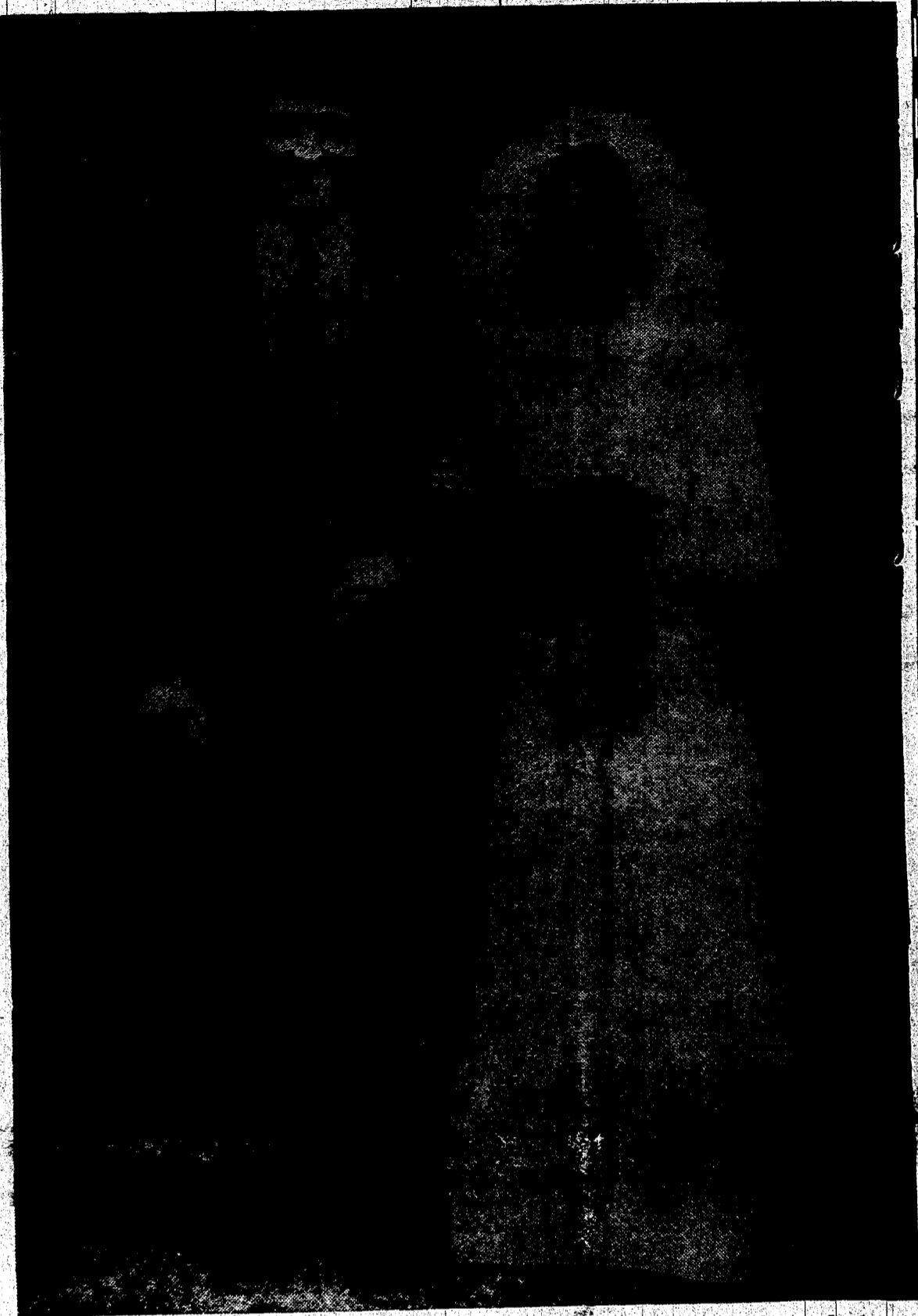

It is with deep regret that we record the death of Mr. John Osborne, Ballinacole, Aglish. A popular and respected figure, deceased, who was a member of a well-known family, was a progressive farmer and was a director of Waterford Co-Operative Society. He was father of Mr. P. Osborne, C.C. (Dungarvan) and uncle of Very Rev. Fr. O'Brien, P.P.

