At the meeting of the Limerick and Clare Farmers' Club on Saturday, the President alluded to the forthcoming election in Malrow, and expressed a hope that the constituency would elect no man who did not pledge himself to be faithful to the cause of Home Rule and not to take place. He referred to the Ballot Bill as "likely to prove beneficial to the country, if passed unaltered by the House of Lords, and said Mr Gladstone was deserving of their thanks for the manner in which he carried it through the House of Commons. Referring to the continued detention of the Fenian prisoners, the President said, that nothing less than an entire and complete amnesty would satisfy the country. Resolutions were adopted declaring that the incarceration of the men was cruel, impolitic, and unjust; that the Club regarded with satisfaction Mr Butt's conduct as an Irish representative in the House of Commons, and recognised the value of his services to the country.

The Telegraph news from Spain shows that the Carlist movement has not been wholly suppressed, although the insurgents have been unable to master in any place in formidable numbers. The small bands of Carlists that show themselves in several districts are invariably defeated when they come in contact with the troops. The main body of the insurgents in Biscay were endeavouring to reach the French frontier, and Marshal Serrano is in hot pursuit. An official despatch states that the Marshal has succeeded in surrounding the Biscay bands, and that a decisive action is soon expected.

There is some hope that the disaster to the "Conard" steamer the Tripoli may not prove so serious as was at first apprehended. The Cuba, one of the magnificent liners belonging to the same company, which called at Queenstown, yesterday reports that the Tripoli is still on the rocks but has not been to all appearance injured by the action of the sea. Her cargo is being rapidly taken out, and if the fine weather continues it is thought she may be got off. Her safety, however, depends entirely on the state of the weather.

We learn by telegram from Washington, of Saturday's date, that the Committee on Foreign Relations has agreed to report favourably on the supplemental article to the Treaty of Washington. The question will now come under the consideration of the Senate, and the proposed article must be ratified by two-thirds of that body, or it will fall through. The debate in the Senate will probably last some days; and the opposition to the acceptance of the codicil will be led by Mr. Sumner, who has already made himself so conspicuous as an advocate of the claim for consequential damages. The final vote is expected to be taken towards the end of this week. The delay caused by the length of the debate is considered favourable to the ultimate acceptance of the proposition.

The "New York Herald" which six months ago laughed at Horace Greeley for President, has swung right round, and now devotes a page of the paper to his praise and another to speeches in his behalf. If there be anything in this sudden revolution by the strongest Grant journal in America, Mr Greeley's success seems not insecure. The "Herald" prints a very handsome sketch of Greeley, and it would appear as if the "Herald" for the time forgot the great rivalry of the "Tribune." We learn that Mr Greeley was born in February, 1811. His father, Zachariah Greeley, was a farmer, and the family is of Scotch-Irish origin. Horace is the eldest survivor of seven children. He resolved early in life to follow the profession of a printer. In the spring of 1829 he entered as an apprentice the office of the "Northern Spectator," a weekly paper, published in East Poutney, Rutland County, Vt. In that office he laboured diligently to learn the art of printing and soon became assistant editor. In June, 1830, Mr Greeley's apprenticeship was brought to a sudden close by the suspension of the "Spectator." His family, meantime, had removed to Erie County, Pa., and after spending a few weeks with them he worked for a short time as journeyman printer in Jamestown, also in Lodi, N.Y., and subsequently for a longer period in Erie, Pa. His knowledge of statistics and of party movements and leaders was even then so extensive and accurate that he soon became regarded as a high authority upon those points. During August, 1831, Mr Greeley came to New York city. His whole worldly gear upon his arrival consisted of a suit of blue cotton jeans, two brown shirts, a chip hat, a pair of brogues, and less than five dollars in money. He speedily secured employment as journeyman printer, and continued working at his trade in various offices till January 1, 1833, when he commenced business for himself, entering into partnership with Mr Francis Story. Greeley and Story were the printers of Dr Sheppard's "Morning Post," the first penny daily paper ever published in New York. This journal, however, failed in three weeks. The "New Yorker," a weekly journal, devoted to politics and literature, was commenced on the 22nd of March, 1834, with Mr Greeley as editor. Its circulation was very large for that period; still, owing to some defect in its business management, the paper barely supported itself. In 1841, Mr. Greeley commenced the publication of the New York Daily "Tribune," and in the following autumn commenced the weekly "Tribune." In 1848, Mr. Greeley was elected to Congress to fill a vacancy, and served from December 1st of that year to March 4th, 1849. His Com-

freemen at this hour, being governed by majorities not of two-thirds, but of a mythical number—if our liberty in all things is not infringed by living under a state of government by majorities, how shall it be infringed if we have in this matter a majority two to one, which is required before the Permissive Bill can be put into execution?—I did not mean to say as much as this, but I have expressed to you how heartily I concur in this first resolution; and I am perfectly convinced that so long as the people are consulted in this matter, as long as the discussion upon the Permissive Bill is conducted in the region of high politics, or when it descends a little lower into the sphere of gross financial progress (hear, hear), so long as there is a monopoly of capitalists who possess an every-ready extending and tyrannical moral and political power over Parliament and the country, I believe that there will be no counterpoise, no moral force sufficient to meet and throw over that incubus which is upon us, but the arising of a moral use of the mass of the people, especially the working men and the wage-earning mothers of that class—the, and the little children too (hear, hear). When we have attained that we shall have got a counterpoise sufficient to balance and then to cast off the enormous tyranny of a great monopoly. I most heartily support the Permissive Bill now more than ever. I will add no words, but simply move the resolution (applause).

