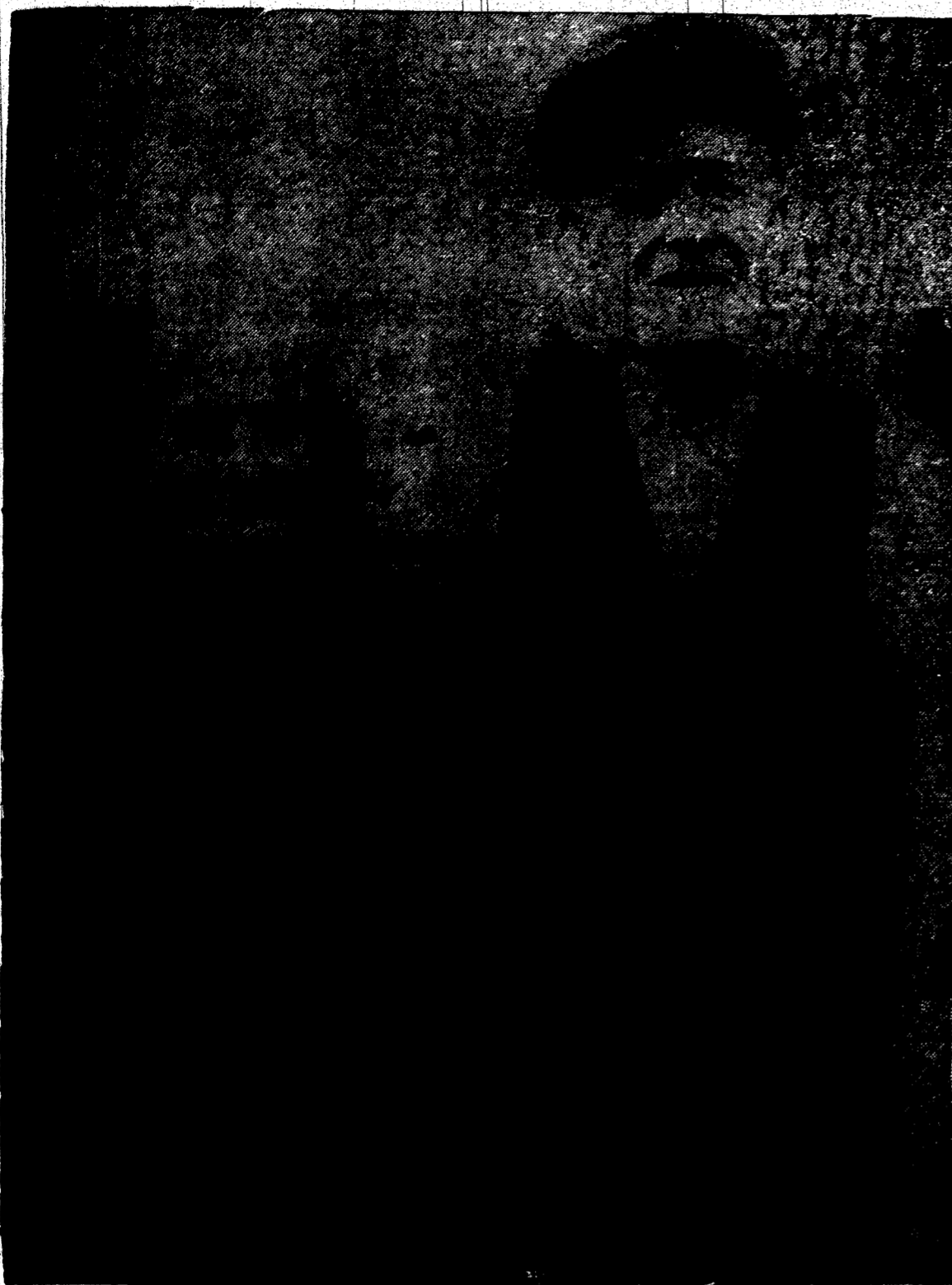

Standing Ovation for Co. Secretary

The long serving Secretary of Waterford County Council retires on Friday next, Mr. Joseph G. Dowling, who has served for a period of 23 years, received a standing ovation at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council, his last meeting.

Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, paying tribute to Mr. Dowling, said he was a faithful servant of the people who worked in a dedicated manner, was a perfect gentleman at all times, who did his work well.

Colr. H. R. Dowd stated that he never before experienced a more courteous or efficient man. Concluding he said the County will surely miss him.

In turn each of the Councillors present associated themselves with the sentiments expressed by the former speakers wishing Mr. and Mrs. Dowling many years of retirement.

Mr. Charles C. O'Connor, County Manager, spoke for the County Council staff.

In reply Mr. Dowling said that he was touched and overcome by the sincerity of the remarks passed. Continuing, he said that he enjoyed his 28 years in Co. Waterford.

Concluding, he thanked everyone for the kindness and courtesy extended to him in the past and he looks forward to many happy years of retirement in Co. Waterford.

"Killer" Stretch at Leamybrien

A letter by Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman of Waterford County Council, was the starting point for a discussion on "the Leamybrien stretch" at Waterford County Council on Monday last. In the letter, Mr. Curran states his attention has been drawn to the fact that there is considerable public concern about the deaths of nine people during the past three years on the main road at Leamybrien. Concluding, he inquired if there were any proposals by the County Council to make this road safer with a view to preventing further deaths.

Included with his letter were proposals from Kilrossanty Muintir na Tire to make the road safer: (1) Enforce speed limits; (2) Improve camber on road, i.e., rise on road; (3) Better lighting; (4) Provision of a bypass; (5) Provision of a roundabout.

Concerning the speed limit which has been erected by the County Council, the fact is that the Garda cannot enforce it until a direction to do so has been received from the Minister for Local Government even though they have

the necessary equipment to do so in Tramore.

A proposal from Colr. S. Whelan, Vice-Chairman, seconded by Colr. P. Cahill, asking the Minister to expedite the order as a matter of urgency within the specified area, was agreed unanimously and on the suggestion of Colr. N. Walsh was forwarded to the Department by telegram to highlight the seriousness and urgency of the matter.

Colr. Phil Cusack put down the accidents to bad manners on the part of drivers and that the light there was more of a hindrance as it dazzled drivers, than a help.

Colr. Curran said that the people of Kilrossanty are fearful of another fatal accident.

Colr. Tom Foley referring to it as the "death stretch" said that some time ago he asked that a kiosk be erected at Leamybrien but it was erected at Kilrossanty instead. Due to the danger there, the day after he had made the request, he saw the kiosk being erected there and he referred to it as a terrible irresponsibility on the part of a State body.

Gold Chain of Office for Deputy Kyne

Mr. John A. Mulcahy, Vice-President of the Pfizer Chemical Corporation speaking in Lawlotts Hotel, Dungarvan, where he presented Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D. with a solid gold chain of office, in memory of his late father, Patsy Mulcahy, Town Clerk, of Dungarvan, from 1907-22 said that he was astounded to read of the charge made in the Press that his company, the Quigley Magnesite Division of Pfizer Chemical Corporation, had been the cause of pollution in Dungarvan Bay resulting in the death of fish. These kind of allegations gave Dungarvan a very bad name he continued and he was personally disappointed that there had not been an immediate reply from the Urban District Council repudiating the allegations.

Referring directly to the National Fishermen's Defence Association he issued a challenge to them on allegations they made on his part in the salmon fishing controversy that was now raging. He stated that his only desire was to bring major contributions to Ireland's economy.

Continuing, he said that he was much disturbed that members of the National Fishermen's Defence Association were condemning him personally for allegedly interfering with the salmon fishing industry in Ireland and that his industrial concerns are the cause of polluting Irish bays and rivers. He went on to say that he made Kerry a paradise for fishermen and for two successive seasons he has employed eight men to remove fishing traps in Waterville, consequently creating rich spawning beds. Having virtually resurrected a salmon hatchery and as a result of these actions 300,000 or 400,000 salmon were this year released in the rivers of Kerry. He refuted the allegations that he himself had taken salmon from the rivers for his Waterville Lake Hotel.

