Problems over new Commuter road

An early difficulty has already arisen concerning the proposed by-pass road in Dungarvan, estimated to cost from £300,000 — £400,000. The proposed road will eliminate the necessity of heavy traffic on the Waterford/Cork Road from going through the centre of the town and thus relieve the congestion which is already affecting Dungarvan, disastrously. The present difficulty is a difference of opinion between the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Halley, B.E. and the Town Engineer, Mr. P. Walsh, B.E. as to the final link up of the by-pass with the main road.

The proposals already submitted by Mr. Hally to Dungarvan Urban District Council—who have the final say in the matter—provide for the commencement of the new road at Youghal Road with the final link-up at Crotty's Corner, Abbeyside.

However, Mr. Walsh is opposed to Mr. Hally's proposed final link-up with the main road. An alternative route suggested by him, provides for the final link up with the main road at Boherwillin, which is farther out than is proposed by the County Engineer.

Mr. Walsh has said that if the County Engineer's pro-

posed route is accepted, practically no suitable land for housing to cope with future needs will be available. However, if his proposals are accepted, there will be land available to build at least another 1,600 to 2,000 houses.

Mr. Hally disagrees with the proposals put forward by Mr. Walsh as he says that if the final link-up is at Boherwillin, the people of Abbeyside travelling to work at the Waterford Glass Plant, will not avail of the road as they would if the entrance was at Crotty's Corner.

The decision as to which route will finally be accepted lies with Dungarvan

Urban District Council and must be conveyed to Waterford County Council by mid-October. It is expected to commence work on the new commuter road next year. However, it will take up to five years to fully complete it.

Fr. Twomey's Road Controversy

The condition of Fr. Twomey's Road which has resulted in a rates with-hold threat from the residents, is to be attended to.

Mr. B. White, Acting Town Clerk, said at Monday night's Urban Council meeting that work would commence on the road in September.

Senator Austin Deasy stated he would ensure that the Co. Council would keep its word. However, the residents feel that work should commence straight away on the road as they say that if work doesn't start until September, it will take months to complete and then the situation would be as bad as it was last year.

HOUSING SCHEME AT RINGNASILLOGE REQUIRES A FURTHER £24,000

At last month's meeting, Dungarvan Urban District Council accepted a tender of £126,000 for the 30-house scheme at Ringnasillloge. However at this month's meeting on Monday last, Mr. B. White, Acting Town Clerk, asked the Council to raise a loan of £150,000 to finance the scheme, an increase of £24,000 and to meet any extras which might accrue.

Both Colr. D. Goode and Senator A. Deasy thought the extra amount staggering. Colr. Goode demanded a breakdown of the figure. Mr. White said provision was made in the loan for an

additional £6,000 to cover expected wage increases of £8,000; for the cost of the 4-acre site; £4,000 for architects fees; £2,000 for the clerk of works and £400 for legal fees which brings the cost of the scheme to an additional £20,000 and in order to be on the safe side, a £150,000 loan would be required.

The members agreed to the proposal unanimously. A sanction is expected within a few days. Deputy T. A. Kyne said it is hoped to commence work on it in the near future.

I.F.A./I.C.M.S.A. unanimous agreement on European Affairs group

Eleven point proposals for European involvement between the I.F.A. and the I.C.M.S.A. were presented by the Presidents of both Organisations to separate meetings of the two National Councils, who approved them unanimously.
The proposals are:
1. An I.F.A./I.C.M.S.A. European Affairs Co-ordinating Group shall be set up.
2. This Group shall be composed of representatives of I.F.A. and I.C.M.S.A. on the basis of 65 per cent I.F.A. membership and 35 per cent I.C.M.S.A. membership.
3. All matters in relation to European affairs will be dealt with by this group, for example:— approving delegates; briefing delegates and delegations; receiving and discussing reports from delegates and delegations to Brussels etc., and it will have the authority to make the decisions in relation to such business.
4. I.F.A. will be the member organisation of C.O.P.A. and that membership will acknowledge I.C.M.S.A. involvement.
5. The method of decision making will as far as possible be by discussion and consensus, and if necessary by a vote of the members. If a serious division develops which could threaten the existence of the Group, any section of the Presidents may intervene to reconcile the issue. The decision of the presidents would be final.
6. All expenses arising from any involvement in European Affairs agreed by the European Affairs Group shall be borne by I.F.A.
7. I.F.A. will make an agreed financial allocation to I.C.M.S.A. on a per annum basis. I.C.M.S.A. will use these funds as it may from time to time determine, including making a refund to any member who presently objects to contributing to the European Fund, this refunding to operate during the term of the initial agreement only.
8. In the context of this agreement I.C.M.S.A. will continue to derive its main income from its traditional source and will be free to adjust or re-arrange the twelfth month of its operation.

