

LONDON.

SUNDAY, JULY 7.

Last night we received the Paris Papers of Wednesday last. Gen. Marchand, who commanded at Grenoble, had been tried at Paris, and acquitted by a Council of War. Letters had reached France from Teneriffe, noticing the arrival at Orotavo, on the 1st of May, of the English ships the Newcastle and the Orontes, having on board Admiral Malcomb, with Baron Sturmer, the Austrian, and also the French Commissioner, destined to reside at St. Helena. The two vessels left Teneriffe on the 5th of the same month. Mr. Brougham, after spending some days at Paris, was about to proceed to Switzerland. The trial of the pretended patriots is not concluded in these papers.

A letter from Plymouth, received yesterday, states, that orders were received on Friday morning to victual and refit, on the war establishment, an squadron, consisting of one first-rate, 120 guns; one second-rate, 98 guns; four of 74 guns; four large frigates, two sloops, and four bombs, under the command of Lord Exmouth, who will hoist his flag on board the Queen Charlotte. The greatest exertions are making to pay off the fleet lately returned from the Mediterranean; in the dock-yard, they are all bustle receiving their stores. The Boyne, 98 guns, has been paid off. The Honourable Commissioner, Sir George Grey, superintended the payments. Two houses of rendezvous were opened on Friday on the point, to enter on board for the expedition to Algiers. Captain Brisbane has been removed from the Boyne, to act as Lord Exmouth's Captain in the Queen Charlotte. The several ships destined to accompany his Lordship to the Mediterranean, are fitting out with all imaginable despatch.

We are gratified to state, on the authority of a gentleman of much knowledge and observation, and who last night returned to town from a tour through the neighbouring counties, that the crops of corn and hay are of uncommon promise. Some apprehension had been entertained by the farmers a week since respecting the barley and oats, but the late rains have dispelled their fears, and from the caution created by the broken weather, very little hay has been injured. The injury sustained by the orchards about a month since, from blighting winds, is said to have occasioned an immediate rise of 3d. per quart in the price of cider—we are, however, much gratified to learn, that the effect was in a great degree local, and that the appearance is extremely good in the cider counties, particularly Devonshire, where our correspondent expects to get 80 hogheads from an orchard that during the last eight years has not yielded him so much.

which he was allied. [The Defendant is married to the Duke of Rutland's sister, Lady Elizabeth Norman.] The Defendant's own affidavit was read, in which he solemnly declared, that he had no enmity towards the present Prosecutor; that at the time he prosecuted him for the libel, he was obliged to do it in the discharge of his duty as a Magistrate. He had, however, made advances to a friendly intercourse with the Prosecutor, and as a step towards that object, he, in 1812, desired the prosecutor would not restrain himself in his sporting excursions. He had repeatedly passed over unnoticed the insulting language of the Prosecutor, till at length the expressions used by him, in Melton Mowbray market, and the subsequent conduct of the Prosecutor at their meeting on the 18th, had betrayed him, the Defendant, into that unfortunate breach of the peace, which no individual could regret more than he did himself.

A number of affidavits were put in by the Defendant, sworn by persons of rank and consideration in the county, giving the Defendant the most honourable character, and proving that the Prosecutor had on various occasions applied the grossest epithets to him, both in public and private companies.

Mr. Justice Bailey delivered the judgment of the Court, and in doing so spoke in high terms of the forbearance shown by the Defendant up to the 18th of August; at the same time, the Court could not but greatly regret, that he should, on that occasion, have been provoked into a breach of the peace; and the Court still more highly regretted his subsequent conduct, in going to church, and thus carrying irritation and enmity into the sacred temple of the Deity. Under all the circumstances, the Court sentenced the Defendant to pay a fine of £100, and to enter into security to keep the peace for three years; himself in £1000, and two securities in £500 each.

DOG KILLING.

