### Senior Cycle for Kilmac?

At the request of Deputy Minister for Education received a deputation from County Waterford Vocational Education Committee recently to consider the provision of a Leaving Certificate course at Kilmacthomas Vocational School. After listening to the arguments of the deputation, the Minister promised that if the projected new enrolments for the next two years were actualised, then he would be prepared to give favourable consideration for the provision of a senior cycle at Kilmacthomas Vocational School.

At the request of Councillor Kieran O'Ryan, a member of the deputation, the Minister agreed to hear a plea from individual members of the deputation for the reinstatement of Mr. Donal Whelan, under Section 24 (Sub-Section 5) of the Offences against the State Act, 1939. The Minister undertook to place the views of those members who spoke, before the Government and he made it quite clear that Mr. Whelan had forfeited his position under the Act and was not in fact dismissed by the Department.

## BOMB BLAST AT CAPPOQUIN

A modern milking parlour was wrecked in a bomb blast in the early hours of last Monday morning. The property of Sir Richard Keane, owner of a 700-acre estate at Belmont, Cappoquin.

Senior Garda Officers are satisfied the bomb attack had a very definite connection with the ground rents controversy in the town involving Sir Richard Keane, the Cappoquin Estate Company and the Cappoquin Owners, Leaseholders and Tenants Association.

However, officers of C.O.L.T.A. have strongly denied that any of their members had anything to do with the attack on Sir Richard's property as did the Official I.R.A.

Throughout Monday plain clothes detectives and uniformed Gardaí searched through the rubble of Belmont in a search for possible clues and they believe the explosion was the work of an expert.

The blast was skilfully controlled, so much so that nearby farm buildings were completely undamaged and the entire explosion was confined within the modernly equipped milking parlour.

This is understood to be the first incident of its kind in the western end of the county. Cappoquin Estate Co. supplies approximately 6% of the total winter milk supply

to Central Dairies Ltd., Dungarvan.

### FURTHER BOMB FOUND

A second bomb was discovered on Tuesday night last. It is believed it was to go off late on Sunday night last! The bomb was of the alarm type and the wiring operation was so skilfully carried out that Garda officials are convinced it was the first one, the work of experts in the field of explosives.

An estate employee discovered this bomb and he alerted the Gardaí immediately. Two explosive experts were summoned from Collins Barracks, Cork, and the bomb was successfully defused. It consisted of an alarm clock and battery wired expertly and contained a large quantity of sodium chloride and sugar. Found within 50 yards of the wrecked milking parlour, Gardaí are satisfied it was designed to cause serious power blackouts over a wide area.

The bomb was rigged to an E.S.P. pole directly underneath an electricity transformer. Beneath the bomb was a can of petrol and had it exploded it would have completely shattered the transformer with a consequential blackout of the entire estate and a wide area in the direction of Mount Melleray.

The bomb was described as a highly lethal one, capable of causing extensive damage. Its discovery has sparked off the most intensive Garda activity ever seen in the area and uniformed Gardaí and plain clothes detectives under Supt. M. English, Inspector M. Quinn and Det. Garda Thomas McDermott led the investigation.

The possibility of a full scale bombing campaign with Sir Richard Keane's estate and property as the prime targets is now feared. They have openly indicated that they are satisfied the incidents are directly connected with the controversy in the town for several months past on the quest of ground and leasehold rents.

Sir Richard has claimed that he was threatened by a member of a certain organisation and told that unless the rents controversy was satisfactorily resolved he would be subjected to possible bomb attacks.

Round the clock vigilance being maintained on Sir Richard's estate at Belmont and also at his extensive out-farms at Tintur and Crinnane, East and West. The official wing of the Sinn Féin movement has publicly disclaimed all responsibility for Monday's blast as has Mr. John Murphy, Chairman of C.O.L.T.A.

