## Choice of Relief Road or Strangulation

**PLANS** which have taken almost five years to complete, for a commuter road within Dungarvan Urban area, were laid before Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, by Mr. J. D. Halley, B.E., Waterford County Engineer. The road, almost two miles in length is estimated to cost from £300,000 — £400,000, for which a 100% grant will be available, if sanctioned, on the assumption it will be a national primary road.

Mr. Halley, introducing the plan, stated that up to this year there hadn't been any pressure for such a road but now due to the amount of heavy traffic passing through the town and often the cause of congestion the need for a commuter road has now become more immediate than in recent years. It is anticipated the road will take up to eight years to complete.

The take off point is at Youghal Road from where it will go to the entrance of Fr. Twomey's Road, near the Waterford Glass Plant, then across to the Clonmel Road and down outside the existing road by the Apple Factory, through Shandon, then by way of a new causeway and

bridge across the estuary to emerge at the Coolagh Road junction (Crotty's Corner).

When the road has been completed, employees of Waterford Glass and the Co-Op. living outside Dungarvan will no longer have need to go through the town.

Some of the Councilors were of the opinion that this road could be harmful to the business of the town, which Mr. Halley replied that there was the choice of a relief road or of strangling the town within a few years.

Town Engineer, Mr. P. Walsh, disagreed with Mr. Halley on having an entrance road at the Coolagh Road junction. Now that we are in the E.E.C., Mr. Walsh said Dun-

garvan is on the main traffic route from Rossire to Cork, resulting in a juggernaut of traffic going to Cork. If the entrance was here it would mean sterilisation of a large amount of land and this is the only place adjacent to the town on the Eastern side suitable for the natural development of housing. Concluding Mr. Walsh said it would be disastrous to bring heavy traffic through what could be a heavy housing zone.

In reply to a query from Senator Deasy, Mr. Halley said that the amount of traffic through Dungarvan merits this road.

Commenting on remarks on the business life of the town, Mr. Halley said the experience generally from commuter roads is an improvement of conditions in the town rather than otherwise.

He further stated that shops will not be allowed spring up on this road.

Returning to the entrance at Coolagh Road, Mr. Walsh suggested that it be sited further out, to which Mr.

Hally replied that if this were so workers in Waterford Co-Op. and Glass factory would not be inclined to use it and would continue to go through the town.

A decision on the matter was adjourned until next monthly meeting.

Vincent Kirwan, Kealfoun, Kilmacthomas, the 25-year-old farmer, in a habeas corpus application to the Court earlier this month had claimed that the girl and he were engaged to be married but that her father Aidan Wall, objected to her marrying him and prevented her from seeing him.

Justice Kenny awarded costs against Mr. Kirwan.

## POTATO BLIGHT

Potato Blight

Blight is still one of the greatest problems of potato growing in Ireland.

Its effects are twofold - (1) Blight in the foliage causes premature death of stalks and consequent reduction in total yield.

(2) Blighted tubers are of no commercial value and may amount to as much as 5 tons per acre in seriously affected crops.

The losses caused by blight are, therefore, considerable. Furthermore, in view of the serious reduction in acreage now under potatoes it is essential that maximum yields are obtained. Hence the importance of adequate blight control measures.

### FOLIAGE BLIGHT

Symptoms.

Blight first appears each season on the overground parts of the potato plant. Dark brown to almost black areas first appear, usually at the margin or top of the small leaves. On the lower surface of the leaf a delicate whitish mould can often be seen around the margin of the discoloured areas. This is the spore bearing fungus. The spores are scattered by wind and rain on to healthy plants and start a new centre of infection.

Source of Infection. Blight survives over the winter in blighted tubers. These infected tubers may have been planted with the crop, or as occurs frequently may have been discarded in dumps or at old pit sites.

Precautions Against Blight. (1) Destroy all blighted tubers since these are the main cause of new outbreaks. (2) Spraying - this the chief method of controlling potato blight. Infected material cannot be saved, therefore, it is essential to start preventative spraying early.

