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## Is Waterford Co-Op Polluting the Area?

THE time has now come when we find we can no longer stand by and ignore the devastating effect to the town of Dungarvan, caused by the effluence of a white powder substance from Waterford Co-Operative Society. This week, in areas adjacent to the plant, shop windows, cars, everything has been coated with this powder.

If one were to leave one's car in the Square, the most central area in the town, even for an hour, the windows would be white. Then when you try to wash it off the water turns to a dirty white. Is it a form of powder milk? If so, what can be more nauseating than decaying milk? Each day early this week, passing through the square, you'd see shopkeepers washing their windows. Certainly windows get dirty and need a wash, maybe once a week but each day or second day is just too much. Then, what of car owners? Is this substance harmless? Some people have had the experience of rubbing it off and the paint work coming off with it. A car wash is 50p. Not too expensive, but

if this release continues, a person just cannot take the chance of not having a car wash at least two or three times a week. Will Waterford Co-Op. foot the bill?

Surely the time has come to put a stop to this? Has an apology been issued by Waterford Co-Operative Society for all the inconvenience they are causing? No! Why not?

Can it be the management are of the impression it is harmless. How can one term this except as pollution. For pollution is what it is! So far no guarantee has been issued that pollution is not being caused. If it is not, why have the management not issued a statement, as Mr. J. A. Mulcahy, Vice-President, Pfizer Chemical Corporation did

recently in Dungarvan when the Quigley Magnesite Plant had been accused of polluting the bay?

The Society uses close on one million gallons of water per day which when further expansion has been carried out will use 1 1/2 million gallons. Have we any guarantee the million gallons of water used daily is not polluting the harbour and the Colligan estuary. Quigley Magnesite were accused of polluting it; they have cleared themselves of the charge. Now Waterford Co-Op. has the gun at its head. Let them clear themselves if they can!

From the tourism point of view, what can be worse for a progressing town? A tourist could not, would not, get a good impression of any place to see the residences, shops and cars on the main streets covered in white dust. They would go away with a lasting impression of the town — an

impression not to visit it again. Is it any wonder the marks Dungarvan are awarded in the Tidy Towns competition are so mediocre.

In a few years time, if this is allowed to continue, Dun- van will be a ghost town. People will ask "Who killed Dungarvan?" What answer could one give to the question? The situation was bad last week but what will it be like when the expansion has been carried out.

The people of Dungarvan and surrounding areas have put up with this long enough. Is the air Dungarvan people breathe polluted?

We call on the Local Authority and the powers-that-be to come to grips with the situation and without any delay to call in pollution experts to go into every aspect of the matter. Dungarvan is a progressing town, but if this is progress, would we be better off without it?

## Opening of Dungarvan Automatic Telephone Exchange

DUNGARVAN'S new automatic telephone exchange was officially declared open on Thursday last, 27th September, 1973, by the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs, Dr. Conor Cruise-O'Brien, T.D. The exchange is part of the programme of telephone development for Dungarvan and the Waterford area generally.

The Minister who was met on arrival at the exchange by Mr. Tomas O'Connell, Postmaster, was accompanied by Mr. Sean O'Droma, Assistant Secretary of the Department and Gerard E. Earright, Engineer in chief.

A distinguished visitor at the opening ceremony and the reception which followed was the Excellency Mr. B. G. Garnstedt, the Swedish Ambassador to Ireland. Other guests included Senators A. Deasy and P. Browne; Deputies T. A. Kynne, W. Kennealy and E. Collins; deputising for the Chairman of the Waterford County Council was Mr. P. Kennealy, members of the Dungarvan U.D. Council, representatives of the local commercial and industrial organisations, the Post Office Unions and the clergy.

The exchange building was designed by the Office of Public Works and built by Messrs. J. J. O'Leary & Sons Ltd., Fermoy. The automatic telephone system was designed by Post Office Engineers and the equipment was supplied and installed by L. M. Ericsson Ltd.

Speaking at a reception in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan, the Minister or Posts and Telegraphs, Dr. Cruise-O'Brien, T.D., said —

"I would like at the outset to welcome you all and to thank you for accepting my invitation to the opening of Dungarvan automatic telephone exchange. To those of you who may wonder why this ceremony is not taking place in the exchange itself I should explain

that the building was designed to accommodate equipment rather than people and has not the space needed to accommodate a group of this size with any degree of comfort.

