

7th Army, of which he is Captain? Commander-in-Chief. General Blake had sailed from Cadiz for Murcia, in order to support the 3d Army; and it appears that Ballasters will disembark in the plain of St. Roque for the same purpose. In consequence, the great force, as well of the Allies as of the enemy, which a few weeks since was in Estremadura, has been divided, one taking the direction of the North, and the other of the South. In the latter province the French have only the garrison of Badajoz and the castle of Truxillo, and some detachments on the side of the Sierra Morena.

AUGUST 11.—An express is just arrived from head-quarters, which he left on the 8th at Sabugal. General Slade, with a brigade of British and another of Portuguese, is in advance at Aldea-de-Ponte, the light division at Quadrazayes, the 6th at Ugricia, and the 3d at head-quarters.

VALENCIA, JULY 16.
General Lacy has taken the command of the troops in Catalonia. It appears that the English, who went to the succor of Tarragona, are gone to Port Mahon.

General Sanabrides has more than 18,000 men, and Polier 3000, in Potos. The corps which still remain here amount to 5000 men; and, in the other parts of the province, there are 4000 more, all regulars. General Albeda is not yet arrived.

A letter from Sweden observes, that "the King is in progress of deposition, but has not yet been formally deposed. As to all real authority, he is completely set aside."

The letters from Hamburg relate a most distressing occurrence which had recently taken place there by order of the existing Government. It appears that two bags of letters had been seized under a supposition that they contained letters intended to be forwarded to England. Many letters of that description were discovered, some of which were proved to have been written by two firms of the first eminence in the city of Hamburg; the writers were immediately secured, and placed on their counting-houses, their property seized, and the parties themselves sent to Paris loaded with irons. The greatest alarm prevailed lest they should be sent to the gallies.

An unpleasant affair lately occurred at the Mauritius, between two Officers of His Majesty's 22d Foot. The account that has reached us states, that on the 2d of December, the day of the capitulation, Lieutenant L. after some menacing expressions, suddenly attacked Lieutenant D. with his drawn sword. The latter, it is said, having no time to prepare for defence, retreated, till he had succeeded in getting his sword from his scabbard, when he stood upon the defensive, and endeavoured to parry the thrusts of his assailant, by whom he was soon disarmed. Lieutenant L. still continued his thrusts, which Lieutenant D. for some time turned aside with his naked hands, till at length Lieutenant L. closing upon his disarmed opponent, and seizing him with one hand, with the other forced the sword into his breast. The point entered the cavity of the breast just above the right nipple, pierced the lungs, and produced a copious discharge of blood from the mouth. Lieutenant D. was considered for two days in imminent danger, but at the date of the last account, no apprehension was entertained of his recovery. A Court of Inquiry has been ordered to assemble, to investigate the circumstances of this case.

The legality of the recent election of Lord Gosford, as one of the Representative Peers of Ireland, in the room of Lord Longueville, deceased, will probably be questioned in the House of Lords, on the ground of the Constituent Peers resident in England, in order to qualify them as electors, having been sworn before Irish Magistrates, who came over for that purpose, but who, it is thought, could exercise no such magisterial authority in this country, unless they had derived it under the Act of Union, which is not the case.

We have great satisfaction in stating that the Duke of Sussex is now in a fair way of recovery. Lord Wellington has, with his usual sagacity, planned a defence for Oporto; which, if not so impregnable as the lines of Lisbon, will at least present a very formidable resistance to the enemy, in the event of his attempting to advance in that quarter. That important city had hitherto been in a manner open, and must have fallen before any superior force that approached it. These new defences chiefly consist in the fortifying of the strong passes which lead, in various directions, to Oporto. The works were begun some time ago.

Some of the letters from Lisbon mention that large reinforcements have lately been received by the enemy, and that Massena is expected at the head of 80,000 men. We do not believe this statement. The reinforcements which the enemy have lately received have not been to any very considerable amount. Their Papers mentioned a short time ago, that some divisions of an army of reserve had arrived; but they have been scarcely sufficient to enable Gen. Bonnet to make head against the Gallician Army, which now holds his acquired strength such as to have forced the enemy to retire from Astorga and the country intersected by the Orbigo, between that city and Leon.