The remains were removed to Aglish Parish Church and the accompanying cortege was one of the largest and most representative ever seen in the area.

### Future of Health Boards

At a meeting of the South Eastern Health Board in Kilkenny, Mr. C. Curran, President, referred to a statement in a medical journal that it was proposed to strip Health Boards of much of their present authority and transfer these powers to the Civil Service. Any such proposal should be strongly resisted.

The setting up of the Boards was an exercise in democracy as it gave direct representation to all interests involved in the proper development of the Health Services. Much progress has been made by the Boards, not the least of which had been the decision to provide a proper hospital service at Dungarvan.

3—Water Main to serve above projects—Tender sanctioned by Department.

4—100 Bed Hospital—Sketch plan is being revised after consultations with the Department.

## Record Entry for Gold Medal Angling Festival

The Committee of Dungarvan Sea Angling Club, promoters of the 5th International Deep Sea Gold Medal Angling Festival are this year stretched to their limits to cater for the biggest contingent of Continental Anglers ever to visit Ireland. When the taking of entries closed on Friday, July 27th, Secretary Michael Moloney gave a sigh of relief for not only had he a record entry of 130 top Anglers (the competition is restricted to 120) but he was unattended with applications from at home and abroad. Sponsored by Quigley Magnetics Division of the Pfizer Chemical Corporation the three day Festival has rightly grown in stature and deservedly gained the reputation as Ireland's Premier Angling Festival. For the first time in this country the Dutch Travel Agent Prem Air, chartered a special flight from Amsterdam to Cork Airport to cater for the top anglers and friends who now seem to make the Festival an annual holiday. The plane is scheduled to arrive at Cork Airport on Thursday night. So serious is the Festival taken in Angling circles in Holland especially the Puffers Nation Trophy that plans are afoot for Dutch Radio Station A.V.R.O. to link-up direct with Dungarvan on the final day for an hour long "talk show" with participating anglers and local interests. Belgium and Dutch T.V. reporters are also booked on the flight and last week a Belgium T.V. team spent two days taking "all in" shots of festival.

This year the festival will be opened by Mr. Tom Kyne, T.D., Abbeyside, and for the following three days the anglers will test their skills in a bid for the Gold, Silver and Bronze Medals. Among the well-known Anglers booked to compete are Paul Verbunt and his team mates from the Seagull Sea Angling Club — The first Dutchman to fish in Dungarvan nine years ago and the winner of the Nation Trophy in 1971. Joe Littler a previous Gold Medal winner and Captain

of last year's winning English team will also fish. The Irish challenge will come from Ted Geary, Irish master angler who has won so many local competitions including this year's Waterford Gold Trophy at Dungarvan, that he must start a hot favourite for at least a medal. Local junior Angler Kieran Kelly last year Gold medal winner for the best catch of Garfish in the county. George Burrows angling correspondent of the "Irish Times", who last year had the honour of opening the festival and Desmond Kelly better known for his dedicated angling column "Copper King" are amongst the entries.

Others who will fish in the festival are Louis Delacourt from Belgium who is an annual visitor to Dungarvan and has organised a party of eight from his home country. The Bank of Ireland Sea Angling club send a four man team and Richard Cullen and a prize for a record competition in Dun Looney was set for the 3 day festival in Dungarvan.

SOCIAL EVENTS — The festival means confined solely to fishing. The official opening is timed for 8 p.m. and will be preceded by a Band Parade in the Square to the opening ceremony on the Quayside. A reception will be held at Lawlors Hotel for visiting Anglers on Thursday night.

On Friday night the festival will be cabaret and dancing commencing at 8 p.m. and on Saturday again at Lawlors Hotel popular "Race Nite" at 9 p.m. followed by cabaret and dancing Sunday night will be the final night with the Seagull Sea Angling Banquet at Lawlors Hotel commencing at 9 p.m. at which the trophies will be presented to the winners.

Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band will also be on Parade and will play on Thursday and Sunday evening at the Quay. Boats will leave the Quay at 8 a.m. and the usual evening fishing will be each evening at 8.30 p.m.

