General approval appears to be the feeling awakened by the action of the Government, so far as it was disclosed on Monday night, in reference to the American claims. The Telegraph is emphatic in its commendation of the ministerial statements which it says were heard with undisguised satisfaction; and it expresses a conviction that a settlement of the dispute, satisfactory to both countries, is not far distant.

According to the Philadelphia correspondent of the Times, the proposal put forward by our Government, and now under consideration by the United States Senate, is that both countries should be bound by the principle that a neutral should only be liable for the direct consequences of such negligence as is charged against England in the matter of the Alabama, this principle to be embodied in a new article, which must receive the assent of two-thirds of the United States Senate.

If this were ratified, there would be of course, an end of the indirect claims. The News and Standard highly commend the prudence of the course taken by Parliament, and especially the discretion shown by the leaders of the Opposition, in abstaining from any discussion of the question which might embarrass the negotiations.

Earl Russell's ill-adviced speech was the only objectionable feature in the proceedings of Monday night.

In the German Parliament on Tuesday, on the consideration of the estimates for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, a deputy moved the omission of an estimate for an envoy to the Pope the reason assigned being the rejection by the Pope of the envoy recently nominated—Cardinal Prince Hohenlohe. The proposal was rejected.

Prince Bismark said that the rejection of an envoy by the Government to whom it was proposed to accredit him was not a frequent, because it was not a courteous proceeding, and had not happened to him (Prince Bismark) during a diplomatic career lasting over ten years. The sorrow he felt, however, would not justify him in manifesting irritation. Regard for the interests of the Catholic population of Germany had determined him to nominate another envoy, however difficult it would be to find one equal to Cardinal Hohenlohe, and he was doubtful of a substitute achieving good results.

At a later stage of the discussion Prince Bismark emphatically declared that he would always reject any treaty with Rome in which the Papacy might claim that certain state laws should not be binding upon a portion of the subjects of the empire.

On Wednesday His Holiness Pius IX completed his eightieth year. Apropos of the event the Daily Telegraph says:—In another month His Holiness will have completed the twenty-sixth year of his Pontificate. Few reigns, spiritual or temporal, have been so crowded with incidents of supreme importance; and perhaps not the least astonishing of all is the success with which the Pope has outlived predictions that his tenure of the Pontifical office was about to close. He has surprised both enemies and friends; by the mere fact of living on he has heaped utter contempt on a popular superstition, and, after a series of wonderful vicissitudes, still confronts his enemies with an alacrity which is almost hilarious.

The extinction of the spiritual and the overthrow of the temporal power have made his reign eventful beyond any that preceded; and when it comes to be viewed historically, the period will loom very big indeed in the annals of the century.

We (Daily Express) are glad to find that Lady Charlemont's proposition to present some testimonial of their sympathy from the ladies of Ireland to the Countess of Mayo has been kindly received, but we trust that the co-operation will be so general as to make it a real compliment to the suffering lady in her great sorrow. It will be probably a personal ornament, and as the subscription is limited to £15, there ought to be no difficulty in obtaining the concurrence of a sufficient number of ladies to make it honourable to the donors as well as the recipient. Lady Charlemont has expressed an earnest wish for the co-operation of any ladies who will take the trouble to collect subscriptions.

SIR JOHN COODE, C.E.

We noticed with much pleasure, a short time ago, the raising of Sir John Coode to the honour of Knighthood, for distinguished services rendered by him as one of the ablest civil engineers in the Empire. Sir John Coode has been for many years identified with Waterford, and its improvements, as the Engineer-in-Chief of the Harbour Board, and his directions relative to the deepening of the Ford were ably carried out by Mr. Stephens, J.P., the local Engineer of the Board. Sir John Coode has obtained a world-wide celebrity, and we are proud that he is so closely identified with the Harbour of Waterford. Now that the Treasury has consented to lend the money for the removal of the Bar, and the establishment of a Dry Dock, we are sure that Sir John Coode and Mr. Stephens will proceed vigorously and satisfactorily with the work. The Illustrated London News, which, in a recent issue, has an excellent portrait of the new Knight, has the following observations:—"Sir John Coode, the eminent civil engineer, who has just received the honour of Knighthood, is a member of an ancient family which has been seated in Cornwall since the time of Henry VII. He is a son of the late Mr. Charles Coode, of Bodmin, by a daughter of the late Rev. Joseph Bennett, Rector of Great Wigborough, Essex, and of St. Andrew's Lodge, Cornwall. He is a nephew of the late Admiral Sir John Coode, R.N., who distinguished himself at the battle of Algiers, where he commanded H.M.S. Albion, under Lord Exmouth. The present Sir John Coode was born in 1816. He commenced the study of his profession as a pupil of the late Mr. J. M. Rendel, under whom he was appointed resident engineer of the National Harbour at Portland, in 1847, succeeding as engineer-in-chief upon that gentleman's decease, in 1856. This post he held until the recent completion of the work, thus being identified with the whole progress of the undertaking. Sir John was a member of the Royal Commission upon Harbours in 1859-9. He has been for some years past consulted by the Board of Trade and other Government departments upon harbour questions, and has executed important public works at the Cape, the Isle of Man, and other parts of the United Kingdom, and the Colonies. Sir John Coode is married to a daughter of the late Mr. William Price, of Weston-super-Mare.

