



AVARICE.—From LABOR.—The school-...  
On the same day, despatches were received from General Souleite (who was expected in Caracas in two days), dated the 17th July. He entered Corico on the 16th, Morates having embarked with his troops in the frigate Ligera and brig of war Hercules, with three schooners, under convoy. He arrived at Corico, and was expected to sail for Porto Cabello in a few days. A ship and brig of war, formerly of his Majesty's service, were momentarily expected from London, completely manned and equipped for the service of Colombia. A frigate of 44 guns was also expected from the same place in a few months.

THE ARCTIC EXPEDITION.