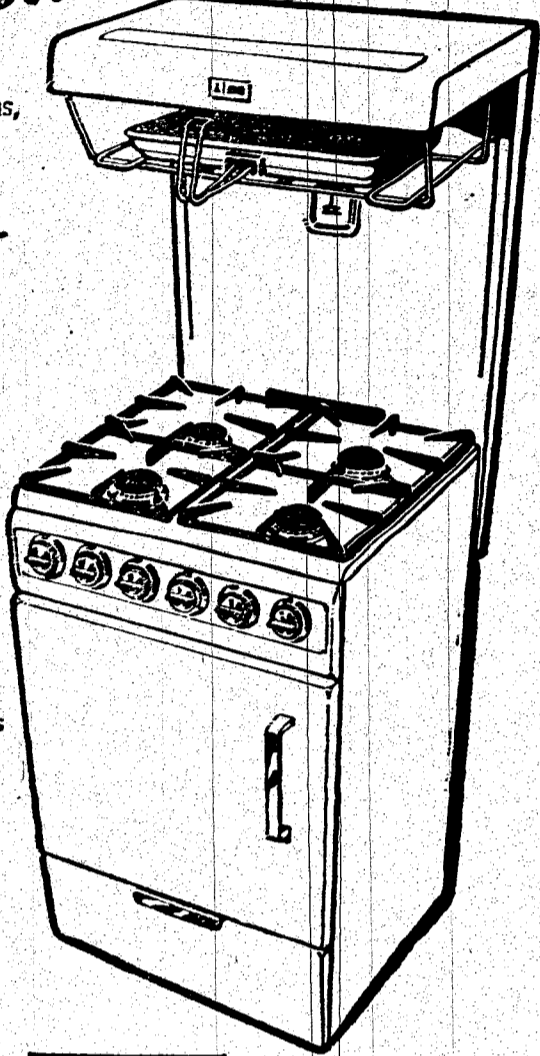

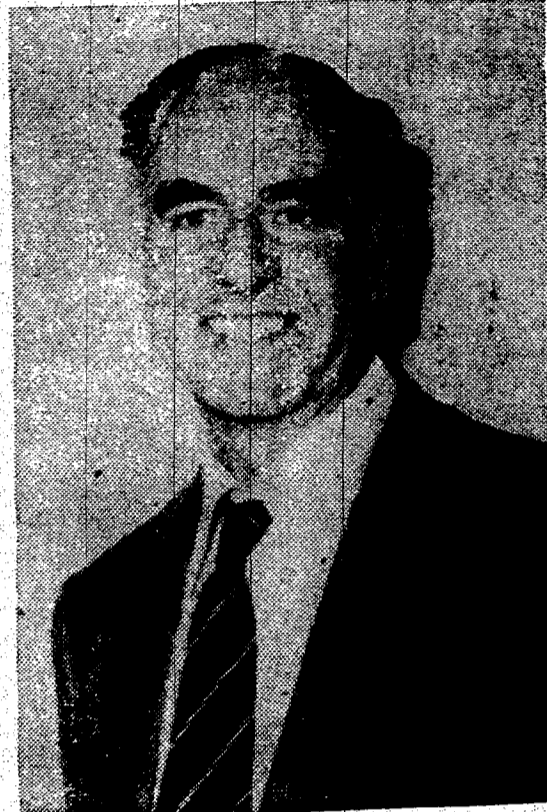

## Getting your Farm

into top gear

FINANCING THE

DEVELOPMENT

There are many sources of credit available to the farmer, especially for productive purposes. There is a lot of money involved in developing even a small farm not alone the bigger ones. This has been brought about by rapidly rising costs and general inflation. The cost of borrowing money has risen rapidly over the last two years and must now be considered the major cost factor facing the younger farmer embarking on a development programme.

**Rates of Interest** : The interest rates charged by the various lending agencies vary widely, and it is imperative that the farmer should carefully consider his credit source and fully understand his commitment in relation to the amount to be repaid and the time given for repayment.