This is the first occasion since I became Minister for Posts and Telegraphs that I have had the opportunity to be present at the opening of a new exchange. Need I say it is a most pleasant task to come to Dungarvan to-day to announce the introduction of automatic service for its 700 or more subscribers. The new exchange has an initial capacity of 1,400 lines which will be needed to meet the growing commercial, industrial and tourist needs of Dungarvan in the immediate future. I am also glad to say that it has been arranged to provide telephones shortly for those people who are at present on the waiting list. The introduction of automatic service normally stimulates demand for new telephones and there is little doubt that this will happen here as elsewhere.

It is now possible for all subscribers in Dungarvan to dial each other directly. In addition, the exchange is equipped for dialling of calls to about 85% of the telephones in the country by means of the Subscriber Trunk Dialling system, commonly known as S.T.D. The STD codes are shown in the Preface of the Telephone Directory.

Telephone development requires very considerable capi-

tal expenditure. You will, I am sure, appreciate this when I mention that the new exchange in Dungarvan and associate trunk schemes in the Dungarvan area will cost about half a million pounds. The trunk schemes already completed include an underground co-axial cable to Waterford and a major cable scheme linking Dungarvan, Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow. Other schemes for this area include the conversion to automatic working of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow manual exchanges in the Dungarvan Charge Group, these are Araglin, Ballynault, Ballyduff, Ballynoe, Ballymacart, Cappagh and Ring.

I would like to turn for a few moments to the overall position regarding the quality of the national telephone service. That is of course, a matter of considerable concern to me. Many of you will have read the statement of my Department in the daily newspapers last week which gave the background to the current problems. Briefly, many of our main automatic exchanges and trunk routes are overloaded and this is affecting calls in various ways particularly during the busy period of the day. An automatic service cannot work efficiently when there are bottlenecks due to shortage of lines and equipment. The situation is one which will not be allowed to continue uncorrected. I voiced my concern about this position when introducing the estimate for my Department to the Dail in June last and indicated that the problem was a complex one due primarily to inadequate investment in the telephone system.

I will be dealing with this matter again in the Dail in the next session when I plan to introduce a new Telephone

Capital Bill and to outline an extensive and costly five year development programme.

Turning for a moment from the telephone to the postal side, I am glad that a new Post Office is also being provided in Dungarvan — it is in the course of construction just across the street from us. I understand it is hoped to have it completed in the Spring of next year. Dungarvan is a developing town and I am happy that my Department is playing its part in this development.

Before formally opening the service I should like firstly to pay tribute to the subscribers at Dungarvan for their patience and forbearance with the shortcomings of the manual service for some time. These have been due largely to shortage of switchboards which could not be remedied within the existing accommodation. The difficulties were minimised by the efforts of the operating staffs who performed their duties under difficult conditions in a most courteous and efficient manner and for this I feel they deserve a special tribute. I am sure the people of Dungarvan will feel a certain sense of loss that progress in the form of automatic working will deprive them of their personal local operators.

I would like to express my appreciation too of the excellent job done by the local Engineering Staff in developing and maintaining the telephone service in the Dungarvan area. They have often worked long and late hours in order to give the best possible service. I am sure they will give even better service now with the new modern equipment.

Finally, I would like to express my thanks to all those whose efforts have made the new exchange possible.

### ALLEGED DISMISSALS

The Government information bureau states —

Recent reports appearing in the National Press have suggested that the headmaster of a vocational school and an assistant county engineer, both employed in County Waterford were dismissed by the Department of Education and Local Government, and that notice of such "dismissal" was not conveyed until the day of the meeting between the Taoiseach and Mr. Edward Heath, the British Prime Minister.

In relation to the alleged dismissals, it must be pointed out that such dismissals occurred. Mr. Donal Whelan, formerly headmaster of Kilmacthomas Vocational School, and Mr. Gerard Murphy, formerly an engineer with Waterford Co. Council were on May 21 found guilty before the Special Criminal Court of being:

1. Guilty of a conspiracy to unlawfully import firearms and ammunition into the State in contravention of section 17 of the Firearms Act, 1925 as amended by Section 21 of the Firearms Act, 1964.
2. Unlawful importation of firearms and ammunition into the State.
3. Having unlawful control of firearms and ammunition with intent to enable other persons by means of such firearms and ammunition to endanger life contrary to section 15 (b) of the Firearms Act, 1925.
4. Having unlawful control of explosive substances under circumstances as to give rise to a reasonable suspicion that the control thereof was not for a lawful object.

