Bord na gCapall Sales Directory

Bord na gCapall has decided to introduce a Sales Directory which will provide buyers with first-hand information on non-thoroughbred horses and ponies for sale throughout the country.

The Board regularly receives enquiries from prospective buyers and in order to cope with these enquiries, up-to-date records on the available horses are required.

A current advertisement in connection with the Directory invites owners to submit particulars of the animal or animals they wish to sell; the availability of this information in a central Directory will assist owners and breeders to sell their stock on a worldwide market. This service is especially designed to meet the expressed needs of some smaller breeders who feel they have no access to these markets.

The Directory will cater for all categories of horses and ponies — from unbroken young stock to experienced hunters and showjumpers. The records will include colour, sex, height, sire and dam of each horse. A brief outline of what the horse has done and the reserve price will complete the picture.

Owners who participate will of course be free to sell their horses at any time. But as their co-operation will be needed to ensure that records are kept up-to-date, owners will be required to notify the Board as soon as a sale has been concluded.

This Directory will be a service to both purchaser and vendor. It will also provide the Board with the information so essential when promoting Irish horses in Europe, particularly at events such as the recent Salon du Cheval in Paris where the Irish Pavilion attracted much attention.

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Prize Schedule For Horse Show Issued

The introduction of a Working Hunter class at the R.D.S. Horse Show, 7th to 12th August, is the principle new feature in the national competitions contained in the prize schedule just issued. There are some changes in the timing of events and some new competitions have been introduced in the international jumping programme. The Society have also introduced a new Four Year Old championship which will be welcomed by all in the Horse Industry.

One of the main reasons for the introduction of this new four year old championship is to save the younger horses from being galloped against the older and more mature animals in the jumping enclosure. The Championship will be judged in the ring number 1 on the Wednesday afternoon. The Champion and Reserve may, if they wish, compete in the class for the Supreme Championship on the Thursday.

The introduction of the working hunter class will be welcomed as this is an aspect of competition that is steadily growing in popularity in recent years. The class is for mares or geldings over 15 h.h., 4 years old or over, who have not registered winnings of over £10 with the S.J.A.I. at time of qualifying. For the class at Dublin, horses must finish

first or second in qualifying competitions at specified shows throughout the country.

In the jumping competitions there have been some changes in the international events.

The Irish Distillers International now becomes a Six Bar competition, a class that has not been seen in Dublin before. Also on the Saturday there will be a new speed competition for the international competitors.

Sunday will see the other changes in the jumping programme. At 12.30 p.m. a new international Team Relay will be held. This is for teams of three riders and horses, and those not nominated in a national team may form their own teams. This leaving open the possibility of a couple of Common Market style Sides.

The first and second in the hunter, working hunter and open children's pony classes will be eligible for entry for the Horse of the Year Show at Wembley next October.

Entries for the showing classes close on 26th June and for the jumping competitions on 2nd July and schedules are available on application to the Livestock Section, R.D.S., Ballsbridge, Dublin 4.

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Problems in Carcase Lamb Export Trade

The problems which have recently come to a head in the carcase lamb export trade are undoubtedly giving rise to serious difficulties for producers. The reality of the situation is that the French Government's policy is now adding even further difficulties to a problematic market. The difficulties are compounded by the fact that the French market, when open, has been our most profitable export outlet for lamb, so that when access to this market is made more difficult, or less profitable, the effect is very serious.

These, as I have said, are the realities of the situation. But equally, there are other realities to be taken into account.

Recently, a number of people have been commenting sharply on the situation, and apportioning blame for the present difficulties in various quarters - this body has done nothing, and that body has not interest in sheep, and so on. This kind of thing makes fine headlines in the newspapers, but it does not in any way help the situation. We must be constructive, and to do that, we must take account of all the elements of the situation. So far, I have not seen any evidence of understanding of the legal aspect of the French policy in the present circumstances, nor evidence of any insight into the French position on this matter.

Article 60 2 of the Accession Treaty reads as follows:-

"In respect of products not covered, on the date of accession, by a Common organisation of the market, the provisions concerning the progressive abolition of charges, having equivalent effect to customs duties and of quantitative restrictions and measures having equivalent effect shall not apply to those charges, restrictions and measures if

they form part of a national market organisation on the date of accession."

"This provision shall apply only to the extent necessary to ensure the maintenance of the national organisation and until the common organisation of the market for these products is implemented for these products is implemented."

This provision was put into the Treaty to deal with situations like the present one. It is the second part of the quotation above which is at issue.

The duty (20 per cent) on Irish lamb going into France is not being increased - it is due to be brought down to 16 per cent on July 1st next. The question revolves around the levy and the threshold price. These are indisputably part of a national organisation of the market. As far as we and the Treaty are concerned, they can last until the end of 1977, unless either there is an E.E.C. policy for sheep in the meantime, or the French Government decides to drop them.

The French do not accept the view that an increase in the threshold price and levy means a change in their market organisation. They say that they are entitled to adjust the protection for their domestic producers to take account of increased production costs and general inflation. In their position we would put up the same argument. That is a political point. Here is another: The Irish and the French are jointly sponsoring a move for a Common E.E.C. Policy on Sheep. A public wrangle, brought before the Commission or the Council would hardly help a move like this.

Let nobody say that I am making the French case against the Irish. I am not. What I am trying to do is to point out that we are in a complex situation, and that we need to keep cool in order to have any chance of getting out of it

Growing at each other serves no purpose.

What are the solutions? Three have been put forward:

1. An attempt to reach an interim agreement with the French.
2. Agree to enter the French Market alone on agreed minimum price.
3. Pay a subsidy on exports to France.

I am surprised to learn that exporters seem to be unaware that the first solution, at least, is being pursued. I heard of moves in this direction last Autumn. French sources inform me that the French Government is chary of this, but might consider it if the move for a Common E.E.C. Policy fails. The U.K. Government, which is not interested in meat exports at the moment, could be expected to oppose anything that diverted Irish meat away from the U.K. and/or attracted meat out of the U.K. On the other hand, an agreement like this could be made compatible with international agreements. Can we give the French a good (credible) reason for wanting one?

The second solution appears reasonable, but the price would have to be near the French market price anyway. Unless the price of Irish lamb in France is now being pursued over the current market level, it is difficult to see what the benefit would be.

The third solution offers the prospect of allowing the French that we are determined to get lamb in (when the market is open) whatever the levy. This solution, or the threat of it, could be used as a bargaining counter.

A possible fourth solution would be to sell Irish lamb in France as a specifically luxury commodity, at an unashamedly high price. This, of course, would require a lot of image-building, and co-operation. (Special report from Alan Duke, Director I.F.A. Office, Brussels).