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In the West Cork area, he said that the number of drift net salmon licences issued had been increased to include doctors, solicitors, engineers and dentists, who have no real connection with the fishing industry. They were killing from 40,000 to 50,000 salmon in Castletownbere and no man has the right to do that, he said, whether fisherman or otherwise.

He went on to say that he loved Ireland and wanted to do all he possibly can for his

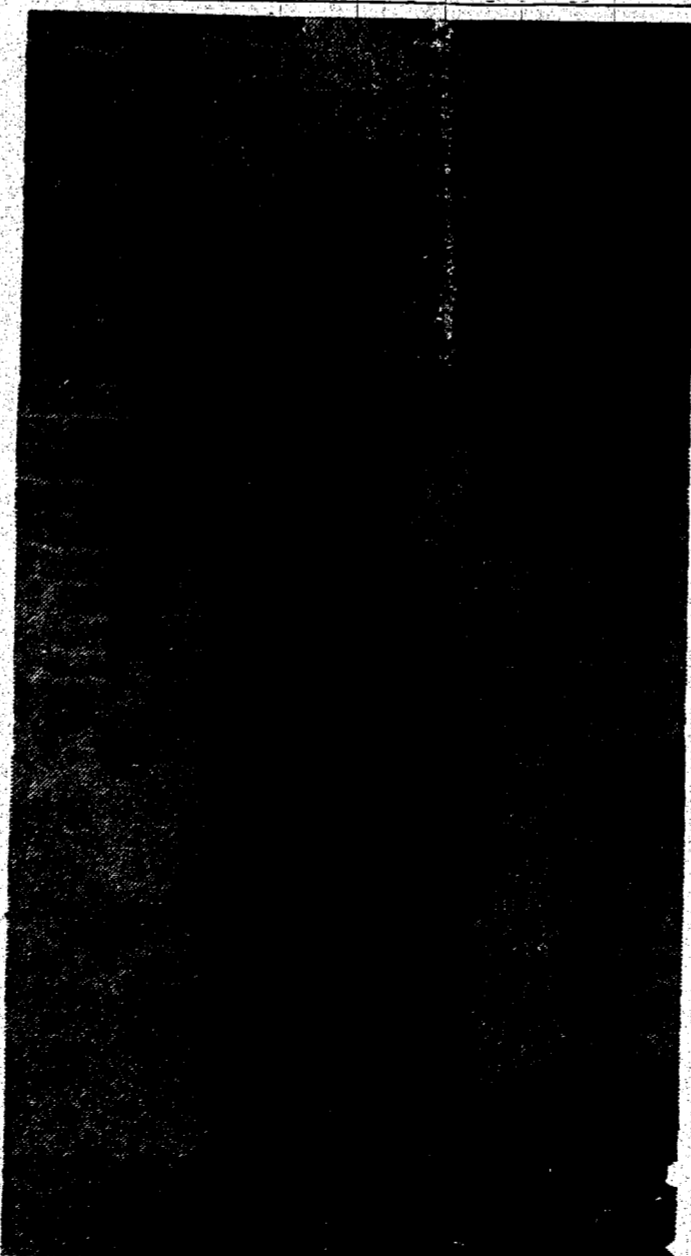
native country. Returning to the salmon fishing industry, he stated the people are losing a priceless heritage and that they should wake up to the fact before it was too late.

In conclusion he referred to his development of the golf course in Waterville which he said would in one year be the best in Europe and one of the top three courses in the world in three years time.

Having accepted the chain of office, Deputy Kyne said he was privileged to be the first holder of it and said it would be a link to tie the Mulcahy family closer to their native Dungarvan. Concerning Mr. Mulcahy's remarks on pollution, he said that the Quigley Magnesite plant had done nothing to cause pollution in Dungarvan Bay and that the U.D.C. would only be too happy to state that fact publicly.

Deputy Kyne then announced that Mr. Mulcahy had contributed 25,000 dollars towards the cost of the proposed £100,000 sports complex.

Each member of the U.D.C. then spoke and voiced their thanks to Mr. Mulcahy.

Improved C.I.E. Services

Mr. J. A. O'Connell, C.I.E. attended the last meeting of Waterford County Council following the criticism of C.I.E. bus services in West Waterford at recent meetings. He announced the immediate introduction of several improved services.

