ARE BYE-LAWS RUINING DUNGARVAN?

Dungarvan as a business town is ruined, was the dismal message conveyed to the members of the Urban District Council at a special meeting last Monday night. Since the parking bye-laws, restricting parking in O'Connell and Main Street, were introduced, the traders claim business has decreased by up to 50% in some cases.

The meeting was attended by a four man deputation representing the traders, Messrs. B. Keane, K. O'Arcy, D. Spratt and J. Curran, Garda Supt. M. English also attended.
Mr. Keane outlined how he has since the bye-law were imposed lost up to £30 for two days business in his fish shop in O'Connell Street. He compared the street to a highway mentioning the juggernauts which pass through at excessive speeds. He concluded by suggesting one side hourly parking.

Agreeing with Mr. Keane, Mr. Kevin D'Arcy said that a number of people who used previously frequent the town from the West Waterford area now go to Youghal and Clonmel to do their business because of the parking regulations. The kernel of the problem seems to be the long term parkers in Grattan Square, he said, suggesting if the were to use the car park, the problem could ease considerably.

The other members of the deputation endorsed all this and Mr. Curran said Dungarvan was ruined as a business town while Mr. Spratt stated the trading in the town was unbalanced. An Auctioneer, Mr. Spratt said because of the bye-laws he had been unable to sell a property in Main Street.

Supt. M. English said that prior to the byelaws there was nothing but chaos and he feels one side hourly parking would be more likely to worsen the situation than relieve it. Hourly parking would also mean the employment of traffic wardens, he continued, who are a law unto themselves. He referred to traders in the Square as victims of circumstances who he considers to have problems also as at 9 a.m. the Square is packed tight with long term parkers. He concluded by stating that contrary to

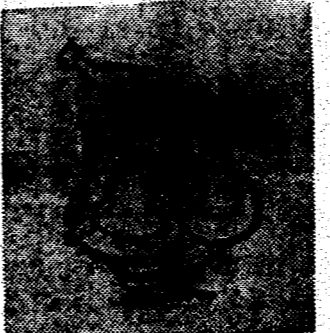

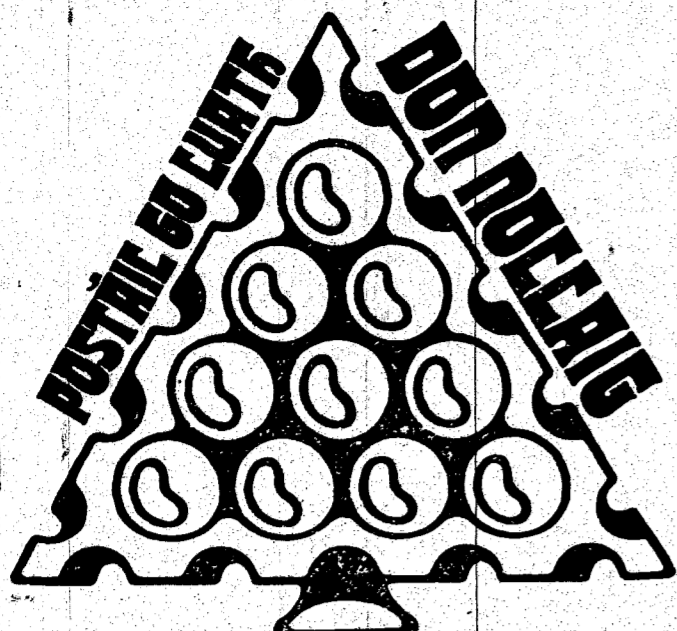

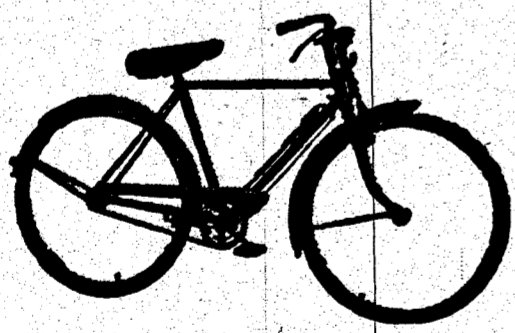

Senator Deasy in the Senate

Speaking on the Arts Bill in the Senate during the week, Senator Deasy said—There has been difficulty in defining the scope of the Arts and I should like to mention one which has not yet been mentioned. It might commonly be called the poor man's idea of artistic entertainment in this country. Unfortunately, it now on the point of extinction, I appeal to the Taoiseach to consider it when he is reconstructing this new Arts Council. I am referring to the circus. For many years we have had a few of these groups—for instance Duffy's and Fossells—but they are on the point of going off the road now. There are a variety of reasons for this. One is the advent of TV which shows continental circuses with which it is difficult to compete. There is then free school transport where children are collected punctually at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, thus depriving the circuses of their matinee audience and, finally, the greatest scourge of all—taxation.