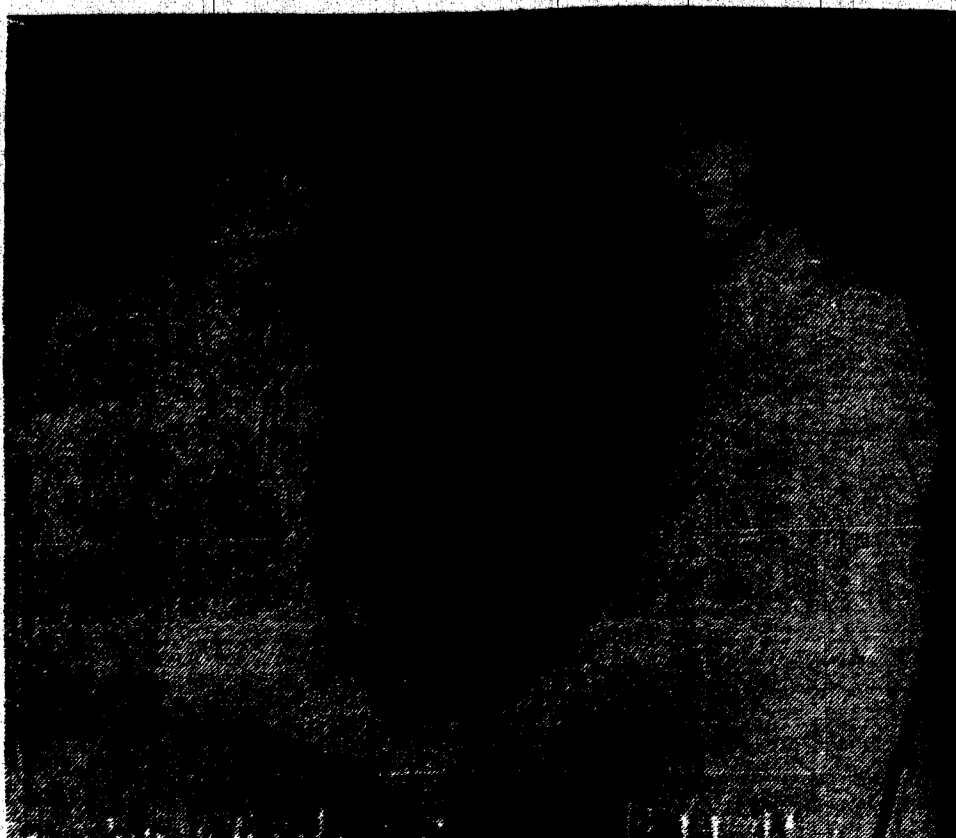

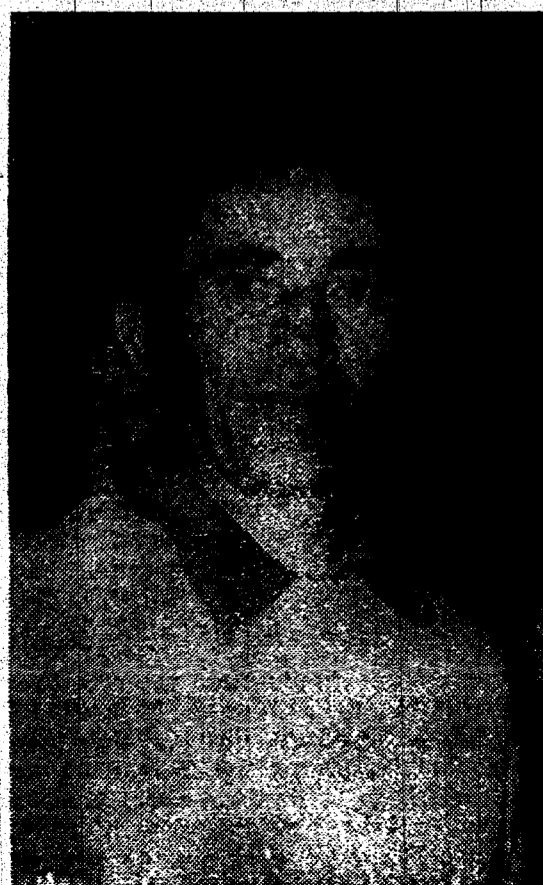

**Deputy complains of poor bus services**

He knew they were running in opposition to each other and that C.I.E. bus section did everything it could to interfere with the train section and vice-versa, stated Mr. T. A. Kyne T.D. at Waterford County Council meeting at Dungarvan on Monday.