WRECK OF A MAIL STEAMER OFF THE WATERFORD COAST.

The Cunard steamer Tripoli, bound from Liverpool to Boston, U.S., was wrecked this morning off the Tuskar, having struck on a sand bank. Forty-six passengers were taken off by the fishing smack Nauid, of Dunmore.

WATERFORD MILLITIA.—One hundred of the recruits of the Waterford Militia went down by steamer to Dunannon fort on Thursday last, to prepare the barracks for the force, which is to be called in on the 28th inst.

DANGEROUS ASSAULT.—Denis Neill was charged at the Waterford petty sessions this day with committing a dangerous assault on a young girl by striking her in the head with a large stone. It appeared that the missile was intended for Constable Reid but struck the girl. The prisoner was sentenced to two months imprisonment.

SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.—An special meeting of this society was held yesterday (Thursday) in the Town Hall, Boreford-street, Waterford, when the annual report to be submitted to a general meeting was read. The report was to the effect that the society was gaining ground in public estimation although the funds were not in as satisfactory a condition as they ought to be. The society had prosecuted to conviction the following cases during the year, 9 horses, 4 asses, one calf and one goose plucking. On the motion of Mr. Wright, seconded by Mrs. Palmer the report was adopted and ordered to be printed.

ALLEGED ROBBERY OF A WATCH.—Marcus Harman was charged at the Waterford petty sessions this day, before the Mayor, Alderman Reid, Alderman Jacob, Captain Brennan, and Captain Johnson, with having a watch in his possession which he knew to have been stolen. It appears that Harman came into Mr. Dillon's shop to ascertain the value of the watch, which was at once recognised as one which had been stolen from a man named Murray. Harman declared that he bought the watch from Mrs. Doyle, of John-street, who said that it belonged to her son. The magistrates sent the case for trial to quarter sessions.

THE "WHITE STAR" LINE—THE STRAITS-SHIP ADRIATIC.—The "White Star" line of ocean steam-ships, for the trade between Liverpool and New York, Boston, and Quebec, consists at present of six powerful vessels, the Oceanic, the Atlantic, the Baltic, the Adriatic, the Antarctic, and the Republic, each of which is 5000 or 5500 tons burden, with engines of 3000 or 3500 horse power. The hull of each ship is divided, for safety, into water-tight compartments; the place for merchandise of all descriptions is stowed in a double bottom, and the passenger accommodation is like that of a first-class hotel, with ladies' private saloon, gentlemen's smoking room, bath-room, a library, and electric bells to call the stewards. These vessels were all built for Messrs. Harman, Imrie, and Co., of Liverpool, by Messrs. Harland and Wolff, of Belfast. They have made very good voyages during the winter months, both westward and eastward, in spite of the heavy gales. The Republic, leaving Sandy Hook, New York harbour, at six p.m., on February 21, reached Roche's Point, Queensland, at nine a.m. on March 1, the mean time of her passage being eight days, ten hours, thirty-eight minutes. The Adriatic, as we learn by a telegram from New York, has just performed her maiden trip from this side in eight days 14 hours, under the command of Captain Digby Murray. Her best day's run was 391 knots, or 459 miles, showing the extraordinary average speed of 16 1/2 knots, or 191-6 miles through the day's length of 452 ft 6 in.; breadth, 41 feet; depth, 32 feet. She has a gross register of 4,250 tons, the net register being 2,950 tons. Mr. Jas. Hennessy, Auctioneer, is the agent at Waterford.

THE BISHOP OF CASHEL.—A rumour prevailed during the early part of the week that the Bishop of Cashel proposed making changes in the present mode of service in the Waterford Protestant Cathedral. The report is not true, however true, as we learn, on the authority of the Waterford clergyman, that the bishop had expressed a desire not to interfere in any way, but to let the Chapter decide matters of this kind, as it is entirely in their province.
