JOHN HUME TO VISIT DUNGARVAN

"Contemporary non-violent movements" will be the subject of a lecture to be delivered by John Hume, Derry, as part of the 21st annual summer school of the Social Study Conference to be held at St. Augustine's College, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, from August 4th to August 11th, 1973. Participation is multidimensional.

THE 1973 THEME

The theme of this year's conference is "The Christian Society and Violence." Can a Christian fight for justice without using violent methods? Are the Irish an aggressive race? Has history moulded the Irish Christian towards violence? Can justice and charity be practised in our society without the use of violence? These and other aspects of the theme, with be dealt with in lecture, panel and group discussions during that week. It is hoped that the school will stimulate ideas on how the individual and Community groups can help towards peace with justice in our Christian society.

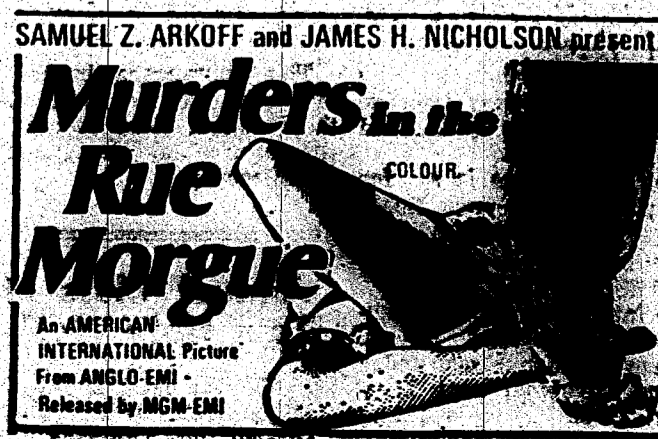
only solution to this problem is to introduce one-side parking.

Improvements in Social Welfare Benefits

The increases and other improvements in Social Welfare benefits announced in this year's Budget come into operation this week. The changes may affect you. Details are given below.

Increases in Benefits

If you are receiving a weekly benefit, pension or allowance from the Department of Social Welfare, your payments will be increased by the following amounts:

- £1.00 a week in your personal rate plus
- 50p. a week if you are being paid for an adult dependant plus
- 50p. a week for each child dependant included in your claim.

If you are an incapacitated old age pensioner receiving an allowance in respect of a relative who is providing you with full time care and attention, you will be paid an increase of 50p. in that allowance.

HIGHER INCREASES APPLY IN THESE CASES

1. If you are in receipt of a widow's pension or a deserted wife's allowance, you will receive an additional 15p. per child making a total of 65p. increase per child in your case.
2. If you are in receipt of either a retirement pension or an old age (contributory) pension which includes an allowance for an adult dependant aged 69 years or more, you will receive a further increase of 50p. making a total of £1.00 increase for this dependant.
3. If you are in receipt of a non-contributory old age pension, a widow's non-contributory pension or a deserted wife's allowance which is reduced on account of your means you will receive more than the increase shown above due to the substantial easing of the means test.
4. If you are receiving the monthly children's allowance, you will receive an extra £1.50 a month for each child under 16.

IS IT NECESSARY TO APPLY FOR THE INCREASES?

There is no need to apply for the increases; they will be paid automatically.

Every effort is being made to pay the increases to all by the beginning of July, 1973. It may not be possible, however, to do this because of the large numbers involved but if your increases are delayed they will still apply from the first pay day in July, 1973.

Were you refused a pension because of your means?

The means test for widows (non-contributory) pension, deserted wife's allowance and old age (non-contributory) pension is being substantially relaxed from the beginning of July 1973. From that date you can have up to £4.00 a week and qualify for the full pension or allowance, if you have more than £4.00 but not more than £9.50 a week, you can qualify for a reduced rate. If you have children, you can have even higher means and still qualify.

YOU SHOULD RE-APPLY NOW IF YOU THINK YOU WILL QUALIFY AS A RESULT OF THIS CHANGE

Have you children between 16 and 18 years age?