MONTGOMERY, DE RUTLAND.—This was an action brought by Mr. Moulford, a literary gentleman, residing in Somer's Town, against the Defendant, an Italian, his next door neighbour, to recover compensation in damages for the loss of a dog, which was wilfully shot by the Defendant. Mr. Topping addressed the Jury, and stated, that the dog in question was a most beautiful animal of the Russian breed, perfectly docile and good humoured, but, like all dogs of his age, being but 15 months old, was playful and wild. From its being a puppy, not a single instance had occurred in which it had either bit, or attempted to bite, any person whatever; the Defendant's children, however, had thought proper, on various occasions, to tease the animal, by beating him with boxing gloves, and thereby occasioned him to bark at them, but he never on any occasion attempted to bite them. This barking, however, had produced either an actual or a fictitious alarm on the part of the children, and the Defendant, in consequence, at one time when passing the animal, gave him a violent kick, threatening at the same time, if he ever should catch him in the field he would shoot him. In consequence of this threat, the Plaintiff had given directions that the dog should be confined within doors, and he was so for ten days previous to the 6th of July last, when the door being accidentally left open, he ran out into the yard, and leaping over the wall, got into the field, where he expressed his joy at his liberty by loud barking, and running about from place to place. Miss Moulford, the Plaintiff's sister, and the servant, immediately went out to catch him, but their efforts, from the playfulness of the animal, were ineffectual. While they were thus engaged, the Defendant's daughter came out, accompanied by a female companion, and approaching the dog, the former took up a brick and said if the animal came near her she would kill his brains out. The dog did not move, but never attempted to touch her, continuing its gambols with perfect indifference to every person. The Defendant's wife now came out, and called to her husband for her sake to bring out his pistol. At the same time she went towards the dog, with her little infant son about four years old—no proof of any apprehension on her part—and put her son towards the animal's mouth, but it never offered to bite; she, however, as if by previous concert, immediately cried out, "Oh, my child!" and drew it away. The child being alarmed at the dog's barking, shrieked; and upon this the Defendant came out with a pistol under his coat. By this time the dog had reached his master's thigh, as if to intreat him, upon which the dog jumped upon him, but did not offer to bite him. Soon after this, the animal, upon the wall, and Mrs. Moulford was pulled down by the neck, when the Defendant drew forth his pistol and shot him in the loins, of which wound he died in a very short time. With respect to the value of the animal, the learned Counsel said he should be enabled to prove that the Plaintiff had offered a very large sum for him, and that he was possessed of many of those appointments which made a dog valuable, such as a ring and carrying his master's clothes and slippers, and an uncommon attachment to all the family, as well as perfect good nature towards all that treated him with kindness. Witnesses were then called in support of this case.

Mr. Fitz Waring, the Plaintiff's sister, proved the docility and playfulness of the dog, but positively denied that he had ever bitten or attempted to bite any person. Her brother had been of good living, and he on the 6th of July, when

the animal got out by accident, having been kept in consequence of the threats of the Defendant. It never attempted to bite the Defendant or his children, although often provoked by the latter and kicked by the former. On the day in question, the animal was running about the field, and the servant was endeavouring to catch it. The Defendant's daughter, with another young lady, came up, and taking up a brick, said she would knock its brains out if it approached her. The Defendant's wife afterwards came out and went to the dog with her little boy, but the animal never offered to touch her or the child. The Defendant soon after came out, and the dog having jumped upon him, although he did not bite him, the defendant shot him through the loins as he was getting over the wall into the yard. This evidence was supported by Mary Holland and two other witnesses.

The Attorney-General addressed the Court and Jury on the part of the Defendant, and contended, that in this instance his client was perfectly justified in the course he had taken, for that he shot the dog in his own defence. The dog had twice jumped at him, and he had beaten him off; he was jumping at him a third time, when he fired, and thereby prevented the consequences which might otherwise have accrued to himself. In proof of this, as well as in support of the case of the Defendant in general, four witnesses were called, who stated that the Defendant was called into the field by the screams of his daughter, and that, in shooting the dog, he did so in his own defence. In the evidence of these persons, how ever, there was a degree of variance, which induced the Jury, after an impartial and able charge from Mr. Justice Abbot, to find a verdict for the Plaintiff. Damages, £100. Costs, 40s.

