



LETTERS TO BE TAKEN BY JUSTICES OF THE PEACE TO HIS MAJESTY GEORGE IV.

The following official Circular upon the above subject has been addressed to the several Clerks of the Peace of the different Counties:—

Whitehall, Feb. 14, 1820.

Sir—I am directed by Lord Sidmouth to acquaint you, that his Lordship, having received several applications on the subject of the Oaths which ought to be taken by Justices of the Peace, in consequence of his Majesty's accession, has consulted with the Attorney and Solicitor-General thereon, and thinks it right to acquaint you, for the information of the Justices of the Peace for the several Counties, that, though not strictly necessary, it will be right, that the Justices should, at their first Sessions, take the Oaths of Allegiance, Supremacy, and Abjuration; but that they need not take any other Oath until a new Commission of the Peace shall be issued by his present Majesty, when every Justice, intending to act under such Commission, must take the Oath of Office before the Clerk of the Peace or his Deputy, and must also, within the time required by law, receive the Sacrament, and take the Oaths of Allegiance, Supremacy, and Abjuration; and such of the Justices as have not previously taken the Oath of Qualification as to Property, must take that oath likewise; but those who have taken that oath, under any antecedent Commission, will not be obliged to take it again.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 19. It will be seen from the London Gazette, that the name of the QUEEN is not included in the Ritual of the Service of the Established Church. The London Papers intimate, that this proceeding deeply engaged the public attention, and a great variety of rumours were in circulation on the subject. One Journal has stated, "that a certain lady (meaning the QUEEN) has been ordered to go to England, and that the persons are commonly named who are said to have been employed during this delicate and extraordinary mission." The same Journal, the Sun, continues— "the transactions which have taken place openly as to admit of little doubt, were fully developed to the Nation, we believe,

that the People in general would join with us in believing, that there is not the least likelihood, if such orders have really been despatched, that they will be followed by acquiescence. We have such solid and satisfactory reasons for our opinions, that, however confidently the rumour may prevail of a mediated return to this Country, voluntary or by requisition, we positively state our conviction, that such an event is far, very far, from being within the limits of probability. This is pretty direct accusation, and the reasons ought to be, indeed, solid which can have justified its public appearance. It was rumoured, that a frigate had actually been sent off, to bring home the Personage referred to, but this statement is questionable on many grounds, and seems to be entirely without foundation. All the advisers of this Royal Personage are understood to have recommended, that she should continue abroad, but that she had resolved to adhere to her original intention, and that she will, at no distant period, visit the British Metropolis. It is, in addition, given out, that an offer has been made to the QUEEN, that she may fix a residence wherever she pleases abroad, with the style of QUEEN, £50,000 per annum, and a frigate to attend her commands, on condition that she remains abroad, and seeks no further establishment; or, as the alternative, that a regular public renewal of the delicate investigation, embracing transactions abroad, shall take place, should she return to England. The Morning Chronicle of Tuesday sent forth the following paragraph—"We are credibly informed, that, on Friday, the Law Officers of the Crown made a Report to the Cabinet Council on a case laid before them relative to an illustrious Personage, whose conduct abroad has been the subject of much animadversion, and that it was their unanimous opinion, than an indictment upon the facts stated could not be supported. This opinion is said to be signed by the Attorney and Solicitor-General, and by his Majesty's Advocate-General. This decision, we presume, puts an end to all idea of a process of divorce." The Globe of Tuesday has the following article:—"SECOND EDITION. "Globe-Office, Four o'Clock. "CHANGE OF MINISTRY. "It is confidently reported, that Ministers have this day tendered their resignation, but by whom they are to be succeeded is not mentioned. Their refusal to undertake a certain delicate measure is the cause assigned."

Such are the statements every where current. We, of course, can neither confirm nor refute them. Some of them may be valid, but it is strongly to be suspected, that the prevalent desire to be first in the field of news may have contributed not a little to swell the list of reports. The subject is one of peculiar interest to the Nation, and till it shall be, somehow or another, laid at rest, it will create powerful feelings and anticipations.