Having considered the criticism raised by councillors, he continued, they were now prepared to introduce additional services which he hoped would bring about the desired improvement and which would meet with public support.

He went on to say that it is now intended to stop the Express bus service in Dungarvan while the daily bus service from Dungarvan to Fermoy would go twice weekly via Tallow, Conna and Castletyons. Also, the weekend train from Dublin to Waterford would be met by a connecting bus to Lismore on Friday and Saturday evenings, returning on Sunday evening to take passengers back to the Dublin train. It is also planned, he concluded, to continue operating a connecting bus service with the Waterford boat train.

Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman, said this decision by C.I.E. was a wonderful gesture in good public relations.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,
Mr. Charles Curran might consider the following facts: large farms (of over 100 acres and averaging about 200 acres) while comprising only 11% of Ireland's agricultural holdings of over one acre and giving only 11% of total agricultural employment, nevertheless control 40% of all agricultural land and over one third of the country's livestock. These 30,000 or so farmers last year netted around £85 millions in earnings and if subjected to normal taxation would have had to forfeit say £25 million. This is sufficient to build in one year 5,000 houses or perhaps 8 major hospitals.

In addition there are thousands of farmers operating less than 100 acres (especially those with small acreage but intensive production) who could also contribute handsomely to the national exchequer. Mr. Curran states that the majority of Irish farmers earn between £12 and £20 a week. It must be remembered, however, that under the tax code as it now stands, strictly speaking, anybody earning over £6 a week is liable to taxation (provided of course he isn't a farmer).

I find it difficult to make sense of Mr. Curran's statement that farmers produce 30 per cent of the national wealth, but only 16 per cent of the national income. There is, of course, a difference between wealth and income, but nevertheless the use of terms here is not at first sight quite clear and I would welcome clarification. It is a fact that agriculture represents 25 per cent of the national work force but only 16 per cent of the national income, but this should not give rise to sympathy, since it is well-known that this country's agriculture is only realising about 50 per cent of its potential. The principal culprits here are the bigger farmers who because of the scale of their

operations can afford to be quite inefficient and still realise eminently satisfactory incomes. Raymond Crotty has suggested that a way to counteract this situation would be to place a tax on the production capacity of land, this would be an incentive to the big farmers to improve on their efficiency.

I don't know where Mr. Curran got the idea that any tax based on stock and acreage must be necessarily punitive, and I would suggest that the use of this emotional team is purely a political gimmick. One would imagine that if such a system were introduced, it would include a judicial body to which farmers could appeal. Such a system seems the only feasible one, until such time as all farmers keep reliable accounts. Any suggestion that no tax at all should be imposed must be ruled out simply on the grounds of fair play.

Mr. Curran seems to be attributing me with assertions which I don't think I ever hinted at; in any case the essence of my original letter was not a matter of fact, but a matter of opinion — namely, that farmers should be taxed the same as everybody else earning a living in Ireland. To object to this suggestion on the grounds that it will drive a wedge between two sectors of the community is out of order, this idea echoes the words of James O'Keefe at the I.C.M.S.A. and is a kin to the objections at the Irish Medical Association to the recently announced changes in the health services. In both cases objections are being put forward as a blatant cover for the simple desire to hang on to the loot. There already is a divide within the community and this will persist so long as one section is in a privileged position not only compared with, but at the expense of everybody else. This divide can only disappear when everybody is subjected to the same treatment.

RECORD COLLECTION—Four-mile-water hurling club's annual collection on Sunday last was an all time record and no wonder with the club in three county finals.

