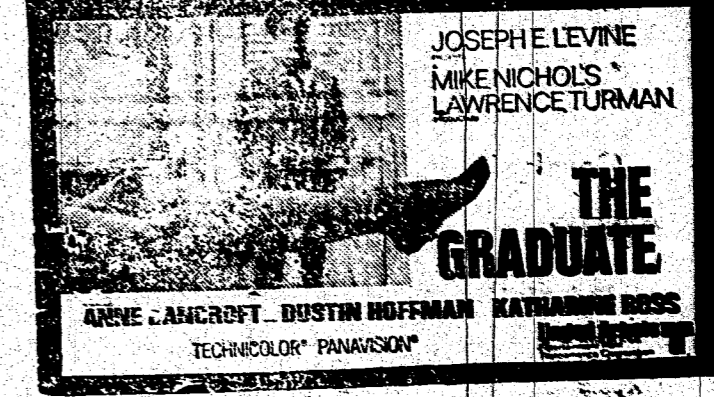

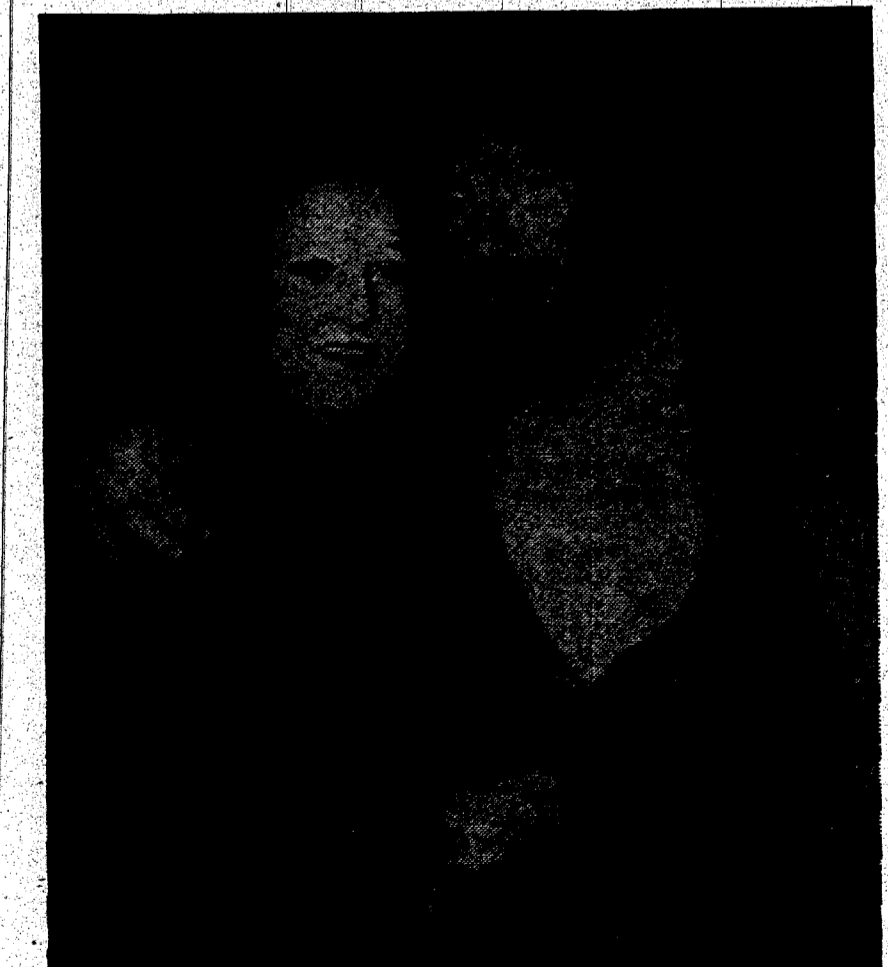

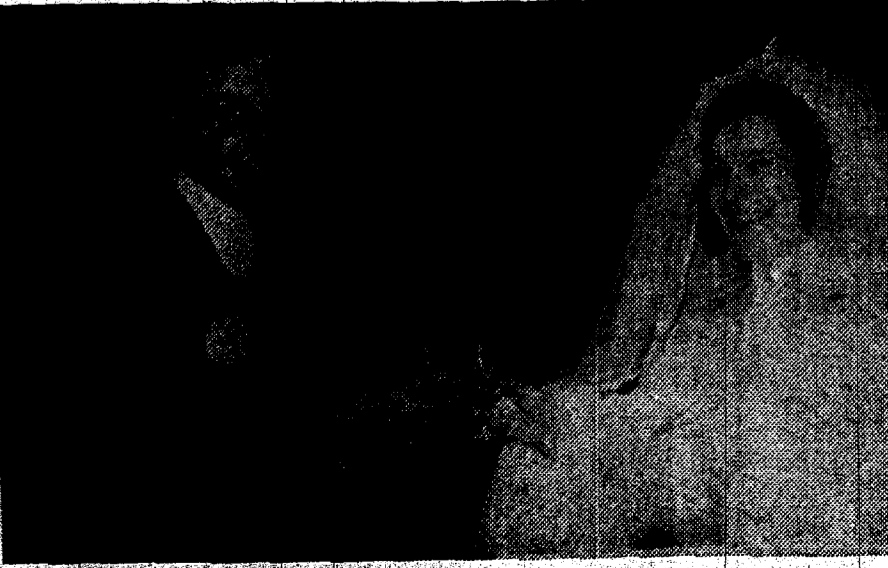

DRAMATIC GROWTH IN COMMUNITY GAMES

MR. JOSEPH CONNOLLY, Honorary General Secretary of the National Community Games Committee said that "1973 will be a historic year for Community Games because there are indications of a full 32 County involvement. We are aiming for a spectacular culmination to the Games by staging the National Community Games from Sept. 7 to 9 in the environment of a real Olympic-style village with participants from every county in Ireland."

The spacious facilities of Budins Holiday Camp at Mosney, Co. Meath, have already been booked as the venue for the National Community Games.

It is very heartening for the organisers of the Community Games to witness the dramatic development of the Games since the inception in 1968. The first Games were staged in Dublin, with 3,000 children taking part. The first National Community Games was held in 1970, with 13,000 children entering the preliminary rounds in five counties. By 1972 the games were actively involving more than half a million children and 21 counties were proudly represented at the prestigious National Community Finals at Santry Stadium.

The message about the real value of the Community Games both for children and adults has been spread to all areas to an extent whereby every child in every village and town is now probably aware of the Games. This achievement is due in no small way to the wonderful co-operation which has been demonstrated by the communications media and our young people.

COUNTY ORGANISERS

Organising committees have now been set up in many counties. These committees consist of members who are familiar with the particular needs of their own county but who also have experience of participating in the Community Games at National Community Games level. Where no such committee exists the National Secretary will be found to be anxious to help with establishing such a committee.

