A gale of wind blew yesterday from the S. and S. W. which prevented the sailing of the Expedition from Portsmouth, under Lord Exmouth, who embarked on Saturday.

The Jasper, it is rumored, will accompany the fleet as far as Gibraltar, for the purpose of returning with Lord Exmouth's despatches.

New York, June 20.—Late from Algiers. Last evening arrived at this port the United States' sloop, the John Adams, Captain Trenchard.

The John Adams sailed from Algiers on the 17th May, in company with the United States' sloop, the Commodore Swann, under the command of Commodore Sauss.

We are informed that a serious misunderstanding has arisen between the Dey of Algiers and the Americans, from what particular causes we have not been able to learn.

Commodore Sauss, apprised of the hostile intentions of the Dey, proceeded with the whole of the American squadron in the Mediterranean to the port of Algiers.

The King has issued an Ordinance, directing the suppression in legal proceedings of the demonstrations, expressions, and formulas hitherto in use.

His Lordship embarked on Saturday at noon, intending to proceed to St. Helena with the following ships:—Queen Charlotte, Minden, Albion, Britannia, Cordelia, Infernal, Fury, and Hecla.
