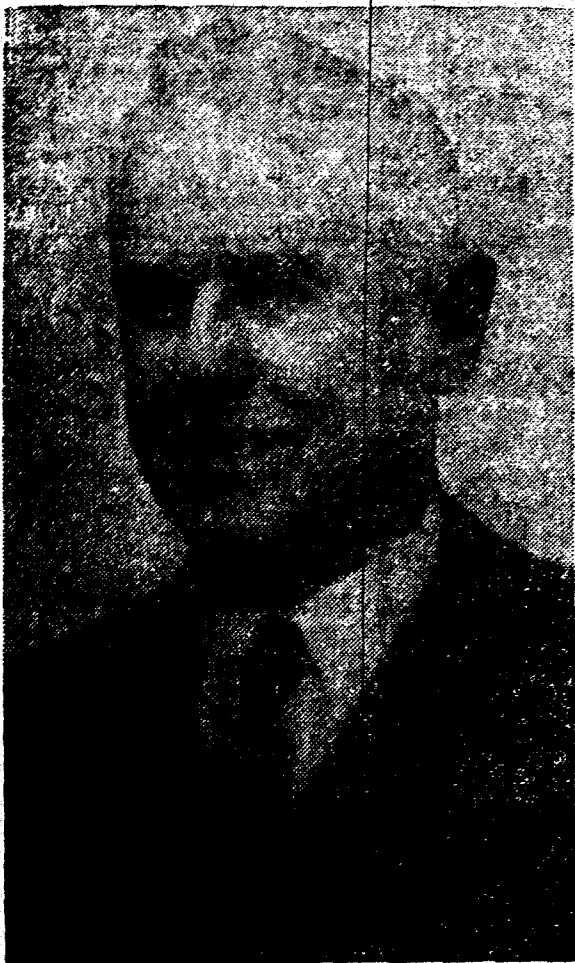

125 YEARS OF TRADING



Late William Henry Hadden of Carlow

THE HADDEN FAMILY BUSINESS was founded in Wexford in the year 1848. The exact date seems to have been the 23rd June, 1848, and certainly a Cash Book still exists which shows the takings on or about the particular day. They were £4 10s. 10d.

Haddens down the years have always taken a long term view of business affairs and development. As the company now marks the occasion of its 125th anniversary it also celebrates the breakthrough it has made in recent years while moving into the fifth generation of family management.

Haddens tradition has been to offer the highest possible service to its customers and a Staff Training Incentive Scheme has been in operation consistently for at least 25 years. All customers are invited to "Shop around at leisure where shopping is a pleasure."

But the strength of the Company has undoubtedly been in its accounting function. This is illustrated by the records right back to the 23rd June, 1848, and it is certainly true that the Management Accounting Techniques employed by Haddens in all branches and in all departments, are unusual and probably unique. **GEORGE HADDEN 1854**

The business was started by Mr. and Mrs. George Hadden, a young couple who were married in August 1848. George Hadden died about nine years later, in 1857, leaving behind a young widow and two boys, William and George.

Mrs. Frances Jane Hadden must have been a remarkable woman, for she not only reared and gave her sons a model training, but she maintained and developed the thriving business at North Main St., Wexford.

William and George Hadden eventually relieved their mother of all responsibility for running the business and they took it over in about the year 1875. From that date on it was generally known as W. & G. Hadden. Under their leadership it continued to prosper, develop and expand. **ALDERMAN GEORGE HADDEN JP OF WEXFORD**

In 1906 the Hadden brothers were unexpectedly offered the drapery business of M/s Merrick and Ruddell in Dungarvan. It was purchased within a matter of days.

In 1909 the business of Mr. Adam Ford in Tullow St., Carlow was acquired, and later additions over the years have made this store not only the largest of the three, but one of the finest retail sites in the provinces.

William Hadden of Wexford eventually went blind and withdrew from the family business at the time of the First World War, leaving his brother George as sole proprietor. George Hadden was a man of both outstanding character and exceptional business ability. (He was an Alderman of Wexford and a Justice of the Peace). His

business continued to be known as W. & G. Hadden and in 1919 it was incorporated as a Limited Liability Company. Alderman George Hadden of Wexford (father of the present Dr. George Hadden of Wexford) also went blind in later years and he died at Springfield, Wexford in 1925.

WILLIAM HENRY HADDEN OF CARLOW
Two of George Hadden's sons, William Henry "of Carlow" and Addison "of Wexford" then carried on the family business as equal partners for a quarter of a century. During this period the branches at Dungarvan and Carlow developed their sale turnover until they both exceeded the sales of the parent branch.