These people may not be regarded as artists by musicians, painters and sculptors, but they are artists and they have not been exempted from income tax as were those referred to by Senator Aherne. Circus people pay every possible type of tax there is. They pay full road tax on the vehicles for hauling wagons et cetera. They operate for only six months each year and each day they may only travel an average of 10 or 12 miles. Yet they pay the full yearly taxation. On the Continent and in Great Britain these people have a special tax rate which amounts to about 25 per cent per year.

All these factors add up to a serious financial dilemma for circuses. As a result the standard has dropped. I appeal for the allowance of certain exemptions to these people who handle the animals. The acrobats, the contortionists, the jugglers and those artists in the true sense of the word. They deserve some concessions just as much as painters and writers. I ask that the Arts Council take them within its ambit and give them a sympathetic hearing. It is the only type of artistic activity ever seen by people in rural areas.

We, as politicians, have something in common with them. Nearly all the time we are clowns. At other times we are jugglers or contortionists. Every day in the week we walk the tight rope and if we slip we are thrown to the lions.

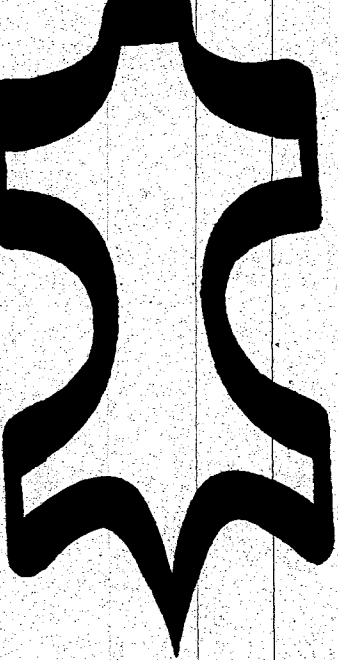

Kilmacthomas woman makes for successful Leather Garment Week

LEATHER GARMENTS are as old as mankind. In fact the first material used to dress the human body was animal skins. It seems facetious to go back to such well known facts, but one of the secrets of the success of leather is indeed that it is the only known natural material which can be used in its original fibre structure.
 Due to this unique position certain qualities of leather were successfully imitated, but the total character was never matched.
 The recognition of natural values favoured an increase in the use of leather. In addition to this the improvements in the technique of tanning and finishing over the last decade have helped to promote leather as an outstanding fashion material.

Ten years ago the Irish Leather Garment Industry just started to develop. Now ten years later it is an important fashion industry producing about 200,000 garments annually. Beside the numerous small enterprises, fifteen industrial firms employ about 1,500 people. The value of leather garments produced in Ireland is about £3,500,000 p.a. of which one third is exported (first quarter 1973 amounted to £470,000). Due to the character of the Irish Tanning Industry which is based mostly on Irish hides, high quality garments have to be imported. In the medium price bracket the tanneries are however substantial exporters.

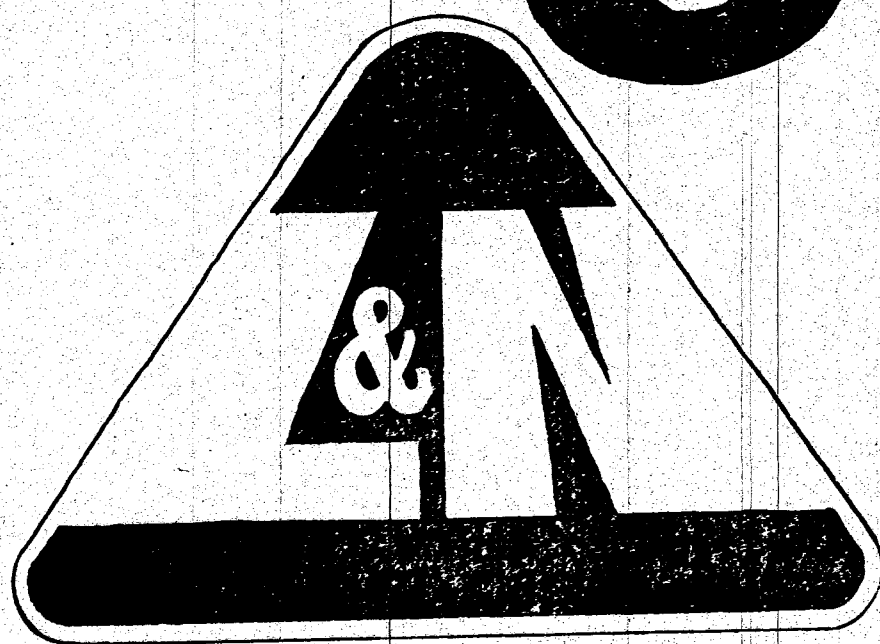

FOWL PEST WARNING

If the outbreak of fowl pest in the North spreads into the Republic it could wipe out the South's thirty million pounds poultry industry, with the resultant loss of more than twenty thousand jobs. This warning was sounded by Mr. George McMeel, Chairman of the Irish Farmers' Association's National Poultry Committee, following an emergency meeting of the I.F.A.'s National Poultry Committee in Dublin.