Each one of these offences is a scheduled offence under the Offences Against the State Act, 1939.

Section 34 of the Offences Against the State Act, 1939 says:

"Whenever a person who is convicted by a Special Criminal Court of an offence which is, at the time of such conviction a scheduled offence for the purpose of Part V of this Act, holds at the time of such conviction an office or employment remunerated out of the Central fund or monies provided by the Oireachtas or monies raised by local taxation, or under or as a paid member of a board or body established by or under statutory authority such person shall immediately on such conviction forfeit such office, employment, place or emolument and the same shall forthwith become and be vacant."

No question, therefore, of "dismissal" arises; forfeiture of office occurs automatically and it is neither a Governmental nor Departmental decision. The Department concerned became aware, however, that Mr. Whelan and Mr. Murphy were still employed by the Local Authorities in Co. Waterford and the attention of the Authorities concerned was drawn to this fact by letters dated the 12th of September, that is five days earlier than the meeting between the Taoiseach and Mr. Heath.

The matter was in the first instance a responsibility for the Local Authorities concerned in accordance with the law.

**Advantage gained through E.E.C. under severe pressure**

Over the past few months many of the advantages which Irish farmers gained through entry into the European Community have been under severe pressure in Brussels.

This was stated by Mr. Paddy Lane, Vice-President of the Irish Farmers' Association for Munster, when he spoke at a meeting of County Officers from Limerick, Clare, North Tipperary in Limerick. He said: "These include the Common Agricultural Policy itself, sugar beet quotas, increased levy on beef, a suggested levy on surplus butter production. While on the home front such matters of payment has increased. All these matters can only be dealt with adequately if Irish farmers have a strong united voice in Brussels. From the European point of view this has improved by the involvement of the I.C.M.S.A. on the I.F.A.'s European Affairs Co-ordinating Group, but it can only be 100 per cent if all farmers in the country are prepared to take part in European involvement and also prepared to finance this involvement."

Mr. Lane pointed out that in the North Munster area all co-op marts are now supporting the European involvement fund. Talks are going ahead with four private marts in the area and if these talks are finalised then 95 per cent of the farmers in this particular area will be backing the fund.

He added: "However, 95 per cent is not enough. To make sure that all aspects of Irish farming are dealt with in a comprehensive manner we must, at this stage, strive for 100 per cent involvement, not only in this area, but throughout the whole country."

**Committee of Agriculture Advisory Programme '73/74**

Mr. George T. Frost, Chief Agricultural Officer, at the last monthly meeting of County Waterford Committee of Agriculture, introduced the Advisory Programme for 1973/74. Emphasis will continue to be placed he began, on the exploitation of grass-based products—milk, cattle, beef and sheep. Attention will be paid to intensifying milk production on labour saving lines as has been done over the past few years. In addition, the following aspects which are closely connected with dairying will be stressed (Co. Animal Health Advisory Committee to focus the farmers attention on animal health), slurry disposal, relief milker scheme, attention to breeding and credit. Cattle production from birth to 14-2 years old will be advised and demonstrated. 30 bulls will be fattened and demonstrated held.

**Sheep Prices Hold Firm**

Despite the very large numbers of good quality sheep on offer at Cloomel fortnightly sale on Monday last the trade was still exceptionally good. Best fat lambs £16 to £19.25; seconds, £16.30 to £17.60; strong store lambs, £14.70 to £16.10 each; seconds, £10.50 to £12.90; best breeding ewes, £19.60 to £21; seconds £14.80 to £16.70; rams £20 to £31; draft ewes £7.00 to £8.75.

**Dungarvan Council of Trade Unions**

The Chairman, Mr. P. Walsh informed the October meeting that arrangements were now in hand to hold a series of lectures on Trade Unionism for senior students in the local schools and colleges. These lectures would be held in conjunction with the Irish Congress of Trade Unions who would also supply the lecturer.