In 1951 Addison Hadden who is well remembered in Wexford as the founder and Managing Director of both the Slaney Furniture Factory and the Tuskar Firelighter Co. became ill. He decided to retire and to dispose of his 50 per cent holding of Ordinary Shares. They were bought equally by his two nephews, Victor and David, the sons of William Henry Hadden of Carlow.

William Henry Hadden died in 1965. Many people who knew him referred to him as "a Christian Gentleman". His outstanding contributions to the family business were his impeccable integrity and his insistence on maintaining and improving the accounting record which he had used to control and operate the company. **WILLIAM VICTOR HADDEN**

For the third time in a century the family business was managed jointly by two brothers. This position continued until 1972 when David Hadden decided to withdraw, and to emigrate, with his wife and family, to Canada. They have settled happily in Winnipeg. David's Ordinary Shares in W. & G. Hadden Ltd. have been bought out by Victor Hadden of Carlow who with his wife Lorna (also a Director) now holds the entire equity of the Company, but a Holding Company has been formed to take most of these Shares in Trust.

Victor Hadden's special interest has always been in Management Accounting. Having accepted the headlines which had already been set, he researched and developed new methods during the sixties and he now lectures professionally on a part time basis for the Irish Management Institute in Dublin. His specialities are Retail Management Accounting and Retail Accounting Methods. **COLIN GEORGE HADDEN**

Victor Hadden's son, Colin (who represents the fifth generation of Haddens in the Management of the business), joined the Board of Directors in 1972, following a promising period of three years as Executive Trainee at Harrods of London.

Like all family businesses in retailing Haddens found the forties and the fifties, with the then static population and a stagnant economy, rather difficult years. Dur-

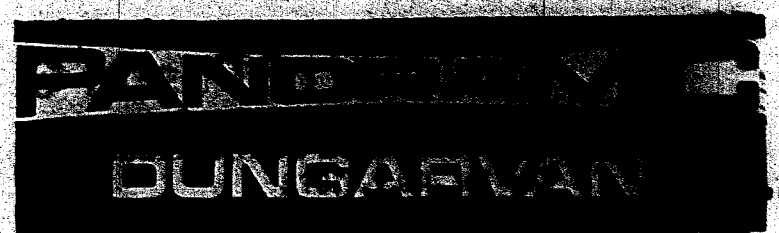
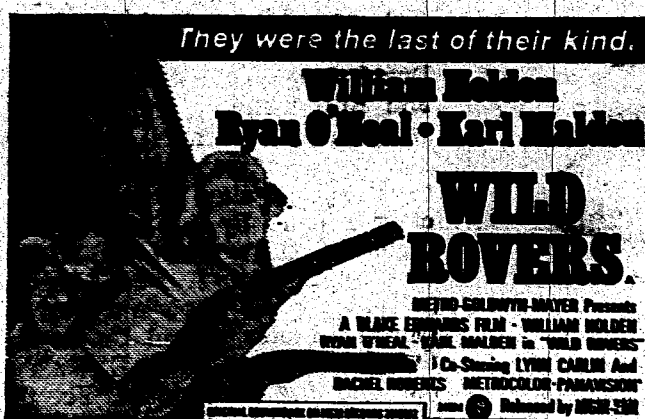

E.E.C. Social Assistance Butter Scheme

Notice to Social Assistance Recipients and Butter Traders

Under the above scheme, which is now being put into operation, a subsidy is provided which allows every person receiving social assistance to purchase one pound of butter per month, together with an additional pound for each of his statutory dependants, at 25p. per pound less than the price normally charged by the retailer from whom the butter is bought.

1. PERSONS ENTITLED

These comprise persons receiving the following payments:—

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE Non-contributory old age, blind and widows' and orphans' pensions, deserted wife's allowance, unemployment assistance, home assistance, old age (care) allowance and social assistance allowance for unmarried mothers.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH: Disabled persons (maintenance) and infectious diseases (maintenance) allowances.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENCE: Special allowances under the Army Pensions Acts.

2. HOW THE SCHEME WORKS

Recipients of the above payments will each receive a butter voucher in respect of each month during which the scheme is in operation, together with an additional voucher for each statutory dependant. A voucher may be exchanged for a pound of butter at any shop at which butter is sold on payment of the difference between the subsidy (25p.) and the normal price charged by the retailer. A voucher may be used during the month shown on it or the following month.

3. DISTRIBUTION OF VOUCHERS

Distribution of vouchers in respect of the month of June is now in progress and will continue for a further week or so. The distribution is being effected as follows:—

(i) To recipients of pensions, Vouchers will be posted from the Department.

(ii) To recipients of unemployment assistance, home assistance, disabled persons (maintenance) allowance and infectious diseases (maintenance) allowance: Vouchers will either be posted or given to the recipients in the same manner as the maintenance allowance.

No special application for vouchers is necessary.

