



THE SERPENTINE RIVER.

CONK TRADE.—The following Decree has been issued by the Spanish Government: "The King, being informed of the petition by the Ayuntamiento of your town, and by the manufacturers of corks in the province of Catalonia, and being desirous of relieving them from the disadvantages they labour under by foreign competition, has been pleased to command, that, for the present, and until the tariff is published, there shall be paid on the exportation of cork, in sheets, 90 reals (£23 per ton) per Castilian quintal, in national ships, and 99 reals (£23 18s.) per ditto, in foreign ships; and a real per quintal on cut corks per Spanish ships, and 3 reals per quintal for foreign ships; and His Majesty shall at the same time resolve, that the Board of Trade of Barcelona shall provide, without delay, the machinery which is used in foreign countries for cutting corks by one stroke, advising His Majesty when said machinery is procured."

And finally, that returns be made immediately of the quantity of cork in sheets and cut, exported during the last five years, stating the value, and of the revenue derived therefrom, and of the results of the same with the results of the resolution.
