## CAPPOQUIN WATER SHORTAGE

Appeal by Co. Engineer

Mr. Norman Walsh, M.C.C., at the last monthly meeting of Waterford County Council said he had been approached by various people concerning the shortage of water in Cappoquin and surrounding areas over the past few weeks. Last weekend he continued, for various parts of the town there had been no supply. He felt the time has now come for a statement from the Co. Engineer on the matter.

Colrs. Quirk, Ahearne and O'Dowd revealed they had also been approached and they consider the water shortage a disgrace.

Mr. J. D. Hally, County Engineer said the primary cause is that this is the third successive year with below average rainfall, continuing that one cannot possibly exaggerate the seriousness of the situation as it now exists. He appeals urgently to the public through the media of the Press that all wastage of water be cut through the most crucial days and weeks ahead.

He continued, that unless there was an immediate and fairly prolonged break in the weather in the near future, the result could be disastrous, more so in the months of August and September.

The area most seriously affected presently is West Waterford and the percentage of wastage at times of the total supply is up to 50 per cent., leakages and other factors seem to be the cause of this.

It is obvious that if the water continues to be wasted indiscriminately as it is at the moment, the effect will be disastrous in the coming weeks.

## REMOVAL OF TREES MATTER OF LIFE AND DEATH

Returning for the second time to the danger caused by trees on the road between Newport Bridge and Youghal Bridge at a County Council meeting, Mr. D. Ahearne at the Council's last meeting on Monday said that on the previous Tuesday, consequent to the passing of a school bus full of children one of the trees fell across the road.

Mr. Ahearne continued by saying that he doesn't want this to go on any longer, as there are lives in danger as long as the trees remain standing. He wants the Council to ask the landowners concerned to have the trees removed, as the people in the locality are constantly living in fear. He concluded by saying it was a matter of life and death.

Mr. J. D. Hally, County Engineer, said the responsibility of having the trees removed is primarily that of the landowner. However, he continued the Council had been in touch with the Forestry Division since the last incident and the Council will serve notice on the landowner to have any trees considered as dangerous, removed.

This statement was welcomed by Colrs. Ahearne, who stated the parents of the children were not prepared to tolerate the situation any longer and unless the dangerous trees were speedily removed further action was planned to draw attention to the situation.

## Telephone Kiosks for Rural Areas

A letter from the Department of Posts and Telegraphs to Waterford County Council, revealed that their kiosk programme for the year 1973/74 provide for provision of kiosks at the following three locations, Leamybrien, Checkpoint and Ballymacaw. Those kiosks are to replace call offices.

This correspondence was a reply to a letter from the Council regarding the phone service in rural areas and requests that new kiosks be provided at a number of nominated areas and that kiosks be substituted for those call offices which were provided by the Department under guarantee by the Council.

Mr. T. Foley, M.C.C. said that he considers it dangerous to have a kiosk erected in Leamybrien, already regarded as a killer village, as the danger with a kiosk there would be greatly increased. Instead, he continued, it could be situated in Kilrossanty, a mere mile away.

The County Secretary is to contact the Department with this suggestion.

The aim of the Department is to have these kiosks in service by 31st March, 1974, but the letter continued, because delays can arise e.g. in the selection of a suitable site, it cannot be guaranteed that any one of them will be operational by the date mentioned.

## MAJOR SPORTS COMPLEX FOR DUNGRVAN

At a news conference given last week by Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee, it was announced that a sports complex, embracing 15 acres, now in charge, situated at Tonsall Road.

Waterford County Council, Vocational Education Committee and Dungarvan Urban Council are jointly involved in the project.

A public meeting will be held following the submission of the Architect's Report, to which representatives of every organisation in West Waterford will be invited.

Mr. L. Comerford said that even though it will be youth oriented, it is also intended to cater for the entire family including the aged.

This was endorsed by Mr. T. Buckley, adding that too much emphasis was placed on the treatment of youth as an individual group.

Senator Deasy said there had been a great public outcry for such a complex in the area. As the youth had no facilities in the immediate area they spent their spare time in lounge bars spending a large amount of money.

Mr. P. Kenneally, endorsed all that had been said, outlined the growing awareness of the need for such a complex not only for the youth but for everyone. Concluding he added that Waterford was about to set the headline for the rest of the country.

Messrs. O'Sullivan have commenced a detailed survey to ascertain the specific needs to be catered for in the project.

