Not the type of letter one Authority sends to another

— Chairman

A letter from Lismore Town Commissioners described by Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman, as not the type of letter one public authority would send to another, at the July monthly meeting in Dungarvan.

The letter from the Town Clerk, Mr. Folland, stated that the Commissioners feel aggrieved at the attitude adopted by the County Council and in particular the Council representatives of the area concerning the provision of a public convenience.

The letter continued that the Commissioners are now fully convinced the so-called objections, which were never proved as valid and which according to a cutting from the "Sunday Press" of June 17th, would not be considered in law, should now be totally and completely rejected and toilets erected on original site and so prevent any further waste of ratepayers money.

Colr. H. R. Dowd said that the letter infers the local councillors did not take any

interest in the matter. However, he continued the reverse is quite true, as they took great interest in it and that they on two occasions met the Town Commissioners. This problem reverts to what it originally was, Colr. Dowd concluded and he suggested putting a notice at the proposed site, adjacent to the existing gent's toilet.

This proposal was seconded by Colr. D. Ahearn and approved of unanimously.

### Massive Expansion Plans for Waterford Port

Waterford Harbour Commissioners are planning a further development project at Waterford Harbour. The development will comprise an extension of the Frank Cassin wharf to provide for the steadily increasing throughput of contained traffic. Waterford County Council were told at its July monthly meeting in Dungarvan on Monday. The extension has been approved by the Minister for Transport and Power and is estimated to cost £340,000.

Waterford County Council are being asked by the Commissioners to act as guarantors for £100,000 of the total loan, the Secretary Mr Dowling said the other intended guarantors being Waterford Corporation (£100,000) and Kilkenny and Tipperary S.R. County Councils (£70,000 each).

Mr. Dowling went on to say that Waterford County Council has guaranteed £150,000 of the loan of £270,000 which was raised to finance harbour development work carried out in 1967/68 and has so far made payments on foot of that loan totalling £35,362. The Board considers it most unlikely that they will ever have to call on the guarantors to meet their commitments under the new loan for which a guarantee is now sought.

The Frank Cassin Wharf, which was the first specially built container wharf in Ireland, was originally erected in 1967/67 and designed for a throughput of 20,000 units per year by 1973. Last year the throughput was 31,500 units and is still increasing at the same rate. The wharf is now far too small to deal with present traffic and this has resulted in some of the present traffic having to be diverted to the south side, where it cannot be handled efficiently.

The Government is prepared to give a grant totalling £50,000 over the first few years to help meet renovation charges. Increased traffic and new charges on Bellferry will have made this project viable on its own by then.

That the Council act as guarantors, was proposed by Deputy W. Kennelly and seconded by Deputy Tom Kyrne and was approved unanimously.

## Ardmore Burial Problem

At the July monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan, the problem of acquiring a new burial ground in Ardmore was highlighted. Presently there are no further graves available in the Old Cemetery and consequently the provision of a new one is a matter of urgency. In December, 1971, Waterford County Council passed a motion that in future where the provision of new cemeteries would arise, the following conditions would obtain, that the parishioners purchase a suitable site, Waterford County Council would

then develop it and that the parishioners would then be responsible for its upkeep etc. Mr. J. G. Dowling, County Secretary, said that this policy has already been implemented in relation to the provision of additional cemetery space at Tramore and it is also intended to apply it to at least two other areas in the County, Clonea-Power and Ballinroad. Some time ago, Mr. Dowling continued, the Council considered the possibility of extending the burial ground at Ardmore but it was found that the adjoining land was not suitable for that purpose,

concluding that if the Council were to deviate from the present policy, at the request of the Ardmore Development Committee, it would be unfair to those areas who have already taken steps to provide their own burial grounds in accordance with the agreed policy.

In a communique to the Co. Secretary, Mr. John Cashman, Secretary of the Ardmore Development Committee, stated that the conditions (previously mentioned) impose an undue hardship on many a small rural community, especially since each parish had also to maintain and erect

This is especially true in Ardmore where the development in the area and where the County Council states that they cannot chase land for housing, even though no houses have been built for twenty years.

Many of the Councillors are opposed to the present policy concerning cemeteries, especially Colr. Michael Henry and Senator Austin Dowling, who are tabling a motion to have the policy re-examined and replaced with one which will allow the Council to purchase burial grounds for local communities.

### LOCAL PRIEST APPOINTED TO AMERICAN STATE RACE BOARD

We take the following from a recent issue of "The Gem State's Catholic Newspaper,"

BOISE—The Rev. Thomas C. Halpin, pastor of St. Frances X Cabrini Church, Meridian, was named a member of the Idaho Horse Racing Commission by Governor Cecil D. Andrus.