**Sources of Credit** : The chief sources of credit available to the Irish farmer are:

- (a) Banks
- (b) Agricultural Credit Corporation
- (c) Hire Purchase Companies
- (d) Co-Operative Societies and Merchant Credit
- (e) Fertiliser credit scheme.

It should not be necessary for any farmer to borrow from a hire purchase company. Interest rates are much too high and the time to repay is generally too short for any worthwhile farm development scheme.

**The Fertiliser Credit Scheme** as operated by the county Land Project Office is by far the cheapest source of credit at present. The interest charged is a mere 4% and the time given to repay can be up to 60 years. Many farmers who have used this credit scheme for liming and fertilising their farms in past years did not need credit but used this scheme because of the very attractive low interest rate.

**Commercial Banks** : They have been and still are one of the main sources of credit to farmers. They are generally not interested in long term (longer than 5 to 7 years) credit. Rates of interest charged depend on the amount of time the money is borrowed for and are lowest for the six year loan or less.

**Agricultural Credit Corporation** : This is the main body in this country for financing the farmers' needs. It is the only organisation interested in long term credit such as for land purchase, building etc. The rate of interest charged, as with the commercial banks, varies and is highest for long term type of loan. Interest rates charged by the Corporation are however lower for any specific type of loan than those charged by other bodies.

**World Bank Livestock Development Project** : This project is being operated by the Agricultural Credit Corporation and the Banks. Under this project finance will be provided for Livestock Buildings, Development such as reclamation, fencing, roadways, etc.

**Rates of Interest** : The rates charged will be lower than current interest rates but will fluctuate slightly. 66% of the interest charged will be at a fixed World Bank rate and the remaining 34% will fluctuate with current Bank rates.