Mr. Kelleher, C.E.O., said that the complex will cater for the whole of West Waterford with its population in excess of 30,000. Within six weeks a preliminary report is expected from the Architects and Stage One of the development, being the provision of the indoor swimming pool, will commence next year. It is

**MEMORIAL AT THE BURGERY**

The committee of the above Association has decided to replace the temporary memorial erected at the Burgery in 1923 to commemorate the death in action in March 1921 of Pat Keating and John Fitzgerald by a permanent one. The proposal has been under consideration for some years, but due to intended road improvements by the Co. Council it was not possible to make any concrete arrangements as regards layout, etc., until the road works had been completed. This work is now practically finished and in co-operation with the Engineering Department of the Council and the Moloney family, owners of the land, a site for the new Memorial has been selected and is being prepared.

The memorial, which has been designed by Brian Sullivan, Esq., Cork, will be in the form of a limestone centrepiece on a raised base, set in recessed space 16' x 6' enclosed by wall of Sandstone. The estimated cost of the work is £500.

As you can well understand the Committee, which has organised the Annual Commemoration each Easter Sunday since 1923 at an approximate cost of £50 per annum, as well as making and maintaining burial plots of all those members of the Brigade who were killed in action, now finds it necessary to appeal once more to all survivors of the Fight for Freedom in the Brigade area and their colleagues throughout Ireland and overseas.

The Committee would appreciate a contribution towards the erection of this Memorial to perpetuate the memory of the Irish Republican Soldiers killed in the vicinity and the other members of the Brigade who made the Supreme Sacrifice. Sine,

**C.A.P. ESSENTIAL FOR  
 IRELAND**

The need for maintaining the Common Agricultural Policy which is under pressure from Germany and Britain especially was stressed at a meeting of Cork County Executive I.F.A. by Mr. Pat Dunne, the newly elected chairman.

He said the value of COPA membership could not be underestimated as it would be more and more appreciated as the final pattern of European Agriculture was resolved through the negotiations of the Commissioners.

It was stated at the meeting that no further members would be admitted to COPA without the unanimous decision of the C.O.P.A. Praesidium. A decision on the National Council report criticised any suggestion that refunds on the mart levy would be considered.

The need for financing the Irish Farmers' representatives in Brussels and consolidating their Organisation at home was taken to be so obvious that any farmers or group not prepared to participate could only be regarded as evading his or their responsibilities and prepared to let alien interests take over the advantages that we were trying to obtain for Irish Agricultural producers.

It was also emphasised that it was solely a matter for farmers to control and finance their own Organisation independently of Banks, Co-Operative Societies or other interests.

