## ALL SET FOR DUNGARVAN SHOW

On Thursday, 2nd August, the year's largest gathering of the agricultural community in the area will take place at the Dungarvan Agricultural Show where prizes totalling more than £1,400 are to be won, in addition to numerous Cups and special awards.

The pattern of the Show is too familiar to need elaboration to regular attenders but to those attending for the first time, it is worth noting that there is something for every taste — and not all is confined to those engaged commercially in agriculture; there are displays of flowers and fruit and vegetables decorative arrangements, jams, fruits, cake and pastries, home crafts of all descriptions and Art.

**SHOW JUMPING**  
Despite the weather, the Gaelic Field in which it is held by kind permission of the G.A.A. will be in its usual immaculate condition. That the course will be testing and imaginative may be taken as certain with this task in the hands of Capt. T. E. Morgan, one of the foremost designers in the country, whose services are sought by shows all over Europe.

The standard of jumping is sure to be high, with all the top riders using Dungarvan to put a final polish on their horses before the Royal Dublin Show the following week. Prizes are high and competition will be keen.

**HORSES**  
In this renowned horse-rearing area it is not surprising that prizes are valuable and the competition keen. In all there are twenty-one classes for horses this year. The principal class this year will be Class 9 for 3-year gelding or filly likely to make a hunter or huntress, the prizes being 1st, £50; 2nd, £20; 3rd, £10 and £5 for the breeder of the winner. This class has been sponsored by Mr. M. Parkhill and Mr. McEvoy; and Mr. P. J. Lynch sponsors Class 10 and 11.

An innovation at this year's Show will be a class for Stallions and a parade of them will take place in the afternoon. A young correspondent, more knowledgeable on horses than I am, recalls some of the great sires that have stood in the area: Golden Years, Nordlys, Whitsuntide, Raincheck, to mention but a few and some of the horses that have appeared in Dungarvan before going on to win prizes in Dublin and abroad. She instances Red Fox, Innis Cara, Magnificent Moments, Gone Away, Manhattan, Ambassador, Bellvue and Bells of Clonmel. Also the unforgettable Bula was bred in the area. She adds that some of the sires inferior to their predecessors. She must be right for this year Bord na Capall has added subsidies to the prizes in no less than six classes.

**CATTLE**  
These classes will take place as usual, at the Mart, where there are loading ramps, pens and a plentiful supply of water.

**SHEEP**  
Entries in this Section are confined to exhibitors from the Mountain areas of County Waterford and must have been grazed on the mountain and have been the bona fide property of the owner for at least three months prior to the show.

**DONKEYS**  
Three Donkey classes are featured this year. This animal, for so long the transport of the underprivileged and a seaside amusement for children,

has now been socially acceptable and even big business to breeders for export. **HORTICULTURE, CRAFTS, HANDICRAFTS AND ART** These classes have been well supported by entries, especially the flowers. With the great upsurge in gardening as a pastime, more and more people are fancying their chances and entries have been received from many who have never entered before — a very good sign of the prosperity and move to the aesthetic from the more functional by local residents.

Entries in the Crafts Section, which are judged the day before, are on sale on the day of the Show, and are often very good bargains, considering the quality of the workmanship.

**ORGANISATION**  
As usual, the officials and helpers are too numerous to mention individually, but all of them have given much time to the Show to enable us to enjoy ourselves. Chairman, Robin de Vere Hunt needs no introduction to horse lovers both in the hunting field and in the Show Ring. Secretary John Dwane has worked hard towards the success of the Show.

In charge of the home industries is, as usual, Mrs. Coward, who brings to the task both devotion and knowledge and gives unstintingly of her time. Whether the entrant has one jar of jam or thirty of forty flower and vegetable entries, Jessie treats them all with the same charm and efficiency.

The Home Industries Section will be held in a marquee in the field next to the Gaelic Field by kind permission of Miss Mary O'Neill. Entrants in the flower sections are advised to bring water with them and to have their exhibits arranged by 10 a.m.

**SHOW DANCE**  
After the Show, from 9 p.m. to 2 a.m. you can enjoy the music of Michael O'Callaghan and his Big Band at the C.S.M. Ballroom, Clonea, for the modest entrance fee of 50p. There will be a licensed bar run by Messrs. Thomas Power & Co. Ltd.

### GARDA STRENGTH CRITICISED

Colr. George Heskin at Waterford County Council annual general meeting said that the Garda Force is so understrength throughout West Waterford no great disservice would be done by disbanding it altogether. He revealed that for the past month the Garda Force in Tallow amounted to one member of the Force. The same has applied to Ballyduff for some time past. He continued that when the Force was first set up, Tallow had four Garda and a Sergt. while Lismore, which is presently understaffed had initially five gardai, a sergeant and a superintendent.