No agreement with French on Sheep and Lamb

The importance to Irish farmers of negotiating a special agreement for the export of our lambs to France, pending the introduction of a Common Agricultural Policy for sheep and lamb, was stressed by Mr. Larry Lenehan, Chairman of the Irish Farmers' Association's National Sheep Committee.
He welcomed the arrival in this country of three Senior French Servants, who will be having discussions with the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Mark Clinton, and officials from his department, on the whole situation concerning the export of Irish sheep and lamb to France.
The visit of the French Civil Servants followed lengthy discussions in Brussels and Luxembourg between Mr. Clinton and the French Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Chirac. During these discussions it was suggested by Mr. Clinton that the French Government might well consider approving a special agreement between the two countries for the exportation of Irish lamb pending the introduction of C.A.P.
Already the I.F.A. at meeting of the C.O.P.A.'s Sheep Working Group have stressed the importance of the introduction of C.A.P. for sheep and lamb to Irish farmers. Over the last eighteen months numerous discussions have also taken place in Dublin and Paris on this and the possibility of negotiating a special agreement in the interim period between I.F.A.'s National Sheep Committee and the French Farmers' Union Sheep Committee.
9. The Group shall have the necessary secretarial services and office facilities to enable it to function properly.
10. There will be reciprocal representation on the respective Councils of I.F.A. and I.C.M.S.A. on an agreed basis beginning in January 1974.
11. This agreement will be reviewed during the twelfth month of its operation.

Deep concern at the possible effects of the recent action taken by the U.S. Government to limit the export of soya bean was expressed to the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Clinton. 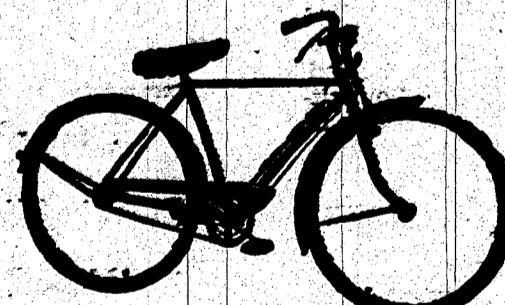

Demonstration on Farm Grain Storage

Over 120 farmers attended a very interesting demonstration on methods of storing grain, held on the farm of Mr. Robert Ahearne, Brenan, Stradally on Wednesday, 11th July. The demonstration was organised by the staff of the County Committee of Agriculture assisted by Mr. Brendan Cunney, of the Agricultural Institute, Oakpark, Carlow, who led the discussion afterwards in the local Community Hall.

It was clearly shown that grain can be safely stored directly off the combined harvester on the farm at costs varying from £1.50 to £2.50 per ton.

Mr. Brendan Cunney outlined two systems:

(1) Ventilated grain storage - the grain is aerated using a small fan and ventilating ducts.

(2) Proponic Acid - a preservative is applied to the grain using a special applicator.

With either method grain may be stored in bins or existing buildings.

If you are interested in storing grain either for feeding or for sale at a later date contact your local Agricultural Instructors for further details.

Poultry Producers Worried about EEC Regulations

Attempts by the E.E.C. Commission to put an end to the supply of fresh plucked poultry — New York dressed — within the Nine, is to be strongly opposed by COPA, the farmers' organisation of the Nine.

The I.F.A.'s National Poultry Committee will be leading the battle at a meeting in Brussels in September where they will have the support of delegates from the U.K., Denmark, Germany and France. Mr. George McMeel, Chairman of the I.F.A.'s National Poultry Committee, said in a statement that the regulations due to come into operation in three years time were inspired by the permanent Veterinary Committee of the E.E.C. Commission to safeguard the health of the Community.

The decision was taken without due consideration being given for the serious and unnecessary disruption of the European multi-million pound poultry industry. Between 20-25 per cent of the 24

million chicken flocks in the Nine are disposed of through fresh trade outlets. "There is very obviously a consumer demand for fresh poultry within the Nine and the trade must be assured of every assistance of meeting this demand," he added. Mr. Michael Dillon, Chairman of the I.F.A.'s Turkey Marketing Committee, said the abolition of N.Y.D. would have disastrous effects on our turkey industry as 70-80 per cent of the 850,000 national flock were produced for the N.Y.D. trade, particularly at Christmas. He warned that there are in the region of 12,000 turkey producers who are in a state of panic about their future. For our producers it would be economic suicide if N.Y.D. turkey trading is banned.

It would be clearly handing over the industry to a small number of commercialised concerns and this type of action cannot be condoned.

LATE MR. THOMAS SULLIVAN

He had returned for a holiday from U.S.A. To his sorrowing daughter, parents, brother, sister and other relatives we tender our deepest sympathy.

His remains were removed on Tuesday evening from Ardkeen Hospital to St. Declan's Church, Ardmore and were received by Rev. Fr. Lane and Fr. Egan, C.C., Ring.

Requiem mass was offered by Fr. O'Gorman, C.C., Ardmore, on Wednesday morning for the repose of his soul and

interment took place immediately afterwards to St. Declan's Cemetery.