Vouchers in respect of the months July-December 1973 will be issued in due course. Persons in category (i) above will receive books of vouchers for these months.

4. CONDITIONS

The conditions under which vouchers are issued and accepted are printed on the front of each voucher. Any breach of these conditions will disqualify the person concerned for receipt of further vouchers.

5. SPECIAL NOTE FOR RETAILERS

Retailers who sell butter in exchange for vouchers should send the vouchers to their butter suppliers to receive credit for the price reductions allowed to their customers. This should be done as soon as possible after the month following that printed on the vouchers. Vouchers for each month should be forwarded separately and should be accompanied by a written declaration to the effect that the vouchers concerned were accepted solely in relation to the purchase of butter. A special form (B.S.I) is being distributed through creameries for this purpose.

The vouchers will be returned to the issuing Department by the creameries, who will receive payment of the subsidy from the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Vouchers will be printed on special tinted paper, a different tint being used in respect of each of the three issuing Departments: Social Welfare — yellow/magenta; Health — blue/magenta and Defence — green/magenta. The June vouchers will be roughly the size of a children's allowance order and, for technical reasons, vouchers in respect of future months may be half this size.

In their own interests, retailers are advised to cancel used vouchers with a stamp or otherwise.

6. DURATION OF THE SCHEME

This scheme is temporary but will continue at least until the end of December 1973.

7. ENQUIRIES

Any enquiry regarding non-receipt of vouchers etc. in individual cases should be addressed to the office responsible for the social assistance payment being received by the person concerned.

Learn the rules and swim in safety

The Irish Water Safety Association are holding a water safety week in the Swimming Pool, Dungarvan, from July 2nd to 7th inclusive. Courses will be conducted each day at 11.00 a.m., 3.30 p.m. and 7.00 p.m. by qualified instructors from the aforementioned association. There is a subscription of 25p for a full week.

In Ireland every year, approximately 140 persons are drowned. The greater percentage of the drowning accidents occur during the summer months when sea-sides, rivers and lakes are frequented by day trippers and holiday makers. Every person who seeks recreation in water should, at least, know and practice the basic water safety rules, thereby guaranteeing his own personal safety. Rules for swimmers while not exhaustive should be followed by those who wish to swim in safety. Parents should see to it that their children are aware of the rules and they should be reminded of them when they inform the parent they are going swimming.

ing the sixties better progress was made and eventually a major decision was taken in 1970 to change not only the firm's traditional selling policy, but to create a younger fresher image more in tune with the seventies.

This change of policy has been remarkably successful, resulting in a rate of growth in recent years which is over twice the national average for Department Stores. This level of performance has been achieved by improvements in efficiency and in productivity which are exceptional — even if overdue.

The following is an interview with Victor Haddens, Managing Director of Haddens Department Stores.

- Q.** Mr. Haddens, your family firm is now in business for 125 years, what bearing has this on your attitude towards the future?
- A.** Your question reminds me of a comment which was once made by the Managing Director of Messrs. J. Wedgwood & Sons Ltd., of world wide fame. He said that being at the head of a family firm "helped one to take a long term view." Haddens have for a long time been taking a long term view and my attitude is that they will take a long term view for a long time.
- Q.** Your management is now moving into a fifth generation in the same family. This seems unusual and quite an achievement.
- A.** Yes — because there is a well known cycle in family businesses. The founder builds up and expands a new enterprise by his personality and flair. His son lacks the flair but has enough patience to carry on. But his grandson has neither the patience nor flair and he sells it up. This is a notorious pattern in family firms. — but we in Haddens seem to have the patience at least to carry on carrying on.
- Q.** What Particular aspects of your Company do you think have contributed to long term success?
- A.** I am not sure that I am the best person to make a judgement, but in my personal view I think there are two. In the first place no firm can continue long in business unless it looks after its customers. When so many retail stores are now turning to self-service and no service, and other are completely indifferent as to whether they in fact give service or not, I think it is more important than ever in our type of retailing to have good customer relations. I would not suggest that our standards have achieved the ultimate perfection — but at least we do have standards, and all our staff are constantly encouraged to achieve them.
- Q.** How have you in fact succeeded in establishing your reputation for good customer service?
- A.** For 25 years we have maintained a consistent policy of recruiting the best trainees we can find, training them as fast as we can and promoting them as soon as we can. We are proud of our staff, and, like our management, we hope they are steadily improving all the time.
- Q.** Do you operate a Staff Training Scheme?
- A.** Yes, very much so — in all departments in our three branches. As a matter of fact we have a Staff Incentive Scheme under which each trainee is actually paid — not on a minimum rate graduated to year of experience — but on actual performance and merit, one inferior compared with another. And in this process, in making our comparisons, the standard of personal service given to customers is evaluated

and assessed at regular intervals.