If you have children over 16 and under 18 years who are at school or college or who are apprenticed or permanently incapacitated you will be eligible for children's allowances for them from 3rd July, 1973. You should claim for them now on the special form which is available at all Post Offices.

Are you aged 69?

Old Age Pension: At age 69 you may be entitled, from 6th July, 1973, to old age pension — contributory, if you have sufficient stamps and non-contributory if you have not. The new weekly maximum rates are £7.20 for contributory and £6.15 for non-contributory.

If you are now aged 69 apply immediately. If you will not reach 69 for some time, remember to apply early — four months in advance for the non-contributory pension, three months in advance for the contributory pension. You can get the appropriate claim form at any Post Office.

Note: Disability benefit, unemployment benefit, unemployment assistance, widow's (non-contributory) pension and deserted wife's allowance will all cease to be payable at age 69. If you are in receipt of one of these payments as a 69 year-old on 6th July 1973, your payment will be continued for a short time to enable your old age pension claim to be decided. Free Travel: At age 69 everyone will be eligible from 1st July 1973, for free travel (on C.I.E. services, mainly) under a scheme administered by the Department of Social Welfare. You need not make special application under the free travel scheme if you are

now receiving or if you qualify for any pension from the Department. An authorisation for free travel will be affixed to your pension book.

If you are not qualified for a pension from the Department, you can still avail of the free travel facility but you must obtain a travel card. The necessary application forms are available at all Post Offices.

Free Electricity: At age 69, you may qualify for a free electricity allowance if you are receiving a pension from the Department of Social Welfare, from the British Department of Health and Social Security or from the Northern Ireland Ministry of Social Services. Further particulars and application forms are available at all Post Offices.

Free Television Licence: If you qualify for the free electricity allowance you can obtain a free television licence at any Post Office.

Are you a deserted wife?

From 5th July 1973, a deserted wife may be paid a deserted wife's benefit instead of a deserted wife's allowance, if either her husband's or her own insurance under the Social Welfare Acts meets the required standard. Unlike the deserted wife's allowance, the new deserted wife's benefit will not be means tested. A recipient of deserted wife's benefit may have an income from employment or any other source without affecting her right to the new benefit. The maximum rates of the new benefit are as follows: —

- £6.60 a week personal rate plus
- £2.15 a week for each child dependant.

Further particulars and application forms may be obtained from the Department of Social Welfare, Phibsboro Tower, Dublin 7.

If you think you might qualify for the new deserted wife's benefit, you should apply immediately to the Department.

The deserted wife's allowance will continue to be payable to the deserted wife who does not qualify for the benefit.

Are you an unmarried mother?

If you are an unmarried mother, you may be entitled to a new weekly allowance, from the 5th July 1973, (in addition to the monthly children's allowance) if you have at least one child dependant under 18 years (21 years if school-going).

AMOUNT OF THE NEW ALLOWANCE

The maximum rates of allowance will be as follows:

- mother with one child £8.15 a week
- mother with more than one child £2.00 a week extra for each additional child.

WHO WILL RECEIVE THE MAXIMUM ALLOWANCE?

You can have up to £4.00 a week and receive the maximum allowance. If you have more than £4.00 but not more than £11.50 a week you can qualify for a reduced allowance. If you have more than one child you can have even higher means and still qualify.

HOW TO CLAIM?

Further particulars and application forms are available from the Department of Social Welfare, Phibsboro Tower, Dublin 7. If you have already written, a claim form will be issued to you without further application.

Are you a woman normally employed in private domestic service or in agriculture?

If you are, you will be entitled to claim unemployment benefit under the same conditions as other women from 2nd July, 1973. The ten-year insurance test for unemployment benefit which has applied to you up to now is being abolished from that date.

Changes affecting insurance contributions

Higher rates of employment contributions, as advertised in last weeks issue, apply from 2nd July, 1973.

As a consequence of the reduction of pensionable age, persons aged 69 years (and over) who are employed will be insurable only at the special rate covering occupational injuries and health services.

