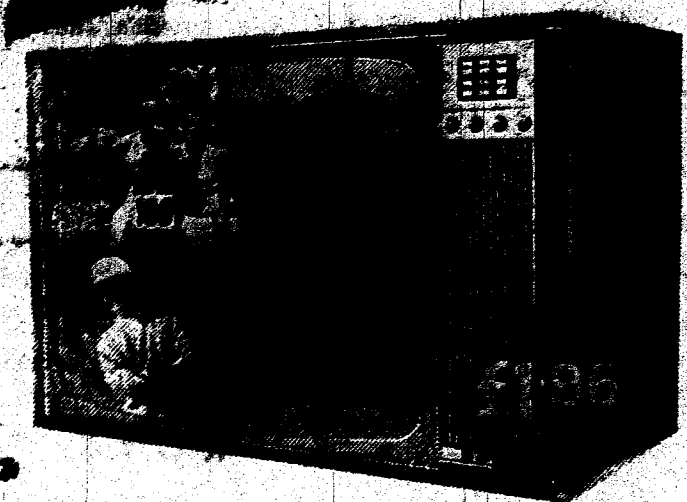

Cappoquin Ground Rents

Dear Sir—

A few hours before copies of last week's "Dungarvan Observer" were delivered in Cappoquin, I read a letter in the "Irish Press" about the local ground rent dispute. The writer of that letter, P. Mulcaire, rebuked me for failing to set my facts right before sending a statement to the Irish Press a few days before. Then I fell to wondering was it possible the well-known Irish international golfer, Pat Mulcaire, had arrived in the locality to act as a kind of advocate for the Cappoquin Estate Co. and no one was aware of his presence. But when the "Observer" came and there I saw the same letter, word for word, but signed by Sir Richard Keane. Bart. the identity of the man who had so patronizingly taken me to task for being mistaken was revealed, or, in homely language, 'the cat was out of the bag.'

But I was not mistaken because the information given to the "Irish Press" and which you, Mr. Editor, so kindly published was based on facts and had Sir Richard Keane consulted his solicitors, Messrs. Keny, Stephenson and Chapman, Waterford, they would have told him so.

The case I mentioned concerned the Teeling family, Main Street, Cappoquin. In 1860, Mrs. Teeling's forbears were granted a lease for 91 years at 28 p.a. When that came to an end a new lease for 21 years at £10 a year was negotiated and this expired in 1972. On these two leases, therefore, the landlord has collected £208 and if this sum be converted into present currency values, it will amount at a very conservative estimate, to at least £6,000.

On July 13th, 1973, the aforementioned solicitors wrote as follows to Mr. M. Teeling: "We would be prepared to advise our clients to grant a renewal for a term of 21 years at a rent of £168 p.a." This means that the previous rent is multiplied by almost 18 times and when the year 1983 comes round a grand total of £2,772 will have passed into the coffers of the Cappoquin Estate Co. from one small holding in a town of only 700 people. What will happen after 1983 God alone knows.

That was the case I had in mind and no other. The example given by Sir Richard Keane was a rather odorous red herring introduced for the purpose of convincing your readers that the people of Cappoquin are gravely mistaken in doubting the benevolent intentions of their landlord.