Sir Joseph Yorke returned yesterday to Spilthead with the Princess and her command.

The Princess Elizabeth Packet is arrived at Falmouth from Sicilian. About a fortnight ago she spoke to Sir J. Yorke's squadron of the Western Islands, enquiring for the homeward-bound China fleet.

CAPEZ, AUG. 1.—The following address from Field Marshal Don Luis Lacy to the deposed and deserters, has been printed and circulated throughout all the free provinces of this principality. "The loss of Tarragona is an irreparable; it is a new stimulus to redouble the heroic endeavours upon which intrepidly depends the liberty of the principality. Reports spread by the enemies of the union and order have produced a scandalous disposition. Eight days, reckoning from this time, is still allowed to all who profess in their hearts the least Spanish feeling, after which those who have not joined their colours, shall be pursued and arrested by their speedy military authorities, in order to be punished according to the regulations of the army. I seriously hope I shall not feel myself obliged to act with severity in fulfilling the obligations which my country and the general voice of the nation impose, and which demand we should all die rather than disobey."

MADRID, JULY 5.—On the 2d arrived two Officers, one from Cadix and the other from Almaraz; they alighted at the house of Belliard, with whom they had a conference for a considerable time, without afterwards speaking to any person; from which, and the still-humour of Belliard, it is inferred that their news was disagreeable; what it is not certainly known, but there is reason to believe that the Officer from Cadix brought accounts relative to the movements of the Gallician Army, and the English troops which are upon Ciudad Rodrigo. This conjecture appears to be confirmed by the arrival of officers, surgeons, &c. from Avila.

BOSTON, JULY 30.
By the President of the United States of America. A PROCLAMATION.
Whereas great and weighty matters, claiming the consideration of the Congress of the United States, form an extraordinary occasion for convening them, I do, by these presents, appoint Monday the 31st day of November next, for their meeting at the City of Washington, hereby requiring the respective Senators and Representatives then and there to assemble in Congress, in order to receive such communications as may then be made to them, and to consult and determine on such measures as in their wisdom may be deemed most for the welfare of the United States.

In testimony whereof I have caused the Seal of the United States to be hereunto affixed, and signed the same with my hand.
Done at the City of Washington, 24th July, 1811.

Of the President's Proclamation the Intelligence says: "It is to be presumed that it grows out of our foreign relations. It seems to be understood that the communications of Mr. Foster do not correspond with the reasonable expectations which might have been formed. We do not understand that they have extended directly to any subject beyond the Orders in Council and the Blockade of May, 1806. With respect to this Blockade, it is understood to be placed under a construction, and as a footing to render it no longer an insuperable difficulty. As to the Orders in Council, it would only on further evidence than is yet afforded of any repeal whatever of the French Decrees, but on a repeal of these Decrees in a far greater extent than the United States have required, or can require, as violating any of their neutral rights. And an idea is held out of a retaliation on the non-importation act, if continued in force without such repeal of the French Decrees as is contended for by Mr. Britain.

The Government Paper mentions that the Essex frigate brought no information from Paris consequent to the arrival of the John Adams; that in general it may be inferred from official and other sources (let the information be seen) that the Decrees are not in operation, and that some commercial relaxations (what are they?) have taken place, but not to the extent desired. Other subjects of complaint are in statu quo.

GENERAL MOREAU.—An American paper contains the following observations on this once celebrated Officer:— "General Moreau's conduct since his arrival among us has been watched with the jealousy natural to freedom; but at the same time with all the candour which his situation entitled him to; whenever his actions did not assume a questionable aspect—and the result has been, a firm conviction on the part of those who have been on terms of particular intimacy with him, that the compassion bestowed upon him as an exile, on his first arrival, was most lamentably misplaced; and that his views, and the character which in fact he sustains, are to be derived from the very base to the peace and liberty of the United States.

General Moreau is now on a tour through the northern States, accompanied by two Gentlemen as his Secretaries, or companions, who in all their excursions are very minute in ascertaining the state of the two great parties which now divide the country;—their feelings on the subject of a war with either belligerents—and how far their prejudices and predilections will carry them in that event. These are facts which the people ought to ponder upon before it becomes too late for to act."