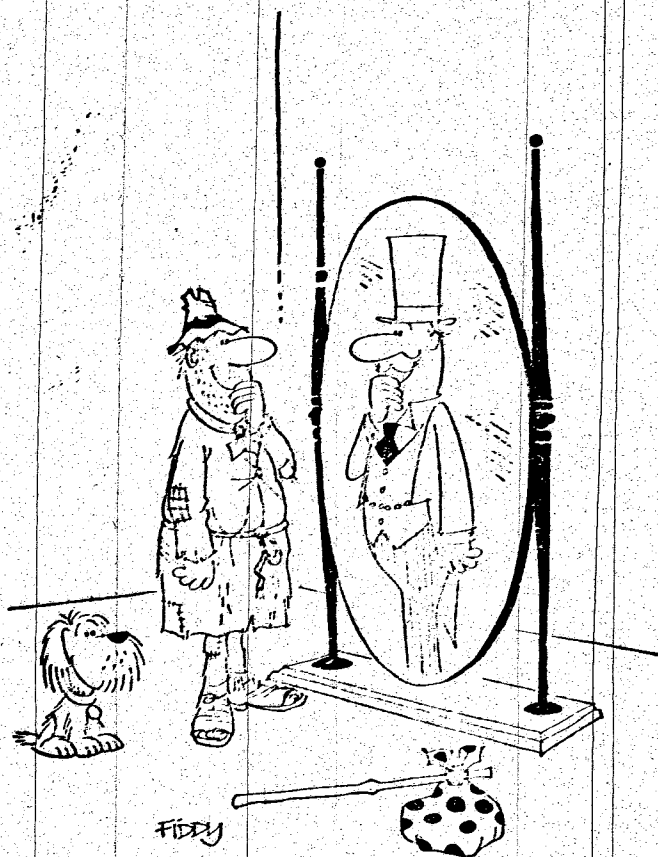

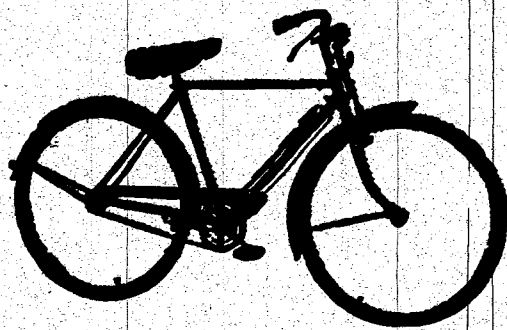

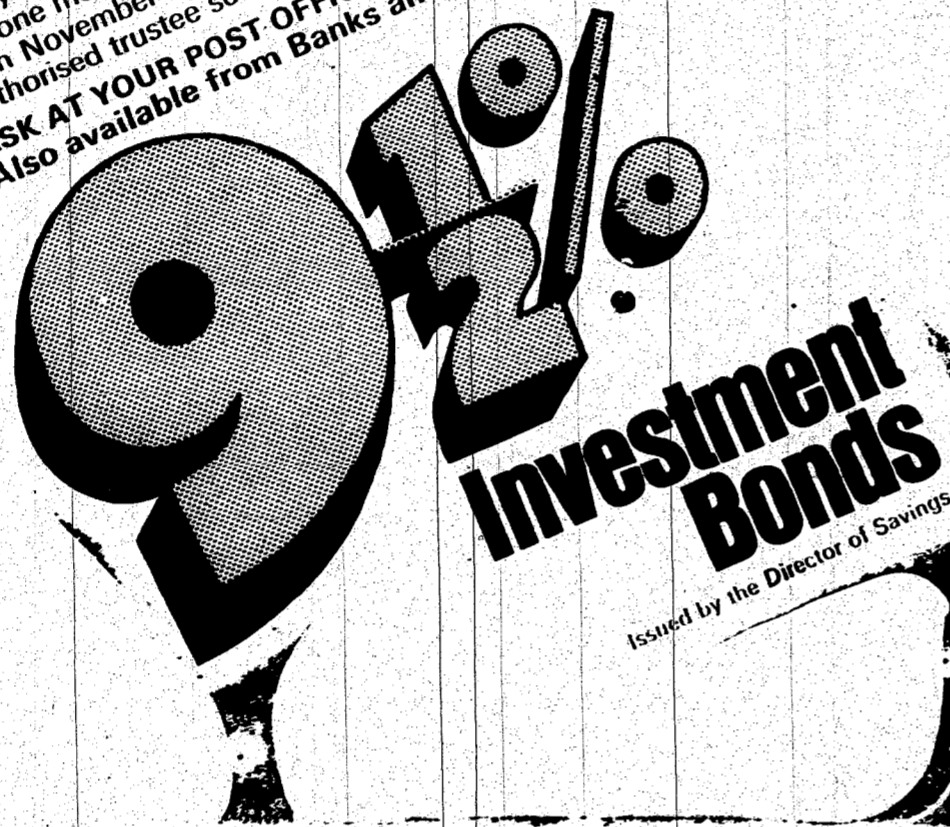

## Scheme for Retirement of elderly Farmers

The importance of generous financial inducements in any scheme to encourage elderly farmers to retire from farming was stressed by Mr. Donal Cashman, Deputy President of the Irish Farmers' Association, at the annual rally of Macra na Feirme in Owenahincha, Co. Cork.

Mr. Cashman referred to statistics in the recent Farm Inheritance Survey published by Macra na Feirme which showed that 48 per cent of male farmers were over 55 and around 25 per cent had no direct successors on the land. There were on the other hand many young farmers with vocational training in agriculture who had difficulty in acquiring land. There was an obvious need for a scheme which would encourage the transfer of land from one group to the other. To meet this need the E.E.C. in 1972 drew up a draft directive announcing that financial aid would be available from the Guidance Section of FEOGA towards the cost of retirement schemes for farmers. Such aid would be directed at farmers between the ages of 55 and 65 and would consist of an annual annuity paid to the farmer and a premium based on the sale value of the land. It was anticipated, however, that member states would offer more generous terms than they should their national situation warrant it.