When to Spray

The first spray should be applied before blight appears on the foliage and before the stalks meet across the furrows to ensure that the lower leaves receive adequate protection.

New foliage produced by the plant after the first spraying must be protected by subsequent spraying. The number and timing of subsequent applications will also depend on -

(a) Weather conditions  
 (b) Persistence of spraying material.

(c) Maturity of the variety of potatoes;  
 (d) Date of burning off the stalks.

Considering all these factors it is advisable to spray at intervals of not less than 2 or more than 3 weeks until the crop is considered to have reached maturity.

### Blight Warnings.

To guide farmers as to the timing of spraying, blight warnings are broadcast by Radio Eireann and Telefis Eireann. Crops should be sprayed as soon as possible after the warnings.

### Spraying Materials.

Many new improved types of spray now give satisfactory protection when properly used and applied liberally and frequently. Medium to high volumes of water must be used since the foliage must be completely covered with spray. Spraying materials are usually sold in packages on which detailed instructions are given as to how they should be prepared.

### BLIGHT IN TUBERS

Symptoms

The first symptom of blight in a tuber is a small brown to purplish black area on the skin. This area becomes hardened and shrunk and may become enlarged either in the field or afterwards in storage until the greater part of the tuber is affected. Underneath the skin, the flesh is rusty brown which projects irregularly but not very deeply into the interior of the tuber.

### Source of Infection

Spores produced on infected foliage are washed down by rainwater through the soil and infect the tubers. Tubers are more likely to become infected than those protected by a deep layer of soil.

Tubers are also very liable to infection at harvesting time when brought into contact with blighted foliage which is not entirely dead or with surface soil containing live spores.

### Precautions against Blight occurring on Tubers

(1) Drills should be well earthed up to provide an adequate covering of soil for protection of tubers against infection by spores shed from infected stalks.  
 (2) Late attacks of blight are responsible for heavy tuber infection. Consequently, spraying should be continued

as long as necessary during August and into September to maintain protection until stalks are burned off.

(3) The stalks of all potato crops whether of seed or ware should be burned off at least 2-3 weeks before the crop is due to be harvested. This will reduce the risk of blight in the tubers.

When to Burn Off (1) Seed crops are burned off when the bulk of the tubers have reached seed size. If good control in a crop is achieved, it should be burned off when the stalks begin to open, because blight may not be observed when the foliage is changing colour.

(2) Ware potatoes planted early and grown from sprouted seed are ready for burning off when tuber growth is almost finished and before the stalks begin to ripen.

(3) Late crops should also be burned off shortly after the final spraying for blight control because a subsequent blight attack could lead to heavy infection of tubers through fissures in the drills caused by 'bulking'. Under normal conditions crops of the latest varieties are burned off in mid-September.

### Damage caused by chemicals for burning off stalks.

These chemicals can cause injury to potatoes which are burned off during a period of drought or if the proper recommendations are not followed. Damage is more likely to occur when the soil moisture level is low and if the chemicals are applied in the evenings shortly before dark. Under such conditions traces of the chemicals are likely to be absorbed into the tubers resulting in stem-end rot.

