EDUCATION.

AUGUSTINIAN SEMINARY, NEW ROSS.

Reverend JAMES CRANE, President.

THE CLERGYMEN of the AUGUSTI-

NIAN ORDER, at NEW ROSS, considering

the advantages which would accrue to their neighbour-

hood and support at large, from the establishment of

a School, of a comprehensive plan and moderate

terms, have proposed to themselves to devote a portion

of their time to this useful mode of literary improve-

ment.

The School will open on the 1st day of March,

1830, in the former College of their order, which they

have lately fitted up for the purpose.

The system of the School will embrace all those

departments of English and Classical Literature

necessary to fit young Gentlemen for entrance into

College, especially into the College of Maynooth,

Carlow and other Ecclesiastical Seminaries.

Special care shall be taken to prepare young men

for Mercantile pursuits, and for those other branches

of business in which the youth of the country find their

interest to engage.

The best Masters will be procured—the newest and

most concise method will be adopted—and no expense

will be spared to render the system of Education

complete.

The General Plan will comprise the Greek, Latin,

Italian, French and English Languages; History,

Geography, Arithmetic, Bookkeeping, and Mathe-

matics.

The details of the system may be known by com-

municating with the President, or any of the Clergy-

men of the Augustinian Chapel House.

The Terms are—FOUR GUINEAS per Annum, for

Greek, Latin, and English Education, as mentioned in

the General Plan; and FIVE GUINEAS per annum, if

French and Italian be added.

No Entrance Money will be required.

The Payments to be made quarterly—and the first

quarter to be paid in advance.

The quarterly days, for greater convenience, are

fixed for the 1st day of March, the 1st of June, the 1st

of September, and the 1st of December—so that the

boy entering previously to the Quarterly Day, will

have to pay in advance from the day of entrance up

to the next Quarterly Day, and for the quarter thence

ensuing also, unless the Quarterly Day shall have been

only recently passed, in which case it may be arranged

with the President, so as not to pay in advance for the

quarter thence ensuing.

Vacation—only one month in the year—from the 1st

of August to the 1st of September.

Hours of attendance in School from Nine o'clock in

the Morning till Three in the Afternoon, and on

Saturdays the boys are to be dismissed at Twelve

o'clock.

Their moral and religious instruction and conduct

will be carefully attended to; and should they so

different persons from the Holy Catholic Faith

think well of sending their children to this School,

there shall be no interference with their religious

instruction.

The Right Reverend Doctor Doyle, who, since his

appointment to the Episcopal Office in Kildare and

Waterford, has not ceased to feel and manifest the

deepest interest in whatever concerns the Augustinian

Order, to which he belongs, has not only approved

fully of the system of Education now offered by his

Religious Brethren to the Public, but arranged or

suggested nearly all its details; and we are authorized