The ceremony of the interment of the Duke of Kent took place with great solemnity at the Royal Chapel of Windsor on Saturday last. All the preparations were completed for the funeral of his late MAJESTY, which was appointed to take place on the evening of Wednesday last, in the same Chapel. The order of these solemnities extended to too great length for present publication.

Disturbances of so serious a nature as to threaten the public peace have lately taken place at Dewsbury, Batley, and other districts in Yorkshire, and about Heckmondwike, Hanging-Neaton, and Churchill. Bands of workmen have way-laid journeymen for working at what they call under-prices, and their employers, and done some of them much personal injury. On the evening of Thursday week, a body of about two hundred attacked the premises of Messrs. NEWELL and SON, near Dewsbury, and forced the workmen employed there to desert from their labours, by breaking the windows, and even beating in some of the window frames, with showers of stones. So sudden, it seems, are the movements of these parties, that there is hardly a possibility of guarding against their attacks. In this respect, their operations are not unlike those of the men, who, some years ago, under the name of Ludlites, perpetrated so many mischiefs in the counties of Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire, and Derbyshire; and it is greatly to be feared, that the public quiet will not be restored till some of these infuriated people shall have brought themselves to the same ignominious end.

All the material accounts that have arrived from Spain will be found in our columns, and we do not think it necessary at present to enter into the subject, farther than to observe, that affairs must speedily come to a crisis, if they have not reached that point before this time; that the Constitutionalists are estimated at 12,000 picked and determined men; and that the lines of La Isla may be held against 50,000 opponents.

The Jamaica Papers contain reports, that MORRIS had been surrounded by the Patriots at San Carlos, and that BOLIVAR was besieging Cartagena. Bolivar was reinstated in his command by the Congress of Venezuela.

Baron DE HEMMELT, after his late dismissal as Prussian Minister, was offered a yearly pension of about £1200. The worthy Baron declined it, and observed to the KING, that, having no longer his Majesty's confidence, he did not think himself entitled to any reward. What an example to other Ministers, when they retire from office! Inconceivable claim of a Candidate for a seat in Parliament—A most singular advertisement has appeared in the Lincoln Mercury, signed "H. MANNERS," requesting the good men of Grantham to elect Mr. FELIX MANNERS, of the Foot Guards,

at the ensuing General Election. The reasons given why they should choose him are, "that an ardent, prodigal, infamous, married woman" has eloped with him to Marrillies; and, if elected, Mr. H. MANNERS says, the Speaker's Warrant, on the call of the House, would be the means of restoring him to his anxious friends. On such national and moral grounds, the worthy Electors can certainly do nothing less than elect Mr. FELIX MANNERS. The only difficulty is, can the Speaker secure this same Mr. FELIX MANNERS from being run away with by some other ardent, prodigal, and infamous married woman?—No Mad due.

ADDRESS TO HIS PRESENT MAJESTY, KING GEORGE IV.

On Thursday, a Meeting, highly respectable in point of number and character, assembled at the Town-Hall of this City, in pursuance of previous arrangements, for the purpose of preparing an Address to the present Sovereign of the British Empire on the demise of his illustrious Father, and on his own accession to the Throne. It was moved by the Lord Bishop, and unanimously carried, that James Haecrett, Esq. Mayor, should take the Chair. The Mayor then read the Requisition, and the appointment of the Meeting, and expressed his readiness to attend to whatever proceedings might be proposed for adoption. It was moved, and unanimously carried, that the following persons be appointed as a Committee to prepare the intended Address:—