He was speaking during a discussion in which the CIE road passenger services in West Waterford came in for further severe criticisms.

Present at the meeting by invitation, was Mr. J. A. O'Connor, Area Manager, CIE, Waterford, who was accompanied by Mr. J. Leonard and Mr. T. Hayes.

Mr. Kyne reiterated complaints made at a previous meeting concerning the inadequacy of the road passenger services operated by CIE throughout West Waterford. He said that this time of year when so many people from the area were coming home on holidays from England it was deplorable that when the boat train from Rosslare arrived in Waterford, travellers who wished to get to Dungarvan, Lismore and Fermoy found themselves stranded unless they were prepared to hire taxis to get them to their homes.

He said that comic opera situations existed in the running of several other CIE bus services and because they had refused to synchronise bus and train time tables it was not possible for people in Dungarvan and other parts of the west of the county to get to Dublin and back by public transport in the one day.

When CIE closed down the railway line between Waterford and Mallow, said Mr. Kyne, they promised the people of these areas an adequate alternative bus service but they did not give it. They should provide the same service for the people as was there before the rail closure and it is up to this Council to make as much row as possible to get it back now.

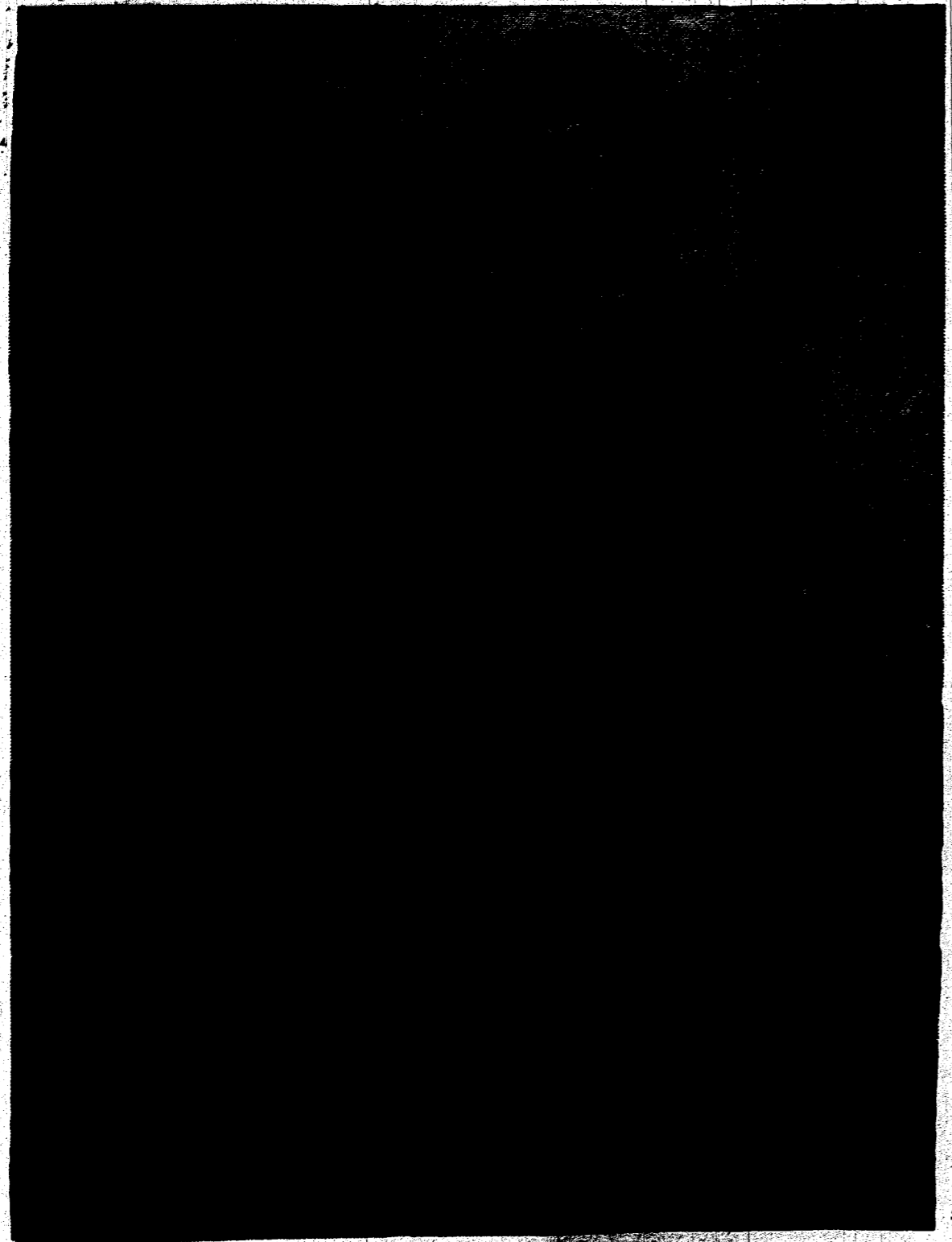

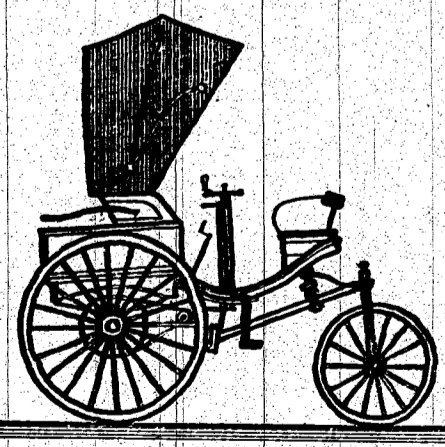
**LISMORE NEWS**



## Vital role of farmer in directing dairy industry

The concept of farmers owning and directing to the greatest possible extent that part of the agricultural industry outside the farm gate has always been promoted by the N.F.A. and now by the I.F.A., said Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers' Association.

Mr. Maher, in a statement, said: "I am extremely pleased that the work which we have been doing, stretching back almost two decades, to convince farmers of the necessity to direct the dairy industry themselves is at last beginning to bear fruit, even in areas where before the idea did not meet with a good reception. Because of this I would urge all farmers in Co. Kerry to support