In connection with the dismissions of Mr D. Whelan and Mr. G. Murphy, the Council members expressed the hope that the Unions involved would be successful in having them reinstated in their former positions.

All Unions operating in Dungarvan and District are asked to affiliate to the Council and send delegates to the next meeting which will be held on the first Monday in November at AT & GWU Offices, time 8.15 p.m.

The system of encouraging groups of farmers to employ their own part-time recorders is progressing well. It is planned to have three such groups in the coming year at Dungarvan, Kilmacothomas and Lismore. Directive 159 concerning the modernisation of farms is expected to come into operation in early '74.

On the horticultural side, orchard management will continue to be stepped up and people will be encouraged to grub out uneconomic orchards.

Emphasis will be laid in the coming years on the need for a more businesslike approach in the running of the farm house, e.g., budgeting of money, use of money, values and decisions.

Winter farm schools will be held at Dungarvan and Tramore. Classes and lectures will be given on horticultural subjects. Demonstrations, field walks and group meeting will be held.

Africa, to take up a teaching post. John, who is a most popular young man, is noted for his many academic achievements and is assured of a brilliant future.

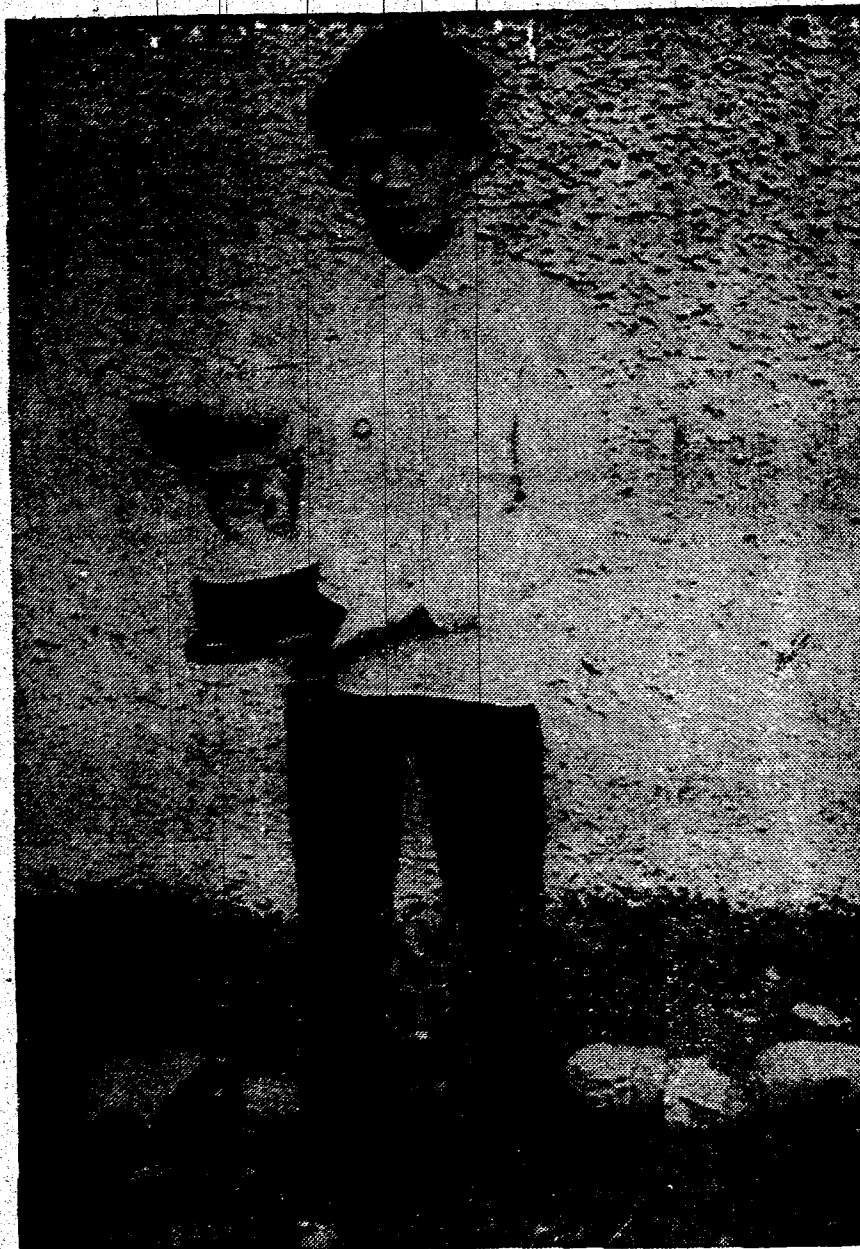

## Co. Committee of Agriculture Annual Outing

COUNTY WATERFORD Committee of Agriculture's Annual Outing took place on Tuesday, 25th September. The first visit of the day was to the hill reclamation areas of Knocknaglogh and vicinity. Several thousand acres of hill land in Co. Waterford are suitable for reclamation and are less difficult to reclaim and manage than hills in other parts of the country, because (1) the elevation—mostly under 700 ft. O.D., (2) they are gently sloping or level, (3) well serviced by roads, (4) generally very dry, (5) early region for growth.

Present land prices make reclamation of this type of land most attractive. The typical soil profile consists of a 3"—4" surface layer of heathery peat on top of 6"—12" layer of stony bleached material. These two layers are separated from a reddish subsoil by a hard pan which is impervious to water.

The nett reclamation costs per acre is £90. The potential of this land for grass production, when properly reclaimed is at least 75 per cent that of good low land.

From there we travelled to Coolcormack to view Modern Developments in Orchard Production at Mr. Pat Spratts. In 1952, 6 acres were planted extensively with 112 trees per acre. In 1970 and '72, 3 and 10 acres were planted respectively, with Golden Delicious, pollinated with Jonathan. In 1970, 600 trees were planted to the acre, while 700 were planted to the acre in 1972. The average yield on third year cropping in the Dungarvan area is 300 bushels per acre, while the potential yield is 500 bushels/acre.

