

PARLIAMENT. HOUSE OF COMMONS—THURSDAY, APRIL 16.

INSOLVENT DEBTERS' ACT. Mr. S. WORTLEY presented a Petition from the Inhabitants of Waterford, against the Insolvent Debtors' Act.

Mr. CHICHESTER presented a Petition from certain Debtors confined in one of the Gaols in Ireland, in favour of the Insolvent Debtors' Act.

Mr. CALCRAFT, as a Member of that Committee, said, the state of the Irish Insolvent Act was not under their consideration.

Mr. CHICHESTER still thought it would be desirable that the same Committee should embrace the inquiry into the Insolvent Debtors' Acts of both Countries.

Mr. CHARLES GRANT would be very unwilling to add to the labours of the Committee, but he still thought that they could manage both inquiries.

Mr. MACDONALD said, that, though a Member of the Committee, he had not approved of the Report.

Mr. DAWSON trusted that the Committee would be induced to undertake this additional task.

Mr. BROUGHAM denied that there was any such indisposition, or any like warmness, exhibited towards Ireland on this subject.

There were very material difficulties in these inquiries; the Right Hon. Gentleman himself (Mr. C. Grant) had started one or two, namely, the constitution of the jurisdiction in Ireland.

It was the constitution of the Court in this Country which led to so much inquiry in the Committee.

On the principle of the measure they were quite agreed, but the details of the Court led to much examination and inquiry.

The circumstances also of the want of a compulsory power, to get real information respecting fraudulent assignments, had been much discussed; that defect did not probably exist in Ireland, as the Judges of the Land were the administrators of the Act.

He understood there were several Petitions from Ireland against the Act. Could any Member suppose these Petitions would be satisfied unless their evidence was heard before a Committee?

In England they certainly would not; and why they were likely to be satisfied in Ireland without examination he was at a loss to conjecture.

It would be much better to have separate Committees sitting; and as the evidence before the present one was printed daily, the Irish Committee could avail themselves of it, and proceed at the same time with their branch of the subject.

Mr. FEEI thought that, as it was desirable to assimilate the laws of both Countries in this respect, it would be well if one Committee embraced the whole subject.

Mr. CALCRAFT said, that if, after the Committee had remitted the labours in which they were now engaged, they could take up the other branch of the subject, he, for one, would be most ready to devote his time to further inquiry.

The Petition was then laid on the table.