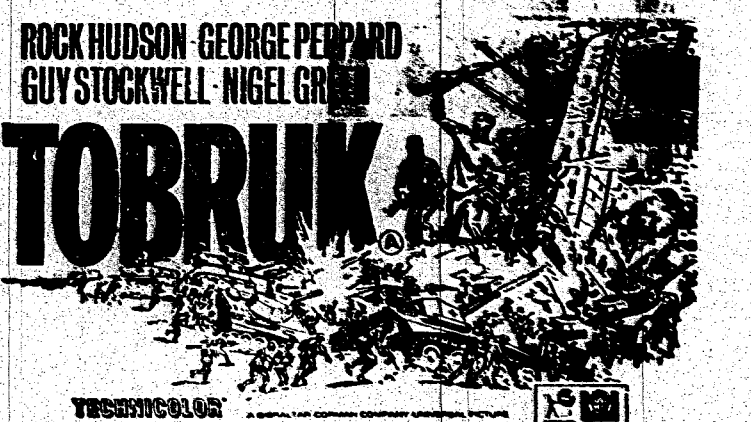

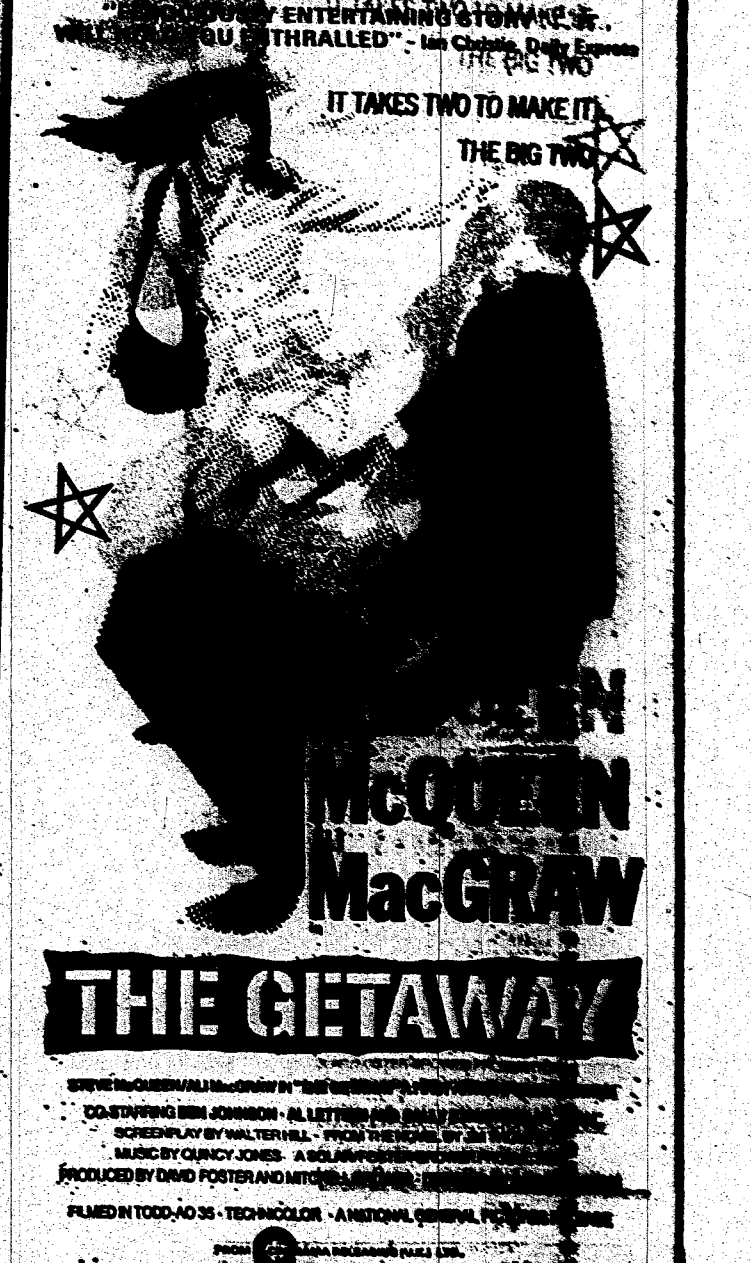

# Parking bye-laws to be enforced

Kyne T.D., at a meeting of the Urban Council on Sunday night, said that the bye-laws were a success and he thought they should revert to the idea of one-sided parking in O'Connell Street, Main Street, Mary Street and Bridge Street and also hourly parking. # Clean wool means more money for the farmer

Sheep farmers can get top price for their wool by following a few simple rules issued by The Wool Council which is anxious to improve the quality of Irish wool and its standing in world wool markets. The better the quality and presentation of Irish wool the keener will be the demand for it, thus ensuring that it will fetch top prices in the open market.

