Finally, I would like to make it clear that these most favourable concessions were won for you by N.A.T.O., of which I am proud to be your Chairman and representative at national level. Many thanks to Mr. Tully, Minister for Local Government for his most admirable approach to the tenants' cause, in granting these concessions, and to Matt Larkin, General Secretary, for negotiating same. To the officers and committee members of Dungarvan Urban and County Tenants Association, great credit is due.

I hope to have the new purchase and rent scheme circulated to the tenants of County Council Cottages in a matter of weeks.

## CO-OPERATION - The only simple answer to our Parking Problem

Parking problems seem to be the order of the day in Dungarvan at present. Rumours are rife throughout the area concerning the severity of the Gardaí in enforcing these traffic bye-laws. However, it has to be realised the Gardaí have their duty to do.

A single yellow line means that a person cannot park a car in that area but one can stop there for a short period as long as the driver does not leave the car. When the driver leaves the car . . . there are no two ways about it . . . the car is parked.

There are many sides to every story and seemingly the predominant factor in this one is the harm the traffic bye-laws are doing the traders

in the main thoroughfares of the town - O'Connell and Main Streets. Since the implementation of the bye-laws, the traders say their business has gradually deteriorated. They have gone on deputations to Dungarvan Urban Council concerning this. Hourly parking on one side of these streets has been suggested. This would be a tremendous asset to those doing their shopping but in order to enforce this a traffic warden or wardens would have to be appointed.

However, the kernel of the problem seems to be the daily parkers on the Square. As one enters the town in the morning the Square is

usually almost full by 9.30 a.m. Is it too much to ask of those who are working in the town and who presently park their cars in the Square to use the car park? If this were done it would do much to alleviate the present problem. Hourly parking in the Square would also go far towards solving the problem. After all, if one worked in a city one would consider himself very lucky to be able to park within a half mile of his work not to mention a few hundred yards here in Dungarvan.

This problem concerns the whole community and some co-operation from the public would go a long way towards solving the problem.

The sale was prematurely ended by the E.S.B. blackout which left about 25 lots of store pigs unsold, the breeding sows.