He referred to the recent announcements made by the Minister for Justice that fifty extra Gardai were to be assigned in Dublin. But what about Joe Soap down the country, he asked.

Referring to the annual visits of the Duke of Devonshire to his castle, he stated, that the place was always alive with Gardai for these visits, while, he added, if an ordinary citizen is robbed, there is no one around to investigate it.

The Council agreed to call on the Garda Commissioner to increase substantially the strength of the present Garda Force in West Waterford, as a matter of urgency.

The Minister for Justice is also to be called up to introduce corporal punishment for those convicted of offences involving violence.

### PLANNING CHAOS IN WATERFORD

Members of Waterford County Council have revealed that they are completely frustrated as to the way the Planning Act is being adhered to in the county. Foremost of those is Waterford T.D. W. Kenneally.

On June 1st, 1973, an order was made giving planning permission to Miss Marie Coleman, Tramore, for the erection of a front porch to a dwelling house at 3, Marine Terrace, while on the same date and on the same page of the County Manager's Orders, the County Solicitor, Mr. M. M. Halley, was instructed to institute immediate legal proceedings against Miss Coleman, in respect of unauthorised development of 3, Marine Terrace.

Kenneally commented on how frustrated he was in connection with the Planning Act, highlighting the aforementioned incident and demanded the legal interpretation from the County Solicitor, concluding that the public at large should know of the situation.

Mr. Halley stated that this was a case of having "jumped the gun". Permission had not been granted but the development had been carried out. Mr. Halley continued that in a case where planning permission has been granted, people can't start on any development for a period of 21 days to give anyone who may have objections a chance to do so.

Mr. C. O'Connell, County Manager, stated that when the application had been dealt with at local level, a

third party entered, an objector, who indicated development had been carried out without even an application or planning permission. The County Engineer then inspected the site and considered it as if no development had been carried out there and subsequently the planning permission was granted. However, when the third party was informed of this he lodged an objection with the Minister. This being the case, when an appeal is lodged the permission is automatically cancelled, therefore, Mr. O'Connell concluded the building was in breach of the Planning Act and the Council is prosecuting.

Mr. Halley, the County Council Solicitor, stated that there was no doubt about it but at the Council was correct.

Deputy Kenneally stated that the fact the building was erected in breach of the Planning Act was known since April and he asked why the order for breach of Planning and that granting Planning permission had been issued on the same date and why the former had taken so long.

Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman, asked if all this information had to be given at the present meeting to which the Deputy replied he wanted to get all the anomalies on this.

Following a heated argument, during which Deputy Kenneally threatened that from now on he would "flood this Council with Section 4." He also stated it sounded "screwy" that the

## Social Study Conference at St. Augustine's New College

The Christian Society and Violence' is the theme for the Social Study Conference's 21st annual summer school to be held at St. Augustine's College, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, from August 4th to 11th, '73. The Social Study Conference was founded in 1952 by a group of students of social science from all parts of the country. ## Educational Exhibit of Co. Committee of Agriculture at Show

Agricultural Section—Will highlight guidelines for the modern dairy farmer—

1.—Most profitable level of production.

2.—Better facilities on the farm—fencing, paddocks, roadway and water supply.

3.—Milk quality demanded by modern processing and diversification. Competition in the milk products market of the future will make higher standards vital.

4.—Better milking facilities in the milking shed and collecting yard. Easier cleaning of yard using pumps for washing and slurry disposal and new systems of milking machine washing.

Horticultural Section—The main emphasis at the Horticultural Stand in this year's Show will be on grading of fruit and vegetables. In the EDC, all fruit and vegetables must be graded to a common standard, these standards are based on quality and size. To most Irish growers this is a new requirement and will in the initial period cause some problems.

To help minimise these problems a wide range of fruit and vegetables graded to EDC standards will be on view at the stand and Advisers will be on hand to explain the standards required for each crop.

He continued by saying that it was a pity, as if a Leaving Certificate Course were not available their children do not want to attend school elsewhere.

Mrs. Walsh stated that it was a new school much needed in Kilmacthomas and considers it a shame that children cannot study for the Leaving Certificate there.

Mrs. Barron endorsing all that had been said by the previous speakers, said that she would not like to see former pupils of the school due to the unavailability of a senior cycle there, leaving home at 8.00 a.m. to travel to school and returning home again at 5.30 p.m. Mrs. Dunne added its unfair to expect children to change schools half way through their education as it is disturbing to them. The change from national school to post primary school is quite enough, she concluded. Mr. Lenihan revealed that he knew children who if they could not continue their education at Kilmacthomas would not continue at all. Mr. K. O'Rvan M.C.C. said that the entire committee supported the deputation and they would all love to see a senior cycle there.