How to organise locally

TO CREATE the widest possible interest, as many as possible of the important people in the area should be involved in the organisation of Community Games.

The first thing to do is to define the area of the community in which the Games are to be held, e.g. the townland, estate, road(s) whose residents will be invited to participate. Responsibility for the organisation of the local Games should be assumed by a local organisation or by a group of organisations. In the latter case a committee comprised of representatives of each organisation should be established to run the Games. This committee should devise a constitution or set of rules and this should be sent, together with a map or definition of the community, to the Honorary General Secretary, National Community Games, 29 Hutches Road Stn., Walkinstown, Dublin 12. If an established organisation takes on the responsibility of arranging the Games it also should send a copy of its constitution or rules and a map or definition of the community to the Honorary General Secretary.

A public meeting to which as many people as possible should be invited should be arranged at a comfortable and convenient venue.

The National Dairy Council has published a booklet entitled "How to plan and run Community Games." This booklet will be a valuable aid to organisers of Community Games at local level. It explains the objects of the Games and provides useful information on how to set up the local machinery to run the games, how to organise meetings, the structure of the Games nationally and the list of events.

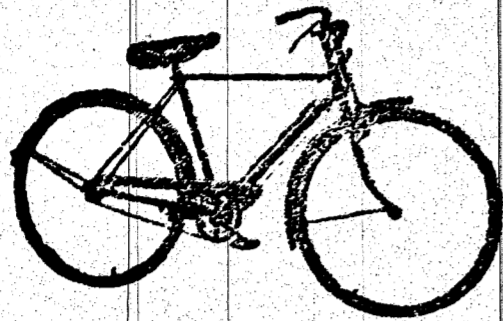

Increase in road tax criticised

The directive gone from the Minister for Local Government, Mr. Tully, to Local Authorities, spelling out in detail the increased rate of road tax to apply to Land Rovers and certain other tractors from June 1st was severely criticised by the Irish Farmers' Association.