In the afternoon the itinerary took us to

the 86 st. acre farm of Mr. Sean Baldwin, Kilnagrange, Kilmacthomas. This year, Mr. Baldwin had fences removed and replaced by electric fencing, paddocks and roadway. 52 acres of his farm are in paddocks. He has had his milking parlour extended from four to six units with room for a further two units. Ten acres have been reseeded using a new sod seeding technique at a cost of £13.90 per acre. He has 69 milking cows, 21 in-calf heifers and 21 weaning heifers and total milk supplied to Creamery to 31st July is 36,500 gallons.

The last visit of the day took us to the farm of William Cummins, Carrigeen, Kilmacthomas, where we viewed a Rotary Turnstyle Milking Parlour in operation. The farm is managed by Mr. Cummins' 19 year-old son Pat who completed a course at one of the country leading agricultural colleges. In the Kilmacthomas area there are two of this type of milking parlour in operation—a 17 unit and the one on his farm a 20 unit. A third one—a 30 unit is almost completed.

Claims for the Rotary Turnstyle include, (1) greater number of cows per man hour; only one top class operator required; ½ man to remove teat-cups an observation by the Adviser is that ½ men are difficult to find; (3) more pleasant working conditions and less tiring than herringbones. The milking equipment on this unit cost £6,000 last year, while the present cost is £9,000.

This is rapidly developing farm, 60 cows milking this year—which are milked in just over 20 minutes—while it is planned to have 150 milking next year.

Pushing every man forward, they pinned the city side in their own half, but with front runners Tobin, Landers and Elsted sadly out of touch they failed to capitalise on their outfield superiority.

Reduction in Poultry Feedstuffs prices essential

An immediate reduction of at least £10 per tonne in poultry compound feed was called for by Mr. George McMeel, Chairman of the Irish Farmers' Association's National Poultry Committee. He made the call following the reported steep reduction in the price of soya bean meal which not only has dropped dramatically in price, but is now freely available.  
He said this is in sharp contrast when compared with the price structure of soya beans when the millers were allowed to increase the price of £17 per tonne a month ago. Maize was also reported dropping £15 per tonne in the past three weeks on the London market.  
The ideal growing conditions in the United States point to the possibility of a bumper maize crop there, which is expected to reach a target of 6,000,000,000 bushels. He said the soya bean yield is expected to reach a crop total of 6,000,000,000 bushels — an income of 25 per cent on the 1972 harvest. The U.S. soya bean stocks at September 1 last was estimated at 65 million bushels, which is three times greater than had been previously forecast.  
He added an immediate reduction of £10 per tonne in poultry compound feed would be a welcome and most desirable reduction in production costs.