The main things to remember are: 1. Use only scourable brands; 2. Avoid excessive use of brands or raddle; 3. Avoid dusty areas when collecting and penning

4. Do not shear damp or wet sheep; 5. Remove daggings; 6. Shear on a clean dry surface; 7. Role and tie fleeces with care using the neck band to secure a firm well rolled fleece; 8. Pack daggings and dirty wool separately from clean wool; 9. Store in a clean, dry premises.

In the girls U-11 100 metres Patricia Pengergast of St. Nicholas A.C. did well to finish a good second to a Jyer Rosemary Walsh of De La Salle, who really moves for one so young and light of weight. There was more joy for the Ballinacoola club when their young starlet Clare Power won the U-11 400 metres and here certainly is a very exciting prospect of which any new club would be justly proud. Among the boys the medal winners were mainly among the established athletes except for Pat Mooney of Bally A.C. who did well to take the runner-up position in the U-13 800 metres, a race won as expected by Dermot Cunningham of Tramore. However, young Mooney lost little caste in defeat and is improving at every meeting. George Hamilton of Dungarvan

A.C. was 3rd in the U-11 shot and here again is a name to remember. Michael Casey of Bally A.C. gave a polished performance in the 800 metres U-15 and he won pulling up but in most impressive style and the same could be said for the display given by Sean Meehan of Dungarvan in the 3,000 metres U-15, a race which Mattie Moloney of St. Nicholas A.C. ran well to take 2nd place and so make it a double medal success for the Moloney family. John Flynn of Dungarvan had two thirds in the 200 metres and shot, while Joe Brice of Friary A.C. won the shot at his case but had to be content with 2nd place in the 200 metres behind Frank Power of John's Park, as well as finishing 3rd to Pat Kelly of John's Park and John Flynn of Dungarvan in the triple jump. Kevin Barnes of Bally A.C. collected his first medal of the track and field season, when he finished 3rd in the U-15 javelin. He was far from disgraced in this event and with a little bit of luck he would have been second and he obviously showed all the signs of the expert coaching he has been receiving from Jack Fraher. It was a day of hard luck stories for Bally A.C. with Carol Power and Carol Wall being just run out at the finish, having made all the running in the 400 metres U-11 and 13. Also only inches deprived Ger Fitzgerald of a medal in the U-13 shot. Young Quinn of Grange A.C. also had hard luck to have been pipped on the line for a place in the U-11 200 metres final as he had to recover from a disastrous start and was full of running at the tape. Still these youngsters should not be too disappointed and this goes for all who have not been among the medals recently, as time is definitely on their side and they will have many more chances of glory in the future.

Finally a word of praise to the organisers of the meeting not forgetting Fr. O'Donnell, who stepped in at the last minute and showed that he has what it takes to make it to the top as a starter!

## Late Rev. Fr. Michael Gerard Moran, O.S.A.

He was very popular with his fellow members of the Order and also with the students of the College, where they were always ready to place their troubles before their beloved master and seek his valuable advice. The late Fr. Michael Gerard Moran, O.S.A., was a notable figure in Dungarvan and his great popularity grew with his appointment to the town and still greater with the passage of time.

We extend a very special sympathy to his sorrowing sisters, brothers, nephews, nieces, aunt, fellow Augustinians and pupils.

His remains were removed on Thursday evening from the District Hospital to the Friary Church, followed by a huge cortege and a Guard of Honour, which consisted of the senior pupils of the college marched at each side of the hearse and were blessed and received by the New Provincial of the Augustinian Order, V. 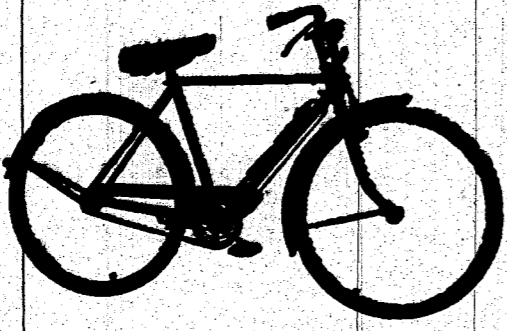

## Common Agricultural Policy for Sheep and Lambs on the way

— Says Lardinois

The announcement by the EEC Commissioner for Agriculture, Mr. Pierre Lardinois, that he hopes to present a draft regulation to the European Parliament on a common market for sheep and lamb by the end of this year was welcomed by the Irish Farmers' Association.