Mr. Cashman said he expected that the Irish Government in their scheme would go beyond the basic minimum eligible for FEOGA assistance, for example, by extending aid to retiring farmers at least until the qualifying age for the old age pension. The E.E.C. directive specified that the Government agency charged with implementing the scheme would have to deal with the registered owner of the land. Mr. Cashman noted that the Farm Inheritance Survey had highlighted the unsettled nature of many titles in Ireland, with up to 30 per cent of the occupiers of small farms not being the registered owner. This could cause difficulties and delays in the implementation of the E.E.C. scheme. I.F.A. would strongly put to the Government the need to facilitate registration of title.

Mr. Cashman stressed that the suggestion in the draft directive that retiring farmers to be eligible for aid would have to cease working in agriculture altogether would be completely unacceptable to Irish farmers. A retired farmer with his experience and knowledge might wish to continue working for the new owner or a neighbour, perhaps on a part time or relief basis, and it would be ridiculous to debar him from accepting such work.

It was disappointing that the directive did not appear to give encouragement to

the formation of partnerships between father and son, Mr. Cashman said. This was a development favoured in the Macra Inheritance Survey. Yet the father would be excluded from benefiting from the annuity under the scheme because to be eligible, the buyer of his land must already be a development farmer and not someone starting off in farming.

By accepting these proposals in the Irish scheme, its attractiveness would be considerably enhanced. Because the scheme would be completely voluntary, it was essential that its terms be as generous as possible in order to have a significant impact on the problem of land transfer, said Mr. Cashman. He referred to figures in the Inheritance Survey which showed that only 23 per cent of farmers over 55 would be prepared to adopt a retirement scheme and 67 per cent said they would not.

He added that a tremendous effort to publicise an agreed acceptable scheme would have to be made, and this put a great responsibility on the Government, the farming organisations and the publicity media.

## Land under-utilised because of lack of Capital

Quite a large proportion of Irish Agricultural land is either owned or held by elderly farmers, and for many reasons, such as shortage of capital, this land is under-utilised. This was stated by Mr. Paddy Lane, Munster Vice-President of the Irish Farmers' Association, when he spoke at the Muintir na Tire Annual Muintir Week in Roscrea, Co. Tipperary.

But this problem is not unique to Ireland, Mr. Lane said. It is one that has been common to all the countries in the European Community and in the last eleven years some of the Nine, particularly the Netherlands and France, have operated a Scheme to encourage farmers to retire and hand over their land to developing farmers in their own particular regions.

The Scheme, which has been in operation in this country for the past five years has been a total failure. But, Mr. Lane added, that it was hoped that a new Scheme being drafted by the Minister for Lands, Mr. Tom Fitzpatrick, and his Department in conjunction with certain E.E.C. Directives would be found to be very attractive by elderly farmers in this country.

THRILLING STRUGGLE  
GRIT AND SKILL WIN THE SPOILS

Waterford ... 3-10; Wexford ... 2-8.

TAKING on the League champions and present joint-leaders, Wexford, at their home ground in New Ross was really asking the ultimate question of our hurlers. The question which over-rides all considerations, all wins over lesser opposition, all flashes in the pan or lucky breaks — have they really got what it takes?

Well, they have answered it themselves now. They sure have. And Wexford are no longer joint-leaders of the League: Waterford stand out on their own, the team of the moment, the one everyone has his eye on. The Skibereen Eagle wasn't in it with them.

Sunday was an euphoric occasion, an experience which many of the Waterford followers present may have thought ended with the stars of the 1959 All-Ireland. Incidentally, there was a fine turn-out of Waterford supporters, and the players were most appreciative in their comments after the game of the exciting atmosphere their cheering created. It will be remembered that Wexford defeated Waterford in a replay of the League quarter final last spring. They showed much of the same form and power in this game, and Waterford played the same energetic, swift game they played on that occasion. But, this time, Waterford showed how much they have learnt in their experiences in the meantime, the grit to stick onto possession hard won; to give up no advantageous

situation easily; when play swung in favour of the opposition (as it must in any game at this level) to hit back before a serious amount of damage can be done. Most of all, perhaps, the lesson that 60 minutes of all out physical effort should never be allowed to go without the crown of victory — where a small extra demand on tired bodies can ensue it.