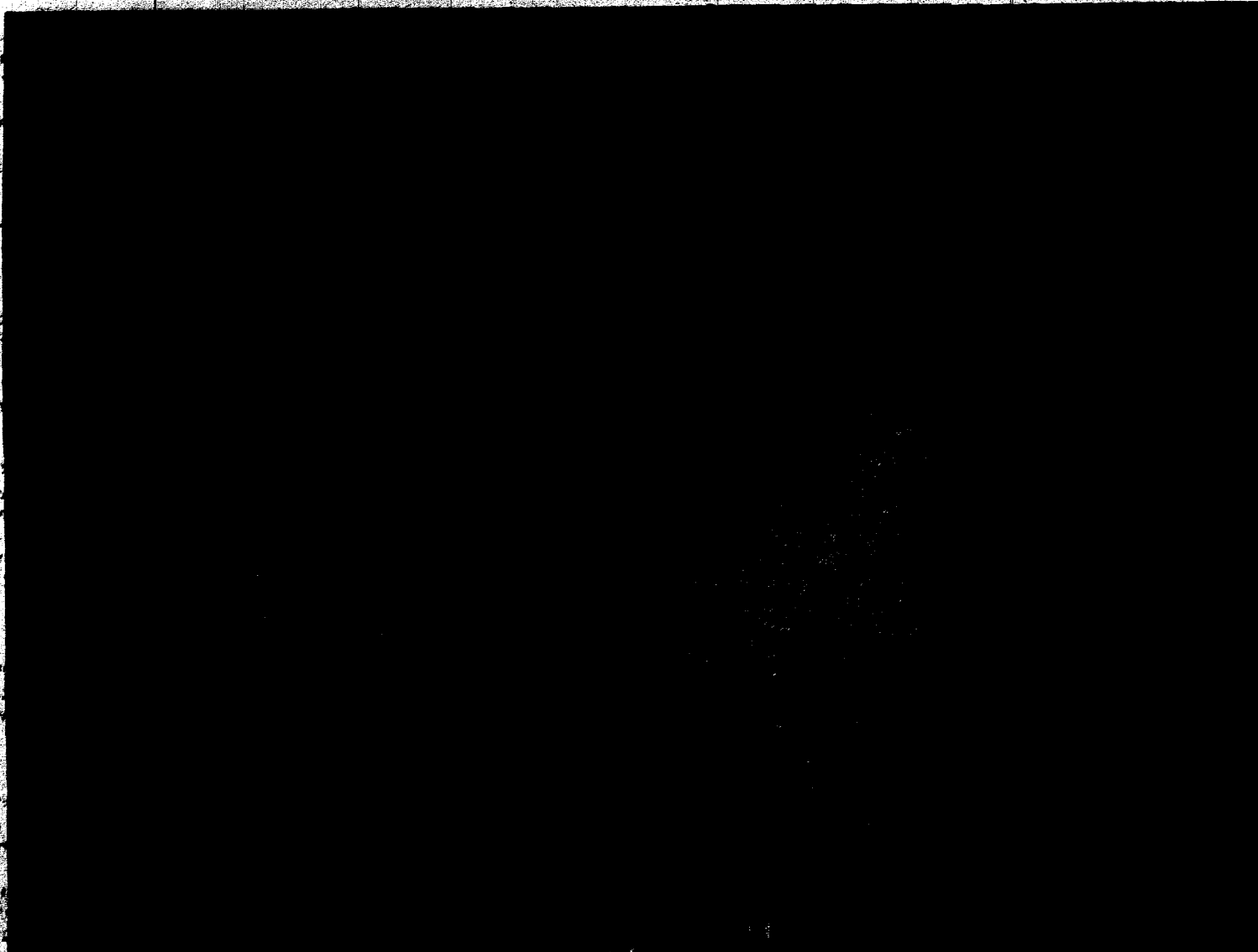

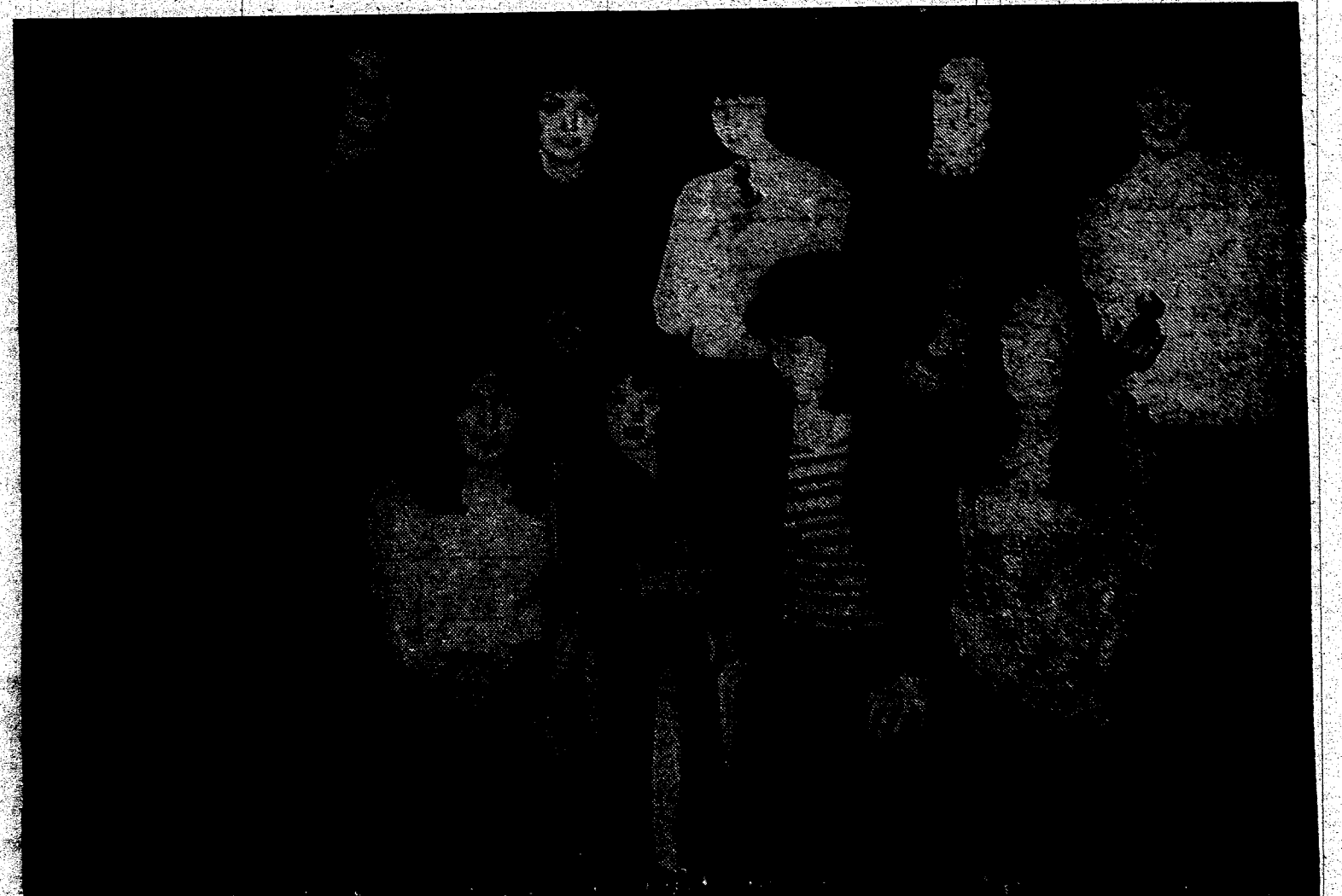

Joe Brice of St. Augustine's College had the unfortunate experience of being deprived of an All-Ireland title by a freak throw from Michael Appleby of Dublin, but still he did well to maintain his Munster form as well as finishing 3rd in the shot. Liam Hennessey of the same College filled the runner-up spot in the intermediate pole vault and here again was a performance to be proud of.

The Munster Senior Men and Ladies' Track and Field Championships at Newtown School on Sunday last saw a good double by Shay Fitzpatrick of Waterford in the high jump and 110 metres hurdles. Tom Aspel of De La Salle A.C. gave another very promising performance in the 1,500 metres, taking the silver medal behind Denis Noonan of Grange A.C. The previous day Tom had run a great race to finish second to Mick O'Shea of Limerick and he continues to improve with every outing. Ray Treacy of St. Nicholas A.C. finished 5th on Sunday in his best time ever of the 1,500 metres. Next Sunday at Dungarvan C.B.S. grounds the second section of the U-11, 13 and 15 boys and girls county championships take place at 2.30 p.m.

Late Miss Bridget Condon

The death occurred on Wednesday, June 6th at a Dungarvan Hospital, of one of County Waterford's greatest freedom fighters, Miss Bridget Condon, Ballymacarbry.

