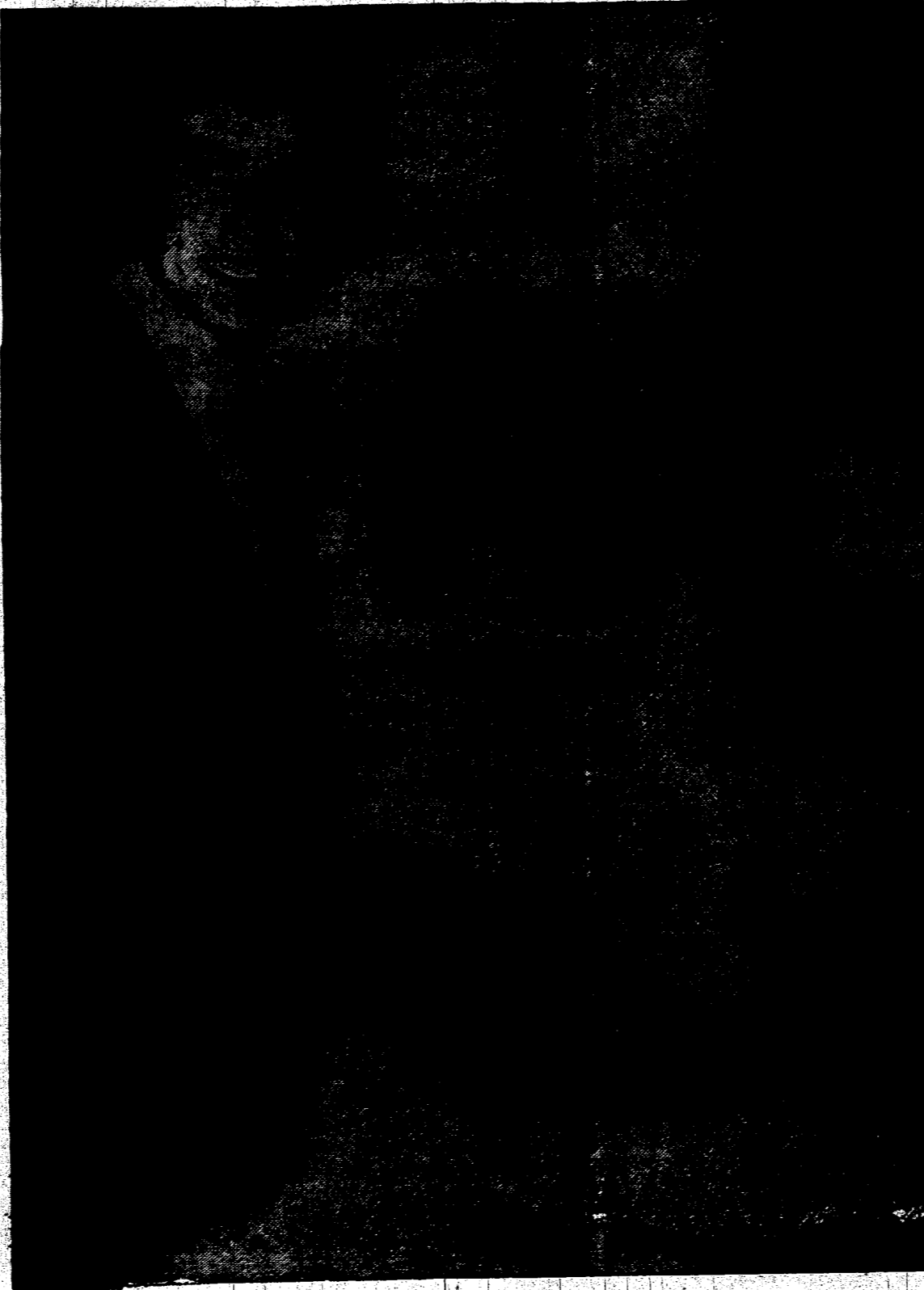

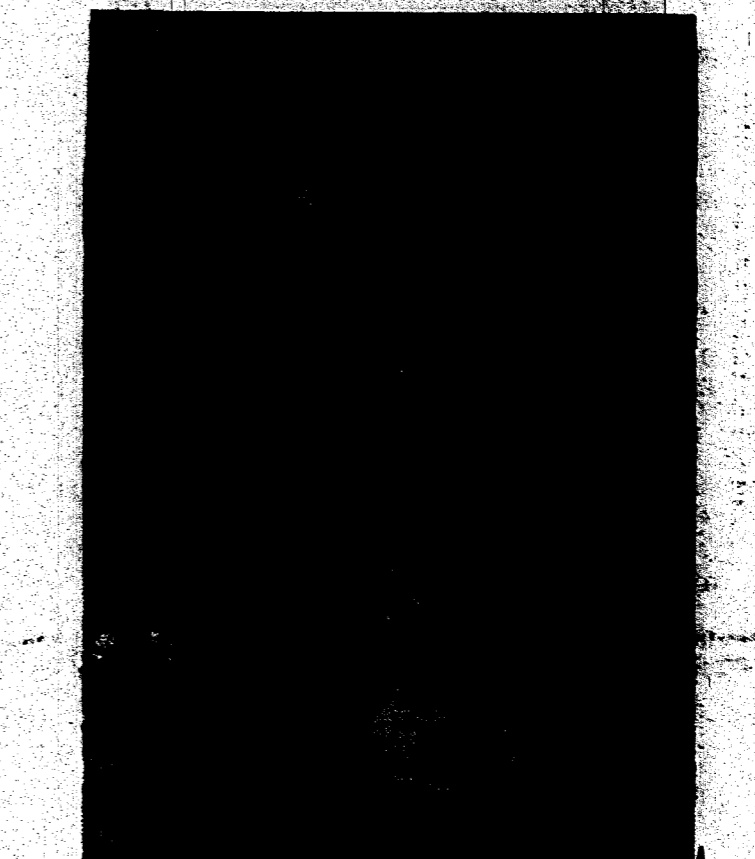

**REMOVAL OF BEACH MATERIAL PROHIBITION**

Public Notice is hereby given that the Minister for Transport and Power has made an Order, dated 18th April, 1973, entitled "Fore-shore (Prohibition of Removal of Beach Material) (No. 4) Order 1973" which came into operation on 18th day of May, 1973.  
 The Order prohibits the removal by any person of beach material of any kind, other than seaweed, from an area of seashore specified on the Schedule to the Order, as described hereunder.  
 The Order applies to all the areas of the seashore of County Waterford, except the following—

1. the part of the seashore which lies within the functional area of the Dungarvan Urban District Council;
2. the part of the seashore which lies within the townland of Annewstown and the part of the seashore which adjoins and lies seaward of that townland;
3. the part of the seashore which lies within the townland of Woodstown and the part of the seashore which adjoins and lies seaward of that townland, and
4. the part of the seashore which lies within the townland of Prospecthall and the part of the seashore which adjoins and lies seaward of that townland.

Persons removing beach material as specified above are liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Ten Pounds for a first offence, and to a fine of Ten Pounds for each subsequent offence.  
 The making of the above-mentioned Order does not prevent the grant of licences by the Minister for removal of beach material from the foreshore in question. Applications for licences should be sent to the Secretary, Department of Transport and Power, Kildare Street, Dublin 2. Such applications will be considered having regard to the likely effect on the coastline.