Late Vocations

Fr. Columba Flanagan O. Carm is engaged in Late Vocation work at St. Mary's College, Aberystwyth, Wales. In recent years he has come to Ireland to explain what a late vocation College is all about.

Q. Are late vocations on the increase?
A. Speaking for St. Mary's College I am happy to say that our numbers are up this year. But you can never have too many priests, so I am doing my rounds in Ireland again.

Q. Is much known about late vocations?
A. Up to a few years ago the question was hardly discussed at all. This was because there was really no shortage. So there was no need to look beyond the young man just leaving school with good grades in his Leaving Certificate. Now that numbers have fallen more interest is being taken in older men. That is one point.

The second is the belief that the vocation of the future will be older. Say a man between 22-24 with a good white-collar job and with, of course, a sound secondary schooling, and examinations behind him. I find that many people think this is the kind of man for whom a Late Vocation College such as ours caters. But this is not so. As you see I am making a distinction between the vocation I have just described and the type who comes to a late vocation College.

Q. Well, what type does your late vocation College cater for?
A. Our students come from different social backgrounds but are mostly ordinary working-class men; artisans; tradesmen; soldiers; industrial workers; men from the land. What they have in common is an educational problem. They have had only a national or primary schooling and so are not equipped to start the study course for the priesthood.

This is where St. Mary's College comes in. We exist to give them a crash course — usually for two years — in basic subjects like English, some Latin, French, History etc. So when they leave us they are ready to start philosophy and theology. We give them the necessary groundwork. The College does not see them through all the way; it is not a short cut to the priesthood.

Q. Your are a Carmelite. Do most of your students enter your Order?
A. Oh no! They are for any diocese or Order. In fact most of them, say seventy per cent, choose the Secular priesthood. But let me hasten to say the Carmelite Order is only too pleased to accept suitable men.

Q. You are implying there are possible late vocations around. Why don't they come forward sooner, when they are younger?
A. Different reasons may apply in dif-

ferent cases. You may realise it, but the old idea of the "spoiled priest" dies hard. I have met it often. It may take the form of "What will the neighbours say if I don't succeed." for those who live in rural areas this can still be a real problem. Or sometimes there is the worry of giving up one's job. This is a valid point. Or perhaps a man may put off from year to year the idea of facing up to question until he finally thinks he has left it too late. Or, lastly he may worry about the financial side.

Q. So what about money? Is it a big problem?
A. Money is, I suppose, always a problem. But it is not so great that it cannot be overcome. In the College we have to charge fees as we receive no subsidies or grants. As this can be a worry for a possible student I would like to explain the position.

A diocese (English) or a religious order who send us a student usually looks after him if he cannot support himself. But what of the man who comes unadopted? And there are many such. He knows it will be many years before he can be a priest. He knows this will cost a great deal — a thousand pounds while he may not have a thousand new pence.

My answer is that lack of money is not ultimately an obstacle. To begin with if he is promising he can get himself adopted quite soon. Then there are societies which are prepared to help. Finally the College itself may be able to help. I know I have just said we receive no public grants. But we welcome those people who would like to act as sponsor or "God-parent" for a future priest. People are especially generous where the priesthood is concerned and send up gifts and donations.

Q. This age question which is implied in the word "Late vocation" — is it possible to be precise about it?
A. I don't think it is. Surely it is true that Christ can call at any age. Didn't the Apostles, the first priests, make up the first late vocation College. How old was Peter when he left his nets?

Q. A final question. What practical advice would you give a man who may be interested?
A. Don't keep putting off your decision. Do something. Don't be nervous about having a chat with a priest. He may be a Late Vocation himself. (In England 20% are). Or else he will know others who are. Or get in touch with me directly. You could write to me directly at the College, or, better still, you could come and see me in private when I come to Dublin during Christmas, Easter and Summer holidays. I stay with my sister at 21, Fortfield Drive, Terenure, Dublin 6. (Tel.: 906530).

BIG DROP IN PIG PRICES

The recent drop of up to £7 per pig is not justified, said Mr. George Rigg, Chairman of the I.F.A.'s National Pigs and Bacon Committee, in a statement. He said that while the Committee is perturbed at this tremendous drop in pig prices, they have been informed by the Pigs and Bacon Commission that it is a temporary one.

He pointed out that only 40 per cent of our pig meat output has been affected by the drop in U.K. pig meat prices and there has been only a marginal drop in Irish pig meat prices. He said: "I must point out that there has been no reduction in the price of pork or bacon to the consumer."

He added that the Pigs and Bacon Commission has told his Committee that the European market for pigmeat is good and prices for pigs should soon rise again, but that it is unlikely that prices will reach previous peak.

A very high standard is expected in these competitions, as all the competitors will have previously qualified in their respective counties. The local Comhaltas Craobh forms the backbone of the Fleadh Cheoil committee and they are aided by Donal De Barra, Reachtair na Mumhan, and the hard working Tipperary Co. Secretary Miss Brid Connan.