Mr. Larry Lenihan, Chairman of the I.F.A.'s National Sheep Committee, said that at this juncture the emphasis of our Government's efforts in Brussels and elsewhere in Europe must be placed on the essential and urgent requirement for a suitable Common Agricultural Policy for sheep.

He said that I.F.A. will continue pressing and negotiating as strongly as possible through COPA, the farmers' organisations of the Nine, on behalf of all Irish sheep farmers, to have such a policy implemented as quickly as possible. He said: "All the necessary but cautious haste must be made in order to achieve this objective, as with a definite policy Irish farmers will be able to plan their future sheep production with more confidence and security."

The present situation is most unsatisfactory from the Irish producer's point of view, because lamb prices in Ireland are largely determined by the condition of our export market where access is both difficult and not guaranteed and where prices are uncertain because of impositions from sources other than within the EEC to our main outlets.

Mr. Lenihan pointed out that at this very moment Irish lamb exports to the French market are subject to a duty of 7 pence per lb., a levy of 12.1 pence per lb. in addition to value added tax and other charges which amount in total to an estimated 20 pence per lb.

## Anti-Pollution Grants for pig men

Anti-pollution grants presently available to contractors should be made available to individual farmers and groups of farmers, an Irish Farmers' Association delegation urged when they met Senior Officials of the Department of Agriculture.

The I.F.A.'s National Pigs and Bacon Committee in a statement said the delegation advocated that regarding the extension of the one-third grant to sow units, the maximum size unit eligible should be 100 sows for the entire group. The I.F.A. said there should be flexibility in the regulations to allow for the widely differing systems of production.

A spokesman for the I.F.A. said: "Our delegation proposed that aids be made available for the distribution of whey. They pointed out that the most economic use of whey was in the form of pig feed and that this would also greatly help reduce the danger of pollution from whey."

The Department Officials told the delegation that residential courses in pig industry will be introduced. The courses are designed for farmers, farmers sons and farm workers and there will be financial incentives for participants.

The course will be of a month's duration and will be held initially in Athenry.

## Establishment of National Economic Council Welcomed By I.F.A.

The establishment of a National Economic Council which will include representatives from the Irish Farmers' Association, was welcomed by the Association in a statement. A spokesman for the I.F.A. said the Association had been involved in talks with the previous Government about the setting up of a new National Economic Council.

He said: "The I.F.A. has been constantly pressing for the inclusion of social policies as part of the overall National Economic policy."

"In so far as this seems to be a step in this area, the setting up of this Council is welcomed by us."

## Grass Seed Prices fixed

Prices for the 1973 grass seed crop were fixed at a joint meeting of the Irish Farmers' Association's National Grass-Seed Committee representatives, County Machinery Association.

Representatives of the Department of Agriculture were also present as observers. The I.F.A. in a statement said the following list of prices growers should receive for seed of 90 per cent purity with an adjustment for each 1 per cent above or below 90 per cent purity: Oriol Perennial £12 per cwt. rough seed; Glasnevin Leafy Perennial — £20 per cwt. cleaned seed; Celtic Italian — £9 per cwt. rough seed and R.V.P. Italian — £10 per cwt. rough seed. These prices show a substantial increase on 1972 prices and are in accordance with general market price trends.

Commenting after the meeting Mr. N. Keogh, Chairman of the I.F.A. National Grass-Seed Committee, expressed satisfaction that agreement had been reached on prices at a fairly realistic level. It was essential, he said, to have agreed floor prices for grass seed on at least a two-year basis to enable growers to plan production programmes.