and involve themselves in the effort to co-operate the structure of the dairy industry in that county which up to now has been owned by the Dairy Disposal Board Company." "However, there would be no useful purpose served in a farmer take-over of these units unless through that take-over the industry was made more efficient and as a consequence the individual farmer got a better return for his milk. In order to achieve this the fullest involvement of the individual farmers, physically and financially, is essential so that the best possible structure will be developed. He must also ensure the best possible talent from amongst his members should sit in the board room to direct, together with top class management, the industry in future in Kerry."

Mr. Maher added: "The farmers of Kerry are now getting golden opportunity to determine their own destiny, and I give full credit to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, Mr. Clinton, for his far-sightedness in handing over to the farmers this link in this vital processing sector. I trust the time will not be long delayed until the handing over to the farmers of all units in the Dairy Disposal Board areas will be complete."

## Guide to E.E.C. Farm modernisation Directive

This week we continue with the second part of a two-piece article by Alan Dukes, the Director of I.F.A.'s Brussels Office, which gives details of a guide to E.E.C. Farm Modernisation Directive.

He writes: Aids under the Farm Modernisation Directive are: (a) An interest rebate of 5 per cent (on condition that the beneficiary himself pays at least 3 per cent) over a period of fifteen years, on investments necessary for development. Member States may extend the aid to 20 years on fixed assets, and 10 years on other assets; the aid may be paid in the form of a capital grant, or may take the form of deferred payments. (b) A guarantee of principal and interest where guarantees existing on the farm are sufficient. (c) "Guidance" premia where, on completion of the farm plan, sale of cattle and/or sheep account for over 50 per cent of total farm sales. (d) Aids for book-keeping (which is obligatory) of £208 payable in at least four instalments. Some special conditions apply to these aids. These are as follows:

