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FARMERS FACE FUEL PROBLEMS

An urgent meeting with the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, Mr. Clinton and the Minister for Transport and Power, Mr. Barry, to discuss the equitable distribution of fuel for use on farms is being sought by the Irish Farmers' Association. This was announced by I.F.A. President, Mr. T. J. Maher at the annual dinner of Waterford I.F.A. County Executive.

Mr. Maher pointed out the almost near total dependence on fuel, not only for

the production of food for our own population, but also the very heavy dependence on fuel for the food export trade. Particularly vulnerable are the horticultural, poultry and pig sections.

He said, "We must realise that if there is one very bad night's frost without heat that a whole year's work could be wiped out."

He added, that in these circumstances agriculture must be given priority in relation to fuel supplies.

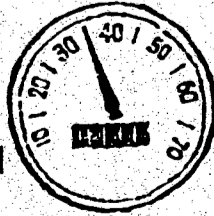

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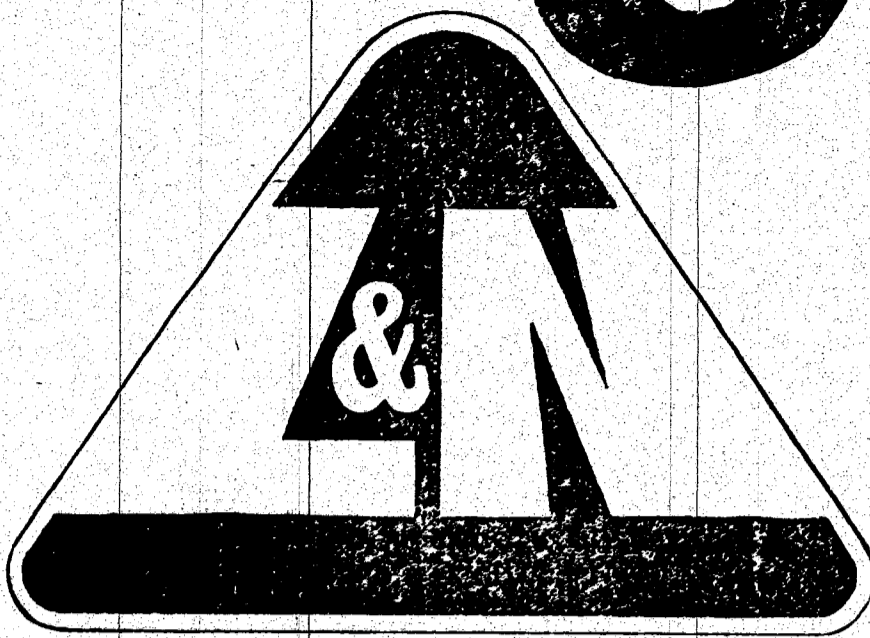

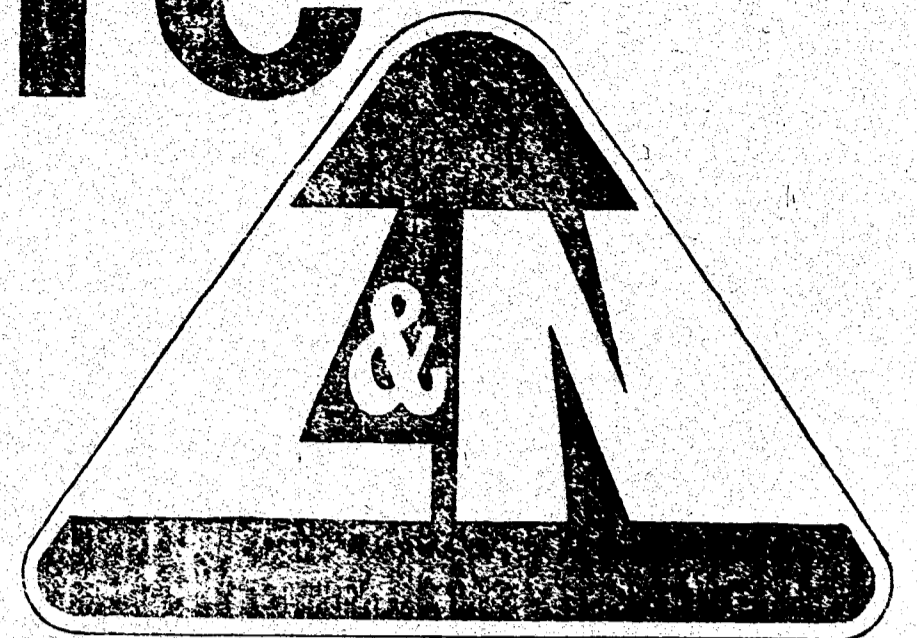

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Limerick take both points

Limerick ... 4-10; Waterford ... 1-6. All-Ireland senior hurling champions Limerick halted Waterford's successful run in the National League before a huge attendance at Dungarvan's Fraher Field, on Sunday last. While the day itself turned out cold and dry, in truth the underfoot conditions were anything but suitable for hurling and Limerick's stronger team used their strength and considerable experience to good advantage and their defence in particular held Waterford's lighter forwards in a vice like grip.