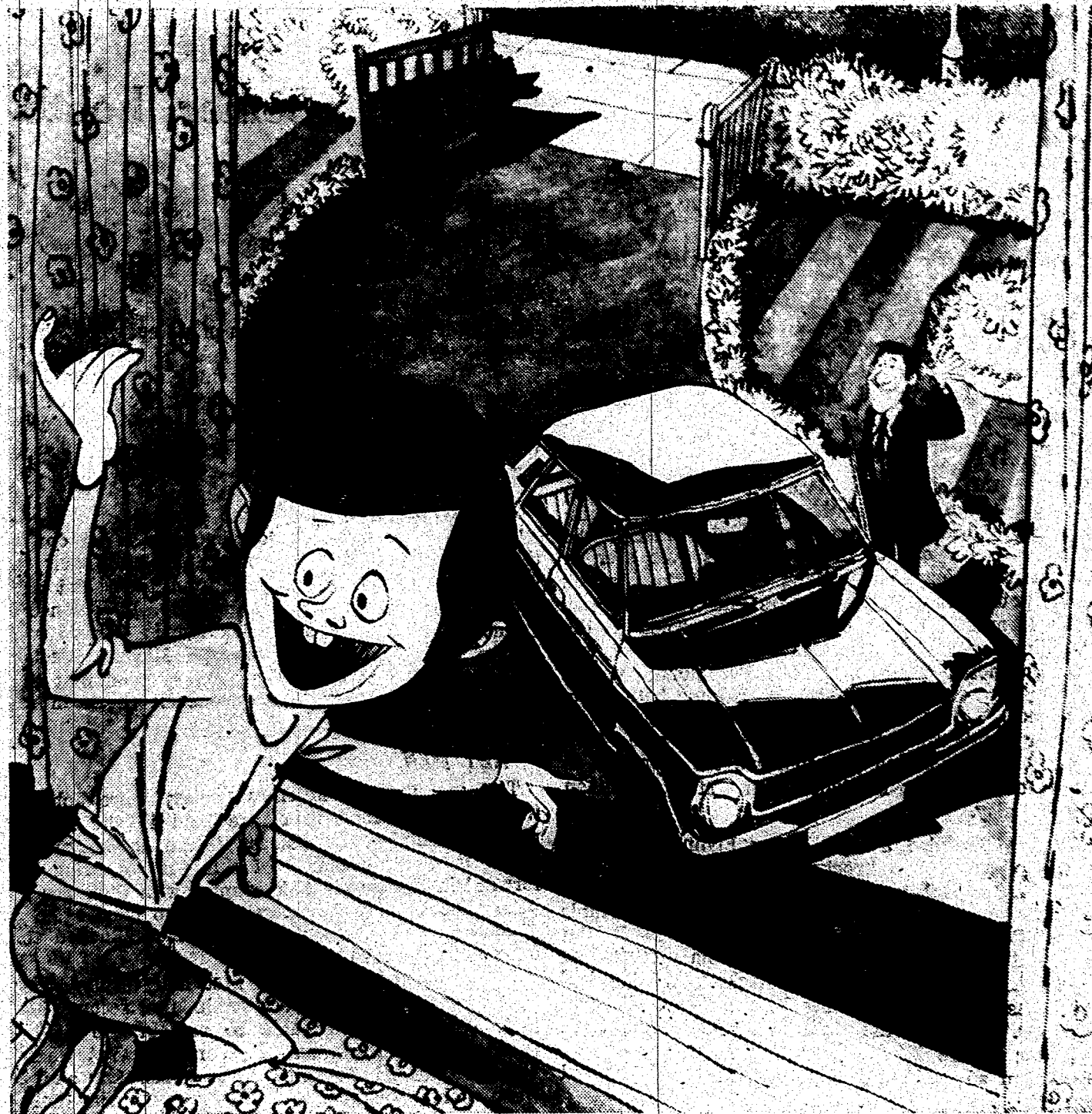