At the press conference Andrus made a special point of stating the commission is now controlled for the first time by his appointees.

He said he asked the commission "to undertake an investigation of the half-truths and innuendoes" surrounding the horse racing industry in Idaho. "If there is any truth at all to any unfavourable charges" he told the commission, "clean them up or recommend that horse racing be abolished in the State of Idaho."

The Governor made reference to rumours about a connection between the Mafia and Idaho horse racing. In referring to these rumours Fr. Halpin said "I think it would be of the very essence for the State of Idaho that this element not become involved."

"I feel that I can make a contribution to the horse breeding and horse racing industry in Idaho," Halpin said. "I am cognizant of its problems and aware of its potential. I hope to see the industry grow straight and tall."

In an interview with the "Idaho Register," Father Halpin emphasised that he was happy to have this opportunity to civic duty to the State. "I feel I have civic obligations as well as priestly ones," he said "and I think that this is a fine chance to serve the State. I thought long and hard before accepting the position."

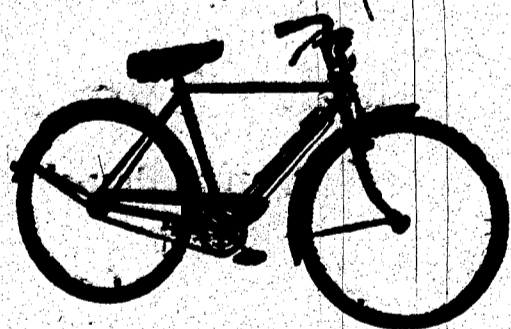

## I.F.A. VIEWS ON EXTRA MARTS

Most of the Western area of this country is well serviced by co-operatively owned livestock marts. Much concern is being expressed just now by farmers at the suggestion that a number of additional marts are to be set up in this area and controlled by a private company which is reputed to have an element of foreign ownership.

This was stated by Paddy Lane, Munster Vice-President of the Irish Farmers' Association, when he spoke at a South East Clare Regional meeting at Parteen, Clare Co-operative Marts in particular are providing a very good service to the farmers in the county. An additional mart now at Sixmilebridge, Co. Clare, controlled by this new company could jeopardise future development of this service, if Clare farmers were prepared to allow this to happen. I, for one, do not believe that such a threat to their own business will be taken lightly by the farmers of Clare, said Mr. Lane.

If this private mart does go ahead, the cost of running the mart and any profits that may be made by the owners, will eventually come out of the farmers' own pockets. Banking Groups will, no doubt be conscious of the implications of supporting this type of venture in competition with farmers' own business. Anything which might tend to introduce a note of acrimony into farmer/Bank relationships would be particularly inopportune at this juncture, when both must co-operate to the full in cashing in on our E.E.C. opportunities.

## ADVICE TO IRISH

### TOURISTS GOING TO IRON CURTAIN COUNTRIES

A special plea to holidaymakers from both sides of the Border who are going to holiday in Australia and Iron Curtain countries was made by the Irish Farmers' Association. Mr. Joe Bruton, Chairman of the I.F.A.'s National Livestock Committee, pointed out that there has been extensive outbreaks of Foot and Mouth Disease in Australia and most Iron Curtain countries, stretching from Yugoslavia to Poland over the past couple of months.

He said: "I appeal to all holidaymakers going to these countries to avoid contact with livestock farms, markets, meat factories etc. Furthermore, I would urge any group planning to make visits to farms in infected areas of Eastern Europe to postpone them for the present or re-arrange their itineraries to avoid danger areas."

He added that groups planning to visit farms, marts or creameries in Italy should also exercise the utmost caution. While there has been no outbreak of Foot and Mouth in Italy, he said there was a constant flow of livestock between Austria, Yugoslavia and Italy.

All persons entering Ireland from any European countries, including incoming tourists and returning Irish nationals, were strongly urged by I.F.A. to use the special disinfection facilities operated by the Department of Agriculture at sea and air ports, if they had any contact with livestock while on the Continent.

## SOYA BEAN MEAL

### SHORTAGE WORRIES POULTRY & PIG MEN

"The American ban on exports of soya bean meal, in view of possible shortages on the U.S. market, could seriously affect our poultry industry," said George McMeel, Chairman of the Irish Farmers' Association's National Poultry Committee, in a statement.

Mr. McMeel said: "Poultry are highly efficient converters of food, but in the present market circumstances, producers must be assured of the availability of adequately balanced compound food. Soya bean meal is a highly important constituent in compound foods - 91,000 tons valued at £4.5 million were imported in 1972 - and accounts for the major share of the protein value of compounds."

