If we look back to the laft twenty five years of his Majelty's reign, we shall find that this is lave and attechment, not limited to the impressions of his carlier life, or arifing from the profperity of his comcile, but acquiring additional force in propertion to his perfocal infirmities, and ftrengthening with his decay. (Hear! hear!) If then the people of this country have uniformly felt the higelt interefts. in the health of their Sovereign-if in the days of the firength, they have rejoiced and mourned with heartfelt forrow during the vilitation of its diftrels and sufferings-is it not a duty most imperative in its exercise, for this House to apply itself to the invesrigation, whether fuch feelings have not been mift themefully deceived, whether the foulest play have not been carried on, and the perion of the King, as well as the attachment of his fobjects, criminally abused, in order to accomplish the Ichemes of eettain of his Ministers. (Hear ! hear !)