WARM WELCOME

Both teams received a warm welcome when they came onto the pitch. Waterford opened well and Liam Canning stormed in at the Limerick defence and was fouled and Pat O'Grady pointed the free. Waterford continued to press but it was Limerick who scored next in the 9th minute, when Richie Bennis leveled the scoring. The ball came back of the Limerick upright, but Martin Geary's shot hit the side netting. Pat O'Grady pointed a free in the 14th minute. M. Ruth leveled the scores in the 16th minute. Richie Bennis put his team in front two minutes later. Then a long drive from Matt Ruth was fumbled by Mick Foley and the champions were now four points ahead and Mossy Dowling added a point. In the 23rd minute, following a mix up in the Waterford defence, Matt Ruth put the ball in the net, passed a surprised Mick Foley, Eamonn Grimes flashed over a great point. In between Andy Heffernan had the ball in the Limerick net. However, the ball was adjudged to have been over the end line before L. Canning got it back to Heffernan.

Martin Geary soloed his way through the Limerick defence in the 29th minute to score the best goal of the game and at the break Limerick lead by six points (2-5 to 1-2). During the first half Limerick had played direct confident hurling and with Pat Hartigan, Jim O'Brien, Eamonn Cregan and W. Conway coming out on top in their duels with our forwards it was obvious that unless Waterford could pierce this

strong Limerick defence that the All-Ireland champions would collect both points.

TRYING FOR GOALS

Waterford brought on Davy Duggan for John Galvin and Martin Hickey exchanged places with Andy Heffernan.

Waterford attacked and Martin Hickey went for a goal from a 21 yard free and F. Geary pointed the rebound. P. O'Grady pointed a free to reduce the leeway to four points and our hopes lifted somewhat. Then Joe McKenna snapped up a half clearance and crashed home Limerick's third goal. Richie Bennis pointed a close in free. Then Mick Foley brought off a great save from Mossy Dowling before Frankie Nolan ran onto another ball that had been nearly cleared out and hammered home another goal to put the issue beyond doubt. Waterford continued to seek goals but they were unable to pierce a superb Limerick defence. M. Ruth and R. Bennis added a brace of points a piece, to a lone reply from Mossy Whelan in the 20th minute.

VERY GOOD TEAM

While many experts continue to de-cry the merits of the All-Ireland champions I for one remain convinced that they are a very good team who will not be easily parted from their title. Goalkeeper S. Horgan, Pat Hartigan, Jim O'Brien, Willie Conway and Eamonn Cregan had great games in the winners' defence. Sean Foley was superb at centre field where Eamonn Grimes as always was as busy as a bee. Their forwards played sound controlled hurling with Mossy Dowling, Joe McKenna, Frankie Nolan and left half forward Matt Ruth having very good games. One second half point by Ruth was joy to behold.

On the day let us have no excuses, Limerick turned in a display befitting their position as All-Ireland champions.

NO CRITICISM WARRENTED

This present Waterford team has come a long way since this time last year and everyone was loud in their praise of their

achievements in winning promotion, running Tipperary close in their Munster championship and especially their great run in the current League campaign and for my part one defeat cannot wipe out their solid achievements over the past twelve months. Sooner or later they were bound to suffer a set back in this League and I believe that we all new this in our hearts. Certainly we could have finished closer to Limerick as we conceded three soft goals and we could have also scored a few soft points if we had taken our points from close in frees.

On the day Waterford failed to produce the same sparkle in their hurling that they displayed against Wexford and Kilkenny, plus the fact that they were unable to master the ground conditions and then of course there was the fact that Limerick played a very confident controlled game.

In defence Martin Kirwan and Shamie Hannon (in the second half) had sound games. Pat McGrath was back to his best form and Jim Greene had a fine game at centre half back. At centre field both Mossy Whelan and Pat O'Grady despite their lack of inches and the under-foot conditions broke even in this vital sector. As already stated our attack was well contained by the Limerick defence and over the hour only Martin Geary posed a constant threat to the winners. His goal was the highlight of the hour from a Waterford point of view.