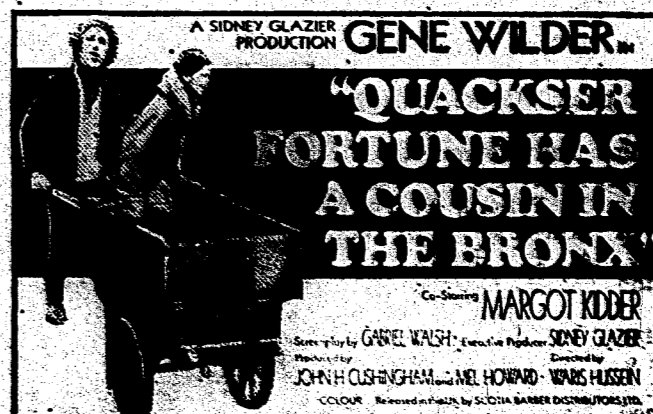

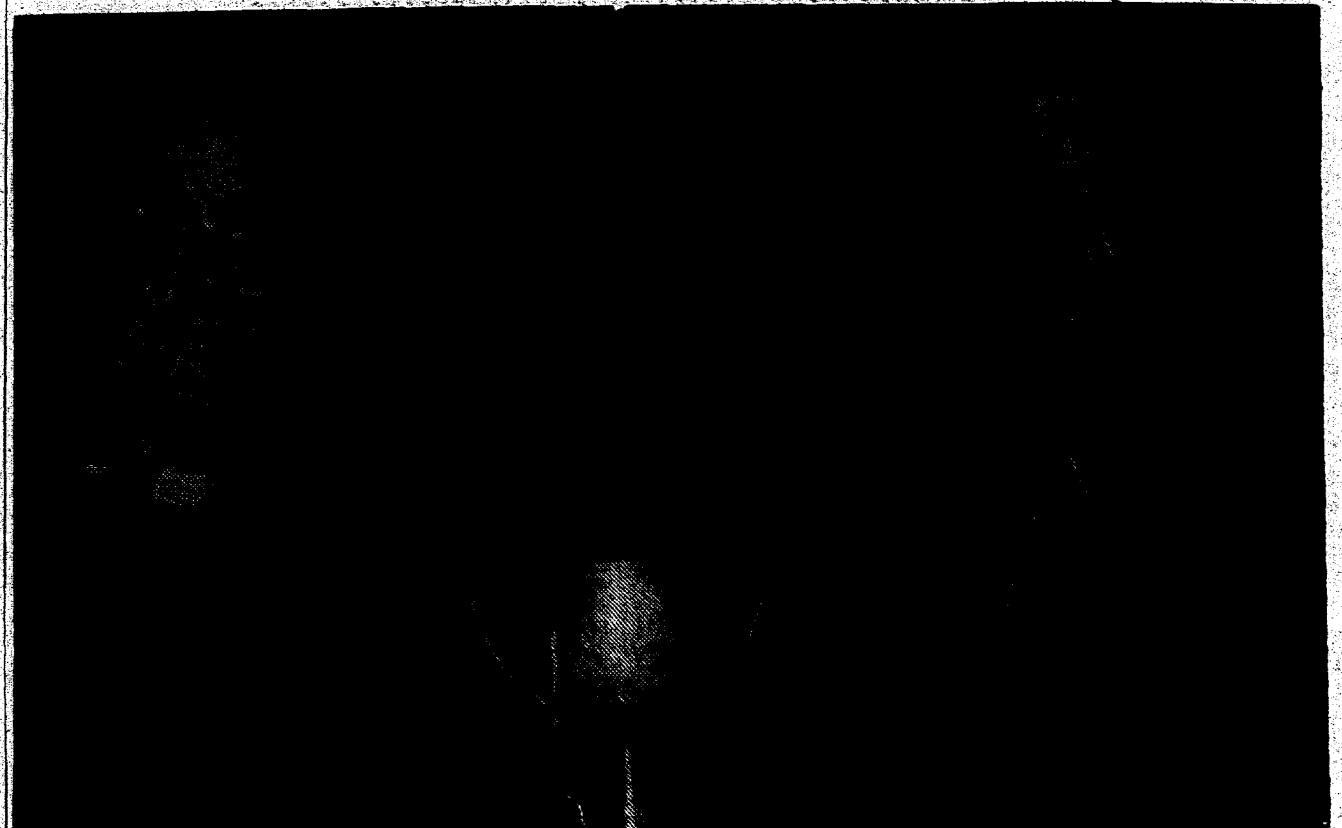

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,
The Industrial Development Authority has just published a statement announcing that since April 1st last it approved grants of £600,000 under the small industries programme, for 45 new manufacturing firms with employment potential of 650 new jobs. I suggest this statement is of special significance for all Gaeltacht areas of dwindling population and I have in mind particularly the Ring Gaeltacht, with an officially estimated population of 833 and an area of 13,000 acres, is the second smallest such area. One may ask how many of these jobs will be in Ring. Has Gaeltarra Eireann yet got any industry established in Ring. What are the obstacles which have so far hindered development there?
On 8th June last Gaeltarra Eireann published a large advertisement in the Gaeltacht paper "Amarach" addressed to all Gaeltacht emigrants living in England and willing to return home if the jobs were got for them. This well displayed notice asked all readers who had friends or relatives in England to inform them that Gaeltarra Eireann would have represen-

