



SUMMARY OF NEWS.

James Fish, jun., the celebrated American stockbroker, was fatally shot yesterday at the Central Hotel in New York by a man against whom he had instituted an action for libel.

The trials at the Old Bailey commenced on yesterday morning. It is arranged that the Brighton murder case shall be brought after the Rev. Mr. Watson's murder case; and the latter shall stand first on Wednesday.

Mr Blake and Major Hayes, Fishery Inspectors, had a conference with the Conservators of Cork district, on Saturday, relative to the application of the tidal fishermen to have the opening of the season fixed at an earlier date than at present.

The secretary of the Waterford and Limerick Railway has, upon information against a young man named Breen, late a clerk in the office, charging him with forging his (the secretary's) name to a cheque on the Provincial Bank, and also with embezzlement of a sum of money, the property of the company.

A meeting was held yesterday at Skibbereen, county Cork, in favour of denominational education. The Roman Catholic Bishop of Ross, who presided, said that if denominational teaching were not granted they would prove that they had materials enough to form an Irish Parliament.

Sir Dominic Corrigan, M.P. for Dublin, replying to an invitation to attend the Permissive Bill meetings held in Dublin last week, excuses himself on the ground of prior engagements, but acknowledges an increasing necessity for some measure which, if it does not eradicate, will diminish the evils of intemperance.

THE LIMERICK BANQUET.

A meeting of the banquet committee was held on yesterday evening at their committee-room, when all the details for the coming great demonstration in that city were finally agreed to.

THE MID-DAY MAIL.

On more than one occasion, considerable inconvenience has been felt by the non-delivering of the mid-day Mail, at Waterford till late in the afternoon.

WATERFORD HARBOUR BOARD.

The monthly general meeting of this body was held on yesterday, Alderman Jacob, J.P., presiding. The secretary said that a general committee, held on the 27th ult., directed Mr. Cherry, the board's solicitor, to continue the means for the deepening of the bar shoal, and the arrangements with the County Waterford Railway relative to not bringing the terminus nearer than 680 yards to the bridge.