The deceased, who was in her 81st year, served as an active member of Cumann na mBan, 7th West Waterford Brigade. She acted as dispatch messenger and was also deeply involved in finding accommodation for other freedom fighters "on the run." She was interned in Kilmalinham jail in January 1923 and detained there until December of that year.

In the field of politics she gave a lifetime of service to the Fianna Fail organisation, campaigning vigorously on the party's behalf in election after election. Throughout her lifetime she was an avid lover of all things Irish and did much to promote the native language, music and culture. She was aunt of Rev. Colm O'Ryan, Los Angeles and Mr. Kieran O'Ryan, Knockalishen, one of County Waterford's best known public representatives.

The removal of remains took place to Fournmolewater Parish Church on Wednesday evening 6th inst. and the cortege was one of the largest and most representative ever seen in the locality. The coffin was draped in the tricolour and the attendance included many of the deceased's old I.R.A. and Cumann na mBan comrades.

Following Requiem mass on Friday morning last the funeral took place to Kilocoggan cemetery where the burial took place. Fittingly the deceased was buried with full military honours, again in the presence of an immense cortege which included members of the Oireachtas and many public representatives from Waterford and South Tipperary. The coffin was also draped in the tricolour.

The last post was sounded and Army personell from Kichhams Barracks, Clonmel, fired a volley of shots over the grave-side.

It was a truly fitting farewell to one who dedicated her life to the cause of Irish freedom.