## ★ MARVELLOUS START

The first twenty minutes of this third series games of the N.H.L. was a revelation of what Waterford can do. Playing against wind and sun (a stiff breeze during the first-half), they defended grimly and with tight, hard tackling in the opening minutes when Wexford swept down into attack as though intent on finishing the matter early. Every defender showed his quality in those opening minutes, with Foley behind as sound as a bell.

Gradually, it began to be evident that the defenders were not but mastering their men. Now, Mossie Whelan and Pat O'Grady put their backs into it and fears of a winning total for Wexford with the elements behind them disappeared. In the 5th minute Tom Byrne knocked over the opening point for Wexford from a free; they had been wide three or four times, hard-pressed by defenders and had a number of other forced misses through the first quarter.

In a couple of Waterford raids, the ball was moved about with crisp intelligence; Reid had a shot just wide, and then moved sweetly on to another ball to open the score with a 7th minute point. Astonishingly, it was Waterford forcing the pace, now. A marvellous piece of harassment by Canning eventually gained him possession on

the right touchline, a lovely centre, grabbed and hammered in by Martin Geary who is going from strength to strength in this side. A golden goal. In the 11th minute, Pat O'Grady stroked over a point from a free; he repeated the dose in the 12th min.

Stephen Greene grabbed a centre splendidly, but was forced away from goal by massed defenders; nevertheless, he hooked his shot high between the posts. In the 15th and 20th minutes Pat O'Grady's groved swing slotted two more pointed frees — the second 50 yards out. Unbelievably the score was 1-6 to 0-1.

## ★ WEXFORD CLOSE THE GAP

It probably seemed too easy; there was a slight relaxation simultaneous with a realisation by Wexford of how desperate their position was fast becoming. Jacob began to make a strenuous effort at mid-field; balls fell thick and fast in Waterford's goal area; Coady, Kirwan and Hanon massive. Eventually, it was a long lob to the left hand post that saw M. Casey force the ball past Foley. Many thought it a foul; almost everyone thought it a "square goal"; but it stood. After 25 minutes Mick Jacob pointed a 70, Wexford pressure continuing. But, immediately, Waterford raised their game; down the middle; Canning slipped a beautiful pass to Geary who burst past a despairing tackle went like the hammers for a goal and as a hurley flew after him palmed the ball past Pat Nolan. Unhappily, the referee had counted; two instances where the luck cruelly counted against Waterford. O'Grady pointed that free and another a minute later in the 28th minute, and Tom Byrne from a free replied with a point for the home team before half-time. Waterford 1-8; Wexford 1-3.

## ★ WEXFORD PRESSURE

The previous Sunday, against Tipperary, Wexford had raised their game greatly to gain victory in the second-half, so it was no surprise when they tore into attack. Again the defence earned its spurs, before Martin Quigley struck a good point in the 3rd minute. Christy Keogh landed another in the 4th. For an ominous moment it looked as though Wexford might overpower the lighter opposition. But, only a moment, as Waterford fought back into the game courageously, O'Grady pointed a hard-earned free in the 7th minute.

Byrne replied in kind to put the game back in the balance. 1-9 to 1-6.

## ★ RESOURCEFULNESS

Waterford now showed great resource, when, even under pressure they managed to make the best of half-chances. Geary whipped on a ball from wing to wing; Stephen Greene drew out the back before pushing it back to Heffernan rushing through the centre; he staggered through two tough tackles, drew the full-back and palmed to Canning on the corner of the square. Liam plucked it like a man picking blackberries... and lashed it past Nolan bursting the net with the force of the shot.

A great lift, that goal. But just in the instant of self-congratulation Waterford let Wexford down-field and Byrne's drive beat Foley under the bar as Tony Doran rushed in. 2-9 to 2-6. In the balance again. Martin Quigley swept over a point. Would Waterford fold up?