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One of the guardians of the Roscommon Poor Law Union has a strong idea of the importance of his office. He gave notice a few days since of a motion to be proposed next day. It is to the following effect:—Mr. Holmes then—that is on the 14th inst.—gave notice that he would move on that day for a resolution that the guardian occupying the chair at our meetings be designated as Mr. Speaker; that the guardians in future be addressed as the hon. members, and that our clerk be designated as clerk of this hon. house.

The Liberal Republicans assembled in convention at Cincinnati have proclaimed a "platform" in which they recognize the equality of all men before the law, pledge themselves to maintain the Union, demand an universal amnesty for those concerned in the late rebellion, recommend local self-government and the supremacy of the civil over the military authority, call for a thorough reformation of the civil service, the present state of which they declare to be a scandal and reproach upon free institutions; demand a system of Federal taxation which shall not unnecessarily interfere with the industry of the people, the maintenance of the public credit, and a speedy return to specie payments; oppose all further grants of land to railroads or other corporations, and urge a conciliatory policy towards foreign nations.

MR. GLADSTONE ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.—A meeting was held on Wednesday at Willis's Rooms, London, in aid of the special endowment fund of the King's College: the Archbishop of Canterbury presided. Mr. Gladstone, in proposing a resolution in favour of religious education, said they had recently seen decrees from Rome which seemed to foreshadow perpetual warfare against the progress and improvement of the human mind; on the other hand, it was painful to see books circulating among the instructed classes of society which spoke of Christianity as an antiquated superstition. The Bishop of Peterborough said unsectarian education had no foundation in good, and would do no good for the welfare of man here or hereafter. The other speakers were the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, Lord Littleton, Mr. Denison, and Mr. W. H. Smith. A list of subscriptions was announced.

MR. GATHORNE HARDY ON PUBLIC AFFAIRS.—Mr. Gathorne Hardy, M.P., presided over a Conservative gathering at Canterbury the other night. In responding to his health, he made a long speech, devoted to a detailed censure of the policy of the present Government. Mr. Hardy expressed his belief that if matters went on as at present the Liberal party would become no party at all. In answer to the argument that Conservatives had no policy, he referred to the numerous speeches of Lord Derby and Mr. Disraeli, and the unanimous political feeling of the party in the Lords. Turning on education, he complimented Mr. Forster on his fairness towards the Conservatives, but thought that more might have been conceded to them. It beloved (Churchmen) to see that the education question was not settled in opposition to their interest. He predicted the speedy accession of the Conservative party to power.

LIBERAL DEMONSTRATION AT GLOUCESTER.—At Gloucester the other evening a Liberal demonstration took place in connection with the local Registration Society. Messrs. Monk and Price, the city members, attended. Mr. Price admitted that the Liberal party in Parliament was not so united as before; but urged that as much dissatisfaction prevailed on the opposite benches. He thought Mr. Gladstone was to blame for the Admiralty disasters; but believed his Government would be as popular as ever when the cloud which now darkened the political horizon had blown away. If Conservatives were to take office Liberals would at once be renounced. Mr. Monk attributed the postponement of useful legislation to the incessant talk of the Conservatives and the members below the gangway. He thought that the supporters of the Government would do well to take the Alabama difficulty. Mr. Monk denounced the Permissive Bill, deeming the Government measure sufficient.

EXPERIENCE IN POULTRY RAISING.—The following communication, signed by "A Farmer's Wife," appears in an American contemporary:—For several years I was very unsuccessful in raising chickens and little turkeys. They would hatch out nicely; I was very careful of them, fed them well, and gave them plenty of drink, but before they were a week old most of them would drop and die. If an old hen were so wise as to steal a few worms, and keep her brood away from my numerous dishes and spoon, she would raise more chickens than those that I helped about. For a few seasons I just let them take care of themselves, but that was a trouble they would raise the mischief in the garden, and wander off and get mixed up with the neighbours' poultry; and chicken-raising was a losing business with us. I finally set about investigating the business in earnest. I knew of course something was wrong. My first discovery was that the food I gave the chickens swelled in their little crops and burst them; so I commenced mixing their food every twelve hours, thereby giving it time to swell to its utmost capacity before feeding it. But all was not yet as it should be; they would die occasionally in spite of me. Finally, by observation and inquiries into the digestive organs, I discovered the cause. I found that the gizzard was not supplied with material for grinding the food, and it was, therefore, either undigested and remained dormant, or hardened in the crop. Since then I have, for the first meal I give them, pounded up glass or broken crockery as fine as convenient, and they will pick up the atoms as they walk, and before they will touch any nourishing food. Regularly three times each week I give them a supply of the pulverized crockery; and I would not ask for better success than has attended my raising of poultry. When they are about four weeks old, I mix a little sulphur with their food twice a week; it prevents the pip, and also keeps them free from lice. Throughout the winter I give all my poultry a supply of material for their grist-mill once in about two weeks; they will rush for it with great eagerness. I also mix cayenne pepper with their food occasionally—give them hot drinks, and plenty of earth or ashes to roll in. There is work in raising poultry, but it is worth doing at all it is worth doing well; and there is nothing more discouraging than to have a fine brood of chickens hatch out, and in a few days to have them all gone, and the poor hen go clucking around you, as if reproaching you for your neglect. I do not think people generally keep their poultry clean enough for health. A little whitewash on their roosts is a good luxury to them; also fresh earth, quite often renewed on the floor of the henneries; the nests cleared out often, and fresh straw or hay furnished. It is really pleasant to hear them grate their thankfulness for such favours.