# Mr. Maher on the siting of Marts

Serious concern at certain developments which, as he sees it, constitute a very definite threat to orderly marketing and stability of the livestock marketing system in certain areas of the country, was expressed by Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers' Association, in a statement.

Mr. Maher said: "Some people seem to think that because the development of Livestock Marts which was initiated by I.F.A. in the mid 1950's, has proved so beneficial to farmers in particular, and the livestock industry in general, that the more marts we can have in the country the better. This is a completely erroneous view of the situation. The efforts of those who propagate this line of thinking are not calculated to serve the best interests of farmers, the livestock industry or the national economy."

"The truth of the matter is that an efficient and effective livestock marketing system requires a reasonable and realistic geographical spacing of livestock mart centres so as to achieve for farmers the best possible price for their livestock. Wasteful competition between small un-economic marts, too closely spaced, is directly reflected in lower prices to the farmer and a tendency to encourage the operation of a speculative type of 'middle man' activity involving frequent movement of cattle from one mart to another over relatively short distances."

"For the record let me say that I consider it to be the duty of I.F.A. to speak out frankly and forthrightly on any undesirable tendencies of that kind so as to ensure that the interests of livestock producers are kept to the forefront. I would not like anybody to feel that, because I.F.A. in certain instances finds it necessary to discourage proposed new livestock marts, that this reflects any lack of concern for the problems of small towns in rural Ireland. However, I would say to Town Development Associations that they should not too hastily conclude that the substitution of a livestock mart for a now defunct cattle fair, is the real answer to their particular problem."