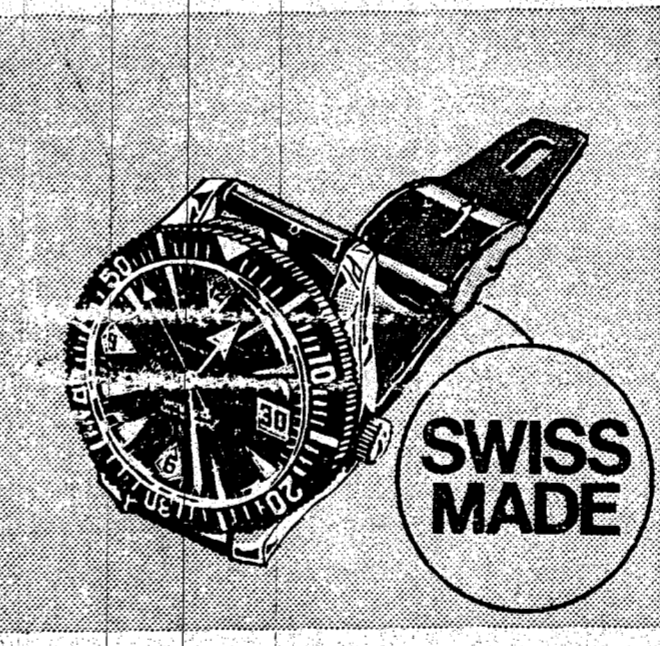

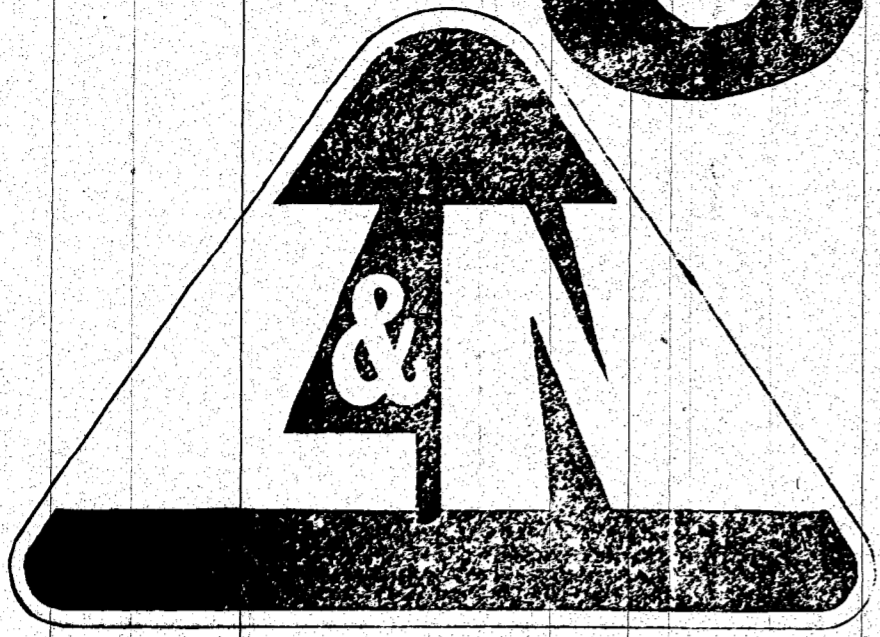

**MUNSTER NOVICE TITLE FOR JOHN TREACY**

Waterford athletes were involved in cross country championships at two centres on Sunday last with our senior athletes running in the Munster novice at Leamlara, Co. Cork and our future stars striving for honour in the Munster juvenile championships at Shannon, Co. Clare. While our boys and girls under 11 brought honour to the county by collecting the bronze medals without doubt the star performance of the day was put on by John Treacy of Villiersstown who won the Munster novice title at his first attempt and did so in convincing fashion. If, as seems likely, young Treacy will take an American scholarship next year, this was his only chance of adding the Munster novice title to his already impressive collection. He took his chance well and at no stage was he unduly worried by the opposition and in the end he had plenty to spare over Gene Meally of Cork and Derry McCarthy of Kerry. Ray Treacy finished in fourth place and this was a good performance by him as he is recovering from injury. However, Waterford still failed to win the inter county contest and they seem doomed never to win this title as this year seemed to be their year, but for various reasons Ger Deegan, Tony Ryan, Roger Barron and Pat Byrne did not run. So hats off to the gallant runners who overcame all these difficulties to collect the silver medals. The other scoring members of the Waterford team were Robbie Walsh, John Barry, David Browne and Jim Keane. To make it a great day for Waterford we had the surprise of the day in the inter club race when the newly formed West Waterford A.C. won the gold medals and here special mention should be made of the three who backed up John Treacy in this triumph. They were Robbie Walsh of Kinsalebeg A.C. who ran his best race ever to emphasise the great improvement he has made in the past few months; John Barry and Jim Keane of Lismore A.C. two seasoned campaigners who are a credit to any county and who always give of their best. This club win must have been great joy for these two athletes and proved once again how successful a good blending of youth and experience can be.

At Shannon it was left mainly to athletes from Grotto A.C. to keep the Waterford flag flying and thanks to the efforts of these youngsters the journey was not in vain. In the boys under 11 race, Maurice Hallahan of Grange A.C. was the early pacemaker but in the end he had to be content with fourth place but this was a

really good performance as also was the solid running of his club mate David Quinn. Colin O'Neill of Grotto came with a late burst to collect the silver medal and only one point deprived him of a second silver medal as this was the margin between Waterford and Clare in the inter county contest. The other scoring runners for us gallant Waterford team were Eoin O'Brien of Bally A.C. who ran his best race to date to collect his first Munster medal, and two runners from Grotto A.C. Henneberry and Shanahan. In the girls under 11 race it was again Grotto A.C. who provided a medal winner in the individual race with Brid Shanahan finishing in third place and leading Waterford to the bronze medals. The other scoring athletes were the Grange A.C. quartet of Sheila Mansfield, Mary Hallahan, Margaret Hartigan and Marie O'Connor and Louise Stafford of Grotto A.C. A display of note in this race was the fine display given by Sheila Mansfield who was the first Grange A.C. athlete to finish. Much was expected of the boys under 13 team but alas their performance was a sad one and even such as Pat Meoney of Bally A.C. and Niall Flynn of Dungarvan ran well below form.

