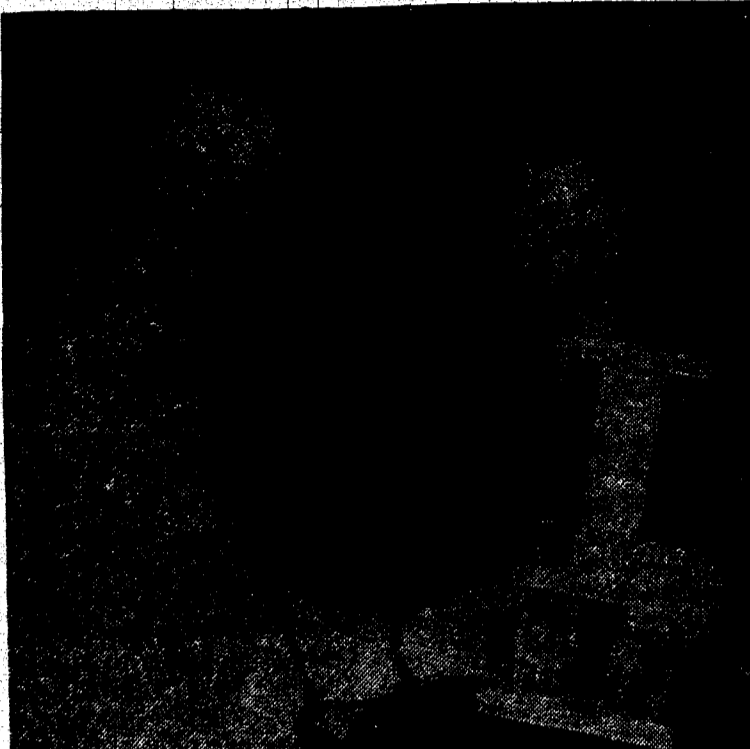

**Department of Social Welfare Children's Allowances**

CLAIMS FOR CHILDREN AGED between 16 and 18 YEARS who are receiving full-time education or who are apprenticed or who are permanently incapacitated are being dealt with in the Department and separate allowance books covering these children will be issued as quickly as possible.

If you have such a child and have not yet claimed the allowance you should do so immediately on a Form A L 5 which may be obtained at any Post Office.

**IMPORTANT:** The entire Form should be filled up and the Declaration on the back completed before you send it to the Department.

- If your child is —
- (a) in full-time education — you should attach a statement from the school or college etc., to that effect;
  - (b) an apprentice — you should attach a statement from the employer giving full details of the apprenticeship;
  - (c) incapacitated — you should attach a medical certificate stating the probable duration of the incapacity.

If you cannot get a statement from school or college until the school holidays end you should send in the form A L 5 with your own declaration as to the date up to which the child will remain in full-time education. The statement from the school or college should be forwarded not later than 31 October, 1973.

**DO NOT SEND IN YOUR ALLOWANCE BOOK WITH THE CLAIM.** Payment in respect of children aged 16 and over will be made on separate allowance books.

**ADHESIVE STAMPS.** These stamps have been issued to all persons in receipt of children's allowances and cover increases of allowances for children under age 16 only. Stamps should be affixed to the right-hand side of the Order for the month shown on the stamp.