A woman receiving a widow's pension, a deserted wife's allowance or an unmarried mother's allowance from the Department of Social Welfare will not be liable, from 2nd July, 1973, for deduction from earnings in respect of employment contributions. The employer, in such cases, must continue to stamp an insurance card, but at a special rate equal to his share of the normal contributions. In order to benefit from this change, a woman who is affected by it should make it known to her employer that she is receiving one of the payments mentioned.

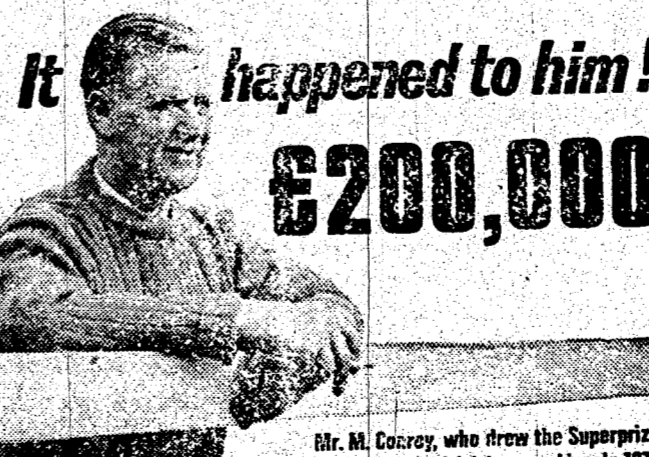

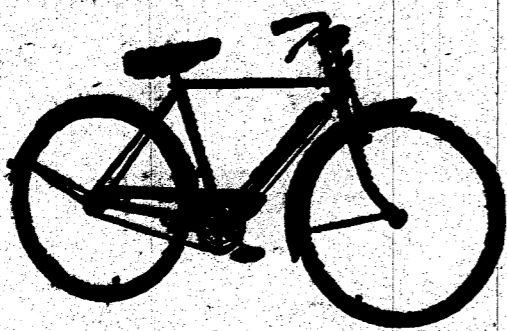

I.F.A. NEWS

The following joint statement was issued by the Irish Farmers' Association and the Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers Association:

"Agreement has been reached between the President of the Irish Farmers' Association Mr. T. J. Maher, and the President of the Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers Association, Mr. James O'Keefe, on a formula for the joint participation of their two organisations in COPA and in European affairs generally. Proposals will be put simultaneously for approval to their respective National Councils shortly.

MR. MAHER'S ADDRESS

Mr. Maher in his presidential address said: "The main reason why we in the I.F.A. favoured Irelan's entry into the EEC was that we believed that the Community's Common Agricultural Policy would offer significant benefits to the Irish farmers and through them, to the Irish economy and the Irish people generally. In the six months since Ireland actually became a member, we have had ample confirmation that our beliefs were well founded. An example of the effects of Common Market membership is the increase in stock numbers. Even though we are only six months in, there is a definite indication that there is an upswing in stock numbers and we are poised for even greater things. We know that in the past the CAP has had its critics and these critics have just been recently going through one of their most vocal periods. We know also that within the original 'Six' the OAF had not by any means solved all of the problems of agriculture and that there are still serious difficulties to overcome, particularly in regard to farm income.

The two main threats to the future existence of the CAP as it stands are: 1. Surpluses and problems associated with their disposal and 2. Cost of operating the system.

On the question of surplus it must be understood that in order to have the market adequately supplied, surplus is necessary. There must be surplus in order that the market is not short and so,

therefore, we must live with surplus as a necessary part of the marketing management. It is also true that if each country were acting independently, that is outside the common market, there would likely be surpluses in each of these countries as was the case in the past. Each in sum-total would not necessarily be less than the present surplus in the Community as a whole.

It should be recognised also, the line between surplus and shortage is a very thin one indeed and a natural phenomenon, for instance drought, in one part of the Community could radically change the situation in a short time. It would be impossible at this time to assess the effects of the scheme in the conversion of dairy cows to beef within the Community as a whole. Hopefully, the scheme will have a positive impact on milk production as a whole within the Community. I believe also that the Community Authorities do not demonstrate sufficient urgency in getting rid of surplus stocks before they reach unmanageable proportions and so giving rise to criticisms which are not entirely justified. On the cost side it should be understood that the total cost to the Community of operating the entire CAP is less than one per cent of the gross national product of the Community as a whole. This, I believe, puts into better perspective the situation in agriculture vis-a-vis their economic activities within the Community. It should be understood also that were it not for the existence of the CAP that the demands on the Community in terms of taking account of the social and economic needs of the farmers in the various countries could be far greater than is presently being demanded under CAP.