tatives to interview such people at specified times in the following cities: London, Liverpool, Glasgow, Leeds, Luton, Huddersfield, Manchester, Coventry and Birmingham, on dates between the 11th and 23rd June. I suggest the time is now ripe to call a meeting to establish a "Ring Development Association". Such a meeting held in Ring or Dungarvan should have representatives of Gaeltarra Eireann, Gaelic League, G.A.A. and public bodies. The meeting could also usefully investigate the possibility of restoring to Gaeltacht status such areas as the Nire Valley, Ardmore and other areas traditionally associated with Ring. And it would hardly leave uninvestigated the possibility of reclaiming the vast area of slob and waste land in Dungarvan Bay. With such activity would naturally go an intensive educational and cultural campaign to emphasise and make more widely appreciated, the heritage of song and story still happily existing in the district.

FOUR-MILE-WATER ARE CHAMPIONS

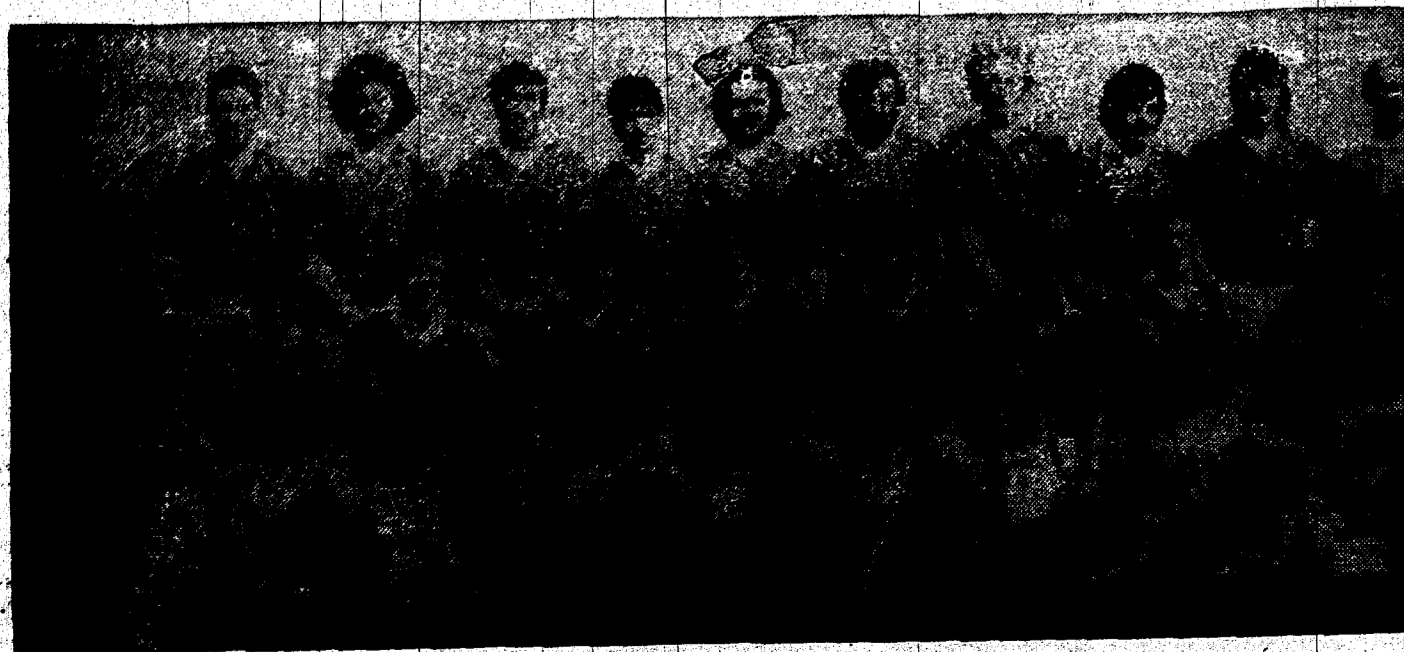
Tempestuous S.H. Final ends in draw

Mount Sion 3-9; Portlaw 2-12.