The Chairman, Mr. P. Kenneally said that the Committee were aware of the need that exists in the area for a senior cycle and that they were 100% behind the deputation. He added that two deputations to the Department had failed. As the deputation withdrew he said that they would leave no stone unturned in their efforts to get a senior cycle for Kilmacthomas.

#### BURSTING AT SEAMS

Deputy W. Kenneally said it was a wellknown fact that the school was bursting at the seams and asked what the situation was.

C.E.O. Mr. D. Kelleher said that he had taken the matter up with the Department and that they had decided not to grant permission for a senior cycle there. Accommodation is adequate there, he continued, taking into account the number of prefabricated buildings there. Approximately 150 students leave the National Schools in the area each year but he concluded if there will only be a junior cycle available the parents will not be inclined to send their children to the Kilmacthomas school.

Deputy Kenneally demanded why permission had not been granted asking if the Department wanted to close the school down. Senator A. Deasy said it would be worth making a new approach to the Minister for Education.

The Chairman said that a figure of 400 was needed for a Senior Cycle, adding that the whole future of the school depended on a senior cycle.

The C.E.O. estimates the attendance for 1973/74 to be in excess of 200 pupils.

Mr. M. Hennebery M.C.C. said that it was a pity the senior cycle was not available there as it would have had effect on the attendance there as parents would be loath to sending their children if the school were to change schools during