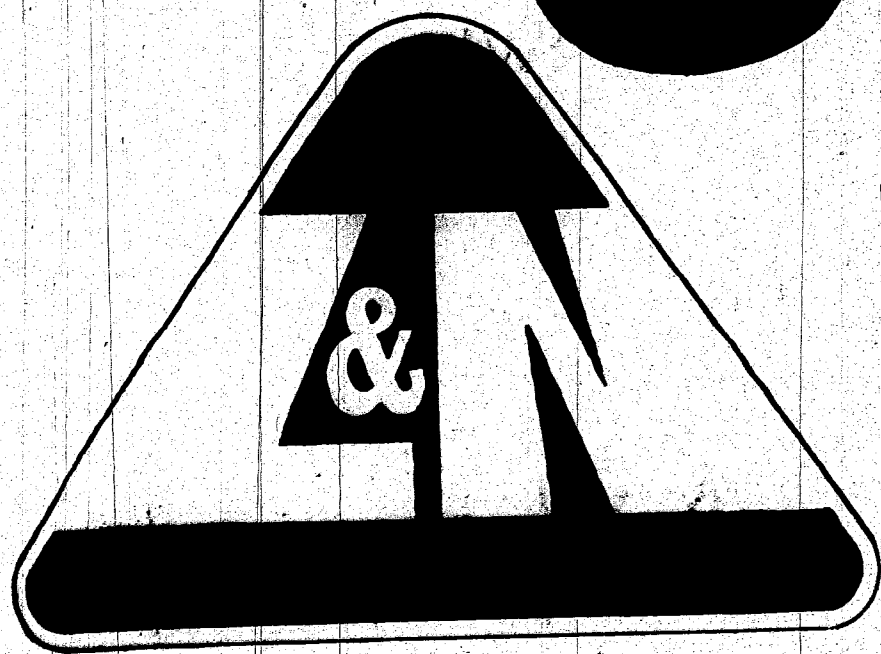

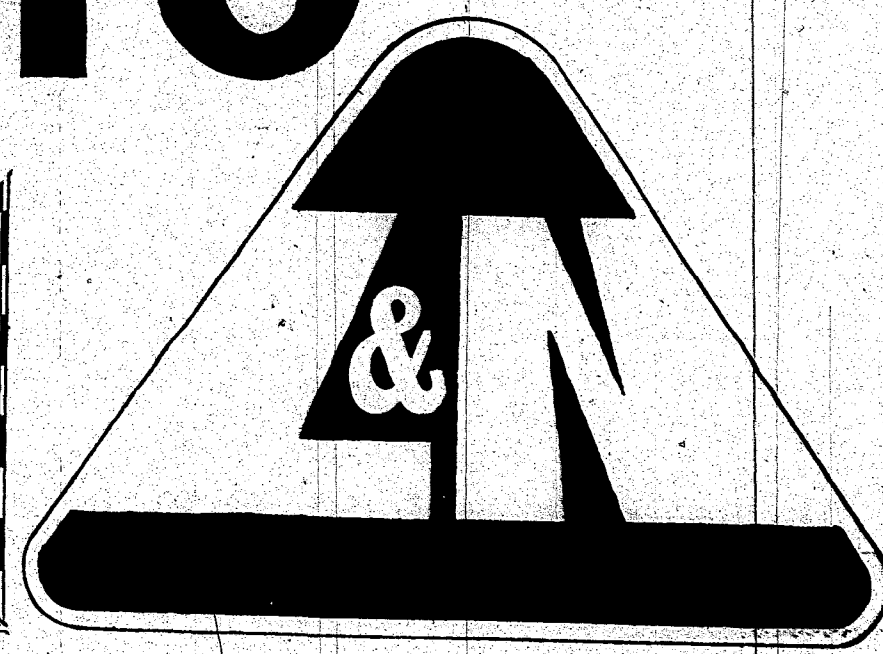

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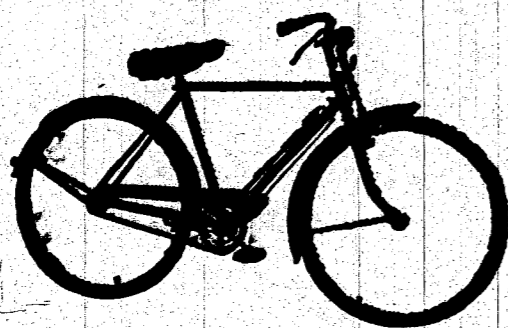

# The passing of the ballad singer

WHEN I was a gursain, there was quite a few story tellers and ballad singers on the road. They usually caused quite a stir. These travelling characters always aroused the instinct within me with their interesting variety of Irish ballads.

My mother loved to hear old songs sung. Old tunes scraped out on the fiddle. Now the ballad singer is becoming extinct. As the corprake would in due time vanish from a countryside in which it was no longer able to find a welcome, the ballad singers departed. The old fiddlers carried on amidst many trials and tribulations. The story-tellers were hard put to find an audience and when they did it was almost invariably composed of the older people. As one ballad singer said to me, that a man's choice tells a great deal about him.

The marvellous thing about the majority of ballad singers was that few if any could afford a high standard of education. They acquired all their wonderful traits of character in a natural way. The people in the towns and the villages always had a great gra for the ballad singer.

They were travelling from town to town. We usually had a few good ones in Dungarvan on a fair day. The farming community attending the fairs would always help the poor ballad singer on his way. I recall many a good ballad being sung at a Munster Hurling final at the Fraher Park. I often heard songs referred to the ballads and landlords, who treated the people badly in yester year. I remember a few songs such as "Rory of the Hill", it went like this:—

"Bad agents or bad landlords,  
We cannot bear them still,  
We will shoot them all,  
At their own hall door,  
Said Rory of the Hill."  
Other songs I heard were as follows:—  
"The seamen of Abbeyside,  
Singing the grand old sea shantie,  
Heave, O Rio,  
We're bound for the Rio Grande.

The advent of the gramophone did not help the poor old ballad singer. I well remember a great ballad singer called Thady Carthy, who hailed from round Kinalee, Co. Cork. He usually held the many people attending Dungarvan fair spell bound, as he rendered the "Galbally Farmer". It went like this:—

"A drop of sour milk that would physic  
a snipe,  
That I got form the old Galbally  
Farmer.

Another great ballad of his was entitled "I lay like a frog in the garden", "I lay like a frog in the garden,  
Till she'd look around,  
If you had a wife like I've got,  
You're courage would surely run down.

The following is an old ballad of my own composition:—  
"From Erins Own to Tallow town,  
You'll find hurlers of renown,  
Who have won many a county hurling  
crown".

From Ballyduff, Portlaw, to sweet Lismore  
and Cappoquin,  
You'll see our hurlers grand,  
Who always make a brilliant stand."

We had a ballad singer who used to sing in town. He paid tribute to Tipperary footballers who won the 1920 All-Ireland football title by defeating Dublin in the final at Croke Park. The ballad went like this:—

"God bless you captain Shelly,  
Gus McCarthy too played well,  
The hero of the day,  
Was Tommy Powell from Clonmel."