Much the same was the case in the girls under 13 race but here at least the Waterford girls finished joint third with Tipperary but lost the medals as Tipp had their sixth girl home before Waterford. Anthony Kelly of Dungarvan A.C. finished a good third in the boys under 15 race and for long stages in the race it looked as if he would take the gold medal. In the end, however, it was perhaps a lack of enough real tough competition that told against the Kilgobnet boy. Still a very good performance and with another few weeks of hard training young Kelly will be a force to be reckoned with in the All-Ireland championships at Naas on December 16th. In the girls under 15 race it was courageous running as the field was a class one.

The girls concerned were Bernadette Pendergast of St. Nicholas A.C. and Maura Clarke of Tramore A.C. and though in the end they had to give way to two Cork girls they deserve great praise for some great running. All in all then not a great day for Waterford as much more was expected but still one has to remember that to win a Munster medal in juvenile athletics is no mean achievement since over 800 athletes took part. Congratulations then to all who did in fact win medals and also to the band of followers who made the long journey to Shannon to cheer on the youngsters.

**ORGANISATIONS REQUEST RETURN OF TEACHER**

At a meeting held in the Temperance Hall, Kilmacthomas, on 23rd November, a committee was formed to consider the re-instatement of Mr. Donal Whelan as Principal of Kilmacthomas Vocational School. # WE CAN BEAT THE CHAMPIONS!

SUNDAY NEXT is a real red letter day for all hurling followers, as the game of the year takes place at Dungarvan's Fraher field, where Waterford's ever improving team throws down the gauntlet to All-Ireland champions, Limerick.

## ★ WARM WELCOME

Limerick whose great victory in the All-Ireland final was acclaimed throughout the land and are sure of warm welcome to Dungarvan's famous hurling sod which has staged numerous great games over the years.

Limerick played vintage hurling in the All-Ireland final to bring the McCarthy cup home to the Shannon side for the first time in 33 years, thus bridging the generation gap, back to the golden era of Limerick hurling when that prince of hurlers Mick Mackey reigned supreme. Limerick hurling has much in common with Waterford. Both have lived in the shadow of the two big guns of Munster, Cork and Tipperary, yet both have continued to play their own distinctive brand of hurling, favouring in the main traditional ground play and first time striking, surely the pure form of hurling as distinct from the lift and carry style favoured by most of the other counties.

In 1971, Limerick's dedicated team won the League only to lose to Tipperary by a single point in the Munster final of Kilkenny and many felt that they had lost their

chance. In 1972 they were shocked by Clare in the first round of the championship. However they bounced back into contention this year and their dedication finally brought them glory.

The last occasion that Limerick played in Dungarvan was in the sixties, also in the League, when if memory serves me correct, Waterford won.

## ★ VITAL POINTS

To date in the League, Limerick have collected full points at the expense of Clare and Galway and played a draw with Kilkenny and they will be playing all out to collect the vital points in their last two outings before the Christmas break, against Waterford and Wexford.

Waterford have surprised all and sundry with their outstanding form in their four League outings so far. With wins over Galway, Clare and Waterford to their credit and also a thrilling draw with Kilkenny. From our point of view Sunday's two points are absolutely vital as they would ensure Waterford a place in the knockout stages of the competition in the Spring. It is going to take a mighty effort to win both points on Sunday but it's well to re-

member that we can expect no gifts from either Tipperary or Cork in the New Year.