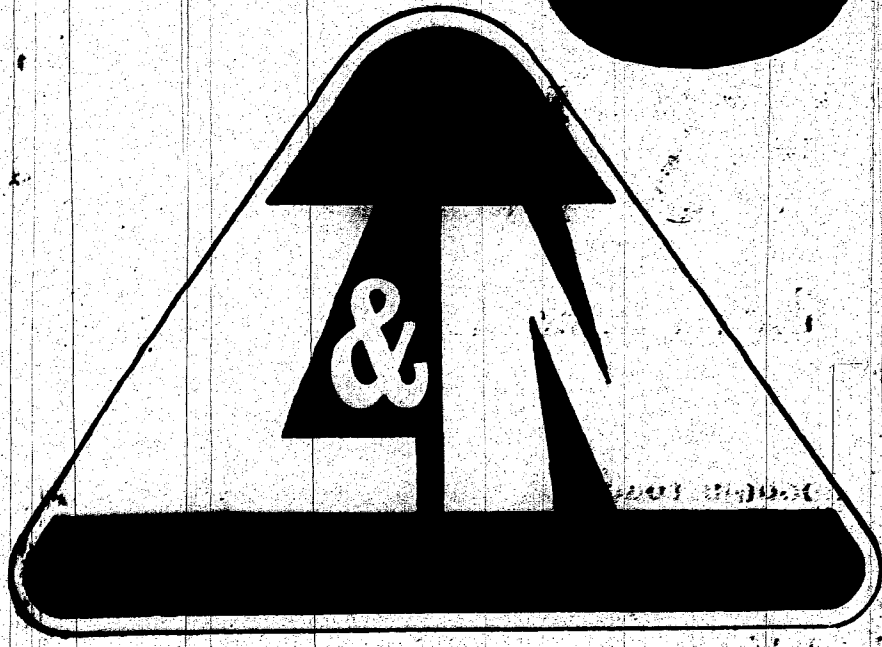

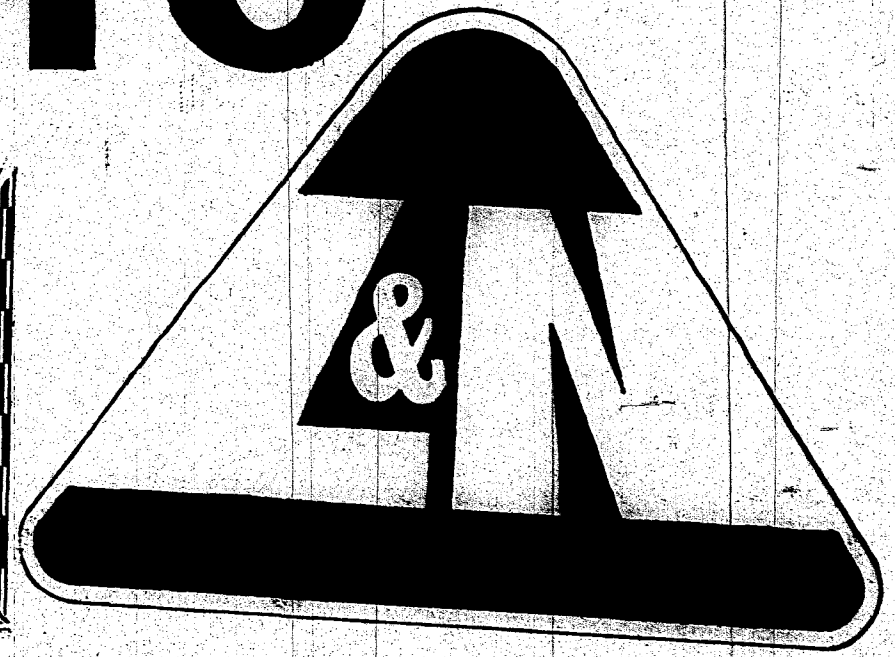

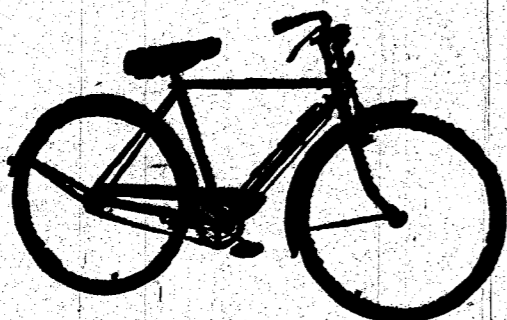

## Irish Sheepmen shocked by French decision

The latest decision made by the French Government to increase the threshold price and the levy on imports of lamb to the French Market comes as a shock and disappointment to all Irish sheep producers and creates further barriers to trade for Irish sheep exporters at the ultimate expense of the sheep farmer. So stated Mr. Larry Lenahan, Chairman, Irish Farmers' Association's National Sheep Committee.

The threshold price is being increased by 3p. per lb. from 49.8 pence per lb. to 52.8 pence per lb. at current exchange rates. The levy is being increased by a similar amount but because of the fact that the threshold price is also being increased the actual levy could be raised from its present level of 13 pence per lb. to 21.2 pence per lb., depending on current French average market prices. Indeed, it is expected that the French market price will not change this week and, therefore, the levy could be raised by as much as 8.2 pence per lb.

Mr. Lenahan said: "These new measures are certainly not in the spirit of the Rome Treaty and will have the effect of increasing the cost of entry to the Paris market and increasing the risk of closure of the French market at an early date because of the higher threshold price. The present French average market price is 12.53 francs per kilogramme and is only 0.33 francs per kilogramme above the threshold level."

"These latest moves indicate, only too clearly, the uncertainty of the present situation with regard to lamb exports and the urgency for a Common Market Organisation for sheepmeat within the Community of Nine. Indeed, the current position demands that the Irish Government and all other interested bodies must continue, in the strongest possible manner, to achieve, as soon as possible, a social arrangement for Irish lamb on the French market until a market regulation is implemented," he added.

## Farmers advised to market their stock in orderly manner

Irish cattle producers have been advised to continue marketing their stock in an orderly manner. The advice came from T. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers' Association. He said the decision of the Council of Ministers to increase the duties and levies on Irish cattle and beef, if the EEC reference price drops below 103 per cent of the guide price, was somewhat of

a disappointment as we had hoped that full duties would be put back against Third countries while this country and the U.K. would be left as we are at present on half duties.

However, he said, it is just possible that the decision of the Council of Ministers will sufficiently firm up the market price of cattle within the EEC so that the reversion to full duties may not take place at all. Once the average market price is above 103 per cent of the guide price again the halving of duties would automatically come back into operation.

## Grants for breeding and farrowing accommodation extended

The Irish Farmers' Association's National Pigs and Bacon Committee has expressed concern to the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries at the fact that farmers do not seem to have been made aware by the Department of the extension of the one-third grant scheme for pig production to breeding and farrowing accommodation.

The extension of the Scheme was announced by the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries on May 16 of this year. The Committee, in a letter to the Department said it is particularly disturbed by reports reaching its members that Farm Building Supervisors in certain parts of the country are not aware of this extension. In view of the situation in the pig industry at the present time, it is of utmost importance that farmers be made fully aware of the aids and incentives available.

The Committee requested the Department to take steps to ensure that farmers be made aware of the various Schemes, and particularly this one.

## Divers Aid Fisheries Research

Scientists from the Fisheries Division of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries have completed the first stage of a new experiment in the Department's research programme on the Dublin Bay Prawn, using aqualung divers to study the growth rate of this species in Berehaven, Co. Cork.

Despite its name the Dublin Bay Prawn is found in many areas around our coast and from Gibraltar to Norway. The determination of growth rate—about which factor of prime importance very little is known—is a longterm yield of any species of shellfish.

The programme was directed by Dr. J. P. Hillis, B.Sc., and Mr. J. O. Browne, B.Sc. It involved the capture by hand of prawns on the seabed by aqualung divers, who then brought them to a boat for measuring and marking. The marking of each individual prawn was by a coded system of notches cut around the edge of the tail. After marking, the prawns were returned to the area of capture.