The Lord Bishop of Waterford, Wm. Newport, Esq. The Dean of Waterford, John Harris, Esq. The Rev. J. Marshall, Samuel Hobson, Esq. The Committee immediately retired to another room, and soon afterwards returned to the Meeting; it was read by the Lord Bishop, as Chairman of the Committee, and adopted by the Assembly. It entered into nothing of a political nature, but merely expressed those sentiments which have been usually conveyed to the Throne on such occasions, that the Address be entrusted to the Mayor, to be signed by him in the name and on behalf of the Citizens of Waterford, as well as in his own name, and be transmitted to the Lords Justices of Ireland, to be by them conveyed to his present MAJESTY. The Mayor at once undertook the duty assigned to him, and stated, that the wishes of his fellow-citizens should be fully complied with. The Committee took the liberty of recommending, in conformity to a good old practice, that the Address shall not be published till it shall have received the sanction of official reception. It was then moved by the Rev. Dean Lee, that the Mayor should leave the Chair, and that it should be taken by the Mayor. This having been complied with, the Thanks of the Meeting were unanimously returned to the Requisition, and for the propriety with which he conducted the proceedings of the day. The Meeting then separated.

SIR JOHN—The General Meeting of the friends of the Sick Poor has been adjourned to Monday next, the 21st Instant, at the Chamber of Commerce, at One o'Clock.

LEINSTER CIRCUIT. LAWRENCE, FEB. 16.—On the night of Thursday last, a number of ruffians, after committing several outrages, under the pretence of mandating arms, attacked the house of Mr. James Ryan, at Court-Brown, about two miles from Askeaton, in Lower Carlow, and in consequence of Mr. Ryan's very spirited resistance, burned his house and offices, in the latter of which two horses were destroyed, besides other property to some amount.

On the night that the party broke into Major Bateman's garden's house, at Newbridge, in this County, in search of arms, (as mentioned in our last,) the same gang committed several other depredations in that neighbourhood—they attacked the house of a man named Ryan, at Riddles-town, and took his gun;—also, the house of a man named Connelly, at Kilderrin, into which they fired some shots, and took two guns—from that place they went to the house of William Roche, of Creaves, where they also fired some shots, and took a gun—from thence they went to the houses of Michael Nestor, of Kilgaran, and Richard Halloran, of Raghnan, and others, where they were equally successful, and in some instances swore the inhabitants to inform them where guns were kept by others; and our highly respectable correspondent informs us, that, as far as he could learn, upwards of twenty guns were taken on that night, and concludes his letter by observing, that if some step is not immediately put to such proceedings, by the energy of the Magistrates, that part of the Country will be in a worse state than the County Galway.

Mr. Furlong Upton, Coast-officer of Ballycotton, with a detachment of Marines, seized 50 bales of smuggled Tobacco on Monday, near Ballycotton, County Cork.

On Saturday night, the turf-bait Peggy, of Seagh, the property of John Boland, was lost off Foynes Island, on her passage up the Shannon. There were six persons on board, all of whom perished—John Boland, sen. (the owner), John Boland, jun. Patrick Boland, Michael M'Nanara, and two pedlars, names unknown. A brig, laden with oranges, was stranded last week on the Coast, near Westport—cargo saved, where it will be told. Lord Mount Charles will be re-elected for Donough—his arrival from the Continent is daily expected.

STATE OF IRELAND.

(From the Dublin Evening Post.) The County of Galway continues in a state of great disturbance. The following is an extract of a Letter from a Gentleman known to us, in the neighbourhood of Augham:—

Extract of a Letter from Beechhill, Augham, Febr. 8, 1820. "We had three joint attacks here by a body of 200 men; they extended from the coach-house, half up the avenue. They sent in a letter, insisting on getting the arms, or tearing down the house. After waiting about ten minutes, they retired. They sent me word, on Friday, that if I sent out the guard and servants to be sworn, they would leave the arms—if not, they should have both, and that they would call at 11 o'clock that night. (This account I got at eight o'clock.) You may guess my answer. I had every thing ready for their reception. They came precisely at the hour, and saw we were so well prepared, and the gallery window so well lighted, that we must know them if they came up. They retired. Cloncha House was broken open that night. They called back to Cloncha again at seven o'clock in the morning, and took two saddles; they did not conceal their faces; they went through Shanahad at eight o'clock in the morning, with the saddles under their arms. Their number was three but eighteen, and they had nine saddled horses."

