Industry promised for Ring Gaeltacht

Ring, the only Gaeltacht area in the country without its own industry, has a promise from Mr. T. O'Donnell, Minister for the Gaeltacht, of a food processing plant. However, prior to this the Government has to be satisfied that the necessary manpower is available to operate it. This revelation was made on Monday last by Fine Gael Senator Austin Deasy, at the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee's monthly meeting. Senator Deasy said the Minister is anxious to rectify the situation as to Ring Gaeltacht having no industry and if it can be proved the necessary manpower is available to staff a plant, he has guaranteed an industry. The plant will give employment to both males and female.

A survey is to be carried out by the National Manpower Service to determine whether the necessary workforce will be available. Senator Deasy went on to say that as Dungarvan was a town of full employment, industries were sceptical in coming to the area due to the fear of lack of available manpower. When the result of the survey is known it will be forwarded to the Minister, the Council.

ENGINEERS'

DISPUTE

In view of inaccurate and biased statements made at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council it is necessary to clarify once again the issues and related facts.

The Engineers employed by Waterford County Council are members of the Amalgamated Unions of Engineering Workers, the largest Engineering Trade Union in the country and the third largest of all the Trade Unions in the country. The A.U.E.W. has operated in Waterford County since at least as far back as 1926. The Engineers concerned were never members of any other Trade Union. It can thus be seen that Mr. Kyne T.D. is incorrect in his reference to Engineers trying to form a breakaway union. Mr. Kyne belongs to the A.T. G.W.U. which has approximately 50,000 members affiliated to the I.C.T.U. The A.U.E.W. has approximately 40,000 members similarly affiliated.

Mr. Kyne further states that if the right of A.U.E.W. to represent Engineers is recognised by the County and City Managers' Association the members of the Local Government and Public Services Union will go on strike. As far as A.U.E.W. can ascertain a ballot of L.G.P.S.U. members would be required to decide whether to take strike action on any issue and no such ballot has been taken or even arranged. Further, as far as A.U.E.W. is able to ascertain, the bulk of the rank and file L.G.P.S.U. members are not opposed to the recognition of A.U.E.W.'s right to represent its members.

Reference has been made to "Go Slow" by Engineers. Again this is erroneous. Engineers are refusing to work unpaid overtime; they are also working strictly within the framework of Regulations and Managerial Orders applied to Local Authority operations. Heretofore, they have, in the interests of efficiency, worked illegally outside regulated procedures, at the real risk of surcharge by the Local Government Auditor.

This dispute is regretted as much by the members of A.U.E.W. as much as it appears to be by the County Councillors and the general public. It could be resolved very quickly by the recognition by the County and City Managers Association of A.U.E.W.'s right to represent its members. That this is the sole right of the C.&C.M.A. is admitted by that body. It further admits that "it would have to have strong grounds to deny representation to a Union representing a significant number of Local Authority Officers." The Union in fact represents almost 400 of the 550 Local Authority Engineer Officers.

Purchase of Friary

Hall not viable

At its October meeting Dungarvan Urban Council decided that the feasibility of purchasing the Friary Hall as a concert hall be investigated. In a report to the Council Mr. C. A. O'Connor, County Manager, says that the Council already has under its control a dual purpose dancing and concert hall at the Town Hall. In the past, many concert groups have used the Town Hall successfully as a concert hall. Therefore the acquisition of a further building for the sole purpose of drama and concerts with all the attendant overheads, would not be a viable proposition.

The current running costs of the present Town Hall over the last five years have shown excess expenditure over receipts by an average of £530 per year. On this basis, the report concluded it can be clearly seen that the purchase of the Friary Hall could not be recommended.

Senator Austin Deasy suggested that the Choral, Dramatic and other such societies including the Brass and Reed Band be advised to contact the Arts Council of Ireland. They got a subvention of £1m. he said and as far as he can see it is not being spent outside of Dublin.

Tom Kyne in the Dail

Mr. Lemass: Could we have a quorum, please?

Mr. Kyne: I suppose I should begin by complimenting Deputy Lemass on getting me an audience. My Contribution will not contain any notable feature. I have no particular qualification to speak on the Department of Education. I avail of the opportunity afforded by the Estimate to bring before the House some point of view of my constituents, ordinary people, and to express some of the grievances they have which they feel should be ventilated in the House or directly to the Minister. I have communicated with the Minister on most of the points that I am about to raise and got the usual acknowledgment but I do not know that anything has been done.