A further meeting with the Machinery Association will be held in the near future to fully discuss the establishment of floor prices.

## Board Condemns Health Estimates Reduction

At the monthly meeting of the S.E. Health Board the members strongly protested against the decision of the Minister to drastically reduce the Board's Estimate for the current year.

Ald M. J. McGuinness said that they should strongly protest against the massive cut, which would seriously affect their programme for 1973-74. They had made certain promises to the staffs of all their hospitals and they would now have to tell these staffs that they could not keep these promises. It was a disgraceful decision and he proposed that they again refer the matter back to the Minister.

Mr. C. Curran, seconded and said that the cut back was directed against the weakest and most defenceless sections of the community — the sick, old, underprivileged and deprived. It would have the effect of crippling some of their services. There was a spending spree in other sectors and Ministers had given themselves an increase of £2,000 per year. It was utter nonsense to suggest that the provisions of the national budget would compensate for the curtailment of the Board's services caused by the cut. Some of their essential services would now be stagnated.

Mr. N. O'Sullivan said it was an extraordinary decision, which could not be justified. It would halt their pleas for improving and expanding their services. The Estimate passed by the Board was the absolute minimum required. Sister M. Stanislaus said she was very concerned at the reduction, which would have the effect of limiting the services they could now provide for the old, poor and handicapped.

Dr. M. Doherty said that it would also restrict the level of medical services and was a cause for grave concern.

Dr. J. Faul and Dr. P. Meehan said that they too disagreed with the reduction, which would result in a severe cut back in essential services. Ald Brennan also disagreed with the decision of the Minister, which he described as anti-social.

Mr. M. Ferris said that nobody could justify the decision and they in the Labour Party were very concerned and uneasy that a Labour Minister should make such a decision — a decision which would have the effect of denying the sick and the poor their rights.

Ald T. Byrne said that the Minister would have to accept full responsibility in the matter — his decision could not be justified. They had been engaged in a programme of hospital improvement, but now all their efforts had been in vain.

The Chairman said the whole matter was unfortunate. Mr. Curran said they were lucky that the hospital development in Dungarvan would not be affected. As the former Minister had approved these projects and the necessary money had already been provided.

The resolution was passed unanimously.

## WEST WATERFORD NEWS

**CLASHMORE F.F. CUMANN A.G.M.**

There was an exceptionally large attendance at the A.G.M. of the Clashmore F.F. Cumann, including many ladies and teenagers. Mr. Erskine Childers was congratulated on his election as President of Ireland.

Strong views were expressed concerning delay on the part of Waterford Co. Council in providing promised essential services for the area and proposals were made that effective protests be made in the near future.

Ald W. Kenneally T.D. said during the General Election the F.G. and Labour parties had promised the abolition of Death Duties and a reduction in the cost of living. Neither promise had been kept instead massive taxation had been imposed on all sections of the community and more was likely to follow.

Mr. Curran M.C.C. said that the Budget was directed mainly against the workers and other wage earners. All sections of the farming community were likely to be the next target for massive taxation.

Mr. P. Kenneally M.C.C. said that the coalition had broken all their major election promises.

# Ghosts and Pishogues

I HAVE LISTENED to many stories about the above with avid interest, around the firesides of Abbeyside and Dungarvan. I was simply enthralled by them all. They were hair-raising, Doubt, fancy and speculation, all at time crossed my mind. Often one story teller would make it longer and more interesting than the others.

Various assertions would be made, but I always came away not altogether convinced. I made the habit of visiting different houses to hear the latest ghost story. All the tales were contrasting. As one proceeded to tell the stories they grew more interesting and all absorbing, but never really convincing. But then again it gave people an opportunity to exchange views on the subject.