The following are extracts from the last Galway and Town Papers:— GALWAY, FEB. 14.—We have reason to believe, that the reports which so generally prevailed for the last week, of the Ribbonmen having made incursions into the east suburbs of this town, under such circumstances.—Connacht Journal.

About thirty Ribbonmen made incursions a few nights since in the neighbourhood of Annadown, in the County Galway, but were spiritedly resisted by Mr. John Cahill, of Woodpark. This Gentleman having been informed that the Ribbonmen were, on the preceding night, administering their illegal oaths in the different Villages about him, assembled his Tenantry, in order to be acquainted of the fact, and remonstrated with them on the invalidity of the oaths, &c.; but they refused to give him any information on the subject, unless he obtained pardon from them from the Colonel of the 77th Regiment, now stationed here. He accordingly qualified them, and having procured arms and ammunition, proceeded from his house, late at night, accompanied by twelve resolute fellows, towards the place where he understood the Ribbonmen were to have met. On perceiving Mr. Cahill and his party coming up, the Insurgents fled, but he pursued, and, after a long chase, succeeded in taking one of the prisoners, whose name is Michael Moran, and who was conducted to our County (Gaol) on Sunday, by a party of Mr. Cahill's tenants armed. On coming to the suburbs of our Town, Mr. Cahill, fearing a rescue, very prudently sent in a messenger for a party of the Military. This truly spirited action reflects great honour on Mr. Cahill and his tenantry; and we are convinced, that if this plan was resorted to in the commencement by our other County Gentlemen, the evil would not have assumed the alarming appearance which it at present has.—Ibid.

TEAM, FEB. 14.—The following fact has been stated to us by a gentleman of high respectability:— One of the nights of the last week, a great number of these misguided Ribbonmen assembled for the purpose of attacking a small party of the Police which are stationed in the County of Roscommon, and if possible to put them to instant death. They were prepared for their design, and lay in ambush for the coming of the Police, who had to pass that way. Shortly after these men arrived near the spot, and were instantly alarmed by a shout from the Ribbonmen, and who, at the same moment, began an attack. There were but six of the Police to contend with this depraved mob, from whom they knew they might expect no quarter, and with this idea formed themselves into a line of defence, and set up a brisk fire, with some effect on them. Fortunately, the Ribbonmen had but two guns, and by that means were unable to contend with determined and well-armed men, who gave a strong specimen of their courage and skill in keeping off so large a mob. Seeing that their plan was frustrated, and one of their party killed and three wounded, they judged a retreat necessary, and in which they were closely and warmly pursued for nearly a mile by these six brave men. The three men wounded were secured by the Police and lodged in Roscommon Gaol.—Inam Gazette.

COUNTY MAYO.—The following will be read with great pleasure from this County:—"CASTLEBAR, FEB. 14.—Every part of this County continues to enjoy perfect tranquillity, notwithstanding its immediate contiguity to both of the disturbed Counties. The Right Hon. Denis Browne, Colonel H. Browne, Lieutenant Colonel Jackson, and the Reverend Denis Browne, have judiciously posted themselves, and taken commands, in those situations on the boundaries which were most likely to be assailed by the infuriated inhabitants of the adjoining District, and they do not venture to approach.—Mayo Constitution.

There are now at Belfast upwards of 3000 tons of shipping advertised to take out Passengers to America immediately.

DEATH OF LEONARD MACNALLY, ESQ. With feelings of unalloyed sorrow, we have to announce the decease of Leonard MacNally, Esq. of the Irish Bar. He became seriously indisposed on Saturday last—his malady increased, and baffled all medical skill, until it terminated in his death, about three o'clock in the afternoon of Tuesday. He was in the 68th year of his age, and was called to the Irish Bar in 1776. He was a Lawyer of great eminence—no other man in his time understood what is called Roman Law better, as well as the Law of the Country. He was well known—he was the author of several dramatic works, most of which were successful. He was the contemporary of that galaxy of Irish talent, to which only a faint setting ray now remains, to remind us, by its occasional scintillations, of the light, irreparable in our day, which our Country has sustained.—Dublin Journal.