Dungarvan had its associations with that historic All-Ireland final of 1920. The Tipperary team. The teams stayed at McCarthy's Hotel in O'Connell Street, Dungarvan. They were loudly welcomed by local gaeles. Jackie Murphy, not at St. Joseph's Hospital, was guide and mentor to the team. Then my old friend the late Mick Arrigan was on the Tipperary team that won the 1920 football title. Mick whilst teaching at the Friary was on the famous "Wasps" football team that won the Dungarvan town league in 1920. Incidentally, Abbeyside won the hurling town league in 1926.

The Dublin team that played in that final, also had associations with Dungarvan. On the Dublin team that day was Frank Burke, who was associated with that outstanding Irishman, P. H. Pearse at St. Enda's. The late Monnie Fraher was a pupil of St. Enda's. Also one of the McCarthy family who donated the All-Ireland Hurling Cup to the G.A.A. I built up a close friendship with Frank Burke. His wife was a wonderful Dungarvan lady, Angela Curran, a member of the well known Curran family on the Quay. She was a prominent member of the Cumman na mBan during the War of Independence.

The late Mrs. Burke was one of the most charitable ladies who came from Dungarvan.

Now on ballad singers, I recall a fellow coming to town, he used sing "Blind Sheehan", "From the Glen of Aherlow." He combined his songs with some acting by lighting a ball of fire in his mouth and tying himself in chains. One day he could

not unloosen the chains, he was frantic. A blacksmith in town came to the rescue. It was a weary man that left Dungarvan that evening after his hectic battle with the chains.

In those day things were tough for the poor ballad singers. They depended on the generosity of the public. Here it can be said that the Dungarvan people were always charitably disposed to entertainers. It was a good indication as they always came back to sing their traditional airs which were appreciated by people of the town. I recall a visit to Dungarvan of a one man band. He had instruments on his head and feet, also on his arms and sung a ballad. He was a fantastic character. He also did acrobatics. Another grand old character who came to town was poor old Jack the gallons. Then we had a regular visit from that well-known character, towny Collins from Waterford. He gave up ballad singing to sell camphor balls.

Ger the Flutter was a great entertainer a soldier of fortune. He was good on the flute and could sing a ballad with the best. Most Sundays outside Fraher Park, Shandon, he used sing "My Old Shacco" and "Goodbye to Green Bushes". His favourite one was "The Bould Tenant Farmer." It went like this:—  
"One evening from Bandon for Conakilly

I was making my way,  
I heard a dispute in a farmers' abode,  
Between the landlord and the wife of  
A bold tenant farmer."  
"The bold tenant farmer's wife she replied,  
Your as bad as your dad that lives down  
the other side."

Another great entertainer was the late Pats Cotter. Pats was out on his own as an Irish step-dancer. I am well aware of the fact that the traditional ballads and songs of Irish origin are still rendered around the firesides of our beloved Deise. As most countries uphold their historic traditions, come weal or woe. They are usually preserved more so in countries where they are not commercialised. May it be ever thus. It is sad that so many of our tourists never come in contact with the real Ireland. One often wonders what image

they take away of our country. Is it just a carbon copy of America or Britain, or do they experience the genuine heritage of the Irish race. An old Dungarvan gael whom I met here recently asked me what I would term a successful social evening in Dungarvan. I replied, if I were blessed with worthy goods and wanted to hold a real gaelic function. First of all I would start at 11 a.m. and finish at midnight, thus ensuring a good night sleep for all concerned. This might seem a new innovation, but no, I got this idea from a charming Dungarvan couple who invited me to their wedding reception. The reception started at 11 a.m. on Saturday morning and terminated at midnight. It was one of the best weddings I ever attended.

No getting back to a proposed Dungarvan function. The venue of course would be that historic Devonshire Arms Hotel, steeped in Deise history. Among the personalities I would invite would be Mrs. Bridie O'Brien to sing that well-known favourite the "Nobleman's Wedding" and of course no Dungarvan function would be successful without the talented Mickey Downey and Josie Terry. This pair of entertainers would top any bill. Then I would have former Waterford and London hurling star sing some his own composed Irish Folk songs, La Noonan, including the O.D.V. and with another Waterford star of other days, Lord Duggan singing "She moved through the fair." Veteran Jack Murphy rendering "She lived beside the Anner." Jackie Bumster talking football and the one and only Eddie Fitzgerald talking hurling. And of course I would have former Abbeyside hurler and Waterford footballer of other days, Bill Organ to sing "The cross of old Piltown." I would have Tom (Jet) Brett that great authority giving us all the latest data on sport and with that outstanding sporting personality Bill Quinn recalling hunts with the local Harriers. Not forgetting that well-known Ballinroad celebrity, Christy (Gypo) Power. The finest dancer I ever saw.

The ballad singers handed down to us all the old ballads and naturally many of us would like to hear them again today. Not for any commercial gain but for sheer love of all that is traditionally Irish.

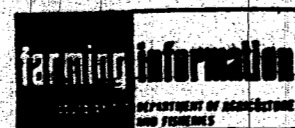