In particular I want to raise with the Minister the question of the pre-med. dentistry course for students in University College, Cork. As I understand, some 19 students were taken into the class and, having passed the examination and, in one case at least, having paid £800 for the year, they were told that there were only ten places and that nine of the students would have to take up dairy science or some other subject or that they could seek places in Galway, Birmingham, Glasgow or some other university. The parent of the student I have in mind tried all of these places, to no avail. There was no place. This is wrong.

I understand that it is customary not only in dentistry but in other subjects that students may be taken in and fees are paid and when the students have passed the qualifying examination they are told there is no place for them. In my view that represents an injustice. Whether the Minister has direct responsibility or not, as Minister for Education it would be up to him to see to it that this would not occur. The parents in the case that I speak of would be quite happy if the student would not get a place this year would be given an undertaking that she would have priority next year in getting a place in the class. That is not usually done but I suggest that in all walks of life a person who has passed an examination and has had to wait a year should get a place the following year. This is one of the matters about which I have communicated with the Minister and, as I have said, got an acknowledgement but I do not know what has happened or if anything will happen. I would like the Minister to see if any solution can be found particularly in relation to their having first preference next year.

The second matter in which I am interested is a matter in which my constituents are also interested and one in which they feel aggrieved. On the fringe of the Gaeltacht area in Ring, in the Old Parish area, there are some 24 secondary school pupils; some are going to Christian Brothers, some to the Mercy Convent and a number to the Vocational School. They have to walk, thumb a lift or cycle to school in Dungarvan which is six or eight miles distant. They are not permitted to have a bus because there is a private all-Irish school in Ring. It is the parents view that an academic training through Irish is not what they believe will profit their children and they are anxious that their children should get their educational qualifications through the medium of their home language which is English.

I have communicated with the Minister in connection with this matter and the Minister said he would like to wait until a meeting was arranged between the Irish college and the representatives of the Vocational committee. This was approximately last May. As a member of the Vocational committee I raised the matter and I have been endeavouring to get the representatives of the Irish College to meet the Vocational committee to see if

they can iron out the problem. The Irish college representatives have not met us yet and so far as I know, they have no intention of meeting the committee.

I was accused of seeking to deprive the Irish college of pupils. That is absolutely wrong. None of these pupils would be attending the Irish College. None of them is attending the Irish College. There was absolutely no intention on my part to deprive the Irish College of any student. It would have been a physical impossibility anyway. All I was doing was endeavouring to see that the children of the people concerned would get an opportunity of attending the schools of their choice.

The Minister should try to find a solution. Should the representatives of the Irish college keep on delaying, thereby depriving these 24 children of facilities given to secondary school pupils all over the country, then I urge that they not be allowed to deprive these children of that facility by their abstaining from meeting the members of the Vocational committee. The Minister should step in and decide whether or not these pupils are entitled to a bus to take them to the schools of their parents' choice. Most of them are attending the Vocational school as the parents believe this is the education which will best fit their children for life later on as against the academic education given in the Gaelic language. I am not arguing that the education in the all-Irish school is not as good, possibly better, than the children would get elsewhere.

Mr. Wilson: Much better. It is a very good school.

Mr. Kyne:—to fit them for the roles they will play later in life. The Minister has a responsibility and he should give these children an equal chance with their contemporaries throughout the country.

I have had complaints from ordinary working men and their wives about the cost of books. Where two or three children are attending a secondary school the cost of books is enormous. Some of these books cost £2.50 and £3 each. If these people could prove they were not able to provide the books they would get assistance. The criterion in my area is the medical card. I do not believe this is the right way to approach the matter. In England, as most people know, school books at all levels—pencils, jotters and all the essential paraphernalia—are provided free. The materials essential to educate our children should be provided by the State. It might mean a considerable increase in the Estimate for the Department of Education but, remembering the extent to which we have gone to provide free transport and so forth, this further step is absolutely essential.

I raise these three matters because I was asked to do so by my constituents. I have no particular qualifications, as I said, to discuss education and the method of educating our children and I feel a little ashamed standing up here in this debate, having listened to so many qualified teachers, both secondary and primary, speak on this Education Estimate. However, as an ordinary man, it is my responsibility to put forward the views of my constituents to the Minister.

Finally, on behalf of my Trade Union movement I should like to draw the attention of the Minister to the picket of the College of Art for the past four months. I know this is not his responsibility and he has, perhaps, no right to intervene, but I would ask him to use his good offices to see if some solution cannot be found to resolve whatever difficulty exists between the two trade unions involved.