Wedding Bells

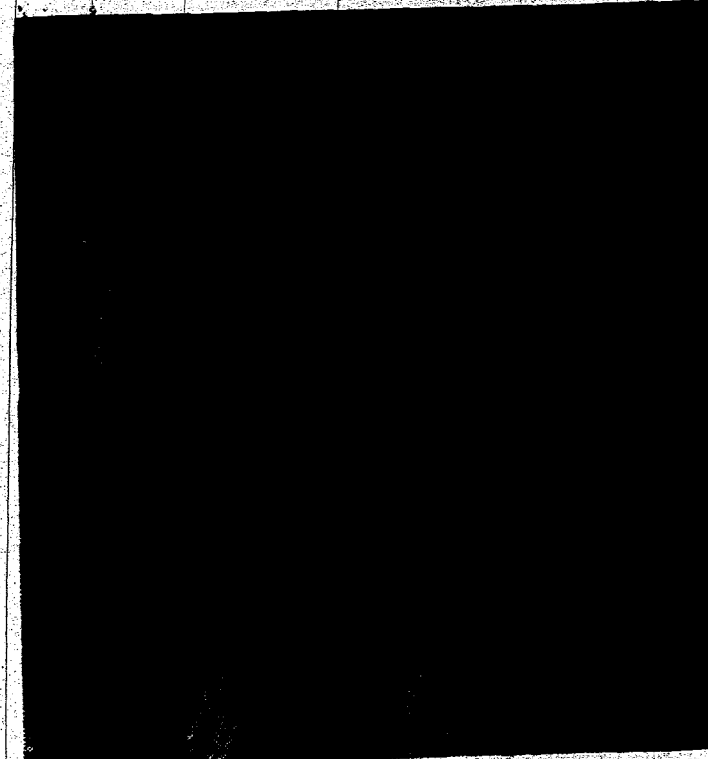

Support of Pigeon Control Scheme Wanes

At this month's meeting of County Waterford Committee of Agriculture, it was revealed that support for the pigeon control scheme had decreased considerably since it was first initiated in County Waterford three years ago. Mr. George T. Frost, C.A.O. said that last year while in excess of 7,000 pigeons had been exterminated, the number exterminated this year was only 4,745, while financial support was forthcoming from only two of the county's eleven gun clubs.

It was suggested that the committee discuss the waning support for the scheme and that they should be interested in trying to curb the destruction of these birds.

Furthermore, he continued, the first year of the scheme had seen a contribution of £65 from the Ballincourty vegetable growers who now appear to be disinterested in the scheme. Since the first year no contribution has been received from them.

The failure on the part of the I.F.A. to subscribe to the scheme during the past two years was described as very bad form by Mr. J. Quirke.

New Free Health Services

THE following statement has been issued by Mr. Brendan Corish, T.D., Tánaiste and Minister for Health and Social Welfare:

"The Government has decided that, from April next, every member of the community, irrespective of income or type of employment, will be entitled to the following health services:

1. Free hospital in-patient services.
2. Free hospital out-patient services.
3. Free maternity services.
4. Free infant welfare services.
5. Assistance towards the cost of drugs and medicines.

From April, no family will be required to pay more than £4 per month for drugs and medicines.

This decision represents a significant step in the development of our health services. At present only manual workers or persons earning less than £1,600 per year or farmers with valuations of £60 or less are entitled to the services mentioned. From April next, every single member of the community will be eligible for these services. An Tánaiste estimates that over 300,000 extra people, including dependants, will become eligible as a result of the abolition of these income and valuation limits.

The system of health contributions will remain unchanged. These now eligible for the services mentioned will continue to pay 15p per week or £7 per year, depending on their occupations. The additional people brought into the scheme will pay the same amounts. In each case all dependants of contributors will be covered.

Similarly, the method of collecting the contributions will remain unchanged. Payment will be made at the rates mentioned as follows:

1. As part of the social insurance con-

tribution in the case of insured persons;

2. By direct contribution to Health Boards of £7 per year in the case of farmers;
3. Collection by the Revenue Commissioners in the case of the self-employed and all others.

An Tánaiste wishes to emphasise that those benefiting under this change can, of course, continue to opt for semi-private or private hospital care. Those who so opt will receive a subsidy from their health board towards the cost. They will simply pay the balance of the cost themselves — either directly in cash or through the Voluntary Health Insurance Board. An Tánaiste has consulted the Voluntary Health Insurance Board on the likely effects of the Government's decision on the Board's operations. He is satisfied that, while premium payments will be reduced as a result of the introduction of the free service, the viability of the Board's operations will not be affected. This is also the Board's view.

The National Coalition parties, before the last election, committed themselves firmly to the introduction of a comprehensive social security system covering all citizens. The decision announced today, together with the Government's earlier decisions to abolish the income limit for social insurance and to introduce pay-related unemployment and sickness benefits, demonstrate clearly the Government's determination to fulfil that commitment.

An Tánaiste consulted and received submissions from many interested groups in our community before the Government made its decision on the health services. He wishes to thank these groups for their expression of views."