"I understand that the U.S. Trade Department has decided what quantities of soya bean meal can be exported and how much can be allocated to the various buyers. It is clear that, to the extent that soya bean meal availabilities are reduced, it will have to be replaced by other protein sources. The suitability of these sources for inclusion in poultry feeds should be immediately assessed."

"It is clear, however, that the use of such sources will bring about a deterioration in food conversion rates in poultry flocks. This in turn will give rise to extra costs to producers, for which they must be adequately recompensed." Mr. McMeel added: "Failure to allow producers to recoup these extra costs could have only the most damaging consequences for the industry as a whole."

# Over 2,000 Entries for Dublin Horse Show

ENTRIES for the R.D.S. Horse Show (7th to 12th August) have just closed and are one of the highest ever. At 2,075 the main increases are in the young horse and brood mare classes. The total entry shows an increase of over 250 on last year's figure.

The increase in the young horse and brood mare classes in a most encouraging one for the horse industry in Ireland. It is in these classes that the increase is greatest. The young horse entry is up by 97 and the brood mares and foals by 28.

Most categories of horses and ponies are up by varying amounts. There is a small increase in the invitation Draught Mare classes. Children's ponies show a substantial increase but there is a small drop in the connemara pony entry.

The entries for the donkey classes, introduced so successfully last year also show an increase. The total over 100 and with some foals not yet born this will probably mean even more by Show time. One of the problems facing the R.D.S. is stabling space and a consequent reduction in the number of night boxes available. If available these will only be allotted to the most deserving cases and some exhibitors will have to be disappointed.

In the international jumping competitions,

six nations will be represented by full teams. Italy, the Netherlands, Germany, France, Britain and Ireland have all accepted invitations to compete.

The details of riders and horses do not have to be declared until late in July. It is expected that Col. D'Ince, the elder of the brothers, will be on the Italian team with his most famous bred Easter Light, with which he won four competitions at Rome, including the Grand Prix and the Championship. Rated one of the world's finest horsemen, he has not competed at Dublin since 1968. His best horses over the years have, with one exception, been Irish bred. They included the Rock, Sumbard, Ballyblack and now Easter Light and Red Fox which was a winner of a hunter class in Dublin. The booking of stands seats for the jumping competitions is good, but there are still seats available for every day of the Show. Ticket sales to Holland and Switzerland are higher this year than previously, which is in line with the general improvement in the horse trade with these countries. Within the last week there were three phone calls from Switzerland booking extra seats. Application for tickets should be made to the Ticket Reservation Office, R.D.S., Ballsbridge, Dublin 4.

It was a great week-end on the athletic front for the Treacy family of Villierstown, with Ray winning his first individual All-Ireland gold medal, at Claremorris. John won the Munster 1,500 and 3,000 titles at Fermoy while Elizabeth collected the bronze medal in the girls 3,000 metres also at Fermoy. Sunday, July 8th will be a date which Ray Treacy will always remember, as it marked his great break-through in winning the All-Ireland junior 3,000 metres title. To make his success all the sweeter he was not expected to take the title but in doing so he got just reward for his perseverance, being so often deprived of the highest honours in the past. On Saturday he broke the existing Munster record in the 1,500 metres when he had plenty to spare over Der O'Leary of Cork and Michael Casey of Bally A.C. who came with a late burst to take the bronze medal. On Sunday he again broke the existing record in the 3,000 metres and this despite the fact that he had to run most of the race on his own as he soon opened up a long lead on all his rivals and so was never really extended. This was certainly a fine display by young Treacy to Munster juvenile athletics which he has graced so successfully over the past few years. Elizabeth Treacy also had her bit of glory on Saturday to prove that the female side of the Treacy family has talent also, when she collected the bronze medal in the 3,000

metres. The merit of her success should be gauged from the fact that for nearly the whole race she ran with one shoe as she lost the other one early on in the mad scramble to get a good start. It was no joke to run 3,000 metres minus a shoe on a hot day and so full marks to a gallant athlete for such a courageous display. On Sunday at Fermoy, Michael Casey and Pat Mooney of Bally A.C. had the tantalising experience of finishing 4th in their respective 800 metres races. In both cases, with a little bit of luck, should have collected bronze medals but such is the way and both can feel proud of their displays in such exalted company where the competition is so keen and the standard so high. In the U-16 shot Biddy Whelan of Bally A.C. gained some useful experience while the same could be said for the displays of Bernadette Pendergast, Kay Moloney, Patricia Pendergast and Mattie Moloney of St. Nicholas A.C.; Emer and Michael Culloo and young Twomey of Gael Oge A.C. who also had a team in the boy's U-14 relay.