Registration of riding establishments by Bord na gCapall

There has been an excellent response to the Bord na gCapall scheme of voluntary registration of riding establishments announced last June. By the end of October, a total of 43 establishments had already been inspected and 25 others had formally applied for inspection. In addition, a further 76 had been visited for the purpose of discussing the scheme, and of this number 23 had taken the initiative in contacting the Board. Altogether, the Board is aware of about 250 establishments which come within scope of the scheme.

Intended to run for a limited period, the scheme is designed to assist owners of riding schools and other establishments which led out horses on hire for leisure riding, hunting, trekking, etc., to prepare for the introduction of compulsory licensing as provided for under the Horse Industry Act, 1970.

Establishments which meet the required standard are registered by the Board in one or more of four categories. These categories are not a grading system, but refer to the service offered by the establishment. It is a condition of the scheme that a registered establishment will not operate in a category for which it is not registered, but at any time application may be made for registration in another category. The inspection carried out by the Board seeks to establish the general level of accommodation and care provided for the horses, their state of health, the precautions taken against disease and fire, the suitability of the equipment available and the competence of the instruction

offered. Establishments which fail to meet the Board's requirements are given detailed recommendations about improvement necessary, and are invited to re-apply when these have been implemented.

Speaking about the scheme, Mr. John Wright, Assistant Manager, Equitation Division, Bord na gCapall, said that Irish horses have a quality image in Europe, but in the eyes of visitors to the country this is sometimes not reflected in our riding establishments. Stable management, drainage, general cleanliness and tidiness, were all areas in which effort and understanding would bring great improvements, and he was very encouraged by the wholehearted response to the scheme. However, he instanced the lack of fire precautions as a frequent defect which had resulted in the issue of a special circular to all establishments.

Mr. Wright said that Bord Failte had decided to base its promotional material for riding holidays, etc., on registered establishments only. In addition, early in 1974 Bord na gCapall will publish in booklet form comprehensive details of registered establishments and this booklet will be made available at Fairs and Shows in Ireland and throughout Europe in which the Board is involved.

Establishments wishing to avail of these publicity outlets should apply for inspection and registration as soon as possible. Mr. Wright concluded by saying that it is expected that the development of standards resulting from the scheme will bring about a greatly increased interest among the general public in riding for pleasure.

Late Patrick (Paddy) Curran

T.B. AND BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEMES

CATTLE IDENTIFY CARDS
The existing blue and pink cattle identify cards issued under the above schemes will gradually be replaced by red and green cards respectively as from 12 November, 1973. The existing yellow cards will continue to be used in the Bruellosis Clearance Area to indicate the stage of eradication of the disease which has been reached in the herd from which an animal comes. The change-over will take place as quickly as possible but existing blue and pink cards will retain their normal period of validity until the issue of the new cards is completed.

The new cards contain an additional provision for identifying marts at which an animal has been sold and indicating the lot number and date of sale. Mart owners and purchasers of cattle should ensure that this section of the card is completed before the animal is removed from the mart.

THE LOW LEVEL OF IRISH FARMERS' INCOME

The preliminary results of the Agricultural Institute's 1972 Farm Management Survey clearly show that the farm family income situation in Ireland is still at a very low level, relative to incomes in the other sectors of the economy, and particularly to farm incomes in the other Member States of the European Community.

This was stated by Mr. Lorcan Blake, Chief Economist of the Irish Farmers' Association, in a statement.

He said the fact that the average farm income per family labour unit in 1972 was £1,113 per head and that 62 per cent or more than 100,000 farms earned a family income of less than £1,000 strongly illustrates this very important point.

In assessing the farm family income position and in comparing farm incomes generally with incomes in other sectors, the disparity between the hours worked per week in each sector is often overlooked. Reliable estimates indicate that dairy, liquid milk, pig and poultry enterprises require on average, a 65 hour, 7 day working week and in many cases for the full 52 weeks of the year. This situation is in sharp contrast with the normal 40 hours, 5 day working week involved in employment in almost all other sectors of the economy.