Mr. McMeel said his Committee was extremely worried about the precautions being taken on both sides of the Border to prevent the disease spreading South.

Senior experts from the Department of Agriculture attended the meeting at the Irish Farm Centre and explained that the outbreak, was the severest ever to break out in this country.

Mr. McMeel said: "This is a situation that demands the most stringent precautions. Therefore, I am calling on all I.F.A. County Executive Committees in the Border Counties to immediately set up vigilante groups so as to make certain that this shocking disease does not invade our poultry flocks."

Mr. McMeel, from Glaslough, Co. Monaghan, the County with the largest poultry population in the Republic, said he hoped the Ulster Farmers' Union would also give their complete cooperation in this matter.

REGIONAL MEETING

Sunday, December 2nd, saw yet another regional meeting of Clerks and Telephonists from the Post Office Workers' Union convened to discuss wages.

This time it was held in Carlow and was attended by representatives from offices in counties Waterford, Wexford, Kilkenny, Laoise, Carlow, Wicklow and Kildare. Also attending the meeting were members of the National Executive of the union and representatives of the South Munster Regional Council (P.O.W.U.) which was formed as a result of a similar type of regional meeting held in Cork on November 11th. The meeting endorsed the call from the All-Ireland meeting, held at Athlone, that a special delegates conference of Clerks and Telephonists be called by the National Executive to discuss wages and autonomy for these grades. This meeting is to be called not later than January 31st, 1974. The meeting also endorsed the setting up of a regional council for the South Eastern area of the county. This task is to be undertaken in the immediate future. Further regional meetings of this type are yet to take place in other areas of the county.

Annual General Meeting of Dungarvan Credit Union

The fifth A.G.M. of the Dungarvan Credit Union Ltd., was held at the offices, 32 St. Mary St., on Wednesday, 5th December.

Mr. E. P. King, President, welcomed the delegates and in his address to the meeting, spoke of the excellent year which the Union had in office in 1973. The opening and blessing of the new office was the highlight of which all members should be proud and he hoped that they would make full use of the first permanent premises of the Credit Union in the town. He referred to the work of the various committees, especially the Credit Committee, which was the foundation of any Credit Union, the Supervisory Committee which was the members' direct agent in the proper running of the organisation and the Ladies' Committee for the excellent function organised for the occasion of our office opening.

He also thanked the treasurer, secretary and all the other voluntary workers for their efforts during the year.

Continuing, he said that the meeting could prove a very important milestone, in the life of Dungarvan Credit Union. The meeting would be asked at a later stage, to approve a resolution to change the common bond, which at the present time consisted of persons residing or employed within the Urban area of Dungarvan. The reasons for the change being asked for, were firstly to meet the wishes of Lismore Credit Union in an effort to cover West Waterford between them and secondly to cover an area in mid Waterford where an unsuccessful attempt had been made to form a Credit Union.

Mr. P. Ryan, Treasurer, presented the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet as certified by the Auditor. This was for a nine month period only, as the financial year for Credit Unions now ended on 30th September.

Income for the period was £7,323 and expenses £2,692.

The assets amounted to £104,026 and liabilities £7,464. Savings were now £85,673 an increase of 16 per cent during the period.

Mr. M. Curran reporting for the Credit Committee said that 354 loans totalling £63,500 had been granted. The amount of loans from the formation of the Union to date, now stood at £320,000 of which £233,000 had been repaid. Mr. J. G. Dowling for the Supervisory Committee reported that his Committee had kept a careful watch on the activities of the various committees during the year and found that everything was in order.

A dividend of 6 per cent p.a. was declared for the period. This required a sum of £3,500.

Messrs J. G. Dowling, J. J. Cullen and T. D. Boyd were re-elected as Supervisors.

- (b) if satisfied upon the hearing of the application that the compulsory purchase order as so confirmed is not within the powers of the Housing Act, 1966, as extended by section 10 of the Local Government (No. 2) Act, 1960 (as substituted by section 86 of the Housing Act, 1966) or that the interests of the applicant have been substantially prejudiced by any requirement of the Housing Act 1966 as so extended, not having been complied with may quash the order as so confirmed either generally or in so far only as it affects any property of the applicant.