- Q.** You mentioned that there was a second factor in your success?
- A.** Well if there is, then I am quite sure sure that our recent breakthrough has been based on a high standard of management information. The general public is aware that there has been a revolution in retailing during the years. But the general public is not aware that retailing has become a very sophisticated occupation. So much so that the most important man in retailing now, is the Management Accountant. Firms can fail or prosper depending entirely on their competence in this sphere.
- Q.** Surely that is rather an exaggeration when all you have to do is buy in at one price and sell out at another?
- A.** Yes, it seems very elementary doesn't it? But in 1973 already we have had the impact of two different wage rounds and an upward adjustment in VAT — all three likely to increase costs by about 30 per cent — and then the customer wonders why prices are going up. But it is not even as simple as that. Take the big supermarkets, for example, — by and large, despite the notorious rise in prices on the one hand and the well publicised Loss Leaders on the other, — week in week out most of them are operating on a nett margin of about 1 per cent of sales. One per cent of sales is a knife edge and the gap between profits and losses is minimal. In fact there is evidence that some at least of the best known groups are heading for a loss situation at present. In this sort of cut-throat competition — and that is what retailing is all about — the key man in the Boardroom is the Management Accountant.
- Q.** But does this apply to Department Stores?
- A.** Perhaps not quite in the same way. The nett margin may be broader but the return on capital employed is likely to be less than in a well managed supermarket operation. With us the problem is different. For example the typical Department Store can have ten departments and make profit in six and a loss in four (which may be all right), or a loss in six and a profit in four — without knowing it — which is not all right.
- Q.** Again that sounds like an exaggeration?
- A.** Well, obviously they can only know one way or the other if they have a first class management accountant to keep them in touch with what is happening at each counter. And such men are few and far between. I doubt if there is any Department Store in Ireland which has yet done any serious research on a departmental costing of our two wage rounds in 1973 plus the higher rate of VAT at 19.5 per cent. And when they do, they will do what is commonly called "a double take."
- Q.** Where do Haddens stand in this sort of league?
- A.** Well, of one thing I am sure — old and all as we are in the business of retailing, we are still able to learn from our mistakes. And this applies particularly in the Management Accounting sphere. Certainly we are doing things this year we could have done last year. And one of them is to control departments on the basis of projected costings.
- Q.** Will this result in higher profits?
- A.** I am very hopeful that — as usual taking a long term view — it will result both in lower prices and also in higher profits?

Inland Waterway Tourist Attraction

During the discussion on the proposed new Commuter road for Dungarvan at last meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. R. A. Walsh, Vice-Chairman raised a very interesting point. Mr. Walsh said that he hoped the Council would bear in mind when constructing the new causeway, the possibility of holding the water no river from the point where the new bridge would be situated. This Mr. Walsh concluded would give us a permanent lake for boating etc.

In an interview with our reporter, Mr. Walsh elaborated on his idea. He said that for many years he has been advocating the tremendous tourist attraction an inland stretch of sheltered water would be. To his mind the stretch of water from the present Causeway to what used to be known as the Red Bridge at Ballynety would be unequalled in Ireland if it were suitably developed. With the wide road running through Shandon and the possibility of another road on the opposite bank along with the development of Pinewood Estate the accessibility of this lake would be unequalled anywhere.

With the proposed construction of the bre-pass, Mr. Walsh thinks the Co. Engineer should carefully examine the potentialities touristwise of this great natural attraction. Everytime I mention this, Mr. Walsh continued, I have been told that it would cost too much but I am not at all satisfied on this point for, two main reasons: (a) As yet nobody has made any attempt to draw up and examine a plan in detail and make an estimate as to how much it would cost, and (b) exactly how much is too much? As the new Causeway will have to be of sufficient strength to take truck loads of over 50 tons it should not require much more to hold back water of a depth of five or six feet.

The potential of such an inland waterway apart from its scenic beauty is staggering in its scope if fully developed. Consider the wonderful outlets for our youth, Mr. Walsh continued, they could

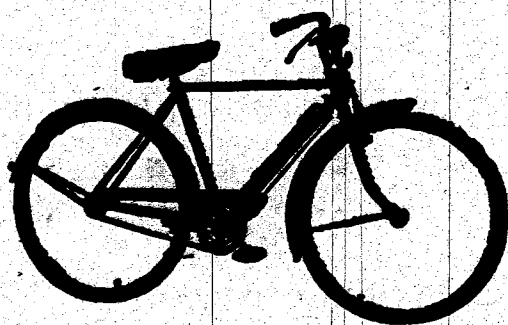

TREATMENT FOR CONTROLLED BREEDING OF SHEEP