Farm family income, as indicated in the report, is the reward to all members of

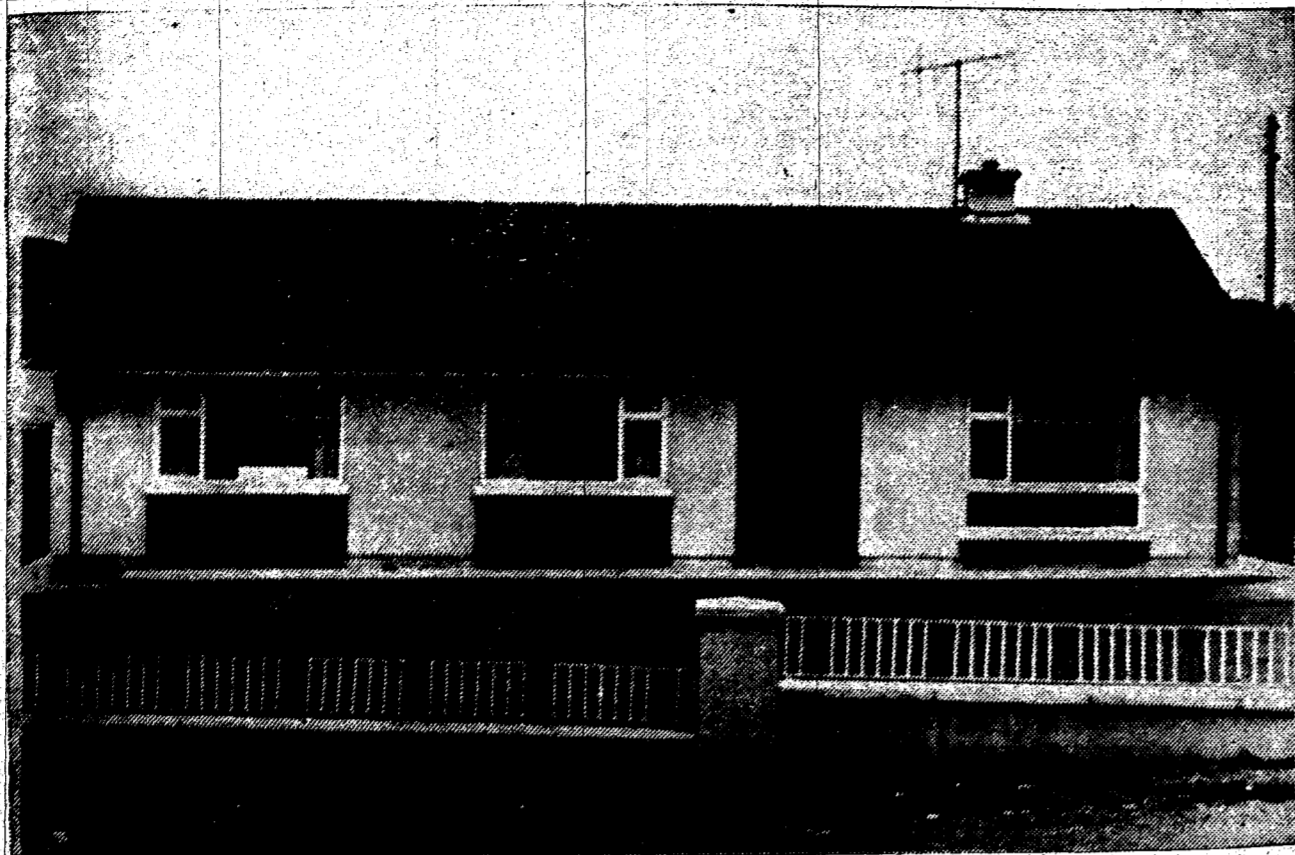
the family working on the farm for their labour and management contributions and their return on the necessary substantial investment required in a capital intensive industry. When comparing farm incomes with those in the other sectors sight should never be lost of the fact that the wage and salary earners are being rewarded solely for their labour and/or management contribution.

From a regional point of view variations in the levels of income as outlined in the report, ranging from £637 and £681 per average family farm income in Ulster and Connaught respectively, to £1,749 in Munster clearly indicate the urgent necessity for the early adoption and implementation of the E.E.C. proposed Directive concerning the disadvantaged areas of the Community.

The disparities of family farm incomes on a farm size basis suggests that the introduction of an attractive retirement scheme for eligible farmers is essential in order to make land available for developing farmers who require such land.

The report clearly shows that the actual performance in all systems of farming throughout all regions of the country falls very short of the potential of Irish agriculture and it indicates the urgent need for further capital investment in order to increase output and income per acre and per farm family member, Mr. Blake said.