## ★ THE TEAMS

Let us compare the teams who will do duty. Mick Foley is playing reasonably well at present and he is a very experienced goalkeeper. Paddy Coady should have some rare set-tos with the bustling Eamonn Rea and the speedy Frankie Nolan will get little change from Shamie Hannon. Martin Kirwan is playing better than ever. Our half back will need to step up considerably on their form against Kilkenny. Yet one must remember that a player can't be in peak form for every game and I expect John Galvin, Jim Greene and Pat McGrath to play much better on Sunday next. Believe you me they will need to, as we conceded far too many needless frees in this area in the Kilkenny game.

Limerick's attack will also include Liam O'Donoghue, Mossey Dowling and Joe McKenna and either Paudie Fitzmaurice or Bernie Hartigan. At centre field, Richie Bennis and the flying Eamonn Grimes have the edge in experience over Pat O'Grady and Mossey Whelan. Yet in

general play Bennis is an easy going player and I believe that O'Grady should fare well against him and that Mossey Whelan surely a most under-rated player will curb Grime's influence to a great extent and of course R. Bennis and P. O'Grady should break even in that other very important facet of the game, namely free taking.

## ★ MAJOR CONFRONTATION

Surely the duel of the day must be that between Limerick's outstanding full back Pat Hartigan and Waterford's full forward Liam Canning. What a confrontation that should be! The Ballyduff Upper man is without doubt the driving force of the attack as in his approach to the game he clearly reflects the spirit of this present Waterford team against Wexford: his great goal out Waterford on the road to victory and in the last quarter of the Kilkenny game his fearless runs at the Kilkenny defence were responsible to a great part for our team's wonderful rally into the goal force breeze.

Andy Heffernan has the speed hurling

and brains to combat Eamonn Cregan. Tony Reide will prove quite a handful for John Foley, hero of the All-Ireland final and team captain Martin Hickey who hit top form in the second half against Kilkenny should have the beating of Phil Bennis. Limerick's outstanding corner back Jim O'Brien cannot be allowed to rampage up-field while Willie Moore complete a very sound line of defence. Both Martin Geary who will be playing against his native county and Stephen Greene should fare well on the Fraher field sod.

## ★ SUMMING UP

Sunday's clash should provide us with a first rate display of dash and daring hurling. Limerick will possess that extra confidence that one associates with champions. They are a very willing side which has not tasted defeat since the League final against Wexford in May and they will start as clear favourites. Waterford have impressed with each outing. As it is now three months since the All-Ireland final and Waterford having enjoyed a great run since they defeated New York in September have been building their team spirit along the way and they should be the fresher team going on their respective games against Kilkenny. There shouldn't be more than a puck of the ball between them.

## SIDELIGHTS TO BIG GAME

The last occasion that Waterford hurlers played All-Ireland champions at the Fraher field was in 1965 when the then champions Tipperary came out on top in a league game.

There should be a huge attendance at the Fraher field for Sunday's clash. The biggest attendance at the Dungarvan venue in recent times was in the early sixties, when Cork defeated Waterford in a League tie. The legendary Christy Ring scored the winning goal for Cork on that occasion.

## TRAINING SESSION

On Saturday evening last the county hurlers under the guidance of team manager Seamus Power held a very useful work-out at the Fraher field. This was the first occasion that the county team has trained at the Dungarvan venue since 1957. In addition to Saturday's session the team held their normal Wednesday night session in Waterford at which tactics are discussed.

## SOUR GRAPES

Included in a well-known paper last week, were the following comments on the Waterford/Kilkenny N.H.L. game: That the Kilkenny officials made major mistake by agreeing to play this important game on such a small pitch. Of course, the writer should be well aware of the fact that Waterford's Walsh Park is in fact a big-

ger playing pitch than Kilkenny's Nowlan park. The writer went on to say that it was a sad reflection on the state of hurling that a team such as Waterford were heading the League table and that as the competition went on Waterford would find out the spirit and determination was no substitute for skill and experience. My oh my, haven't we got a real expert here, of course if Kilkenny had won two weeks ago the standard of hurling would have been okay. It would appear that the writer was suffering from an overdose of sour grapes.