Mr. Seamus McCann, Secretary of the I.F.A.'s Industrial and Transport Section, said: "This twenty fold increase in road tax, together with the removal of the subsidy on Potash a few weeks ago, will severely erode the advantage of E.E.C. membership for our farmers."

"These regressive measures will slow up the development in agriculture, contrary to the accepted opinion of all - the Government included - of the need to invest in this, our major industry, so that we can maximise the nation's return from our membership of the E.E.C."

He added that cut-down lorries particularly together with land rovers fill a void in agricultural transport that is not being provided by C.I.E. or any other transport source.

Grain growers did not make big fortune on feeding stuffs.

The impression that grain growers are in some way responsible for the present exorbitant prices of feeding stuffs, was strongly disputed by a member of the I.F.A. National Grain Committee, Mr. Ivan Bergin, at a meeting of the Offaly County Executive of the Irish Farmers' Association, in Tullamore.

Mr. Bergin pointed out that farmers who had sold their feeding barley crop last harvest at a price of £27.50 per ton were justifiably angry with the present situation where this barley was being traded at prices in the region of £40 per ton.

Referring to the recent increase of £11 per ton which the Minister for Industry and Commerce had granted to the com-

modity feeding stuffs manufacturers, Mr. Bergin said that the I.F.A. believed that the basis on which the National Prices Commission had recommended this increase, was open to question.

It did not appear as if sufficient account had been taken of the relatively low price paid to Irish farmers for their barley. The Commission also appeared to have largely overlooked the fact that well over 300,000 tons of feed grain had been imported free of levy under a special arrangement sanctioned by the Department of Agriculture prior to the accession of this country to E.E.C.

The I.F.A. did not intend to accept a situation where the benefit of this special grain import concession would be allowed to go entirely to the grain importers or feed compounders.

The Association had been pressing for a meeting with the Minister for Industry and Commerce on this issue and it was a matter of great dissatisfaction that this meeting had not yet taken place.

Dealing with prices and marketing arrangements for the 1973 grain crops, Mr. Bergin emphasised the importance of adequate provision being made by farmers for grain storage at farm level. This, he pointed out, would be a worthwhile proposition both from the point of view of grain and feeders.

As far as grain growers were concerned farm storage would be a useful protection against artificial depression of prices at harvest time.

He added that on the other hand farmers requiring feed grain for pigs and other livestock could, by purchasing their requirements at around harvest time and retaining it in suitable storage facilities, help to guard against profiteering by unscrupulous elements in the grain/feed trade later on.

Lamb producers up in arms over French levy

A demand that duties to the same level as present being imposed by the French Government on Irish lamb exports to France be imposed on French imports in Ireland was made by the Irish Farmers' Association's National Sheep Committee.

Mr. Larry Lenehan, Chairman of the Committee, in a statement pointed out that in the last two months the imports variable levy has been increased by 100 per cent to an all-time record level of 21 pence per lb on Irish lamb, plus additional duties and V.A.T. "This puts Irish lamb exporters in the position of having to pay charges of 20 pence per lb on our lamb before it can be exported for sale on the Paris market."

He said that his Committee stressed the importance of the urgent implementation of a Common Agricultural Policy for sheep meat and the need to expand the national flock thereby instilling confidence in the future of the industry.

He added that pending an early introduction of a Common Agricultural Policy for sheep that his Committee demanded steps should be taken to give fair access to the French market.

MINNIES SQUASH CLUB



She was sister of Mrs. Maude Walsh, Rathannv; Philip Power, Carriganure; and John Power Arundel Square, Waterford.

The remains were removed to the St. John of God Convent, Wexford and Requiem Mass was celebrated on Thursday morning, at which the chief celebrant was Rev. Fr. Killian Walsh The Bishop of Ferns, Most Rev. Dr. Donal Herlihy, presided. R.I.P.