Furthermore, the much publicised cost of food is in many cases not directly the result of the operation of a Common Agricultural Policy, but rather is caused by the shortage of these products at world level. Indeed it could be argued that were it not for the existence of a protective system like CAP within the Community, giving rise

as it does to increased production, that these food prices would be very much higher than they now are. In the year 1970, the proportion of total income devoted to food amounted to less than 30 per cent on average in the nine countries of the Community and this percentage is on the decrease.

It is true also that the farmer gets an ever-declining proportion of the total price the consumer pays for food. This is so because of the rapidly escalating costs of the handling and the processing and distribution of food products outside the farm gate. In fact, over the Community of nine countries the proportional benefit to the farmer of the price the consumer pays for food is approximately one-third.

In this context I would strongly urge that research be carried out in all nine countries so that the exact position can be determined and solutions proposed so that the farmer will get an equitable price and at the same time the consumer will get his food at the lowest cost. The Ministers of Agriculture of the EEC have agreed to hold a review of the CAP in October next. In this connection, the stated intentions so far are that the basic principles of the CAP — common prices, common financing and free movement of goods — will not be called into question but that an examination of the instruments of the CAP will be carried out in order to see if it is possible, to make it work in a more efficient and equitable way.

This of course, can mean many things and both we and our Government must be on guard — to ensure that no dilution of the guarantees which the CAP offers to our farmers is brought about.

"From our point of view, two important exceptions are the sheep and potato sectors. Both of these are areas of considerable importance to Irish farmers and the question of their inclusion within the scope of the CAP is one which we can legitimately put forward in the context of a review. These matters have already been under examination by COPA for some time now and I.F.A. has been and will continue to be, closely involved in this work. On the domestic side in spite of all that has been said by the previous Government, and indeed by many other people concerned with the development of regions within this country, it is clear at this stage that we still have no regional policy that is national in character. This is a discrepancy in our overall economic policy that we cannot afford and I would now most strongly urge the present Government to lose no time in setting the evolution of this policy on foot. It could begin to give this movement impetus by the decision, without much further delay, to establish a Government Section headed by a Minister with special responsibility for the direction of regional affairs. I recommend this in light of the fact that few countries within the Community have proportionately as much to gain from a well-developed and well balanced regional policy as has Ireland, and while it is true that a lot of useful work is being done by many people at many levels, that work lacks overall co-ordination in a national sense. This would be one way to convert the negative approach of those who continue to talk about the so-called dying areas of our country into positive action, to enable the peoples of these territories to find their rightful place within the national development programme. We welcome the decision to establish the National Economic Council with full farmer participation as an Advisory Body to Government. This Council should help in a real way in the evolution of a well balanced overall economic policy, and should also enable the various segments of society here to a better understanding of the situation and the difficulties existing in other sectors.

Retail Prices (Food) Display Order, 1973

The Minister for Industry and Commerce has made an Order under the Prices Acts, 1958 to 1972, entitled the Retail Prices (Food) Display Order, 1973. The order comes into effect on June 29, 1973.

From June 29, 1973, every person who carries on in the State the business of selling by retail any commodity mentioned in the Schedule below shall exhibit a notice at the shop, vehicle or other place where the business is carried on. The notice shall specify every commodity mentioned in the Schedule which is on sale at the shop, vehicle or other place, together with the retail price being charged for each such commodity in respect of the number or unit of weight specified in the Schedule for the commodity.

A notice exhibited pursuant to the Order shall:

- if it is at a shop, be in such a position as to be clearly visible and easily accessible to all persons frequenting the shop before or immediately after entering the shop, and
- if it is at a vehicle or other place, be in such a position as to be clearly visible and easily accessible to all persons in the immediate vicinity of the vehicle or other place, as the case may be.