I listened to an all time thriller as the shades of eve were falling. I made a dash to the nearest pub to revive my somewhat drooping spirits. All the fantasy had left me when I had a glass of Paddy Whiskey. At this juncture the door of the pub flew open and in walked the tall sprightly Dungarvan hurler of yester years, the one and only Lord Duggan. In real Danny Rianhflower style, shouted at me in the bar, "hello there." He reminded me of his days on the hurling arenas of Munster. I invited him to have a drink. I'll have a drop of spirits said the genial lord. I reminded him I heard enough about spirits for one night. Lord cheered all in the pub by singing "Bantry Bay." It was getting late in the night. I left the lord singing "My Snowy Brested Pearl."

Next I met my old friend the late Mikie Wyse and we had a long conversation about all the current topics in the town. Leaving Mikie I proceeded home only to encounter a well-known coffin maker, who shall be nameless. He greeted me and asked me would I give him a hand to move some coffins. I said yes; so the reader can well imagine how I felt moving the coffins at midnight on a dark dreary winter's night. I still had a good way to go home as I came out of the coffin-maker's house. All the lights in town were switched off. Not a soul in sight. Everytime I heard the slightest sound my mind went back to the coffins. Was I really pleased to get home that night. When I told the story in the dressing room to a hurling team mate of mine, the following Sunday getting ready for a vital championship match, he roared with laughter and rejoined we don't want any dead men on the field to-day. Every member of team will have to be very much alive to stand up to a star Tallow side.

I never had a morbid outlook, but I found over the years that people talk about those things. Of course in those days there was no television and fine communal spirit prevailed. If we had television we would never have had the opportunity of discussing matters and problems.

Dungarvan had some of the finest conversationists in Ireland. Men such as Jim Gibbons, Mikie Wyse, Pax Whelan, Tom Lee late U.D.C. and the doyen of them all, Bertie O'Neill, who could discuss Lady Gregory, Oscar Wilde, Yeats and T. D. Sullivan. Bertie must be one of Dungarvan's outstanding personalities. I fear I am digressing; now to return to the subject.

How often have I heard of the Banshees wailing around Knockboy, Ballinacorney and Ballymacarby. It was usually said that the banshee followed families whose name started with an O.

Of course around Dungarvan quite a few areas are regarded as spooky. I must say I never came face to face with a ghost. The greatest shock I had was when we were fishing under the Abbey near Abbeyside church. It was around 3 a.m. of a dark Winter's morning, the wind was howling. I was on my own in the strand. I had the wharf waiting for the lads to come in with the boat. Lo and behold a man jumped out of Abbeyside cemetery. I ran, he called me back. I recognised his voice, was I glad when he told me he was looking around for any wind falls. We remained firm friends and often had a good laugh at the incident afterwards.

How many times have I heard the story of the headless coach from old Abbeyside folk. My mind goes back to a toss school at the cross in Abbeyside. Of course pitch and toss was regarded as gambling. My job was to hold the candle those dark Saturday night as the coins were tossed up and the stakes were on the ground. I recall the coins being tossed. One would now and again hear an objection to a foul toss. One player when tossing up would shout, "bar them if you like." One Saturday night when the toss school was in full swing and one player was cleaning up the school, a big tall person dressed in white appeared, as result we ran as fast as we could. But ghost or no ghost the bloke who kept winning picked up the stakes off the ground. Some years later I heard a rehearsal of the story in a pub in Dungarvan. It appears that the bloke who was winning all the night had been using a two-headed half-penny and that the ghost appeared to help him out as it is well known that using a two-headed coin in a pitch and toss game is enough, to use a racing parlance, to be barred off the course. I think the biggest toss school I ever saw was in the Burgery near Fives pub; the Pond at Abbeyside was another one; the one near Fair Lane, Dungarvan was also a good one with a well-known local character shouting the odds.

The Gardai in town in those days over looked any little "irregularities." We knew them by their christian name, hurlers like Limerick's Mick Peane; Sean Hughes, Killenny. Sean had orders to stop us hurling

in the Park. We had a real tough match in progress one day. Someone shouted Garda Sean Hughes is coming. He came over to me and said that's great hurling Mick. He took off his jacket and took part in the match. Great days!