After a patient investigation, it appeared that the deceased went out with the intention of making what is called a crib for catching birds, and took with him a greynose, which was found by his side, and from the blow of which he came by his death. Verdict, Willful Murder. It is supposed that the act was committed by an Idiot living in that neighbourhood.

THE MARKETS.

DUBLIN CORN-EXCHANGE, FEB. 14.—Although we had a good supply of Wheat this morning from Essex, Kent, and Suffolk, yet the demand was fully adequate to the arrivals, and fine runs from the above Counties found ready sale, at an advance of 2s. per quarter on last Monday's price. Having but little fine Barley in the early part of the morning, a few select samples sold at a price higher than on this day week; and the supply increasing considerably about ten o'clock, the trade from that hour became heavy, and the early prices could not be obtained; so that our prices fell off the same as on Friday, which may be quoted 1s. per quarter dearer than on last Monday. New Beans are 1s. per quarter lower. Oats are 1s. per quarter higher, having early arrivals of that article. In other articles there is no alteration.

DUBLIN CORN-EXCHANGE, FEB. 16.—Our supply of Grain at Market this day was smaller than usual, and prices were steady, but without alteration from our quotation of Friday's Market, except prime Oats, which were in demand, and about 6d. per barrel higher. The general rates this day were, for Wheat, 23s. 6d. to 3s.; Common Oats, 12s. to 13s.; Distillers' prices, 13s. to 15s. 6d.; Feeding, 14s. to 16s.; Seed, 18s. to 25s.; Grinding Barley, 15s. to 16s.; Malt, 18s. to 19s.; Beer, 13s. 6d. to 14s. 6d.; New Malt, 32s. to 37s.; Old (nominally), 30s. to 32s.; Rapeseed, 30s. to 32s. per barrel; Oatmeal, 12s. to 15s.; Second Flour, 19s. to 21s. per cwt.; Red Clover Seed, 45s. 12s. 9d. to 46s.; White Gu. 26s. 10s. to 27s. per cwt.

WATERFORD MARKETS. The price of Butter has been rather on the decline since Wednesday; there were but 27 firkins at market on Thursday, the general price of which was about 88s. for first quality; yesterday morning, 88s. was paid for a few casks, of first quality—but afterwards, in consequence of the unusual largeness of the supply, (210 firkins having been weighed, besides 11 left unsold), there was a reduction of at least 2s. per cwt., and 86s. was the highest to be generally obtained for first quality till the close. It is right to observe, however, that as the principal part of the Butter brought to market at this late stage of the season consists of the inferior qualities—as lots are now chiefly purchased in the run, or at one general sale for all qualities together—and as the price given by purchasers varies considerably, according to the proportion of these qualities contained in each lot, it becomes every day more difficult to state with any degree of precision the rates of the respective qualities. There has been no alteration since our last in the price of Singed or Scalded Rice, 41s. being still the utmost paid for the former, and 43s. for the latter. Wheat has continued to improve; the general rate for prime quality has got up to 44s. and 5d. over has been paid in some instances. Barley has remained stationary. No change has occurred in the price of Oats to Farmers, which has remained at 12s. 6d.—but good parcels have been in better demand since Wednesday, and have brought higher prices than could then be obtained. No material alteration in Flour or Oatmeal. New Scotch Herrings, of best quality, are still on the advance, and were yesterday 1s. per barrel dearer; the inferior kind are not much in request, and remain as last quoted. Newport Cod, in consequence of the numerous arrivals within the last few days, has been reduced, and is now selling, in large quantities, at 3s. 10d. per barrel; small quantities, 4s. to 4s. 2s. No alteration yet in Newcastle. Other articles remain as in our usual table.