"I believe that a careful analysis of the situation will lead, in the vast majority of cases, to the conclusion that they should seek development along other lines of activity. I can readily assure such groups that the I.F.A. at all levels will be only too willing to assist in their discussions and investigations in relation to suitable projects aimed at the promotion

of local economic development. I would like to place on record our appreciation of the responsible attitude which the Banking Groups in the country have generally displayed in evaluating propositions placed before them concerning the establishment of possible new livestock marts. In consultation with the Irish Agricultural Organisations Society over the years, we in I.F.A. have endeavoured to assist the banks in this respect by setting out certain basis guidelines."

"We have outlined the requirements which a prospective new livestock mart must fulfil if it is to make a positive contribution towards the improvement of the livestock marketing system in the area. Apart from the more obvious geographical considerations as regards spacing marts centres, the other criteria, which have been arrived at jointly by I.F.A. and the I.A.O.S. and which I might add have had to be revised upwards from time to time to take account of the constantly developing situation, include specifications with regard to livestock population, the pattern of livestock movement in the area, and the degree of farmer interest in any such project as measured by the amount of share capital which farmers in the prospective catchment area are willing to put up towards the project."

"I feel that the present situation is sufficiently serious to require that I should convey a message to each of three categories of people in particular. I consider it my duty to remind farmers of the problems which they would create for themselves by involvement in or support for a proposed new livestock mart which does not measure up to the criteria set out by the I.F.A. and the I.A.O.S. It is farmers themselves who will ultimately have to pay the cost of such projects, out of the price of their cattle."

"To any interests who may see a possibility of personal financial gain from a project which does not take into consideration the overall good of the farming industry, I strongly advise them to think again before committing themselves to the establishment of livestock marts in areas where this is not economically justified. To the Banks or other credit institutions whose support may be sought in this context, I would urge them to act only with fullest sense of responsibility and with due regard to their un-

derstanding with us on the essential criteria for a successful new livestock mart."

"May I say that I see possibility of a certain temptation on the part of some banks to view a prospective new mart project more on terms of its potentialities as a medium of bringing them, as the account holders in contact with farmers, without perhaps having sufficient regard to the broader policy aspects. I would strongly urge that all the banking groups and other relevant credit institutions should consult among themselves with a view to agreeing on a sensible policy as regards the availability of capital for projects of this nature."

Mr. Maher added: "I am convinced that there are possibilities for existing livestock marts to develop closer working arrangements so as to make the best use of their resources, improve their operating efficiency and develop even further in their respective areas, the very good service already being provided for farmers."

## Late Richard Coffey

Knockavanna, Ballymacarbray  
Deep feelings of regret were occasioned at the announcement of the death of Richard Coffey, Knockavanna, Ballymacarbray, who died during the early hours of Friday morning, August 3rd, at his residence. The deceased was a well-known member of the farming community and of a most popular widely connected family. He spent a part of his life in the U.S. but in his earlier days he fought the good fight for his country's freedom.

To his sorrowing wife, Margaret, sons, daughters, brother sisters, nephew and relatives sincere sympathy is extended. His remains were removed on Friday evening to Touraneena Parish Church followed by a very large cortege and his coffin was draped in the Tri-colour. Very Rev. T. O'Brien, P.P. blessed and received his coffin.

The last Mass on Sunday morning was offered for the repose of his soul and the interment took place in the adjoining family plot. Very Rev. T. O'Brien, P.P., assisted by Very Rev. N. McCarthy, P.P., English Mission, imparted the final absolution at the graveside.

Craft Promotion has interested his business as Visitors' Purchases in 1971 totalled \$90m. and as farming under E.E.C. conditions has become huge and technically beyond the ability of the untrained housewife to cope, intensive training is necessary.

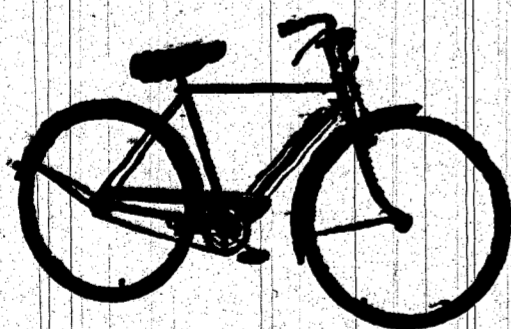