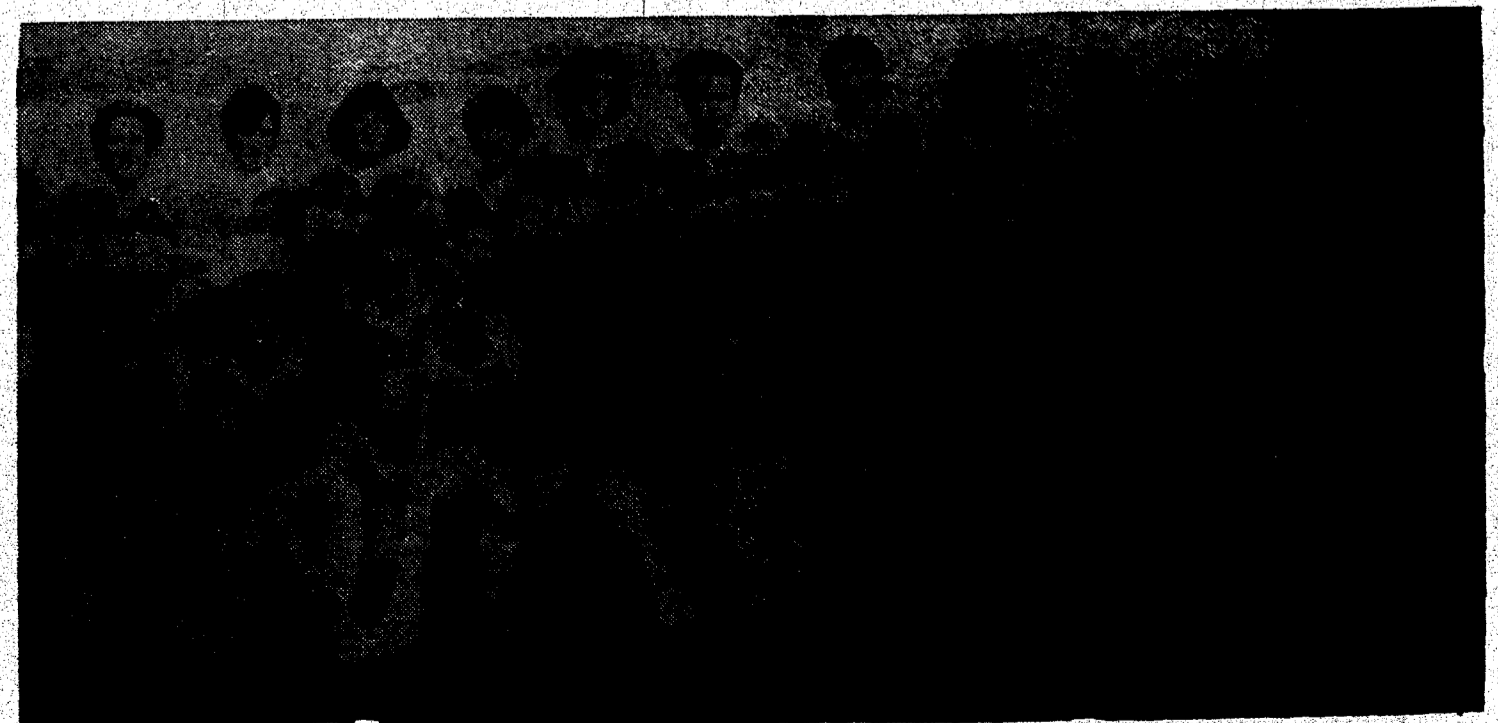