A notice exhibited pursuant to the Order shall be in such form as to be capable of being easily read by all persons frequenting the shop, vehicle or other place at which it is so exhibited, and the letters and figures on the notice shall be at least three millimetres in height and of proportionate width.

It was Waterford's night in gay London. The lights were turned on at the International Town Hall at Camden Borough to welcome the many hundreds of gaeles across London, to the renowned hotel at Parkway. "The Dublin Castle" overlooking the gateway to the north west.

Like the old days of London pagentry procession, the gaeles from Waterford with friends from Cork, Dublin, Tipperary, Kerry, Limerick and Wexford gave a new face to the night life of the "Dublin Castle", where national artists and poets, T.V. stars and leading figures in political life associated with the Emerald Isle, place their name on the Golden Bound Book, with the ancient quill pen.

This was the outstanding social of the year, organised by Waterford Emigrants who in the past year have advanced up the charts of Irish associations with rapidity and glory.

We do feel grateful to the Abbeyside in London for over 35 years, for the much veteran hurler who has been with the gaeles enjoyed entertainment and night show with a mixture of Irish Dancing, Mr. Mick Morrissey.

Seldom in Irish circles have I witnessed such a happy family, from the town of Waterford, Cappoquin, Tramore, the holy light and inspirations of the "Rock of Cashel" in Tipperary, with a sprinkle of Shannonsiders from Killaloe, Limerick city, and the principal town of county Clare down to Ennistymon, near the world's famous Spa and Springs.

With the gay company of some journalists from Kingscross, Camden Town and Kilburn, where there are no less than 25,000 Irish emigrants, we joined the high lights of the Waterford emigrants for this first-class social gathering.

It has been a rather unique assembly, with Germans, French and Dutch visitors to the Dublin Castle. Meeting such veterans as Pat Cahill (Dungarvan) Executive member and his charming wife, Mick Noonan, a former County Waterford senior All-Ireland hurler and the "Angel" himself, Mick Morrissey, the Abbeyside King, who greeted the guests one by one at the main entrance. He must have handshaken at the "Golden Gates" as many friends as the late Lord Mayor of Dublin Alfie Byrne, when as Lord Mayor of the Capital, at a Mansion Banquet.

Mick Morrissey told me that the "Rise of the Emigrants" was due to the catering for the working class and in general the emigrant man or woman who visited London from all Parishes in Co. Waterford, were neglected and looked after in a homely and friendly fashion. Down the years we have fought this middle class front of Tall Hats and Dress Suits hired out for the night by people who tried to put a false front. The folk from rural areas and towns were a happy go lucky people and no one wished to relive the stage Irishman. Too long he stated Waterford suffered from memories and realities soaked in the chapters of Waterford history and evictions and down trodden folk, who had to emigrate to U.S.A., Canada and Australia.

In late years over the span of 1930 and upwards the new generation sought a better living and social life, coming to seek a new career in neighbouring Britain, where good wages and conditions awaited the mixed grades.

On this score he stated Waterford people in London should realise the importance of joining their own class movement. Not to sit on the "fence" and wait for other to move on the draught board. The many hundreds of people with whom I passed a word with were in deep praise for the good work Waterford gaeles were doing for the traditional county. The life-line of industry and Agriculture was measured in the great attendance and their is every evidence that larger membership is in plans and schemes for this 1973 season.

Over the hour Affane fully deserved their hard earned victory and with this win behind them they are certain to make a bold bid to reach the county final.

Peter Hackett kept his net intact. Michael Phelan, Lar Denn and John Coughlan came through a testing hour with reputations enhanced. Frankie McCarthy and Shamie Denn had good games in the half back line, where Danny Flynn was the rock on which many a Kill attack perished. The did reasonably well at centre-field. While Pat Denn, Paddy McGrath, Michael Hackett, Jim Joe Landers and Denis McCarthy were all seen in good effect in attack.

In truth, Kill were but a pale shadow of the great Kill teams of the past. In defence wing backs Tommy Hennessy and John Regan were in rare form.