## ★ FINAL EFFORT

On the contrary, they fought ball for ball, attack for attack for five full minutes

scoreless, gradually gaining the fall of play; the half-forwards worked like trojans here doing every kind of job. Finally, Reid followed in and fastened to a breaking ball, as he was about to be steamrolled by driving backs he coolly lofted a palmed ball towards the square. Stephen Greene leaped between two defenders and managed to charm the ball into the net. That was the clincher. Quigley pointed again; and Martin Geary swept in to collect a ball after a move through the field and brushed his man aside before blazing just above the bar for a great final fanfare.

A team effort; no stars. Or, more correctly, all stars. No one should be mentioned above another.

Next day out, the opponents are Kilkenny — who will now be desperate for points after their defeat by Cork on Sunday last. This time, however, Waterford meet them not as serfs with a tug of the forelock, but as equals in the hunt for ranking as the country's best.

And after that Limerick in Pairce Ul Thearachair. What a day and what a crowd that will be.

## NEW RULES

Last week-end try outs of the proposed rule changes certainly provoked plenty of discussion. At last two of the changes seem certain to be adopted i.e. the no charging of the goalkeeper within the present square and the minor one affecting side line kicks, which allows the player to place the ball himself for the kick. What of the other changes. Well the ones dealing with the pick up and tackle are certainly the most controversial.

My view of the pick-up is that it is one of the basic skills of the game and personally I believe that it must remain a part of our game. I don't subscribe to the idea that we have had no good football games at inter-county level in 1973. Surely, All-Ireland champions Cork and Galway showed us how good a game of football can be in this year's final.

Players have become so expert with the fisted pass that I believe that we should stick with it. Also I have my doubts about the enlarged square, while the suggested change in respect of the tackle is one which will need plenty of thought before any decision is arrived at. Two points are most important to note, are that the changes should evolve slowly where possible and not all in one big rush. Any changes which are finally decided upon will apply right down to the most humble juvenile game.

## Gaelic Jottings

### DUNGARVAN'S GOLDEN YEARS

The return of Dungarvan's footballers to a county final naturally brings back memories of other days. The Old Boro club heads the list of senior county title winners, with twenty titles to their credit. They won five titles in a row from 1926 to 1930. Collected two more in 1937 and 1938. Then came the war years and Kilrossanty, Stradbally and Dungarvan turned in some of the greatest football ever seen in this county. Kilrossanty won out in 1939. Stradbally then took over and ruled the roost for five years 1940 to 1944 inclusive and even the inclusion of the great Paul Russell in the Old Boro team failed to halt Stradbally's wonder team.

The tide turned in 1945 and these were the truly "Golden Years" for the Dungarvan club, as they lorded the scene and won four titles on the trot. The Dungarvan teams of that "Golden Era" were back boned by such really accomplished footballers and great club men as Cristy Moylan, Jackie Goode, Willie Barron, Jimmy Mountain, Tom Curran, Mickey Landers, Paul Lannon, Mickey Tobin, Terry Donnelly, Percy Butler, Frank Fearly etc. Truly Dungarvan were a wonderful club in the forties and early fifties and one still has vivid memories of those great years and of very good Dungarvan teams right up to the mid fifties. They won out in 1954 and they were very unlucky to lose to Mount Sion, who were then quite a force in football after a thrilling final in 1956. Eamonn McCarthy starred at wing back on that occasion, while Liam Shalloe, Tom McHugh and of course Tom Cunningham who was without doubt one of the best footballers ever produced by the Old Boro club and

Val Kyne were others to star in the '56 decider.

In these brief few lines it is difficult to do justice to the wonderful history and tradition of Dungarvan football. Certainly their absence from the senior grade has left a void in Waterford football and we will all be hoping (without the exception of Roanmore) of course that Dungarvan take an important step on the road back to senior competition on Sunday next.