(i) Aids are not given for the purchase of land, pigs or poultry; (ii) Aids are given only for the first incremental purchase of cattle or sheep; (iii) Where aids are given for the purchase of cattle and/or sheep, it is a condition that at the end of the plan period, sales of cattle and/or sheep must account for over 60 per cent of total farm sales; (iv) Aids cannot be given on that portion of total investment under the plan which exceeds £16,500 per labour unit (Member States can reduce this limit); (v) Where the development plan provides for investment in a pig enterprise, the aid is given on condition that the investment is not less than £4,000 nor more than £18,500 and that, at the end of the plan, the farm must be capable of producing at least the equivalent of 35 per cent of the feed necessary for the enterprise; (vi) Where the development plan involves the acquisition of extra land, the farmer must show concrete evidence that he is actually going to get the land before he qualifies for aid; (vii) Receipts of aids is further conditional on keeping farm accounts. The main outlines of the accounts system are set out in the Directive.

It will be up to each farmer involved in the scheme to apply for the relevant aids at the appropriate time. Once the farm plan has been approved by the competent authorities, there should generally be no

further questions on eligibility for aids. The obvious course for the farmer to follow is to apply for aid for each relevant investment in the plan as the need for the project arises. In the case of payment of interest subsidies, it is clear that some form of statement from the lending agency will be required as evidence.

By applying the aids at each step in the plan, the cash-flow problem (both for the farmer and for the aiding agencies — the Government involved and the E.A.G.G.F.) can be alleviated.

We no go back to our original simple plan: To recapitulate — (a) Our farmer has an income lower than the "comparable income"; (b) He has a plan which will bring income up to the target level in six years; (c) There are twenty suckler cows and a small weaner enterprise; the plan provides for the addition of thirty more cows, and the expansion of the pig enterprise and installation of fattening facilities after the second year, sump drainage, and the addition of an extra full labour unit (the son) at the end of the second year.

## Pig's committee success on

### VAT reduction

The Irish Farmers' Association's National Pig and Bacon Committee has been campaigning continuously since before the introduction of V.A.T. to have dried feed grain taxed at zero rate instead of at 5.25 per cent.

Compound feeding stuffs carry a zero rate of tax and so the consequence of paying the tax on whole grains has been to penalise those farmers who use their own feeding-stuffs using purchased cereals. Few of these farmers are equipped to register for V.A.T. and thereby recover the tax paid. The penalty on them is up to 50p. per pig. The most recent legislation on this subject was between I.F.A. and the Minister for Finance shortly before the Budget. The Minister has decided to remove the tax from 1st September onwards at a meeting held recently the Pig Committee expressed its appreciation of his action.

In particular it is essential that application for supply should be made during the period which will be announced for each area.

In 1949 Tourin won the county junior hurling title and the following year they captured the senior crown and in 1963 they also won the county junior hurling title. Indeed Cork's last football title win was away back in 1945. So Sunday's pairing is indeed a unique one.