We had also some great card schools in those days. Great games were played near Foley's workshop at the cross at Abbeyside. Also at the pub in Sheares Street, where my old friend Jimmy Havens was in charge. Many a good card game was played at the Linny on the Quay. 45 was the favourite game. Abbeyside and Dungarvan had some great 45 players. Many great games of solo were played at the late Dan Fraher's on the Square. Also at the old Commercial Hotel in Shandon. A friendly rivalry existed amongst all the players. Commercial travellers visiting the town joined in the games. The late Jim and Nicholas Draper were good solo players. Others I remember were the late Jack Dwyer, who in his young days played rugby for Garryowen. Dan Fraher, Phil Walsh, John Lynch and J. A. Lynch, father of the present Editor of the Dungarvan Observer. Yes they were great days and the community spirit in Dungarvan was unbeatable. There was never a dull moment.

Back to the card games which were a big social and enjoyable feature of Dungarvan in yester year. It would be most interesting to hear from readers whom they thought were Dungarvan's best 45, 25 and solo players. I am sure some enterprising business firm in the town would sponsor the awarding of some trophy to an acclaimed star player. Of course Dungarvan had some good Bridge and Chess players in my time. I recall great players in Mah Taylor family, also Mrs. Slattery, sister of the outstanding athlete of yester year, T. F. Kiely the champion. Talking of cards, I knew an old Abbeyside friend of mine who never went without the pack in his pocket. He was always ready for a game. One game he would never touch was the 3-card-trick. Such blokes came to town for a big match and took up a stand. You put your money on the card, you usually lost. A fellow came to town one day to the fair. I was in the company of the great Dungarvan Gael, Jack Wyse. I decided to pick out a card. Jack told me the card. I won but the three card trick man was annoyed. He told me and Jack if we kept it up he would head for the County Home.

Pishogues prevailing in my youth around the county were many. I have often discussed them with friends of mine from the county in London over a pint of Guinness. I recall a few barbers had a golden rule never to cut hair on a Monday. But one I knew in my youth almost slipped up. He shall be nameless. Clare hurlers met Waterford at our, home venue, Dungarvan. The Clare team stopped in town on Monday. As a result a member of the Clare team decided to have a hair cut and shave. He walked into the barber's shop. The barber like myself, liked a few pints and had a few. Forgot it was Monday. Suddenly he realised it whilst shaving the Clare man. He had by now shaved one side of his face, he shouted, "It's Monday, you've had it." The Clare man was astounded. He shouted "we have none of them pishogues around the Banner County." He refused to pay. The Barber shouted, "let Clare do what they like, I'm not shaving you further." It was great fun. The other Clare players pulling his leg, one side of his face shaved and the other unshaven. One rarely saw a safety razor in those days. It was a big cut-throat and the Clareman had to wait till he got back to Clare to get the shaving finished.

It was considered unlucky to borrow salt. It was a golden rule that once you bought meat from a butcher you never brought it back. Then I used to hear the story that it was unlucky to meet a woman with a certain colour hair early in the morning. I heard it said by old folk in my area that quite a few men going to work in the morning turned back who met a woman with a certain coloured hair.

Yes, all those pishogues provoked discussion. I don't think anybody took them too serious. Dungarvan was a great town for quotations. The late Charlie Coughlan a native of the town who lived at Upper O'Connell Street was brilliant at quotations. I quote some of Charlie's — "The men you spend your money on. Will turn around and say, We don't care what you were. But what you are to-day. Another one went like this — "Since man to man is so unjust, I hardly know which man to trust, So pay to day and Trust to-morrow."

Yes, Charlie Coughlan was a wonderful personality. In his younger days he was a useful boxer. He spent some years in the U.S.A. A real Dungarvan man. He held his native town out around the Sheshes. They had some great saying. I often used them in London during the Winter. On a bitterly cold day they would be heard saying, "It's the real Sean Beacht. They told me it was the skinning of the old cow. I have often heard of the Goban. But felt that our local sayings were really good. County Waterford folk down through the years have enriched Irish culture."