MINI OLYMPICS

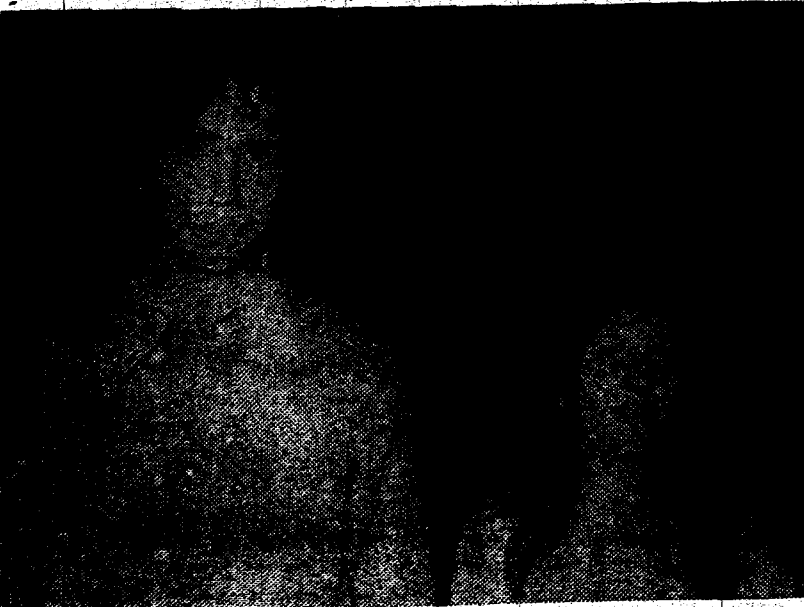

This year Waterford hopes to fare even better. Hopes

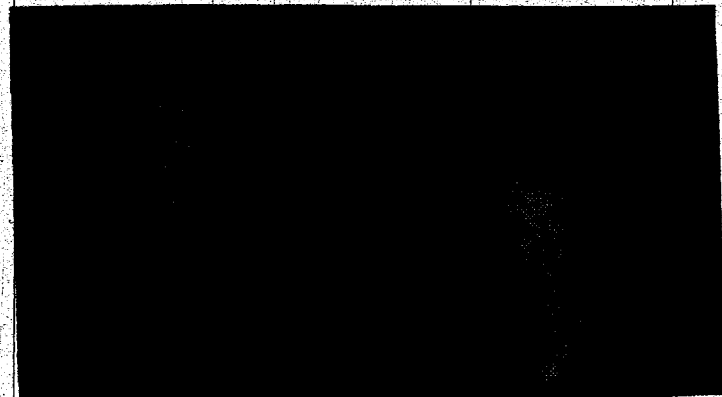

Serious Setback in Cattle Prices Forecast

Irish farmers face a serious reduction in prices for cattle which could amount to £20 per head or more.

This warning was contained in a statement issued on Friday last, by the Irish Fresh Meat Exporters Society in relation to the termination of the E.E.C. Beef Scarcity Regulation which is expected to occur on September 9th and which will result in greatly increased levies against Irish beef and live cattle exports. The following is the text of the statement:—

- "With the imminent termination of the E.E.C. Scarcity Regulation there will occur:
- increases in the E.E.C. import duties on meat and live cattle — in the case of meat from 10% to 16% and, in the case of live cattle from 8% to 12.8%.
 - the imposition of the "accession" levy, i.e. the levy to bridge the difference between the E.E.C. Guide

Pig Producers Demand High Prices

An urgent call for higher prices for pigs has been made by Mr. George Rigg, Chairman of the Irish Farmers' Association National Pigs and Bacon Commission.

He said, in a statement, that pig producers badly needed a substantial increase in the price of pigs to meet the rising costs of production. Production cost had risen sharply because of the latest increase of £8.60 per ton in the price of pig feeds. "An increase of £3.20 in the price of 'Specials' is needed to compensate for this feed price increase alone, not to talk of cost increases in other spheres of production such as building and equipment.

"There is every indication at the present time" he said "that the demand for gilts has slackened considerably. I.F.A. at present are very concerned that should this trend continue there would be a further reduction in the national breeding herd.

"I would make a strong demand on behalf of pig producers that the bacon factories pass on to producers the full benefit of recent increases in the wholesale prices of pigmeat."

Since the week-ending July 21, there has been an increase of £80 per ton in the price of Irish bacon on the English market from £5.50 to £6.30 per ton while in the same period there has been less than £40 per ton increase in the average price published paid for pigs. I would also like to point to the fact that there has been a buoyant home market in the same period due to the tourist season.

"Since we can no longer have national subsidies there is now an urgent need for consultation between the Pig and Bacon Commission and the relevant authorities in Northern Ireland and Great Britain as to how adequate increases can be effected in the price of pigmeat to ensure that producers will be able to maintain production at an economic level. The Pig and Bacon Commission should initiate such consultation immediately."