### ON INJURED LIST

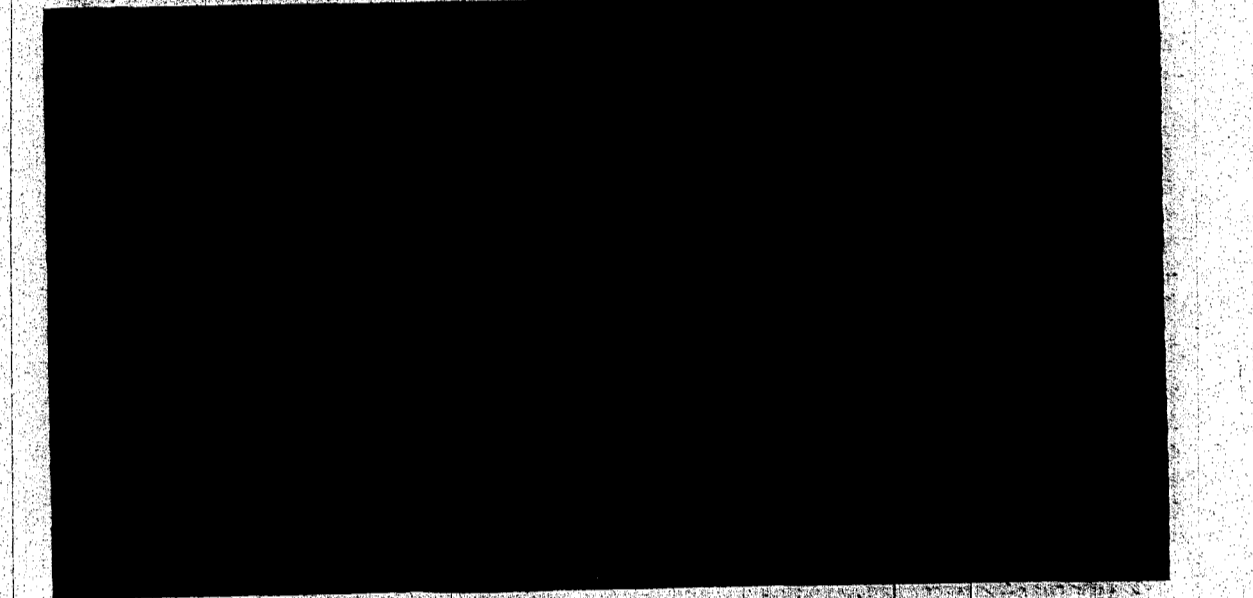

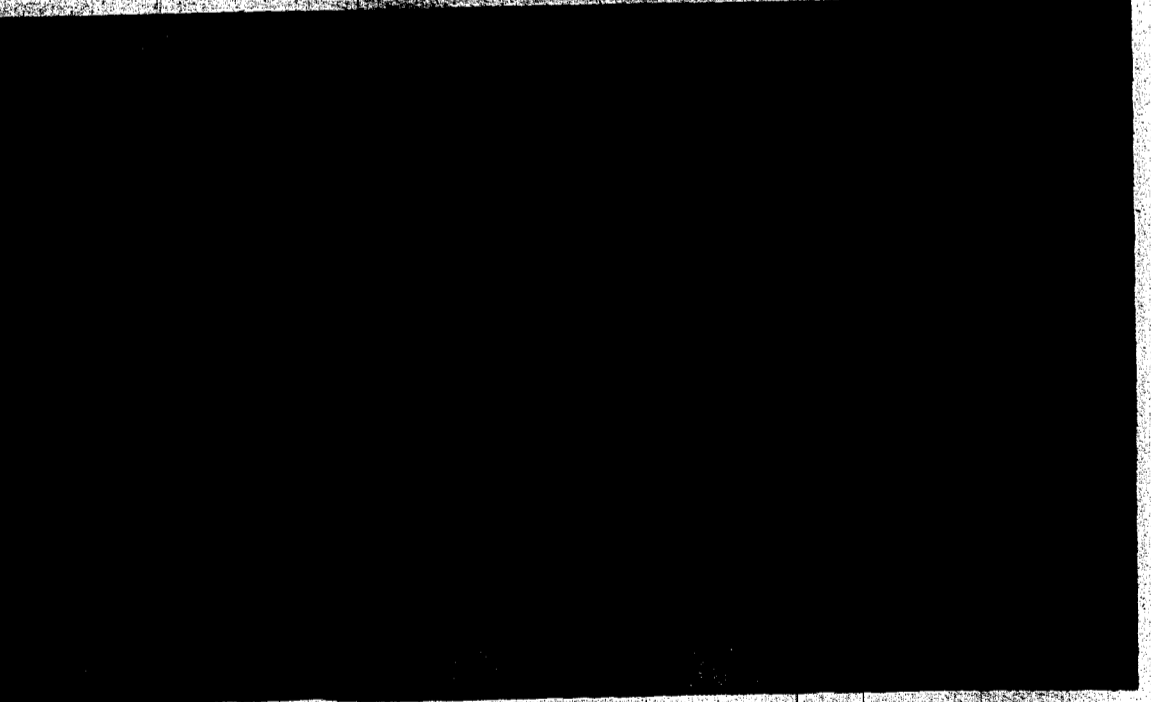
### New Edition of Football Book