NAVIGATOR MEDALS.—At the Custom-house sale on Thursday last, three silver sets of Bonaparte medals, consisting of 145 each, were sold for £265. They had been entered at £200 each, and were seized as undervalued. These medals, however, have not the sharpness nor the beauty of the bronze, which are become invaluable. The dies are all broken, and it is said that Audien has disposed of his dies to the French Government. The Return from Elba, one of the most medals, will fetch in France from twenty to thirty Napoleons; they are certainly very fine specimens of art, and authentic records of memorable events. In consequence of the harbour dues having been laid on the French vessels, the passage is now entirely with the British; the mails only come from Calais. The fact alone proves the great advantage which the French had over the English while the dues were exacted from the latter only; for, until very lately, there were nearly thirty French vessels who could carry passengers at reduced prices.

COMMISSION COURT.

GRIS-SHAFER, MONDAY, JULY 8. The King, at the prosecution of Isaac Callimore, John Callimore, and Peter Ugar Williams, v. Patrick Cuddihy.

On the sitting of the Court, Mr. O'Connell moved, that the trial of the traverser should be called on. He stated, that this prosecution was lying over since the month of February last. The great object of his client, Mr. Cuddihy, always was to have it brought on. He courted investigation as much as his adversary's smirk, from it—and their conduct, this day, proved, that investigation was not their object. Now, said the learned Counsel, when they were unable to form any excuse for further delay, they have abandoned the prosecution altogether. But it is not intended the thing should stop here. Mr. Cuddihy feels, that his character has been publicly assailed, and it is a duty he owes to himself and his family to prove to the world, that the charges made against him were false and infamous.

Mr. O'Connell then applied to the Court for copies of the informations sworn by the prosecutors; and also, for the copy of an affidavit sworn by one Joseph O'Fly. He said he applied for those documents in order to ground an action upon them for a malicious prosecution. He moved on an affidavit sworn in the month of February last, and, with the permission of the Court, he would detail some of the facts sworn in that affidavit.

Baron McCallan. Mr. O'Connell, it is quite unnecessary; you are entitled, as a matter of course, to these documents moved for. As this is a case where no prosecution has been had, your client's character must stand quite unimpaired, and, perhaps, it would be as well if the circumstances of the case were not made known before the trial of your action.

Mr. O'Connell.—But, my Lords, I feel it necessary to say one word. Although the prosecutors have not dared to appear—and, my Lords, no man in society more regrets, or, indeed, has more cause to regret, their non-appearance, than Mr. Cuddihy—the greatest grievance committed on my client is their non-appearance this day: he being a Gentleman of great respectability, high in the commercial world, a man whose honour has never been questioned, and whose character has never been assailed, until the prosecutors thought fit to commence this action against him. My Lords, it was not more than a month after Mr. Cuddihy brought an action for an outrage committed on him by the Callimores, and their agent, and had obtained a hat from my Lord Chief Justice, when they ventured to introduce his name, and charge him with the offence which they have not dared, this day, to come forward, nor attempt to prove. My Lords, the assured object of this prosecution was, to extort a large sum of money from my client, which his prosecutors thought, from

his feelings of delicacy, he would advance more than appear in this Court, to answer even an unfounded charge—a charge which must have sorely wounded the feelings, and was calculated to injure the character of Mr. Cuddihy, as a gentleman and a merchant; at least, with those who were unacquainted with the facts. Mr. Cuddihy fortunately had the firmness to stand upon his innocence; he came forward to defend his character, and, as was to be expected, they had no dared to appear in Court. But, my Lords, they shall be taught, that it is not in this country the reputation of an honourable man can be assailed with impunity; an opportunity will be given my client to defend his character from the foulest imputations, and the laws of the land will, I trust, severely punish his defamers. Against his prosecutors he will instantly proceed by action; against their conduct he will institute a prosecution for the grossest perjury.

Their Lordships then made the order required; and directed the recognizances of the prosecutors to be estraited, to the satisfaction of a most crowded Court.