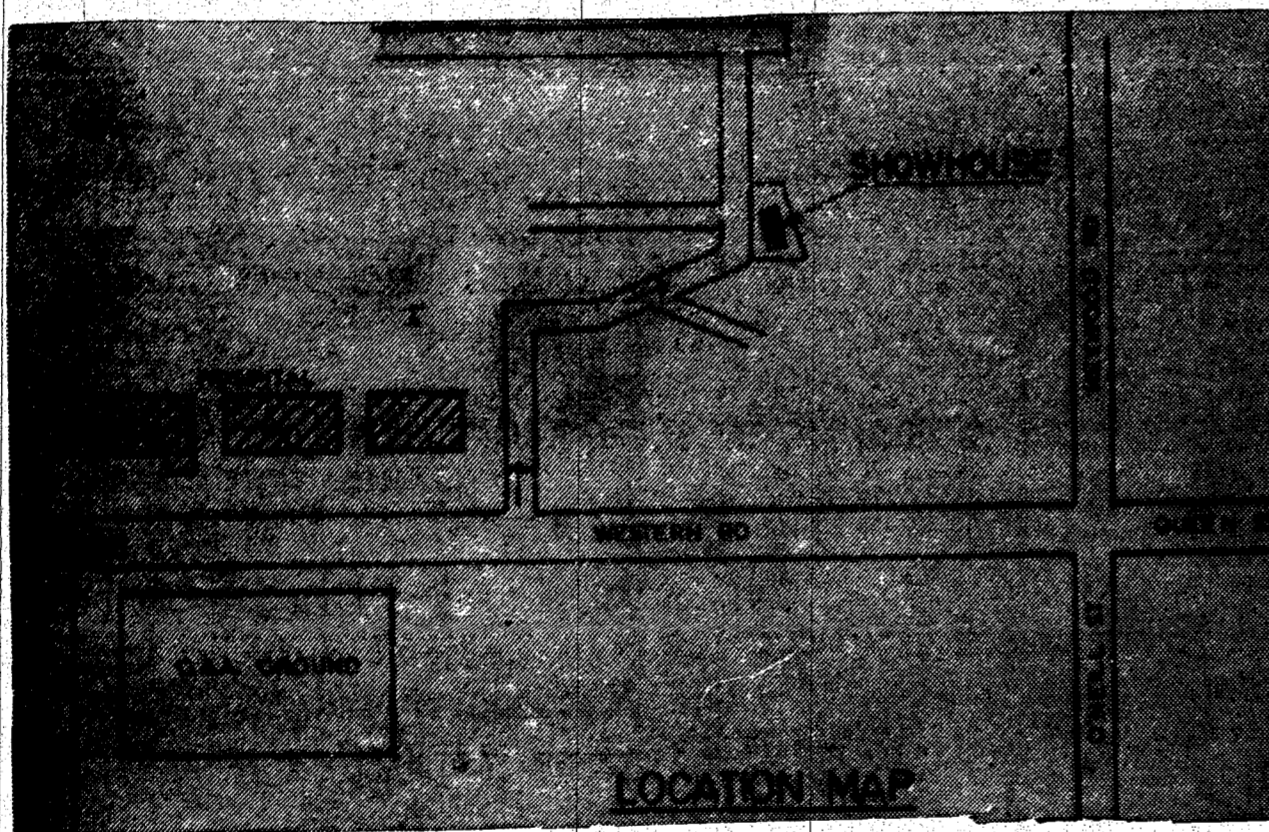
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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

All the atmosphere and tension of the big occasion was present as the teams came onto the pitch to the cheers of the crowd. Conditions were all against hurling and more especially our team as the pitch, following week long rain, was heavily water-logged and was most unsuitable for ground hurling.

* TONIC START

Waterford got off to a tonic start when in the first minute Andy Heffernan drove a long shot into the Kilkenny goal area. Noel Skehan saved and soloed his way out to the 14 yard line where Liam Canning knocked the ball off his hurley and returned it to the square where Stephen Greene nipped in and hammered the ball to the net. Pat O'Grady stretched the lead to four points, when he pointed a 21 yard free in the fourth minute. Eddie Keher and O'Grady scored two points and at the end of the first quarter the position stood at Waterford 1-3; Kilkenny 0-2.

* KILKENNY IN CONTROL

Kilkenny despite playing against the very strong breeze were now firmly in control of the out-field exchanges and they steadied the pace of the game to their own liking. A line ball was only partially cleared by Mick Foley and Pat Delaney made no mistake and now only a point separated the teams. Eddie Keher made it all square from a placed ball.
